90 Year Old Family Hardware Business Sold

Ninety years in business in the same family. A goodly share of our town's history is encompassed in that statement. Many memories and much hard work have gone into the forming of a local tradition such as the Widmayer family has offered us.

In 1852, Dr. Kapp lived on Clinton Street and was a partner in building what was known as the Rehffuss and Kapp block. These are the buildings on the South side of Main Street which now house business offices and Rymack Printing.

It was in this same year that Norton and then Kingsley rented one half of this building and operated a Hardware store. Fred Widmayer, at first working here, then buying. It was then known as Widmayers Hardware. On the East it was neighbored by the Rehffuss Butcher Shop and on the West by the old Fred Dietle Saloon. This building (the saloon) later became a candy store and then later a Bear Parlor again. During all these years the Hardware was operated by Fred with the help of his family.

Having married Emma Fausel whose father, Adolph, had come from the old country as a watchmaker and who had owned and operated a jewelry store on the exact corner where the Mobil Station now stands. They had three children, Roland F., Herbert A., and Russell Widmayer. The eldest son, Roland worked in the store until 1918 when he left for World War I. This was the time when Herbert was brought into the store to help after school and on weekends. In 1930 the store moved across the street to the building where the Furniture Store now stands. Ten years later, in 1940, back across the street again to the old Saloon Building. During the following year from 1940 to 1941 plans were made for expansion, and the old building was torn down and the present building erected. Moving in during the month of February of 1941 they have remained there ever since.

The year of 1940 was a busy one, the old building being razed and Main Street entirely blocked off for a carnival. Everyone was in town either to "superintend" the demolition project or to attend the carnival (this was the year of the big crowds-do any of you old-timers remember Stella??). The death of the elder Mr. Widmayer in 1950 and then of Roland in

1963, left Herbert working by himself, for Russell was also a business man in Manchester, having first operated the old Saloon on the corner, then later the tavern where the Black Sheep is now.

In 1935 Herb branched out into another Main Street business. Or, as he says, "during the depression it was hard to make a nickel." He opened the Manchester theatre in the building where the Laundromat now stands. Art Jenter had moved his furniture store out and had also moved the undertaking business from the basement so the 216 seats were installed, two projectors, and the first picture, starring Jean Arthur and the cartoon feature "The Ant and the Grasshopper" showed to a delighted town.

Reminiscing about his very early years, growing up in the Village and working in the store, Herbert recalls the hilarious Halloween's when 40 rolls of wire fencing were rolled all over Main Street and a hay baler was put Continued on Page 4

When I got back to the spot where your son was he immediately accused me of hitting his dog. He based his opinion on the fact that mine was the only car on the road when he found the dog, therefore, he figured I must have hit the dog. AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

SECOND ROUND

Rising retail meat prices made front page news earlier this year and some people are dragging it up again.

During April, a decline in the retail price of beef and pork seemed to calm the public furor, but no one wrote about the decline.

When the Price Commission investigated beef prices the real facts came to light. Farmers and ranchers had nothing to hide. They were finally receiving the same price for beef on the hoof they did twenty years ago.

Beef price is basically determined by consumer demand. If demand surges upward, the price of beef will climb. If demand falls off, beef prices will drop.

The desire for beef on our tables has been increasing. In fact, in the last twenty years, annual beef consumption per person in this country has doubled from 56 pounds per person to 115 pounds today.

Several factors are responsible for the increase. According to Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz, "Rising real wages have had a marked effect upon buying habits. People want beef and, as they have enjoyed more and more real wages, they have been buying more and more beef and better quality beef, too. This is by far the greatest single factor in increasing beef consumption." Butz also pointed out that the substantial increase in the Food Stamp Program has played a major role in meat prices. "In April of 1972, 11.5 million people were participating in the Food Stamp Program. One of the first items purchased with added dollars in the food budget by consumers eligible for Food Stamps is meat, preferably beef," according to Butz.

Farmers are increasing beef production to meet consumers' demands, but we must remember the simple fact that a cow produces just one calf a year which can be kept for increased production or put on the market as beef.

CRASH PROGRAM TO BOOST BLOOD DONATIONS

Red Cross chapters participating in the accelerated program, besides Washtenaw, are those of Macomb County, Garden City, Berkeley, and Detroit.

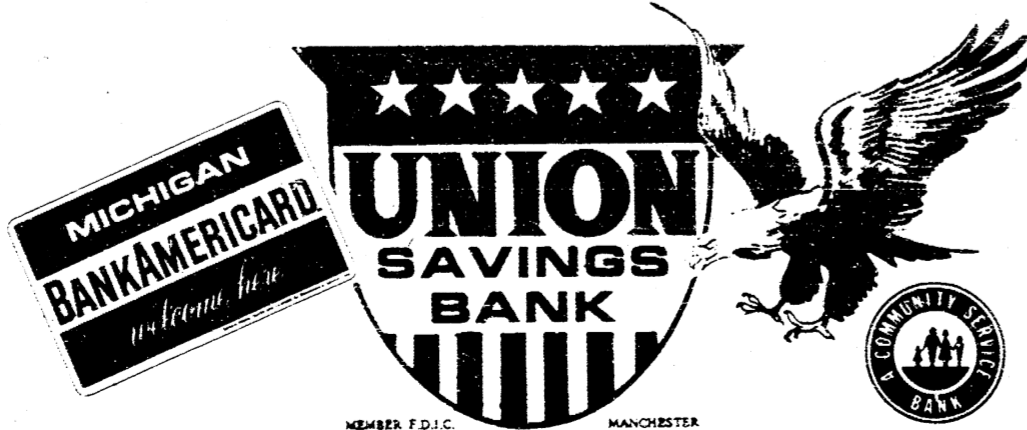

Working in the store for many years was "Uncle Bill" Widmayer and Fred (Doc) Dowling, for in earlier times, when eaves-troughs were sold, why then the old "tin wagon" was loaded and they were delivered and installed. If one bought a kitchen stove it was delivered, set up, and even a fire built in it for a double purpose—to be sure it worked properly and to burn off the fine layer of oil which coated it from the factory. A good roaring fire caused one large kitchen smudge but then she burned clean forever. The service came with the sale.

"Uncle Bill" used to say, "We do everything from the bottom of the well to the top of the chimney."

Herb states it has been a pleasure to serve the people of Manchester and says he is going to be here most of the time. Perhaps a little travel to visit daughter, Doris, and her family in the East.

New owners Samuel and Joan Beal, will operate "Beal's Ace Hardware" in much the same fashion, with

the addition of plumbing and electrical supplies.

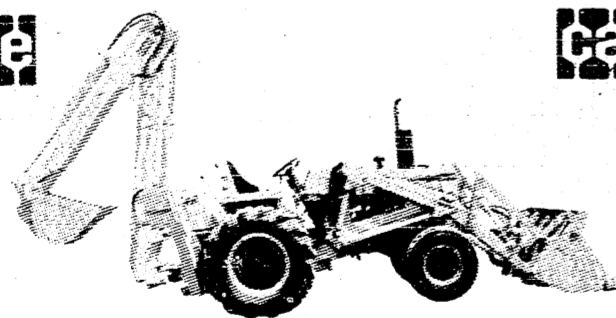

THE AMERICAN'S CREED

by William Tyler Page

The idea of laying special emphasis upon the duties and obligations of citizenship in the form of a national creed originated with Henry S. Chapin. In 1916-17 a contest, open to all Americans, was inaugurated in the press throughout the country to secure "the best summary of the political faith of America." The contest was formally approved by the President of the United States. Through Mayor James H. Preston, the city of Baltimore, as the birthplace of the Star-Spangled Banner, offered a prize of \$1,000, which was accepted, and the following committees were appointed: A committee on manuscripts, consisting of Porter Emerson Browne and representatives from leading American magazines, with headquarters in New York City; a committee on award, consisting of Matthew P. Andrews, Irvin S. Cobb, Hamlin Garland, Ellen Glasgow, Julian Street, Booth Tarkington, and Charles Hanson Towne; and an advisory committee, consisting of Dr. P. P. Claxton, United States Commissioner of Education, governors of States, United States Senators, and other national and state officials.

The winner of the contest and the author of the creed selected proved to be William Tyler Page, of Friendship Heights, Md., a descendant of President Tyler and also of Carter Braxton, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence.

HURON VALLEY GIRL SCOUT COUNCIL MAKES MOVE

On July 12, the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council will move from their offices of the past ten years at 310 S. Huron Street to larger quarters at 19 North Hamilton Street, Ypsilanti, formerly the Conger-Bush funeral home.

The brick and frame building will more than double the office space and triple the parking space of the present building and provide important new facilities for volunteers and staff.

The move was originally recommended by a Long Range Planning Committee under the chairmanship of Wyeth Allen of Ann Arbor, which projected aims and needs of the Council through 1980. The 1970 report showed that the number of Girl Scouts in the Council's area, Washtenaw, Livingston, Western Wayne, and Northern Monroe counties, will grow from 11,000 in 1970 to 16,000 in 1980. Current enrollment is 12,500. The present office was purchased when total enrollment was less than 6,000.

On the basis of this report a request for assistance was made to the Kresge Foundation in Detroit. Their response was a challenge grant of \$50,000, pledged last year with the understanding that the Council raise the rest of the money needed within a year. This was done through a few additional gifts and sale of property to Consumers Power Company and sale of the old office building. No operating funds were used.

In the new building, the 6,600 sq. feet of floor space will be divided into four units, administrative offices, field directors section, meeting rooms and a troop supplies and mailing room. The 66 by 66 foot parking lot will accommodate 20 cars.

For the first time Council President, Mrs. James A. Kennedy, of Ann Arbor, will have an office and Executive Director, Mrs. Jo Stevens, will have a private office from which to direct fiscal control, fund raising, program development and the operation of the three Girl Scout camps belonging to the Council.

A new reference library for troop leaders and staff will be installed in the Field Directors Section. Field Directors direct girls to troops and recruit volunteer troop leaders and their coordinators, Troop Services Directors. Field Directors assist leaders by preparing training materials, advising on program and personnel problems, inform-

ing them on developments in Girl Scouting in other parts of the country and in general providing expertise and encouragement to these women on whom the success of Girl Scouting largely depends.

A second floor apartment will be converted into meeting rooms for Troop Services Directors and leaders for training sessions, program planning seminars, and conferences with National Girl Scout officers. A well-equipped kitchen will make possible the serving of light meals.

The staff of the troop supplies and mailing room will have enlarged space from which to send badges and pins to Girl Scouts, mail to 3,000 adult members the monthly publication "The View of the Valley" edited by Mrs. H. M. Crooks (Nan) of Ann Arbor, and provide troops with tents, movie projectors and other equipment.

An Open House for the new headquarters is planned for September.

I'm a girl and I'm 18 years of age. I want to join the Armed Services, but I find that a girl cannot enlist without her parents' consent unless she is 21. This is unfair and discriminates against women. Men are allowed to enlist at 18 without their parents' consent. Why not women?

—L. P., Detroit

I must agree that the present law is discriminatory. I feel certain it would be held unconstitutional if and when the Equal Rights Amendment, which already has passed both houses of Congress, is ratified by the legislatures of ¾ of the states. At this writing 18 states have ratified the amendment. You will be interested to know that a bill (H.R. 11064) has been introduced in Congress to deal specifically with the point by making enlistment ages the same for men and women. You might wish to write to the Chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, Rep. F. Edward Hebert, Rayburn Office Building, Washington, D.C.

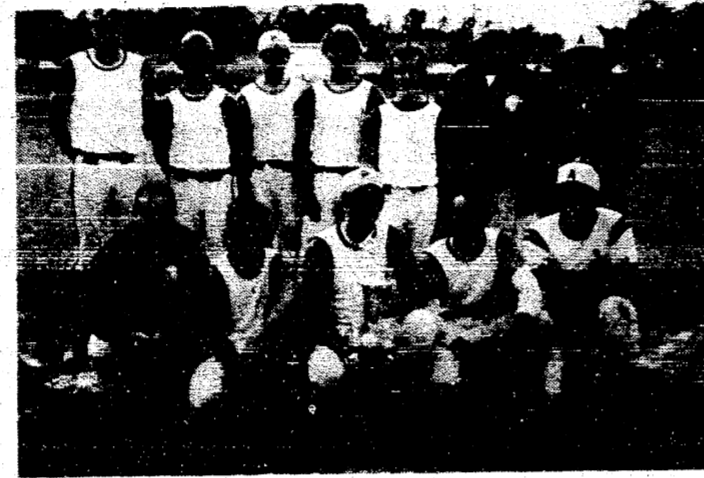
The beauty shop where I get my hair done has raised its prices. I complained but the manager says she is exempt from price controls because the shop makes less than \$100,000 a year. Is this true?

No. A retail store is exempt if its gross sales are less than \$100,000. But service firms, such as laundries, restaurants, television repair shops, and beauty parlors, are required by law to comply with price guidelines. If you think a violation of the price stabilization guidelines has been committed contact your local IRS office.

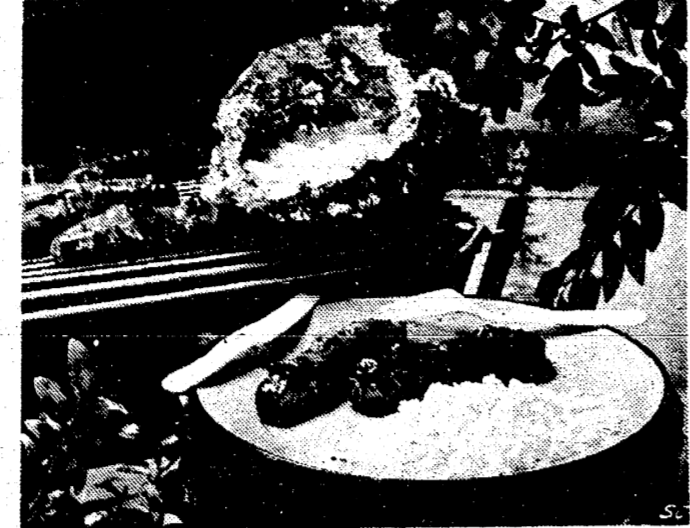

Call of the Wild—Camper's Rice

- Measure two 18-inch square sheets of heavy duty aluminum foil. Place on top of medium bowl; press down to form pouch. Combine rice, instant breakfast drink, salt, and butter in pouch. Fold foil to seal tightly and remove pouch from bowl. When ready to cook, add water and close pouch tightly. Bring to a boil on grill over hot coals. Move to side of grill and let stand at least 5 minutes. Open foil and fluff rice with fork before serving. Makes about 2 1/2 cups or 4 servings.

Trailer Fables Can Get You Into Trouble

Jim Scoggin, safety director for U-Haul, has compiled a list of things to beware of when towing trailers you own or rent. He calls them "trailer fables." Here are some of them:

Some people believe that the rule of loading heavily in front, which places a portion of the trailer weight on the car, is a gimmick invented by trailer manufacturers to save wear and tear on their equipment. This is false. Trailers must be loaded heavily in front for safe towing. Trailers towed by passenger cars should be loaded so approximately 10% of the gross trailer weight (trailer and cargo) is placed on the coupler and hitch. An easy rule of thumb to follow is to position 80% of the cargo weight in the front half of the trailer, and 40% in the rear half. Weight also should be balanced evenly from side to side. This procedure will result in proper weight placement on the coupler and hitch, and is necessary for stability and safety.

Load Tandems Same Way
 Some people believe that tandem axle trailers can be loaded evenly over the axles, thereby eliminating the need for loading heavily in front. This is false. Tandem axle trailers react just like single axle trailers and must be loaded heavily in front the same way. The only reason for a tandem axle is to provide another set of wheels for greater carrying capacity. Some people believe that a rear load can be compensated for by loading the car trunk heavily. This just produces two unstable vehicles instead of one. A variation of this is to overload the trunk of the car first, and then load the trailer heavily.

Watch Water Tanks

If you own a vacation or travel trailer, familiarize yourself with the placement of its water tanks and septic tanks. This can cause serious variations in load distribution. A classic example is a trailer with a water tank in front and a septic tank in the rear. After several days of travel the fresh water is used out of the front tank and transferred to the rear tank. A trailer starting out heavy in front can soon be dangerously heavy in the rear—and in deep trouble.

A last warning deals with human nature. People usually start a trip by following all the rules. They keep their speed within a safe driving range. By the second day, everything has been going so well that it seems reasonable to increase the speed a little. About the third day, they want to reach their destination early; so the speed goes up again. They might make it, if they're lucky; but if they have to make any rapid corrections, such as for sudden wind gusts or dips in the road, their trip could end right there.

In summary, two rules that will help you have safe trailering: load heavily in front, and keep your speed down.
