 A letter from the Department of Natural Resources concerning phosphorous compounds from wastewater was read. Bruce Daniels was requested to attend the meeting scheduled March 16 in Monroe. Some estimates on equipping our present facilities for phosphate treatment indicate the cost would be \$50,000 to \$75,000 with an additional daily cost of approximately \$18 for chemicals. Further information is to be obtained.  
 Fitzgerald listed activities of the Public Works for the previous two weeks. Detour signs have been ordered for traffic control during the Main Street bridge repairs, and the file for the intersection at the north end of Macomb St. and the railroad are in place with grading planned as soon as the frost is out. Village Planning Commission Minutes

February 17, 1972

The postponed regular meeting of the Village Planning Commission was held at the Village Hall, with members present Curley, Widmayer, Leeson, Kraus, Walton, Althouse, Little, and later, Kirk.

Also present were Mr. Sang Nam, of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, Mrs. Bruce Daniels, Supt. of Public Works, and a number of Manchester business people.

Chairman Curley opened the meeting at 7:15 p.m. for general review of the planning up to the present.

Mr. Nam presented maps and explanations of present and proposed parking areas, especially those to the rear of the north side of Main St. business places. The total future possibilities are laid out in stages of development which might be followed over a period of many years.

For the benefit of several guests who might not be familiar with the overall plan, Mr. Nam repeated the showing and description of several maps and overlays of the entire village with the various use areas depicted, and then maps of the central business district (CBD), including traffic flow patterns and other outstanding features.

These illustrate certain problem conditions which must be solved to revitalize the CBD. For east-west through traffic there are three possibilities: approximately "as is", following Main St. through the center of the business section; secondly, a northern route following the vacated railroad right-of-way; and thirdly, by-passing the main business section to the south, via Duncan St. Suggestions for pedestrian movement are also shown. Charts indicate parking facilities as they exist, in comparison to business needs, along with anticipated needs. Other recommendations are made for practical correction of some other problems, through short and medium range implementation of changes.

Following a brief recess, the business meeting was called to order at 9:00 p.m., by Chairman Curley. A group was present from the University of Michigan, Department of Landscape Architecture, who are conducting a continuation of the study of Manchester's visual characteristics which was begun last year.

Mr. Guy DeVaul, Mr. Larry Happle, Mrs. Jo Dansard, and Mr. Skip Mills will be working on suggestions for preservation and/or improvement of specific areas, and perhaps will be able to go somewhat into means of funding these projects.

The minutes of the last meeting were read, and on the motion by Little, seconded by Althouse, were approved.

Some difficulties have been caused by conflicts with our regularly scheduled meeting days. It was moved by Walton that henceforth we shall meet on the third Thursday of each month, at 7:30 p.m. at the Village Hall, unless otherwise arranged. Motion supported by Althouse, and approved.

Election of officers for the ensuing year was declared to be in order. It was moved by Kraus that the incumbent officers be renominated, and a unanimous ballot be cast for their election. The motion was seconded by Kirk, and the roll-call vote was all "aye". The incumbent officers were declared elected.

(Organization of the Manchester Village Planning Commission for the ensuing year is as follows: Edward Curley, Chairman; Lyle Widmayer, Vice-Chairman; Laurin Leeson, Secretary; and Members John Althouse, Harry Kraus, L. V. Kirk, David Little, Tom Walton, and Stanton Roesch.)

Ch. Curley brought up the question of possible rezoning of the 17 acre parcel of property straddling the eastern extremity of Duncan Street, from "Industrial" to "Residential". There has been an informal request from Mr. Don Limpert to ascertain the status of planning for this area at this time. Mr. Peter K. Olmsted, who is the prospective developer of this parcel for residential purposes was present, and explained something of his ideas. He will have more explicit details of his intentions and plans for the next meeting.

In reference to the question of lot size, the present basic minimum size is 7000 Sq. Ft., with 60 ft. frontage on a street.

After review of several considerations involved, it was moved by Kraus that we should recommend (for future developments) a minimum basic lot size of 13,000 sq. ft. The motion was seconded by Little, and unanimously approved. (Note: minimum frontage requirement is to be determined at the next meeting.)

It was moved by Kraus, seconded by Widmayer, that the meeting be adjourned. Adjournment ordered at 10:40 p.m. Laurin F. Leeson, Secretary

Do you believe amnesty should be granted to the thousands of draft dodgers who went to Canada rather than serve in the Army during the Vietnam war? —J. B., Sanilac County

I don't believe we should even be talking about amnesty while some men are still being drafted for service in Vietnam. Once the war is over and the draft is over—which I hope will be soon—then it might be more appropriate to consider the merits of various proposals that have been suggested.

Could you give me information on student loans? My son is a student at Michigan State University and has tried unsuccessfully to secure a loan at an East Lansing bank. He was turned down because he had not lived there for a year. The two banks in our little town say they are not making student loans. —N. G., Oakland County

Under the Student Loan Program of the National Defense Education Act, which I co-authored in 1958, more than 2 million young Americans have secured some \$2.2 billion in loans to help pay for their education. Enclosed is a booklet published by the Office of Education, HEW, which contains information on this and other student assistance programs. In addition, I suggest your son inquire at the financial aid office at MSU for additional help.

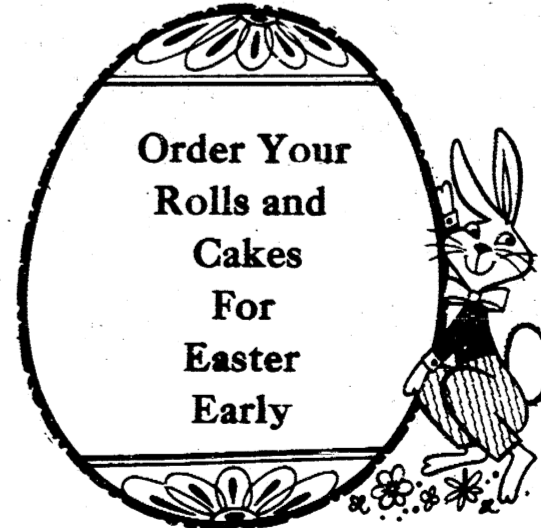

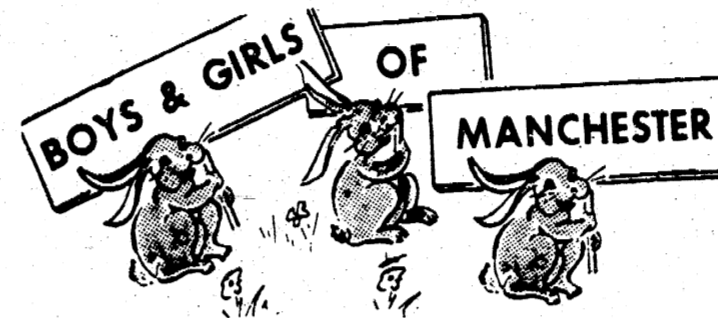
