NEW FARM WHEAT ALLOTMENT

A new farm wheat allotment may be established for the 1973 crop of wheat for farms that did not have a 1972 allotment if they meet eligibility requirements. Mr. Raymond Girbach of the Washtenaw County ASC Committee announced today.

A 1973 wheat allotment will be established automatically for all farms that had a wheat allotment in 1972.

To be eligible for a new farm allotment, the operator must expect to receive 50 percent or more of his income from farming. Neither the owner or the operator may have an interest in any other farm which has a 1973 wheat allotment, and the person making application must have had at least two years experience in the last five years in producing wheat.

Applications for a new farm allotment must be filed in the county office on or before June 30, 1972. Any interested producer who can meet these requirements should contact the county office before the final date for filing an application.

MANY VETERANS LET OTHERS CARRY LOAD

A vast number of veterans, who do not join veterans organizations, really get a free ride on benefits, as is pointed out by Senator Vance Hartke, Chairman of the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee.

Said the Senator in a floor statement recently:

"Of the 28 million veterans in America less than seven million belong to organized veterans' groups, which are chartered by the Congress and which act as effective spokesmen for the whole roster of former servicemen."

"The organized veterans provide the only ready representation, the only forum, the only real say in what is accomplished at the Federal level. Seldom does the non joiner give the veterans group a second thought. Content with his benefits, he pays no credit to those who gained them. In some circles, it is even fashionable to slight them. We have all heard the term professional veteran. That should be in the realm of a compliment. It takes a professional to win something. The organized groups have worked long and hard in the veterans behalf, and they continue to insist, from Capitol Hill to the State houses, on assistance, better hospital care and rightful benefits."

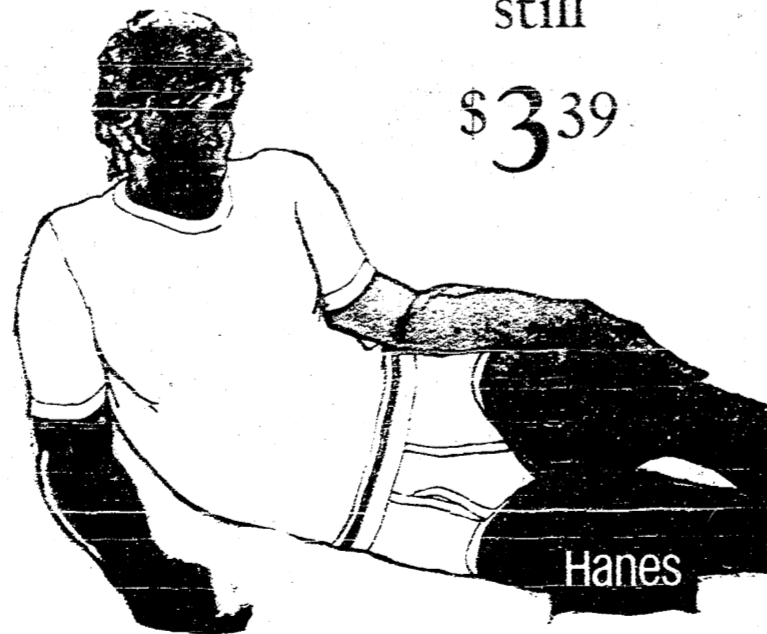

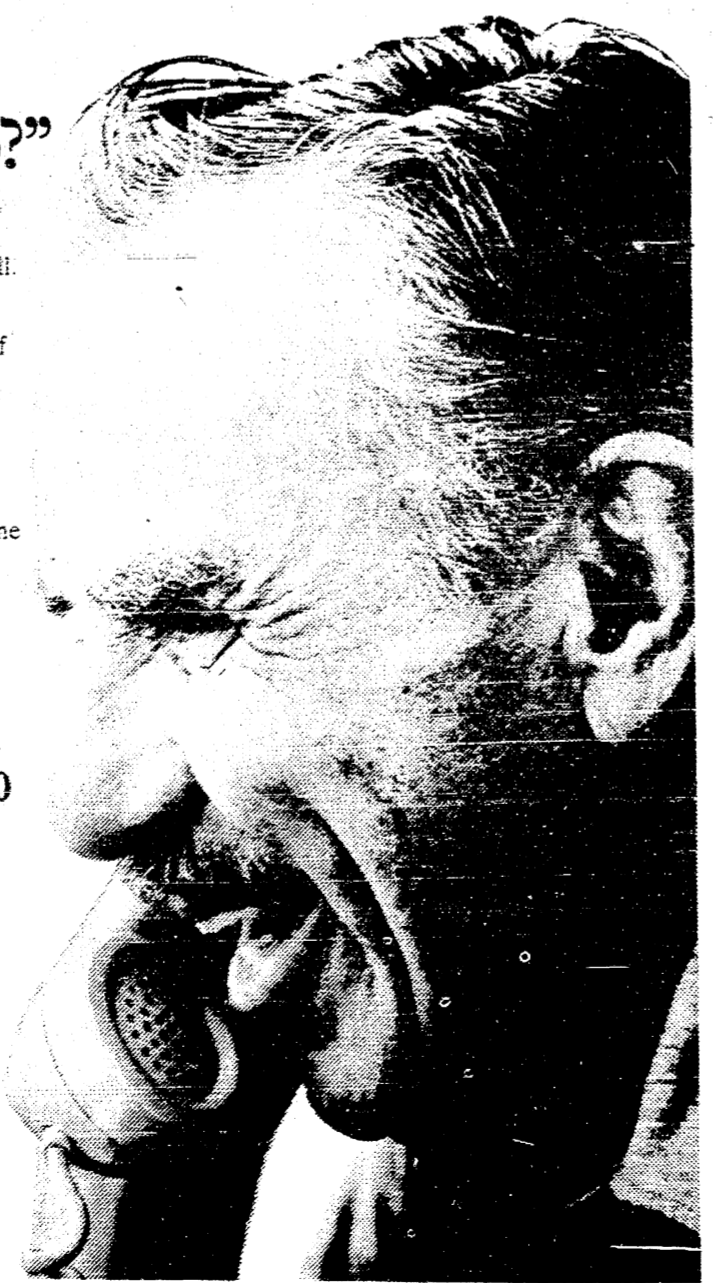

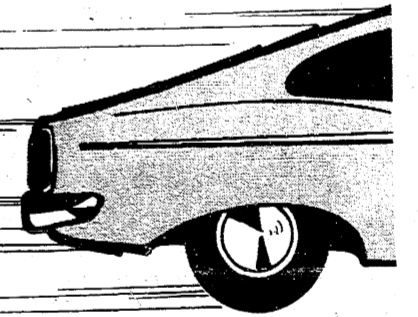

ALCOHOL SAFETY ACTION

Manchester community, church, and service groups can now schedule a summer showing of "GUILTY VIC-TIMS: The Problem Drinker Behind the Wheel," newly produced in Washtenaw County by local film maker, Bob Ferguson of Ann Arbor.

The film is a documentary on the Washtenaw Alcohol Safety Action Program and features interviews with several county residents who are involved in the project's Antabuse Program. (Antabuse is a drug which helps a person stop drinking because it will make him sick when combined with alcohol.)

These clients of the Washtenaw Council on Alcoholism call on film how the program has altered their lives since they were screened by court counselors for the program.

With the new court procedures outlined in the film, these drunk-driving offenders and many others over the past year and a half were given the option of probation and participation in

a treatment program, once it was determined that, for them, alcohol had become a serious problem.

Viewers will see how some of their neighbors are being helped through group discussions and education as well as through the use of Antabuse, to find a more satisfying future without alcohol dependency.

Showings can be arranged by calling Nancy Boyer at the Washtenaw Council on Alcoholism (971-7900). She will arrange for a speaker to show the film and answer questions about the Alcohol Safety Action Program. Programs can also be arranged to cover any aspect of the drinking and driving problem.

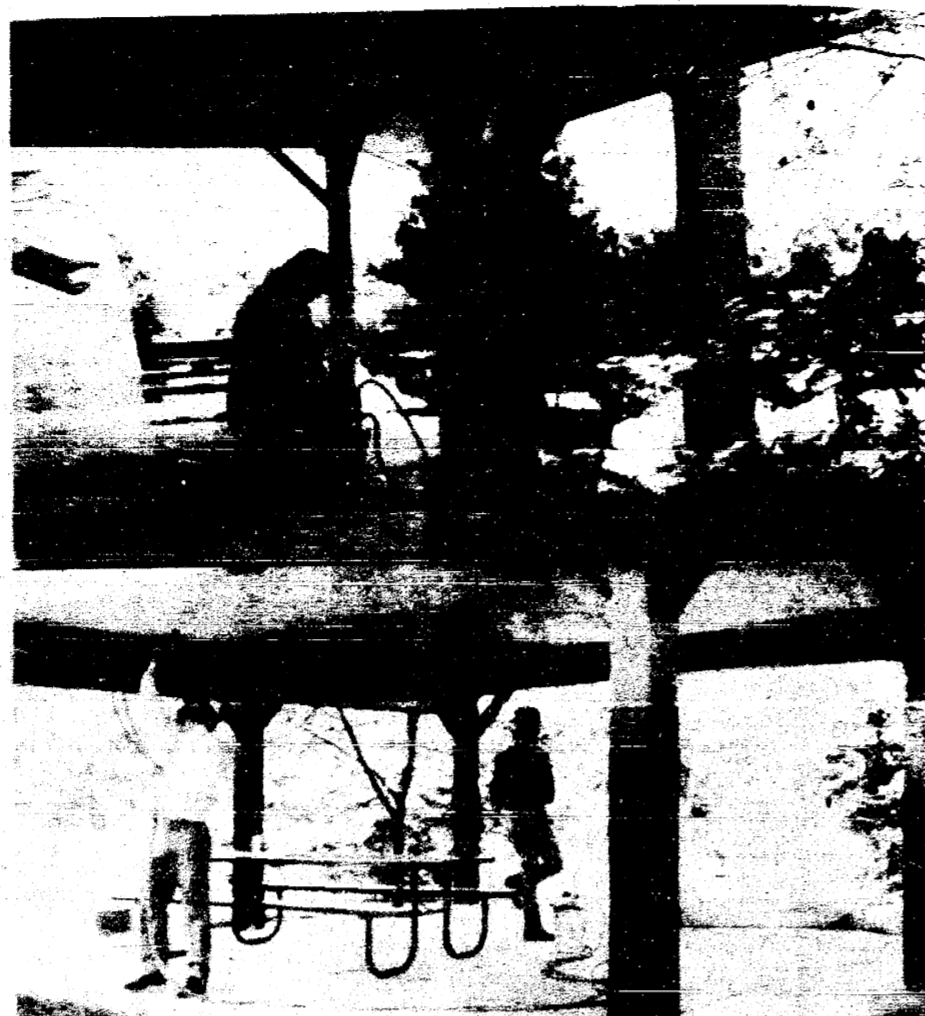

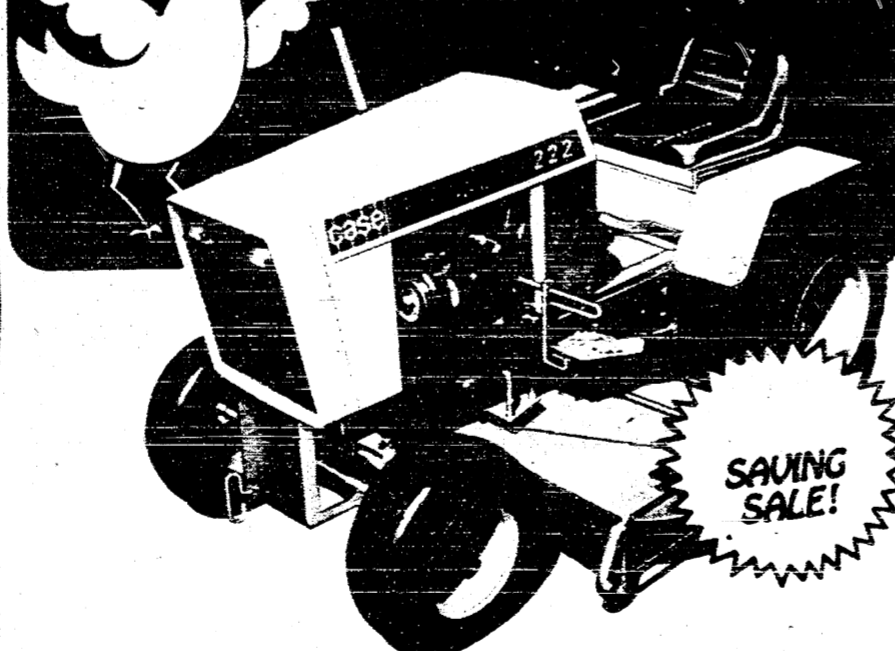

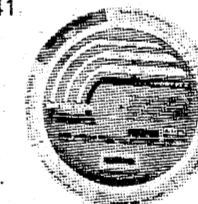

Township Meeting

The Regular Meeting of the Manchester Township Board was held in the Village Hall on Monday at 8 p.m., May 15, 1972.

The members present were Clarence Fielder, Dorothy Burch, Ambrose Lentz, Lyle Widmayer, and Waldo Marx.

The clerk was asked by chairman Fielder to read the minutes of the last regular meeting held Monday, April 10 at 8 p.m. It was moved by Ambrose Lentz and seconded by Lyle Widmayer that the minutes of the above regular meeting be accepted as read. Motion was carried.

Harold Burch, the custodian of the voting machines of Manchester Township, then presented to the Township Board the need for a plywood cover over the election machines which were stored in a small room in the fire hall. This would keep the fire off the machines and allow space above to store the fence, gate tables, etc. Things needed in carrying on the election.

It was moved by Lyle Widmayer and supported by Dorothy Burch that this should be done and to have Harold Burch look into the matter and have someone do the work. Motion was carried.

The Manchester Township Board at this meeting had two members of the Washtenaw County road commission present, Chairman P. Kock and Managing Director T. Vaillicourt to discuss the road problems of Manchester.

Many of the danger spots in our road system around Manchester were discussed and it was agreed by both parties that we should have aid from the county road commission to remedy these bad spots and also keep our roads built up. The Washtenaw County road commission has promised to do all they can to improve the conditions of our roads. At this point Mr. Kock and Mr. Vaillicourt left the meeting.

It was agreed that on the following day, May 9, Manchester Township would send a letter with the following directions in regard to just laying on Manchester Township roads to Washtenaw County road commission, attention Thomas Vaillicourt. This was done.

1. After May 30, chloride will be spread for 400 feet in front of each house on local roads in Manchester Twp.
2. The Road Commission will immediately spread brine water on the entire length of Schiewels Road to Bowers Rd. then east to M-22 and after May 30 they will complete the chloride coverage.

We will then notify them each time a new coverage is needed.

At our May 8th meeting of the Manchester Township Board we signed a fire protection contract with Norwell Township residents who use Manchester area telephones. The purpose being to provide better fire protection to this area.

The Manchester phone number to call for fire protection is 645-3111 for fire service. If for a good reason you need to burn openly arrange in advance for a burning permit from the Manchester Fire Dept. The following is a supplemental sheet #1 Fire protection contract.

Before May 1, 1972 if a fire should occur in Norwell Township under this agreement there will be a grand-by fee of \$100.00. There will be a copy of \$225.00 for fire hour per call with a charge of \$175.00 for the second hour and each hour thereafter. Should Norwell Township have no fires before May 1, 1972 there will be a \$1200.00 yearly experience rate.

The treasurer report as of May 8, 1972 was then given by Dorothy Burch, treasurer. She intends to give a copy at every regular meeting to the township Board.

Moved by Waldo Marx and seconded by Dorothy Burch that the Township Bd. have a \$25.00 petty cash fund. Motion was carried.

The election commission asked the township board their opinion on having a school of instruction to show the electors how to use voting machines for the coming election. This would be beneficial to all age groups. The date would be Friday, May 12, 12 noon to 5 p.m.

It was moved by Ambrose Lentz and seconded by Dorothy Burch to have this voting instruction. Motion was carried.

It was moved by Waldo Marx and seconded by Dorothy Burch to pay the

election help at a rate of \$1.75 per hour. Motion was carried.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

TIME FOR ACTION

In a number of recent court cases across our land, the courts have held, in effect, that reliance on local property taxes to finance public education is unconstitutional under the federal or state constitutions.

The most common agreement in such cases is that a system which makes the level of spending for public education dependent on local wealth violates the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment of the Constitution of the United States.

Nothing in any of these court decisions indicates that the property tax is an unconstitutional tax; or that spending per pupil must be the same in all school districts. The real thing that is in question is the binding of local

school expenditures on local property taxes.

Put this together with the decision of the Michigan Supreme Court on capital outlay projects, such as county and township buildings, etc., where the "sky is the limit" on the amount of property tax that can be levied to pay off indebtedness. This can be done without a vote of the people.

The citizens of Michigan may find themselves faced with a double barreled shotgun in the future if action is not taken.

Presently, petitions are being circulated to place on the November 1972 ballot a meaningful and lasting tax reform program through a basic Constitutional change.

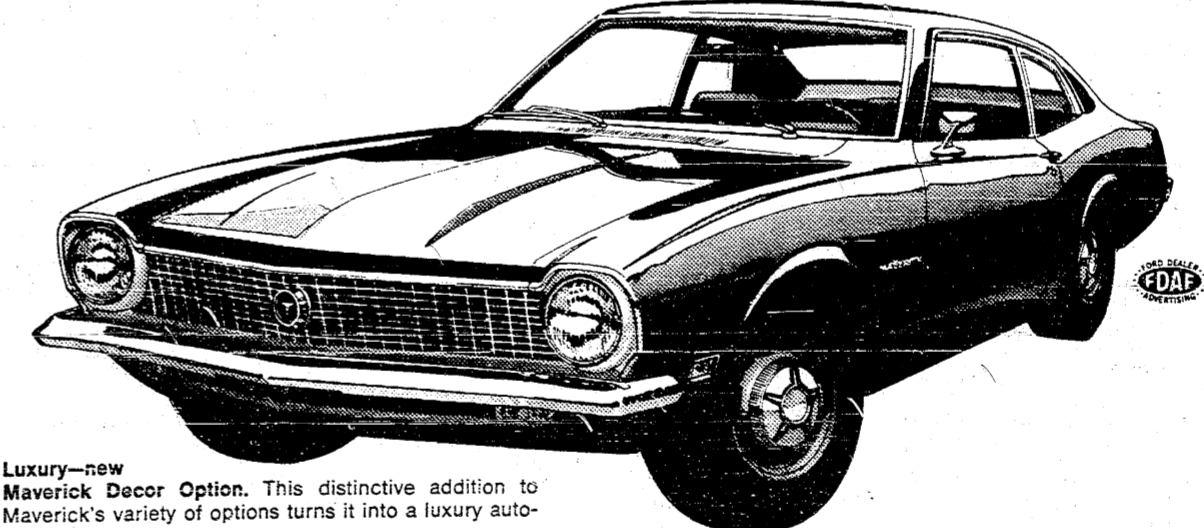
The reform program would put a limit on property tax and set forth a breakdown as to amounts that can be levied for various purposes. The petitions also will solve, as nearly as possible, the problem created by the Supreme Court decision.

The citizens of Michigan cannot afford to get into a bind on how our public education will be financed. We still have the opportunity to do something about it by signing these petitions and then let it be decided at the polls in November.

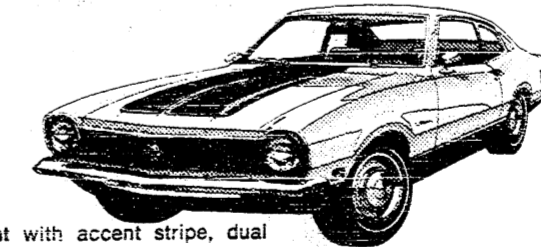
