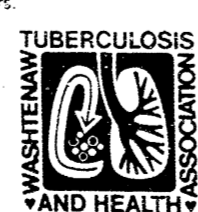





1973 WASHTEENAW COUNTY ASC COMMITTEE

The Washtenaw County ASC Committee for 1973 is Chairman, Raymond Gribach of Saline, Vice-Chairman, Earl Dolezky of Dexter and Member, Lawrence Stein of Ann Arbor.

Terms of office for county committee men are on a 3-year basis, with one new member normally being elected each year at a convention of newly elected ASC committee members. The situation varies, however, according to the number of actual vacancies on the committee. In addition, first and second alternates are elected for one year each. The newly elected alternates of the county are 1st alternate, Robert Mast of Dexter and 2nd alternate, Lloyd Geau of Chelsea.

The ASC farmer-committee system is unique. No other group of citizens has so direct a voice in developing and running Government programs. Farmers eligible to take part in programs administered by the committee first elect county committee men, who in turn elect county committeemen. While the county committee is in actual charge of administering the programs locally, including expenditures of Federal funds, the county committeemen lend operating assistance where needed and are particularly responsible for keeping their neighbors informed about the programs available.

The elected committees are not Federal office holders. Congress holds the Department of Agriculture responsible, and the Department in turn relies on the judgement and leadership of the locally elected farmers and the county office employees. The county office serves as the headquarters for farmer business connected with program participation.

Major ASC activities in Washtenaw County include the Feed Grain Program, the Wheat Program, the National Wool Program, Price-support Loans, Storage Facility Loans, Dryer Loans, the Creep-land Adjustment Program and the Rural Environmental Assistance Program.

A new analysis of surveys of Washtenaw County drivers shows that:
*Men do four times as much nighttime driving as women, and nine times as much illegal drinking and driving at night.

*Drivers 25 to 34 years of age do more illegal drinking and driving than other age groups.

*Drivers 18 through 20 years of age significantly increased their drinking and driving following legalization of drinking at 18.

The surveys were carried out for the Washtenaw Alcohol Safety Action Program (ASAP) by the U-M Highway Safety Research Institute (HSRI) during the spring of 1971 and spring of 1972.

The ASAP is a Federal demonstration project that has beefed up police patrols and modified court procedures to reduce drunken driving.

Following release of findings by another ASAP project in Vermont that young blue collar workers did more drunken driving there, HSRI analyzed Washtenaw County data regarding the profile of alcohol-impaired drivers here.

According to Arthur Wolfe, associate research scientist at HSRI, "Both our surveys suggest greater involvement in driving after heavy drinking by blue collar workers than by white collar workers."

In the 1971 survey, says Wolfe, "The differences among occupational groups are not very great for all persons at .02 percent blood alcohol concentration (BAC). However, the blue collar groups are about twice as likely as the white collar groups to be driving at the higher BACs of .05 percent and .10 percent."

The BAC of .05 has been found to be the statistical point at which a driver's chances of causing a crash begin to multiply rapidly.

"Similarly in the 1972 study," says Wolfe, "blue collar workers are only slightly more likely to have a BAC of .02 or more than are white collar workers, but they are twice as likely to have a BAC of .07 or more. (The BAC of .07 is the new legal level of impairment which took effect this year.)"

For a 160-pound person, .02 percent BAC means drinking the equivalent of one ounce of whiskey or one bottle of beer in one hour. A BAC of .05 percent means two-and-one-half such drinks in one hour. BACs of .07 and .10 percent mean three-and-one-half and five such drinks, respectively, in one hour for a

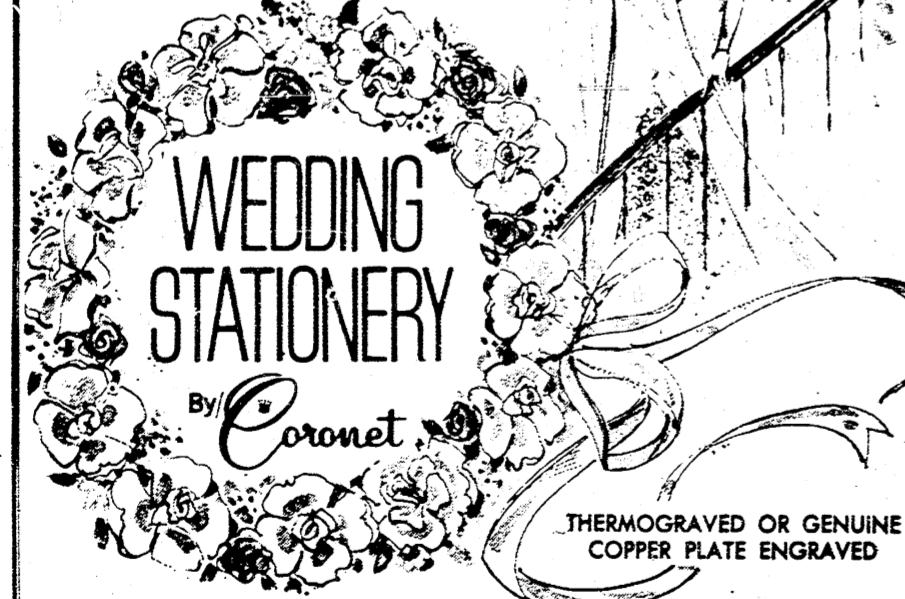

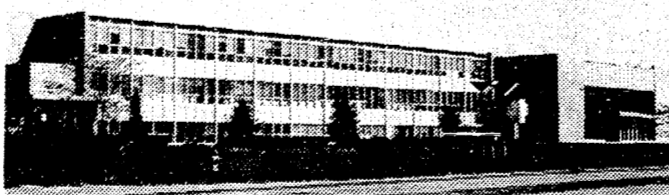

AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

By Carl P. Kenton

1973 LOOKS GOOD FOR FARMERS

With the year coming to a close, the thoughts of experts on farm matters begin to turn to next year.

During 1972, agriculture experienced many changes. Demand for soybeans, the increase in grain sales and cattle and hog prices were major factors on the plus side for farmers.

But bad weather which hampered the harvesting of many crops and prices equal to or below previous years offset some of the good points of the year.

Now, what can farmers expect for the next 13 months?

U.S. Department of Agriculture eco-

nomists say the outlook for the first six months at least is for a continuation of the record-high level 1972 has produced. Cattle prices will go higher, they say, in early 1973. Hog prices will stay high for the first half of the year. However, with a report that farmers are farrowing seven percent more sows in the December-February period, marketings in the summer could pick up and lower hog prices somewhat. USDA economists even say such a trend toward increased production could put prices under considerable pressure late next year.

In feed grains and wheat, it is expected that the Russians will buy \$1.2 billion in fiscal 1973 compared with only \$150 million in the previous year. Most of this will be in wheat (\$660 million) with feed grains making up close to \$400 million. Soybean purchases will come to about \$135 million. This buying reflects the Soviet crop failures and also the effort to improve the diets of their people.

Here at home, the consumer will continue record purchases of food in supermarkets and restaurants. Total food spend-

ing is rising about 4 1/2 percent this year and may top \$124 billion. The economy is expected to continue to expand and this means personal incomes will increase. This will bring on a further rise in domestic demand for food products. It all looks good on paper. It will look even better when that paper is green and in the pockets of farmers. It really is about time.

INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE

Taxpayers in the Ann Arbor area can obtain assistance with their 1972 Federal income tax returns Monday through Friday each week at the IRS office, here starting January 2, 1973, LeRoy Willis local District Director's Representative, said today.

Internal Revenue Service personnel will be available to provide Federal income tax information from 8 a. m. to 4 p. m. The Ann Arbor office is located at 3430 Washtenaw Street.

Mr. Willis suggested that many taxpayers will be able to obtain answers to their questions by phone. The assistance

phone number in Ann Arbor is 971-0370. In announcing taxpayer service days, Mr. Willis noted that many taxpayers will be able to use the new "short form" 1040A, which the IRS reintroduced this year. The IRS estimates that about 30 million taxpayers will be able to use the half-page form.

Taxpayers using the Form 1040 should also find their returns easier to prepare due to the more simplified language used in the instructions this year Willis said.

He also reminded taxpayers that the IRS may be able to compute the tax for individuals if they make less than \$20,000, take the standard deduction, and fill in certain portions of the return. The information required is explained in the Form 1040 and 1040A instruction booklets.

Mr. Willis reminded taxpayers who plan to pay someone to prepare their return that the law requires the person to sign the form as preparer. The new form also include a line for the preparer's Social Security or identification number.

Taxpayers who pay to have their returns prepared should be careful to select a qualified preparer, Mr. Willis.

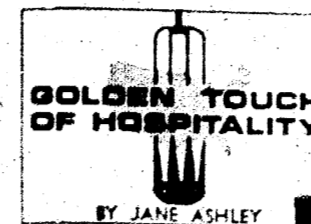

Cookie Recipe Comes From Greece

Immigrants from many different lands have contributed the best of their native cookery to our varied American dessert cuisine.

One of the many national groups to add to our culinary wealth are the Greeks. "Kourambithes" is the Greek name for a delicate confection - an almond flavored cookie rolled in confectioners sugar just before serving.

- Greek Cookies
- 2 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1/4 cup corn starch
- 1 cup margarine
- 1/2 cup confectioners sugar
- 1 egg yolk
- 1/2 teaspoon almond extract
- 1/4 cup chopped nuts, optional

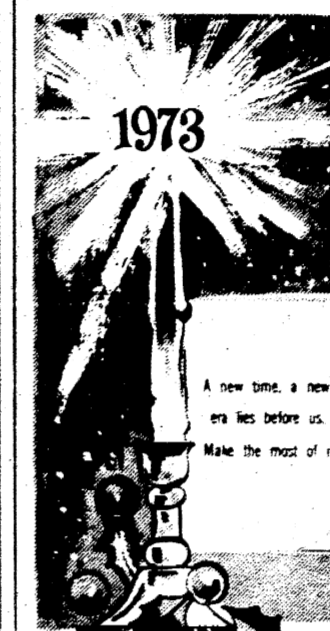
Sift together flour and corn starch. With a spoon, blend margarine and confectioners sugar in mixing bowl. Blend in egg yolk and almond extract. Cut in flour mixture with pastry blender or two knives until coarse crumbs form. Add nuts. Knead dough a few times until it holds together easily.

Pinch off balls of dough (about 1 inch) and shape cookies as desired. Dough may be flattened and cut with cookie cutters. Place on ungreased cookie sheet.

Bake in 350° F. (moderate) oven until golden brown, about 15 minutes. Roll in confectioners sugar before serving. Makes about 2 dozen.

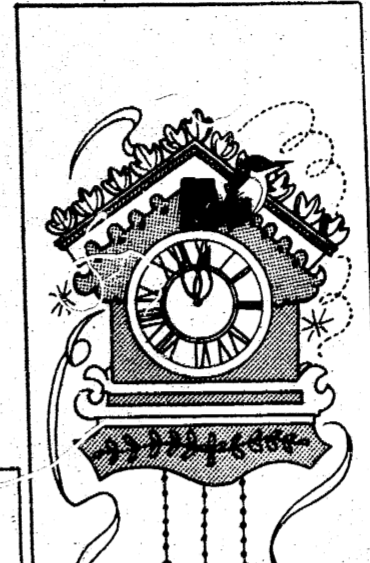
I ran to hide Under our table, But when I got there, I was not able. Our dog was sleeping Without a sound, But when he heard me, He jumped off the ground.

The elves had deliberately walked out on him And left poor Santa out on a limb;

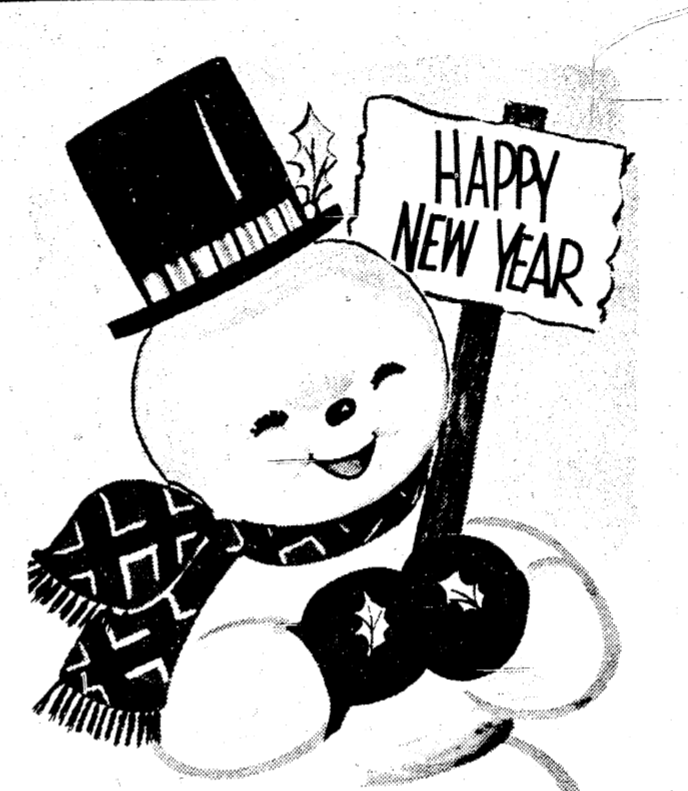

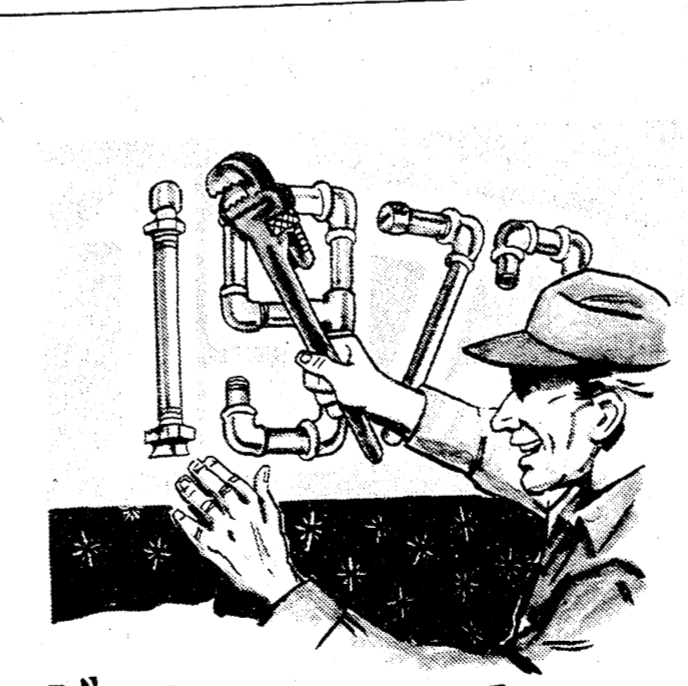
