Bloodmobile To Be Here March 30th

The first Bloodmobile for the Manchester Community Blood Club this year will be March 30 at the new United Methodist Church on Ann Arbor Street from 12:00 to 6:00 pm. Mrs. Robert Little is Chairman - of-the-day with Mrs. Ica Schaffer co-chairman. The professional staff will come from Southeastern Michigan Blood Center, Detroit.

Local industries participating in the clinic are Double A Products, Manchester Tool & Die, Manchester Stamping and Plastics. Churches in the area and the Jaycees are working on the 20% Plan which was introduced over a year ago. This is a plan whereby the blood needs of all members, as well as all group members spouses, children under 18, children over 18 unable to donate, parents, parents-in-law, grand-parents, and grand-parents-in-law living anywhere in the United States or Canada are covered if 20% of the membership of the group gives blood during the year.

Families which may not be included in these groups may assure themselves of similar coverage by donating blood at a Red Cross Bloodmobile once or oftener during a year. Of course residents of the Manchester School District and Manchester Township are automatically covered by the local club as they have been the past 22 years. Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:10 pm. Enter Walton at 7:12 pm. Minutes from the February 5, 1973 meeting were read. Moved by Benedict, supported by Stautz to approve the minutes as corrected. All years, carried.

Moved by Scully, supported by Walton that a letter be written informing contractors and local businesses involved in electrical, plumbing, and heating installation of the local ordinance covering this matter and the pen-

alty which could be enacted. All years, carried.

Moved by Mahony, supported by Walton to recess as Village Council and convene as Zoning Board of Appeals at 8:00 pm. to consider the application for conditional use of D.E. Limpert. Mr. Limpert requested a conditional use permit for residential use of the second floor of the addresses 110, 118, 122, 130 East Main Street. Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald to grant the conditional use applied for. All years, carried. Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald to adjourn as Zoning Board of Appeals and reconvene as Village Council.

Moved by Stautz, supported by Mahony to authorize the Village President and Clerk to make application to Banker's Life Insurance Co. for a group

retirement program, group life insurance program and group weekly income benefits for full time Village employees. All years, carried.

A budget hearing was scheduled for 8:30 pm. Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully to table the adoption of the complete budget until the next meeting. All years, carried. The General Fund budget was reviewed. Moved by Benedict, supported by Walton to approve that portion of the budget. All years, carried. The clerk was reminded that a check had not been written to the Police Auxiliary for the budgeted amount of \$200 and should be done before the end of the fiscal year on February 28, 1973. January accounts were reviewed.

The clerk was requested to advise Mr. Donald Davis in writing that he has been selected to audit the Village books for this fiscal year of 1972-1973 with the audit to be completed by June, 1973. This was done in a motion by Mahony, support by Walton. All years, carried.

Scully advised Council that the new police car is in operation. Sealed bids for the 1970 Dodge will be opened March 5, 1973 at 8:00 pm.

Fitzgerald reviewed Public Works Activities of the previous two weeks. A letter from the State Highway Dept. regarding parking on the newly reconstructed Main St. Bridge was read, along with Bruce Daniels' recommendation as Street Administrator. Council requested Pres. Little to check with the Village Attorney on possibly obtaining permission to continue parking on the bridge.

Resolved by Mahony, supported by Benedict, that it is hereby deemed advisable to enter into contract with Consumers Power Co. of Jackson, Mich., for furnishing pumping service to the Village of Manchester, for a period of one year and thereafter from year to year in accordance with the terms of contract heretofore submitted to and considered by the Council and Resolved, further, that the President, David L. Little and Mary H. Wheeler, Village Clerk, be and are authorized and directed to execute such contract on behalf of the Village. All years, carried.

Moved by Scully, supported by Stautz to repeal Ordinance 85 in its entirety. All years, carried.

Moved by Scully, supported by Fitzgerald to adjourn at 10:10 pm. All years, carried.

Cross-Stitch Cookies Win Raves



This cross-stitchery wins a blue ribbon — the cross-stitch cookies, that is. Rich with oats 'n' spices and other things nice, the dough is shaped into balls and flattened with the tines of a fork. (Quick "needlework" this.) They bake till crisp and crunchy, then win hearts as well as prizes. Handicrafts are "in" these days, but delicious homemade cookies — particularly the old-fashioned oatmeal type — have never been out!

- CROSS-STITCH SPICE COOKIES**
Makes 4 dozen
 - 1 cup shortening, soft
 - 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
 - 1/2 cup granulated sugar
 - 1 egg
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 - 1/2 teaspoon soda
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 - 1 cup quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked
- Heat oven to moderate (375°F.). Beat together shortening and sugars. Add egg and vanilla; beat well. Sift together flour, soda, salt, cinnamon and nutmeg. Gradually add to creamed mixture, beating well. Stir in oats.

Ask Senator GRIFFIN



By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. My wife and I have been interested in visiting the Soviet Union ever since the President went there last year. Can we visit there and how do we go about getting the necessary permission and visas?

—D. P., Bangor

It's not easy—but perhaps it's not as difficult as you might think. First, the Soviets require that you plan your itinerary in detail. Then, make all travel arrangements and pay in advance for your hotel, transportation, and meals through one of the 100 U.S. travel agencies accredited by Intourist (the Soviet travel office). The travel agency will give you a tourist voucher. This must be presented to the Soviet consulate at least ten days prior to your date of departure, and you should then be issued a visa to enter the Soviet Union upon payment of a \$2 fee. The address of the Soviet consulate in Washington, D.C. is 1609 Decatur St. N.W. Of course, you will also have to have a U.S. passport, which you can obtain by making application at the office of the nearest clerk of a state or federal court. Allow at least two weeks to obtain your passport. To provide additional information and assistance, I am sending you a pamphlet published by the Passport Office of the U.S. Department of State explaining some of the do's and don't's when visiting the Soviet Union.

I read somewhere that bean soup is served every day in the U.S. Capital restaurants. Can't you people find a chef with some imagination? What gives?

There are many uncertainties about Congress but you can be absolutely sure of one thing—bean soup will be on the menu whenever you visit the Capitol. It's a long, long tradition. On the House side, the origin goes back to 1904 when Speaker Joseph Cannon ordered bean soup one day, only to be told it was not on the menu. "Thunderation," roared Uncle Joe Cannon, "I had my mouth set for bean soup. From now on, hot or cold, rain, snow or shine, I want bean soup on the menu every day!"

It should be of special interest that only Michigan beans are used to make the soup. I'm sending you a copy of the recipe printed each day on the official restaurant menu which a Capitol visitor is permitted to take along as a souvenir. And don't knock the bean soup—it's very good.



Staff from Highway Safety Research Institute practice for the upcoming Roadside Alcohol Survey, March 13 thru April 9. They will be asking Washtenaw County drivers to step inside a research van like the one pictured for a breath test and brief interview.

During the four weeks following March 13, approximately 20 drivers will be stopped in the vicinity of Manchester and asked to participate in a Roadside Alcohol Survey.

They will be part of the third such survey conducted by the Washtenaw Alcohol Safety Action Program (ASAP). The ASAP is a Federal demonstration project which has bolstered police

patrols and modified court procedures in Washtenaw County to reduce drunken driving.

In all, survey teams will use 48 roadside locations throughout the county to conduct Breathalyzer tests and short interviews of more than 1,000 randomly selected nighttime drivers.

"Names will not be asked and all information will remain confidential,"

assures Marion Compton of the University of Michigan Highway Safety Research Institute. The Institute is conducting this and other surveys to be used in evaluating the effectiveness of the ASAP program.

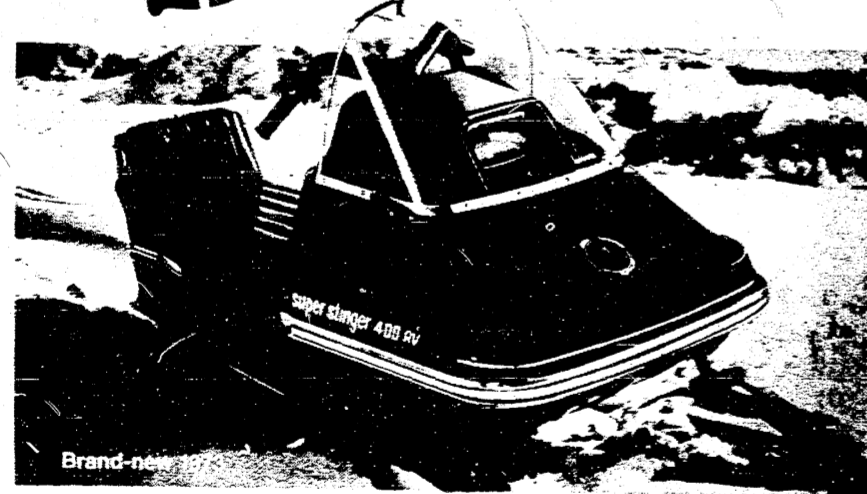
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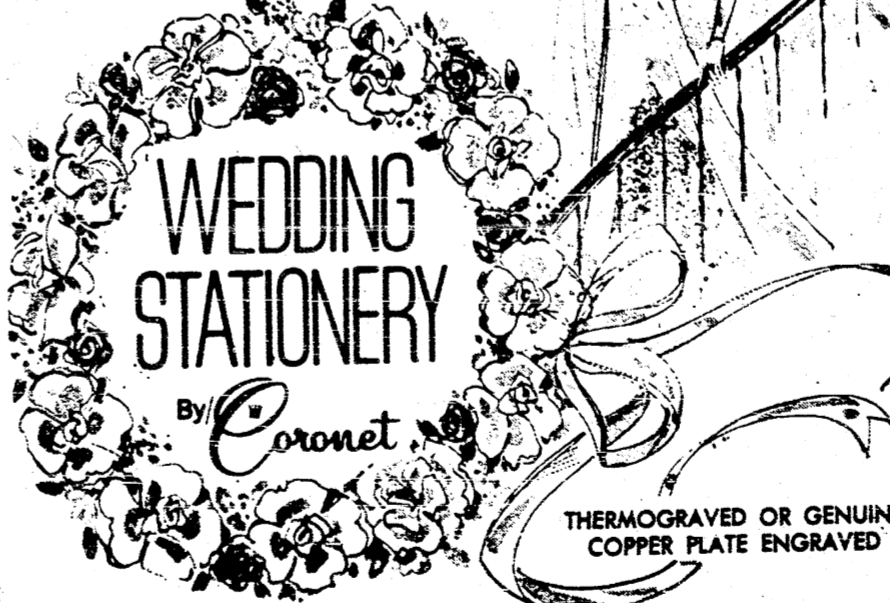
