North To Alaska

After two weeks on the road, a 24 hour stop was the entire time allowed by two Alaskan visitors to Manchester this week. Enroute to Florida, the sister and brother in law of Bob Chapin, of Main St., Laura and Reggie Hendricks, could only stop for enough time to catch up on family news, meet the children, take a look at the town and move on. Leaving behind them glimpses of an exciting life of challenges met and wilderness explored.

Reggie and Laura, properly of Clam Gulch, Alaska, went first to Alaska in 1957 for a visit and stayed 2 years, he working in Civil Service and she as Engineer and Film Editor at Television Station KEM-TV in Anchorage. Developing and broadcasting her own shows, she had the thrill of being on the switchboard when the news of Alaska's statehood was announced.

In 1959 they moved from Anchorage to the Kenai Peninsula, 180 miles South West, to a Homestead of 160 Acres. Homesteading has its own regulations, and they lived seven months of each year on the property, built a cabin, built a road, cleared 20 acres and planted what is known as a Homesteaders Mix, a combination of Timothy, Rye, and Barley, the only rule being that it must be other than grass.

The great agricultural area is in another part of the country, called the Matanuska Valley, nearer Anchorage, and here are grown root vegetables, cabbages 30 to 60 pounds, and in these more recent years are growing peas, lettuce, corn under plastic as mulch and potatoes so fine that they are exported to the States for Seed Stock. Hot House Conditions also produce 10 ft. high tomato plants, cucumbers and zucchini.

However, on the Kenai Peninsula, the Homestead is adjacent to and surrounded by the Kenai Moose Range, about 370 square miles, or roughly 1/3 of the Peninsula sit aside, where the world's biggest moose live. The Range is open to hunters during season, and the 7 foot high moose, weighing up to two thousand pounds, is quite a freezer full of meat. The Range also abounds in wolves, coyotes, lynx, black and brown bear, goat and sheep, really a hunters dream.

During these years, beginning in 1960, Reg and Laura, "went outside" during the winter months and back to Alaska in the summer. The years were packed full of places to go and things to do, things like Salmon fishing, with a gill netter, or 'drift' boat, and going back to the University at Central Wash-

Dutch To Invade Clinton Friday

The Dutchman will invade Clinton this Friday night for the wrap up of the 1972 LCAA football race. The two teams will be meeting on the grid-iron for the 49th time in what stands as one of Manchester's oldest and probably most highly contested rivalries.

The two schools began playing each other as far back as 1920 at least. They have met every year since that time except for 1922, 1923, and 1945. The score of the 1926 game is not known. Clinton won the first three and six of the first eight games played between them, five of these by shutout scores. There was also a scoreless tie in 1927 and a 13-13 tie in 1925. Included in this series of Clinton victories was the 1928 contest in which the Redskin gridder established what is still the Lenawee County record for points scored in a football game by one team when they massacred the Dutchmen 112-0. Manchester achieved a good measure of revenge a few years back when they swamped the Clinton gridder to the tune of 62-0 in 1970.

Manchester's best period in this series would have to be the 1955-59 stretch when they won five in a row, Continued on page 6

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



Dear Editor:

I am writing in regards to a pro-abortion letter from Mr. Randy Fielder, published October 19, 1972.

Mr. Fielder argued that embryos or fetuses are not babies. He referred to them as a group of cells. He says "its not called a baby until the moment of birth!" Mr. Fielder, no matter what you choose to call it the fetus is human life.

1. Thomas Lamber, Editor in Chief of the American Trial Lawyers Association says "the fetus or child in the womb should be treated as a person for purposes of Tort law whenever that is necessary to prevent injustices."

2. The Hippocratic Oath which Doctors often take was formed by a Greek philosopher who died 377 B.C. and who was not a Christian. This oath was in part to say "... I will not give to a woman an instrument to produce abortion." It was considered morally wrong to kill for a long time, centuries, I can not see how now it can be approved.

3. What about the "Declaration of Geneva"? Adopted by the General Assembly of the World Medical Association, in 1948 in Geneva. Which says in part "I will maintain the utmost respect for human life from the time of conception" It appears that this prestigious group of Doctors agree that human life begins at conception!

4. Offer "Pro-Abortionists" say that anti-abortionists have only their religious views to point out that life begins at conception. Although it is true that as a born again believer and a follower of Jesus Christ I believe that the Bibles teaching that life begins at conception. But this is also supported by others who are not cristian.

Consider the fact that the egg of a human female the ovum has only 23 human chromosomes or only half of the needed cells. It is a part of the mothers body. But when it unites with the male sperm which also has 23 chromosomes it becomes a separate entity. A new life! It can now live and divide and become a mature adult all it needs is time, the proper environment necessary to become a new human being. Mr. Fielder knows as well as I do or any other person nine years or older how women get pregnant and there sure are no laws forcing it to happen! People are responsible for their acts. We do not say it is O.K. to murder with a gun, we hold people responsible for their actions there. I believe that a person should decide and weigh the fact that they will be responsible for the life that results from pregnancy.

Again Mr. Fielder says "a deeper tragedy is the uncounted numbers of unwanted children who are born into unhappy homes and children who are born to parents who beat and abuse them." I say that it is a foolish argument for abortion. Two wrongs never make a right. How can it be said that it is right to deny a child the right to live because its parents did not want it. Again I say that people are, and should be, held responsible for their actions! We have laws governing child beating lets enforce them. I know many parents who love their children, but did not want them at conception.... a normal person learns to love and cherish life.

Often abortion advocates insist the fetus before 24 weeks cannot live without the Mother. That is not a valid reason because a baby even at full term would die if left on its own. SOCIAL SECURITY

Robert A. Kehoe, District Manager of the social security office in Ann Arbor, is reminding all people over 65 that an important deadline will fall on December 31. That is the last day that persons enrolled for the voluntary part B of medicare, or the doctor bill insurance, can file for reimbursement for expenses for 1971 and the last three months of 1970. He encourages all persons over 65 to review all their bills and explanations of medicare benefits for 1971, and contact the Social Security Office for claim forms and assistance with outstanding 1971 doctors' and other part B charges still not reimbursed by Medicare.

Kehoe further stated that it is not wise to wait until the end of the year to submit 1972 charges -- nor for that matter, to make a practice of "bunching" them and sending them on an annual basis. This creates too big a backlog with the Medicare carrier and causes delay in payment. He encourages seniors to submit claims once they have a total of \$50 in expenses in the calendar year (thus meeting the annual deductible) and then submit them as they occur from then on.

He further reminded those over 65 that if they do not have \$50 in part B expenses in any one calendar year, all expenses in the last three months of the year can be carried over toward the next year's deductible.

... ABOUT RIDDLES:

"In at every window and every door crack, round and round the house and never a track - what is it?" Who says riddles are just kids' stuff? Puzzlers like this one have been with man ever since we began to talk, according to Compton's Encyclopedia.

"The Wind" - that's the answer to this riddle, and the wind is a favorite for riddle-makers. In Germany, you might hear "What can go in the face of the sun and leave no track?" The answer, again, is the wind.



Like fables and folktales, riddles are common to all nations and to all times. Whenever and wherever people gather to pass the time, riddles can be a pleasant amusement. Sometimes, the right answer to a riddle pays off in big rewards, but the wrong answer means there's a heavy price to pay, notes Compton's Encyclopedia.

The daughter of Thor, Norse god of thunder, was the prize in a riddle contest recorded in an ancient myth. Homer, the Greek poet, though, is said to have died of chagrin when he could not answer a riddle.

Outside Thebes in ancient Greece, the strange monster Sphinx crouched on a hill above the city. "What is that which has four feet in the morning, two at noon and three at night?" asked the Sphinx of every passerby. Those who failed the test were killed. Many perished until Oedipus came and answered. "Man. As a baby, we creep on hands and knees. In mid-life,

we walk on two feet. In old age, we totter along with the aid of a cane, or third leg."

An old collection called *Amusing Questions* contains many of the riddles used by Medieval courtiers as they whiled away the hours in their drafty castles. It is well that this book gives us the answers for a few of these riddles for who could guess the answer to such a riddle as "What is that that never was or never will be?" It was a bright courtier who could answer correctly. "A mouse's nest in a cat's ear."

An all-time favorite type of riddle is one that plays on words or is a pun. Puns may have a bad reputation among humorists as the lowest form, but that doesn't decrease their ability to amuse. They even have a rather formidable official name, "onomatopoeia."

A familiar favorite is "What is it that is black and white and red all over?" Everybody knows the answer is a "newspaper" because "red" can be spelled "read." But here's another answer - one that's just as right - "An embarrassed zebra."

"When is a door not a door?" why, of course, "when it is a jail."

"What kind of fruit does the electric plant bear?" "Currents!"

Riddles are familiar to us all, but learning about riddles is an adventure in exploration and discovery. Compton's Encyclopedia takes us on an intellectual "trip."

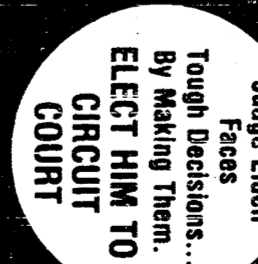

I teach deaf and hard-of-hearing youngsters, and I'd like to bring a problem to your attention and request your help. In the past few years, wireless auditory trainers using low powered FM transmitters have been experimented with for the education of children with hearing handicaps. There is great hope for the success of these systems. Unfortunately, the FCC rules governing wireless microphones place severe restrictions on manufacturers, and have hurt development of these systems. Is there any way the FCC can be made to realize the possible importance of these systems to the deaf and can develop new rules?

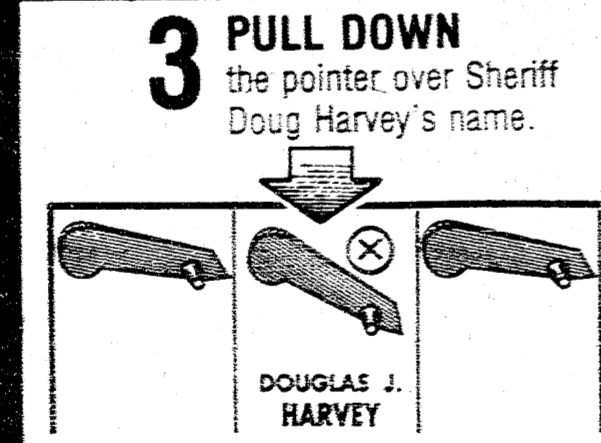
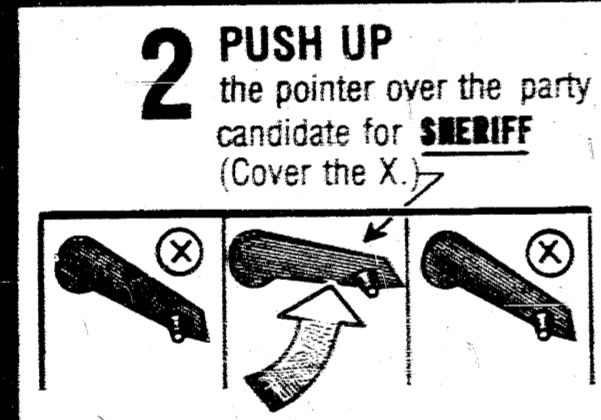
I've discussed this matter with the Federal Communication Commission (FCC) representatives, and they have assured me that new regulations will be forthcoming which will make provisions allowing manufacturers the latitude needed to develop successful systems for the deaf and hard of hearing children. Good luck in your work.

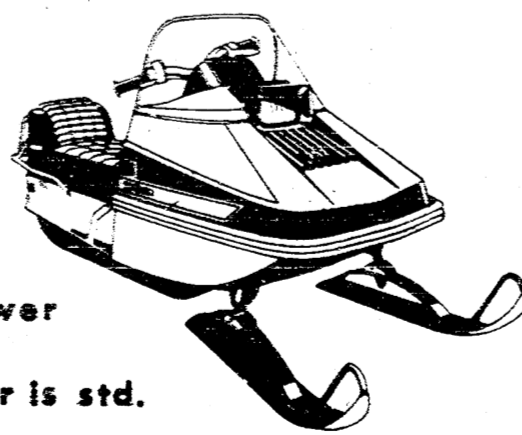

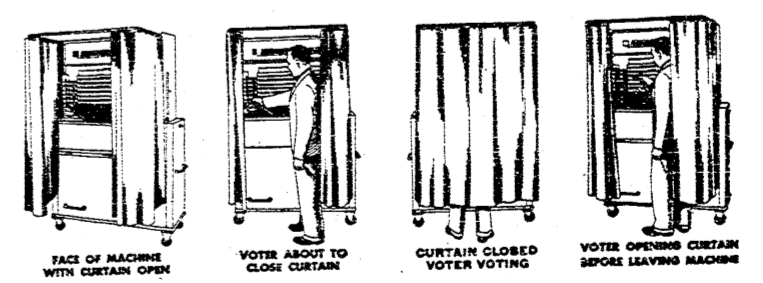

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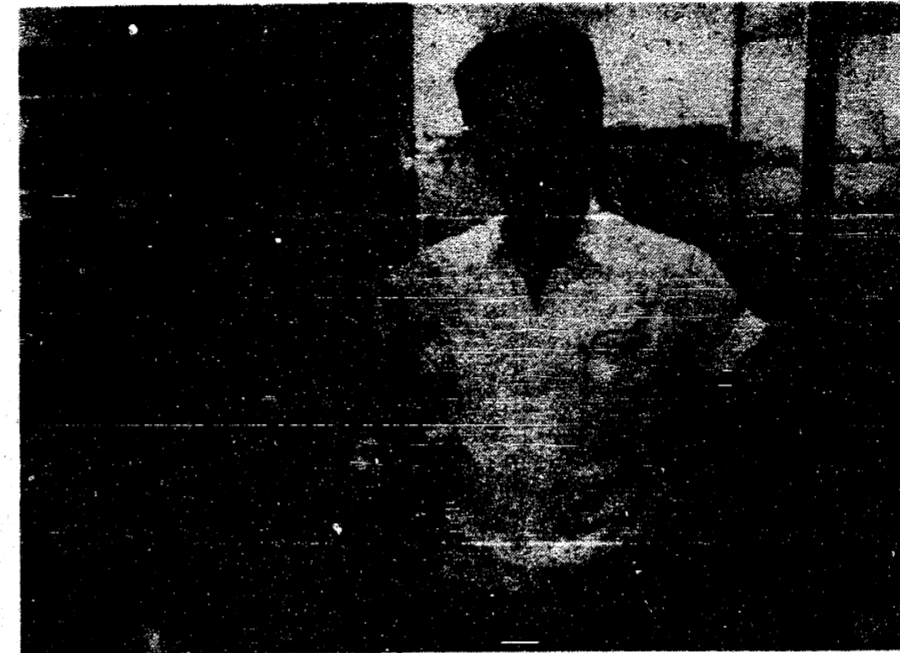

The newest addition to the downtown business district in Manchester is a doughnut and coffee shop owned by Donut Time U.S.A., Inc., with our own Chuck King of Main St., as president and chief baker. Starting at 8:00 p.m. each evening he and another baker, turn out 800 to 1000 doz. doughnuts each week and 1500 to 1800 doz. on Saturdays.

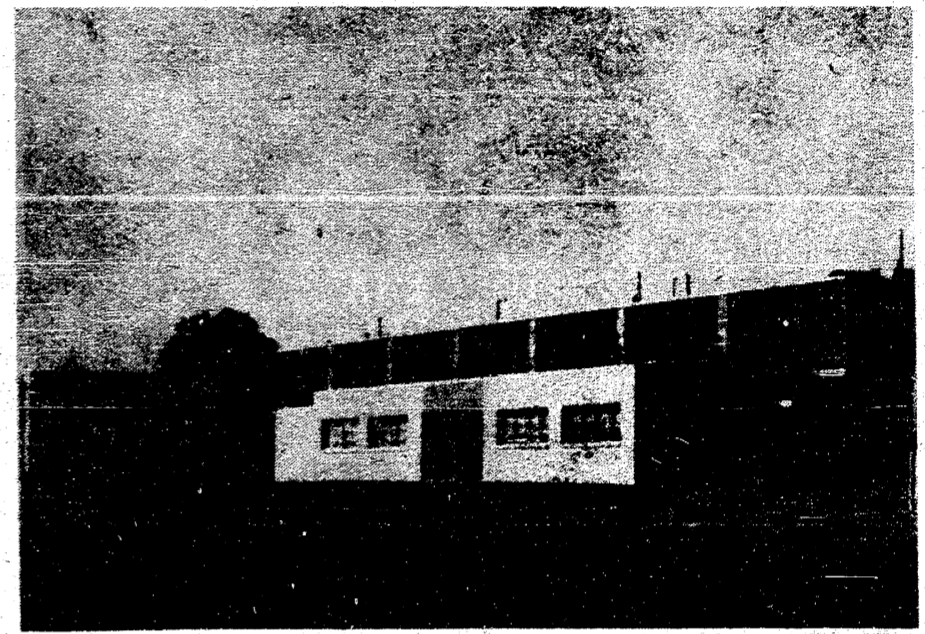
