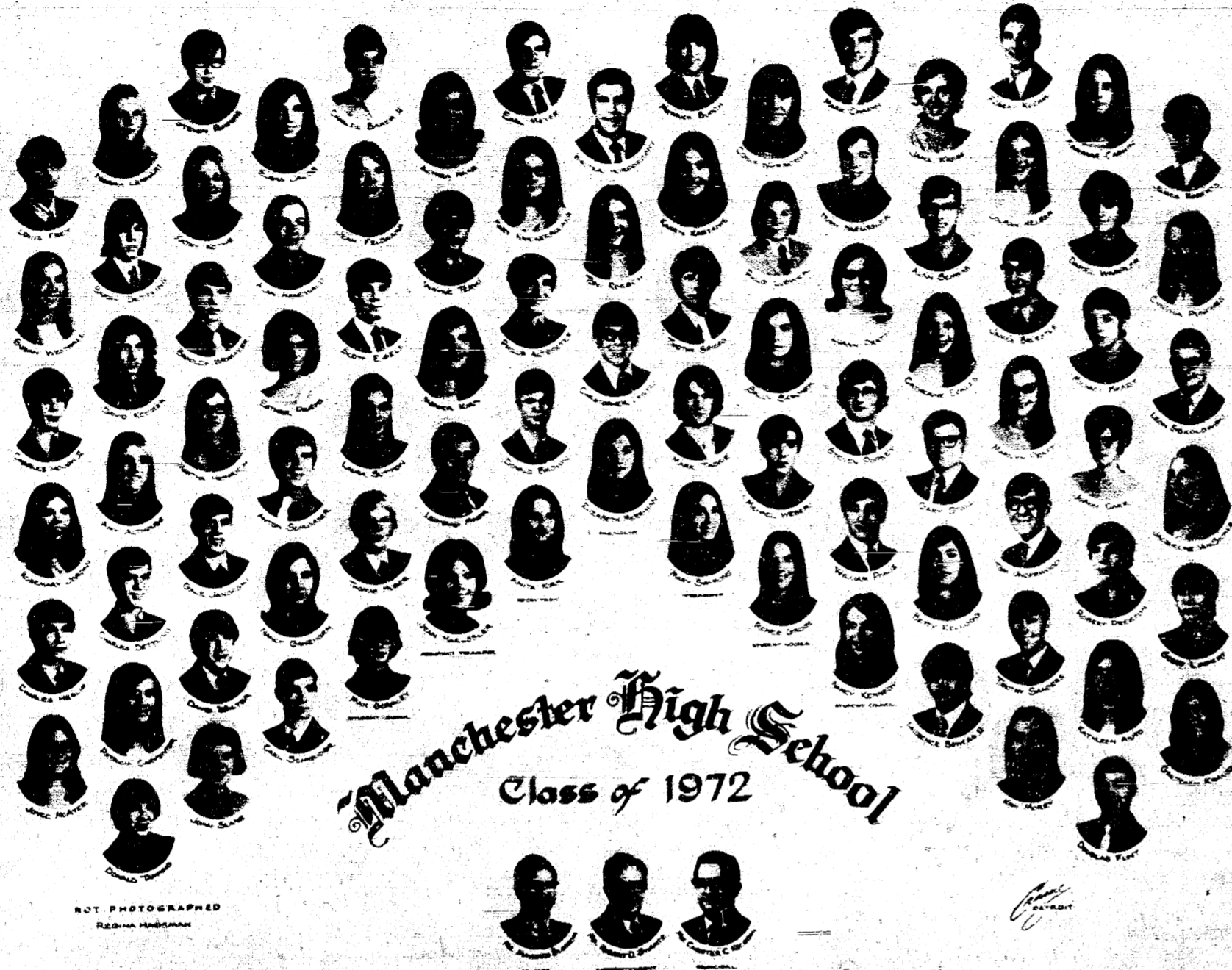
Glass Recycling Pick-up June 3

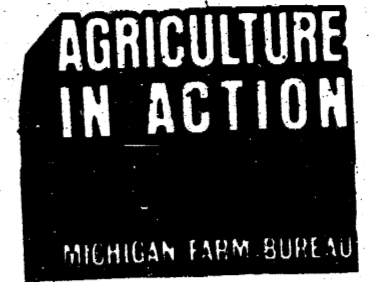

OUR CONTRIBUTION

Few people truly realize what agriculture means to the state of Michigan.

It provides the second largest source of income to our state, even though only one out of every hundred citizens operate a farm. Twenty-seven percent of our state's population derives some part of their income from agriculture.

Our vast crop production is achieved on 13 million acres of land which produces more than two and one-half billion dollars worth of commodities when sold at retail outlets.

Michigan produces a variety of crops, but ranked fifth or higher among all the states in the production of nineteen foods in 1971. We ranked first in the nation's production of blueberries, red tart cherries, dry edible beans, Eastern white soft winter wheat and prune plums. We placed second in the production of pickling cucumbers and third with apples, carrots and celery.

Our state is often referred to as the bean capitol of the United States. We produce almost all of the navy (pea) beans grown in the country and a large portion of cranberry beans, yelloweyes and red kidney beans. In 1971 Michigan ranked first in the nation with a total bean crop of almost 590 million pounds worth over sixty-eight and one-half million dollars. The state's eleven thousand growers harvested beans from 590,000 acres of land in the Saginaw-Thumb area.

Michigan is also the leading producer of plantation grown Christmas trees. In 1971 over five and a quarter million Michigan evergreens were sold. The Christmas tree growing and marketing business now exceeds \$26 million annually.

We should be proud of the contribution Michigan's agriculture makes to our communities, state and nation.

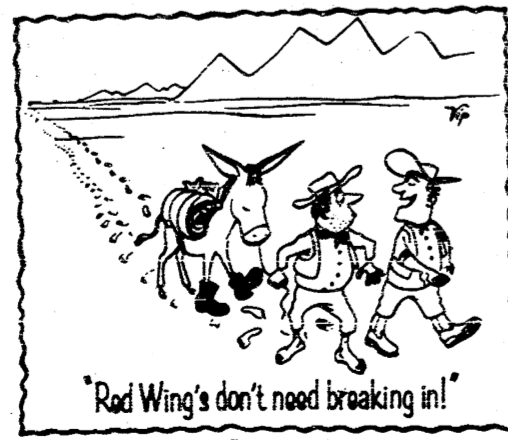

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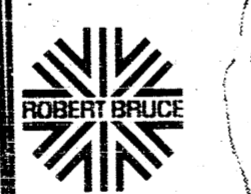

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MIDDLE SCHOOL TRACKMEN RECORD BREAKERS

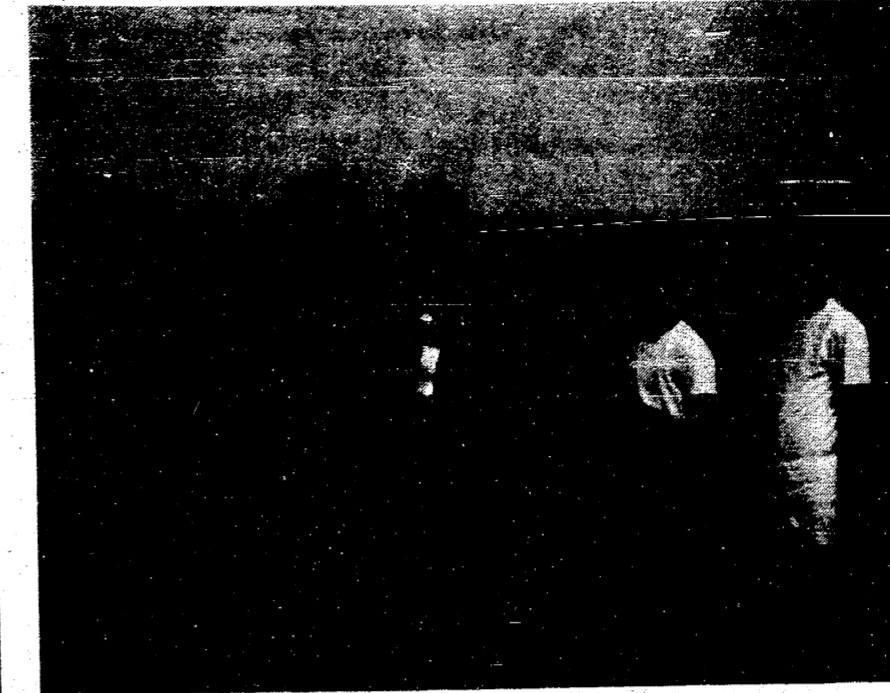

FAST TIMES FOR MIDDLE SCHOOL CROSS-COUNTRY RUNNERS

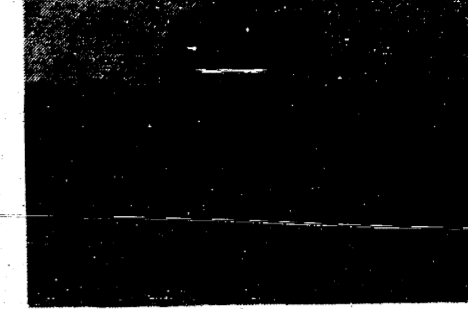
The 8th Grade spring cross-country meet was held last Tuesday at the Klager Elementary School Varsity course, and some fine times were recorded for the one mile course.

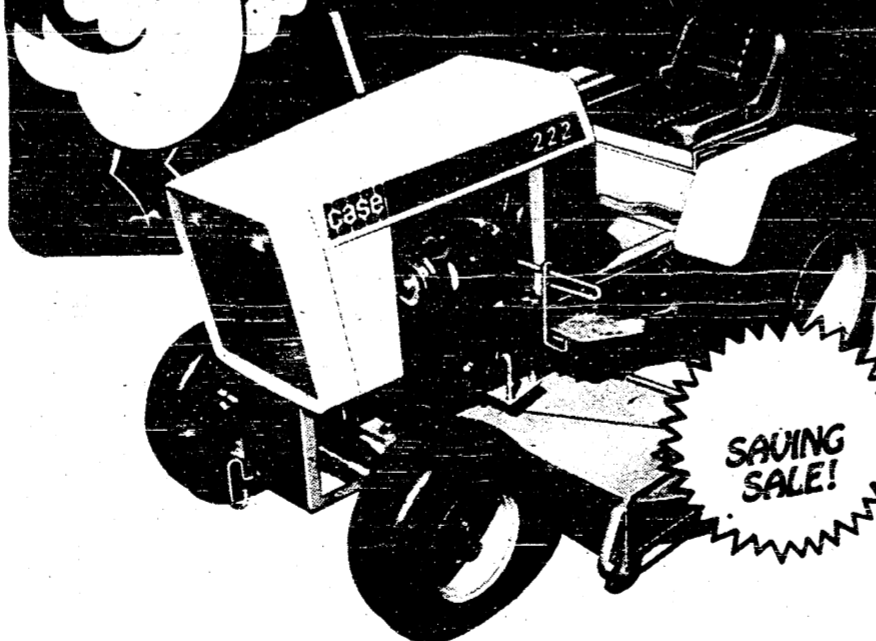

TESTING FOR TB A1 ORK

Mass testing for TB in children is being deemphasized these days. But tuberculin testing in industry is on the increase.

There are reasons for the change of emphasis. For one thing, only a small percentage of children who are tested in school programs show a positive reaction to the tuberculin test. Tuberculin testing identifies people who have tuberculous infections; these people can be given preventive treatment so they will not develop active disease.

Once children and even adults with tuberculous infections are spotted, however, it can be a problem to convince them to take pills so they will not develop active TB. The situation is quite different in industry.

Take Wisconsin as an example. In a recent article in "Medical Tribune," Dr. Richard P. Jahn—medical director of the Wisconsin Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association—reports that less than one percent of primary school children in the state show a positive reaction to the tuberculin test. In fact, 98 percent of all positive reactors in the state are over 20 years of age. And 84 percent are above the age of 35. Obviously, tuberculin testing programs should aim at adults.

An original demonstration and training program was set up by the Association in industries in the state. Tuberculin positive rates in many industries were high. And—a factor essential for TB prevention—workers were willing to begin a year-long preventive treatment program, which meant taking a drug called isoniazid in one dose every day before breakfast. As a result, many industries decided to finance and continue their own permanent TB prevention programs. Tuberculin testing was made a prerequisite for employment in many industries.

TB can be eradicated. And preventive programs in industry can play a central role in controlling the disease. See you tuberculosis and respiratory disease association. They have the facts:

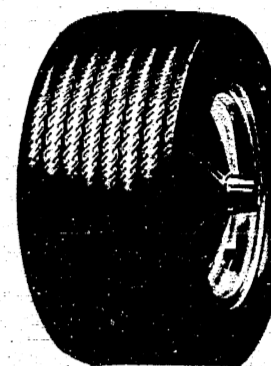

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Ask Senator GRIFFIN



To cut through red tape members of Congress can often lead a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to Senator Robert F. Griffin, Senate Office Building, Washington D.C. 20510.

We live in a mobile home and pay rent on our space in a trailer park. The owner of our trailer park is now threatening to raise our rent and says he's not subject to rent controls. Is that right?
—B. J., Macomb County

No, he is wrong. If a trailer park operator leases space for residential purposes, rent regulations do apply. Incidentally, even a boat slip is covered by rent controls if it is leased for a houseboat used for residential purposes.

On March 16, 1971, I ordered three sets of Eisenhower unrecirculated coins from the Treasury Department for \$10.50. Five months later I sent in a newspaper clipping showing that some of the banks were selling them—but I still haven't received my coins. Can you help?
—P. T., Muskegon County

Your coins are on their way. Treasury receives orders for proof sets from coin collectors under four different programs. Bank orders are accorded a processing priority. Treasury advises that ordinarily it takes six to twelve months to handle the orders from individual collectors. You will want to have that in mind when you place future orders.

My wife recently gave me a wine-making kit for my birthday. I've been told there's a limit on how much wine I can make legally. Is that true? If so, what's the limit?
—B. M., Grand Rapids

The head of a family, who registers with the Internal Revenue Service, is allowed to make up to 200 gallons of wine a year tax-free so long as it is for family use and not for sale. The IRS is sending you Form 1541, on which you can register and qualify to make wine for family consumption.

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
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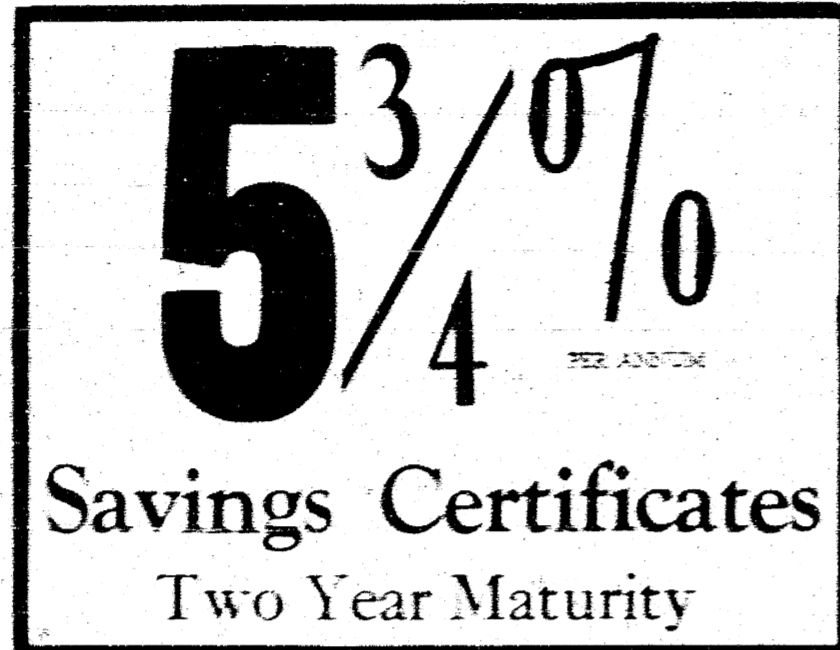
