





Celebrate Spring with Shortcake

Baskets of red-ripe strawberries have become a bright accent on produce shelves the year around. But real berry connoisseurs are partial to the berry grown in their own area. So the top season for strawberry shortcake is the time of the native harvest. For a tender unusual biscuit shortcake use corn starch along

/4 cup margarine 1/2 cup corn starch
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt

Sift together flour, corn starch, baking powder and salt into mixing bowl. Cut in margarine until coarse crumbs form. Mix in milk with fork just until dough forms. Gently knead on lightly floured surface 15 times. Roll to 4-inch thickness. Cut with loured 2 ½ inch biscuit cutter. Place on ungreased baking shee and bake in a 450° F. (very hot) oven until lightly browned, 15 to 20 minutes. Break biscuits apart while warm, but not hot. Whip the cream. Spoon cream on bottom halves. Top with half of berries. Cover with biscuit tops, more whipped cream and
