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
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

A Step Backwards Into The Past

Lincoln's birthday this week, and it seemed to me a good time to think of that period in our history and what it likely means to us today, in the effect it had on the entire nation, the states, the towns and most of all our community and the families living here.

In 1861 it became fashionable to form groups of young adults, a sort of club for social purposes, giving balls and special affairs, such as celebrating the 4th of July. Formed on Military lines, with rather precise rituals, special uniforms and elaborately formal social events, the local version of this was named the "Manchester Greys". Quite

a festive and colorful group.

When in April of 1861 the Civil War began, President Lincoln issued a call for fifty thousand men to come to the aid of the Union, many of these

local, small-town groups joined en-masse. So it was in Manchester, Draw ing not only from the Village but from the surrounding townships, the farms and small settlements such as Sharon Hollow. the enlistments of men were accepted here and almost immediately there were about 90 strong young men, signed for a 3 month enlistment.

These "Manchester Greys" at once ecome Company D of the 1st Michigan Infantry.

Direct to Washington they went and then in July, into the first Battle of the War. Manassas Bull Run. Names that everyone has read. The Confederate Army, of the South, named battles for nearby towns and so it became Manassas. The Union Army named the battles for geographical locations and Bull Run was

the name of a Creek in that area. The first major Battle of the War was won by the South. Politicians from Washington had come to view the spectacle and the festive air of the occasion was soon dispelled as the North was badly

beaten and many prisoners were taken. The three month enlistments soon expired and after that dreadful experience many of the Michigan Men simply came home. Many re-enlisted in other groups to go on to further battles later in the war with 3 year enlistments.

The Northern states gave many men to both Armies. Many Detroit and Canadian men joined the Confederates. We have no knowledge of any Manches-

ter men joining the South. A great many cultural factors entered into this phase of our history. With no organized Hospital Corps, within the Army to care for the wounded, the Red Cross came to be the greatest help to the suffering men. Out of this period grew the new concept of Social Services as we know it today. Pensions, orphanages, and care for the sick were always done on an individual basis before that time.

Great names, famous today, were then common. George S. Custer was commander of the 1st Michigan Calvary Brigade which was unique in that it was the first organization to use repeating firearms of any consequence. To be able to fire successive shots, while the enemy must stop to reload each builet, certainly was a new a startling development in close warfare.

After the war, the Grand Army of the Republic was formed. An Organization similar to American Legion or ter Post was formed in Manchester, called #352 and the roster of names has a familiar sound today. L.C. Benedict, joined Dec. 28, 1863, mustered out at Nashville in Sept. 1865, resident in Manchester, died in 1921 at age 76,

Thomas Farrell, enlisted Aug. 1864. discharged 1865, resident of Manches died in 1926 age 80. Daniel Burch, enlisted 1862, discharged June 1865, resident of Sharon, died 1930 age 91. Alfred Stringham joined 1862, discharge 1865, resident of Manchester, died in 1930's. English, Blaisdell, Fellows, Alber, Root, Fisk, Hough, Goodyear, Horning, Cook, Dorr, Fountain all had served well and honorably.

The war was a great wound, healing slowly and not yet forgotten. A turning point in our history. A shift from a predominantly agricultural economy to an industrial one, with the political power previously held by the South, grasped by the North. We live with the results today.

My appreciation to D.E. Limpert, for sharing with us his knowledge of this period in history.

IRS WILL COMPUTE YOUR TAX

Many taxpayer's again may have the internal Revenue Service compute their income tax and retirement income credit, Thomas A. Cardoza, IRS District Director for Michigan, said today.

He said the IRS on request will com pute the tax for persons with incomes of \$20,000 or less, who take the standard deduction, and whose income is solely from salaries, wages, tips, dividends, interest, pension and annuities.

If the taxpaver also wants the IRS to compute his retirement income credit, he should include the basic information on Schedule R and attach it to his Form 1040, Mr. Cardoza said. He should also enter "RIC" on line 19, Form 1040. Instructions on Schedule R explain which items need to be provided

For those persons who qualify, the IRS will compute the tax, whether the return is a Short Form 1040A or the regular 1040. The tax instructions explain what information should be entered on the return, Mr. Cardoza said. After this information is entered on

the return, the taxpayer should sign it and send it to the Cincinnati Service Center, Cincinnati, Ohio 45298.

He said the IRS will then compute the tax and send the taxpayer a refund or a bill for the tax due, whichever is


