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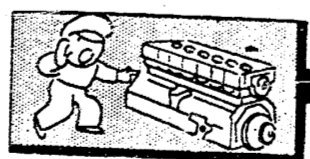

It was a great day for the Dutchmen and many of the hometown fans turned out to watch and cheer on as the wrestling team captured its second straight league championship. The 112 1/2 points that this years team scored exceeded last years total by 2 1/2 points and outdistanced second place Onsted by 42 points.

The championship team had six of the twelve individual weight champions. Joel Tobias was Manchesters first sophomore to become a conference champ as he won at 98 pounds. John Roberts uped his record to 24 and 2 as he won at 105 pounds. Steve Gross finally overcame his bad luck and became the 112 pound champion. Jose Arana excited the crowd with his speed and aggressiveness as he captured the 119 pound crown. Mike Johnson avenged his loss in the finals last-year and defeated last years champion to become the 145 pound winner. Randy Seegert showed that last year was no fluke as he took the 185 pound title for the second year in a row.

Five other members of the team added valuable points as Delrus Wolff, a senior 138 pounder was 3rd. Ross Haussler at 167 and Keith Alber at Heavyweight took thirds in their weight classes.

Greg Bertke managed only one win, but it was a pin and gave him a fourth at 132.

Doyle Keasal came back from a serious injury to gain the finals, but was beaten by last years champion and had to settle for a second place at 155.

"This team was really dedicated to win this tournament and championship for the school. No one, not involved with the sport, knows the amount of time, work and desire that these boys put in, in order to be able to feel the excitement and pride of winning the championship. They are justly proud and I am proud of them said a smiling coach Gulliver."

The next match will be at home Thursday with Vandercook Lake. Varsity starts at 7:00 pm.

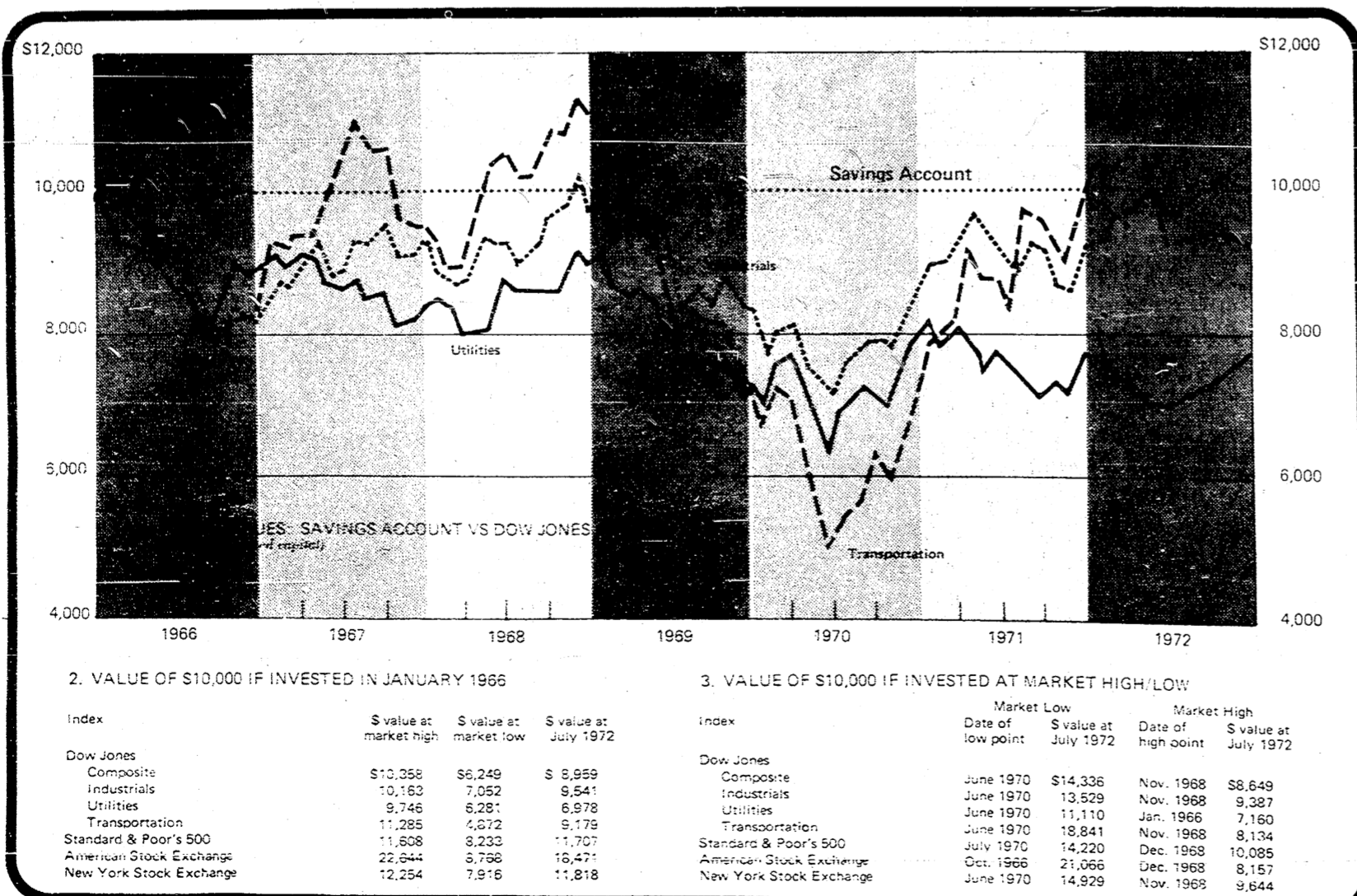

The Board was to consider the request for conditional use of the Manchester Enterprise located at 305 Beaufort St. in the Village of Manchester. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Benedict to grant the request with the condition that the Manchester Enterprise may operate at 305 Beaufort Street as long as Edward E. Steele owns the paper and property. All yeas, carried. Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald to adjourn as Zoning Board of Appeals and reconvene as Village Council. All yeas, carried.

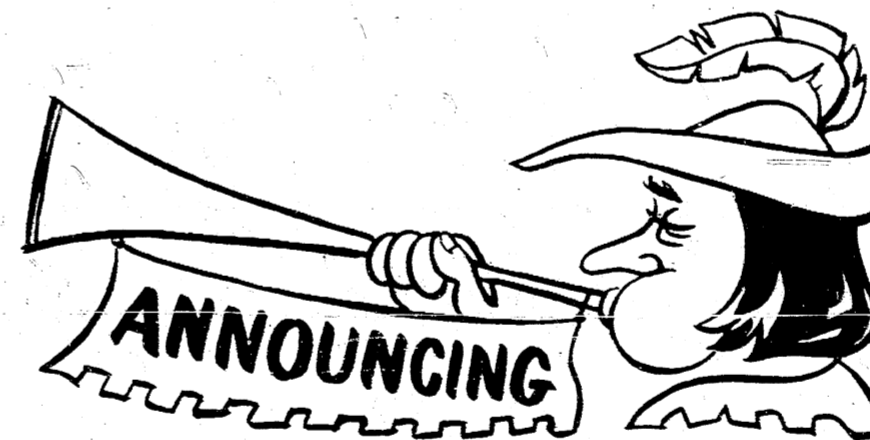
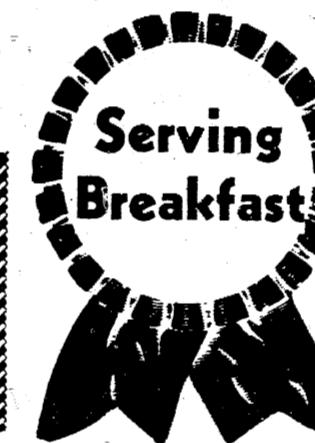

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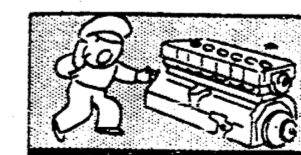

Honorary Chairman For Easter Seal



The honorable John B. Swainson, Associate Justice of the Michigan Supreme Court this week announced the opening of the 1973 Easter Seal Campaign for crippled children and adults.

Justice Swainson is the Honorary State Chairman for the campaign which opens in Michigan and throughout the nation on March 1, culminating on Easter Sunday, April 22.

Justice Swainson is an excellent example of a man who overcame a tremendous handicap, having lost both legs while in service with the United States Army in France under General George S. Patton, Jr. in November, 1944.

Upon release from the Army Hospital System he entered college and earned both a Bachelor of Arts and Law Degree at the University of North Carolina. He then entered private law practice in Detroit.

Entering the field of politics Swainson's progress was meteoric. In 1954 he was elected to the Michigan State Senate and re-elected in 1956. In 1958 he was elected Lieutenant Governor of the State of Michigan. In 1960 at the age of 35, he became the 40th Governor of the state. Continuing in public service John B. Swainson was elected Judge of the third circuit in 1965 and one year later re-elected. In November, 1970 he was elected to an 8 year term on the Michigan Supreme Court in which
