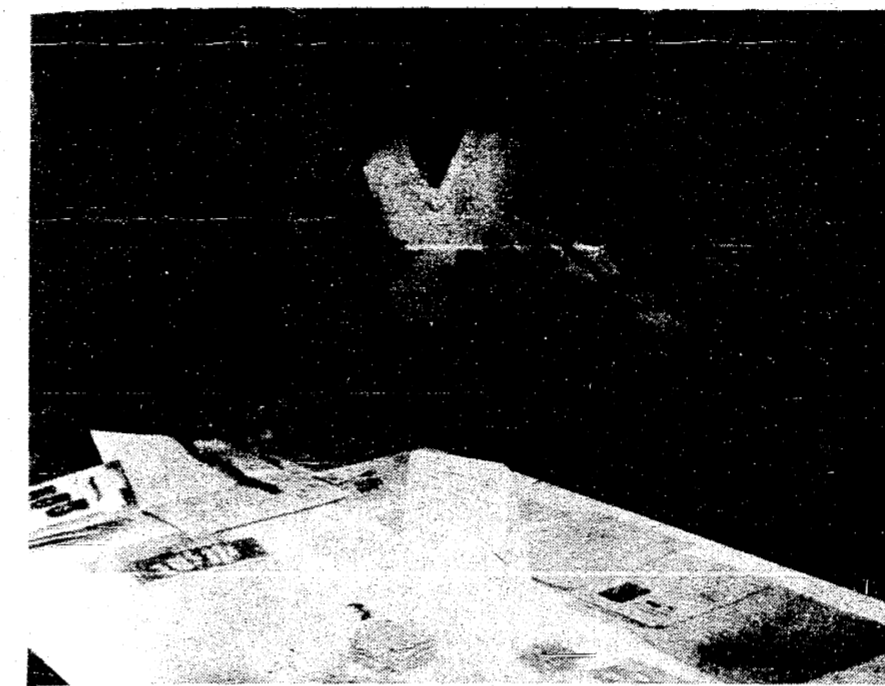

Project Find

Red Cross is heavily involved in a national campaign to identify and enroll elderly and disabled individuals who may be eligible for Federal Food Assistance. Project FIND has two purposes: (1) to immediately relieve the problem of malnutrition among the elderly; (2) to show older persons that an arm of American society cares about their circumstances.

Mrs. Malcolm Blakeley of Dexter, is Red Cross volunteer recruitment chairman for Washtenaw County, while Mrs. Franklin Reck is in charge of the program in the Manchester area.

Project FIND was devised by Dr. Arthur Flemming, chairman of the White House Conference on Aging. The program began when Social Security checks were received in August by more than 27 million individuals throughout the country. Each person received an explanatory brochure and a postcard which they could return should they need assistance.

Approximately 10 cards were returned by local residents. Volunteers will telephone or visit those individuals who are interested in learning more about their possible eligibility for Food Assistance. The Red Cross role is to interpret, not to make final decisions about an applicant's eligibility.

Anyone in the Manchester area who is interested in being contacted should either mail their card to Project FIND or they can phone Red Cross at 971-5300.

The plays are all Johnson originals, and each story is designed to teach the child audience something of value - such as geography, nature study, science, or just plain lessons in living together.

A New Day A New Way

A salute to 4-H will be broadcast nationwide Saturday, October 7, during the halftime ceremonies for the Michigan State vs. Notre Dame football game on the ABC television network. Consult your television program guides for the local broadcast times.

What is 4-H? The letters stand for HEAD, HEART, HANDS and HEALTH. As an organization, a 4-H club means many things to many people.

To a ten year old, it may be a terrific gang of kids who get together to learn to sew, study wildflowers, build bird houses, or bake brownies - with lots of fun on the side. To the social minded teen-ager, perhaps it's a center for learning new skills and enjoying the companionship of other boys and girls. The local leader may see 4-H as a channel through which he can guide boys and girls to a wholesome and happy adulthood. Perhaps as a parent, one would see 4-H as a training organization up which one could trust his most precious possessions - his children - knowing it would nurture their finest qualities. Because young people need parental interest and support in everything they undertake, the 4-H programs are a family affair. Many programs center around the family. Many parents are among the volunteer leaders who participate each year. Young people benefit by both planning and evaluating their own activities under the guidance of parents and leaders. Four-H, at it's best, is a group of boys and girls, local leaders and parents, working together for the finest and fullest development of each individual in a sound educational program.

Who can join a 4-H? Boys and girls who have reached their tenth birthday, regardless of where they may live, may join a 4-H club. They must be ten by October 1st of the following year. Maximum age for a boy or girl is 18. Those members who are more than 14 but not yet 18 are eligible to take part in state and out-of-state activities, and to compete in national contests.

What are the responsibilities of a 4-H member? The 4-H member must, first of all, be interested in learning. Secondly, the 4-H member must complete one project and keep accurate records. Thirdly, the 4-H member must exhibit his or her project at a 4-H fair or a 4-H achievement day. And lastly, 4-H members should participate in special club activities such as judging teams, demonstrations, camps, tours and trips and so on.

Members pay nothing to join a 4-H club. All report forms and project bulletins, with the exception of a few, are free. Clubs may charge dues for their own use if they choose to do so. Four-H begins at home where the interests of its youngest members are - and it grows with them to encompass their county, district, state, nation and world.

Volunteer leaders, who accept as full payment for their time, the joy of seeing boys and girls developing their own finest qualities, direct local groups in community 4-H clubs which involve several local club leaders and many Continued on page 7

It has been called to our attention that during the month of September, 1972, the Home-Vinson Brooklyn Ambulance Co. distributed business cards to residents of Manchester.

We wish to advise the residents of Manchester that no license in Washtenaw County for the purpose in the Ordinance which has been in effect for your convenience.

Don't need license to do this: is operated from a location or headquarters outside of Washtenaw County in order to transport patients who are picked up beyond the limits of Washtenaw County to locations within Washtenaw County.

Need license to do these two: but no such outside ambulance shall be used to pick up patients within Washtenaw County for transportation to locations within Washtenaw County; shall become effective July 1, 1972, and customarily operates from a location outside of Washtenaw County, is called for a patient located in Washtenaw County to be transported to a location outside of Washtenaw County; shall become effective July 1, 1972. The Company is being duly notified.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

September 18, 1972

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by President Little at 7:00 p.m.

Present were trustees Fitzgerald, Mahony, Scully, Stum and Walton; absent - Benedict. Minutes from the Sept. 5, regular meeting were read and approved. Moved by Walton, supported by Fitzgerald that the minutes be approved.

Benedict presented two proposed ordinances, one concerning litter and vandalism and the other covering larceny. Both were discussed. Moved by Walton, supported by Fitzgerald to adopt Ordinance 91-"An Ordinance to prohibit littering or vandalism on any public building, place or street within the Village of Manchester" and Ordinance 92-"An Ordinance to prohibit the offense of larceny and possession of stolen property with value less than \$100.00 within the village of Manchester". All yeas, carried. The above ordinances will be effective 20 days after publication in the Manchester Enterprise.

Fitzgerald reported on Public Works activities. Brush has been cut, Macomb Street has been edged, other streets have been patched, one of the drying beds has been cleaned out, the Paris and Hill fields have been mowed, the Lafayette property is being covered more thoroughly, driveway culverts are being cleaned out, Morgan Street has been fixed, and new brooms have been installed on the sweeper. Bids for the new pickup were opened at 8:00 p.m. Two bids were received: the one from Tim Chevrolet was for \$2,849 or \$2,770 with trade; Tom Marshall Ford's was \$5,061.33 or \$2,986.33 with trade. Moved by Scully, supported by Mahony that the purchase be made at the discretion of the Public Works Committee. All yeas carried.

Walton advised Council of a work session scheduled for Sept. 25 at 8:00 p.m. to discuss the proposed zoning ordinance. Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully to recess at the Village Council and convene as the Zoning Board of Appeals to consider the application for conditional use permit of Robert Lawson for the former Methodist Church property located at 120 West Main. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Stum that a conditional use

permit be granted for the former Methodist Church property located at 120 West Main Street, Manchester to allow the former Church Hall to be used as office space and the residence as rental housing with the following stipulations:

- 1. At least 1.2 spaces of off-street parking per tenant must be maintained;
- 2. no tenant shall be allowed to park on Main Street between Washington and Clinton Streets;
- 3. No tenant shall be allowed to park on North Washington between Main and Madison Streets;
- 4. Items 2 and 3 listed above, shall be made part of the tenants leases. All yeas, carried. Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully that the group adjourn as Zoning Board of Appeals and reconvene as the Village Council.

WASHTENAW ALCOHOL SAFETY ACTION PROGRAM

One-Hundred twenty-six visitors to the Manchester community fair, August 15-19, left with personal drink/drive prescriptions. The prescriptions were available at the Washtenaw Alcohol Safety Action Program information booth, located in the merchant's tent.

The Alcohol Safety Action Program (ASAP) is a federally-funded demonstration project with the aim of reducing alcohol-related crashes and injuries in the county. The fair booth at Manchester, as well as similar displays at Chelsea and Saline, was designed to increase residents' awareness of the project and of the danger of driving while impaired by alcohol.

During the fair's busy evening hour, ASAP project staff used a large drink/drive calculator from the Automobile Club of Michigan to figure out how much each inquirer could drink and still stay below reasonable limits for safe driving.

The limit for a driver who wishes to keep his blood-alcohol level below .05 on the police breathalyzer varied according to the weight of the drinker and the length of the drinking period. A risk chart at the display booth showed that .05 is the highest level a person can have without moving into the high risk category for driving. Over this level the chance of being involved in an accident compared with a sober driver goes up dramatically. At .07 (the level of presumed impairment from alcohol, according to Michigan law), the risk of accident is twice as great. At .10 (the level legally presumed intoxicated when driving) the risk is 5 times greater; and at .15 percent blood alcohol concentration, the risk has multiplied to 25 times greater.

FUTURE RESEARCH NEEDED

The practical use of agricultural research by American farmers, as contrasted with research for research sake in some other countries, has made it possible for the U.S. to meet the increasing food demands from other parts of the globe.

The unique mechanism of the Cooperative Extension Service which has carried research to the farm, plus the stimulation of incentives under the competitive enterprise system, have thrust this nation into an undisputed position of world leadership in food production.

population both at home and abroad and the growing demand for improved diets as a result of improved living standards, are exceedingly great, "according to William J. Kuhfus, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

"The recent trade deal with the Soviet Union involving \$750 million of wheat and feed grain sales may be a signal of future trends, as Russia seeks to increase its livestock and poultry production. Similar requests may be expected from other Eastern European countries. Yugoslavia recently has been a big buyer of U.A. grains. Also, some trade experts see possibilities of the Middle East and Arab countries becoming grain customers again," he said.

With export pressures as they are today, think of what the demand for U.S. exports may be in 1980 with a world population of 4.5 billion.

If the U.S. is to maintain its position of world leadership, a forward looking and rapidly advancing economy will be required. Many young people embarking on careers in agriculture, research, marketing, packaging, export trading, etc. will be needed to meet future demands.

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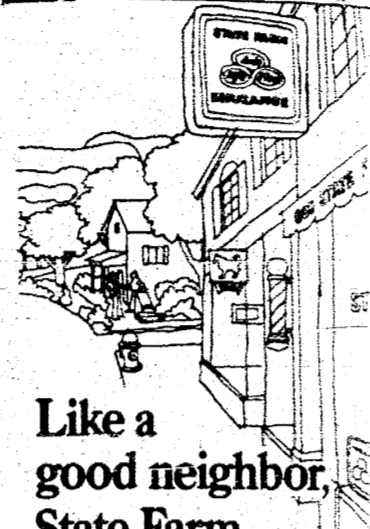
