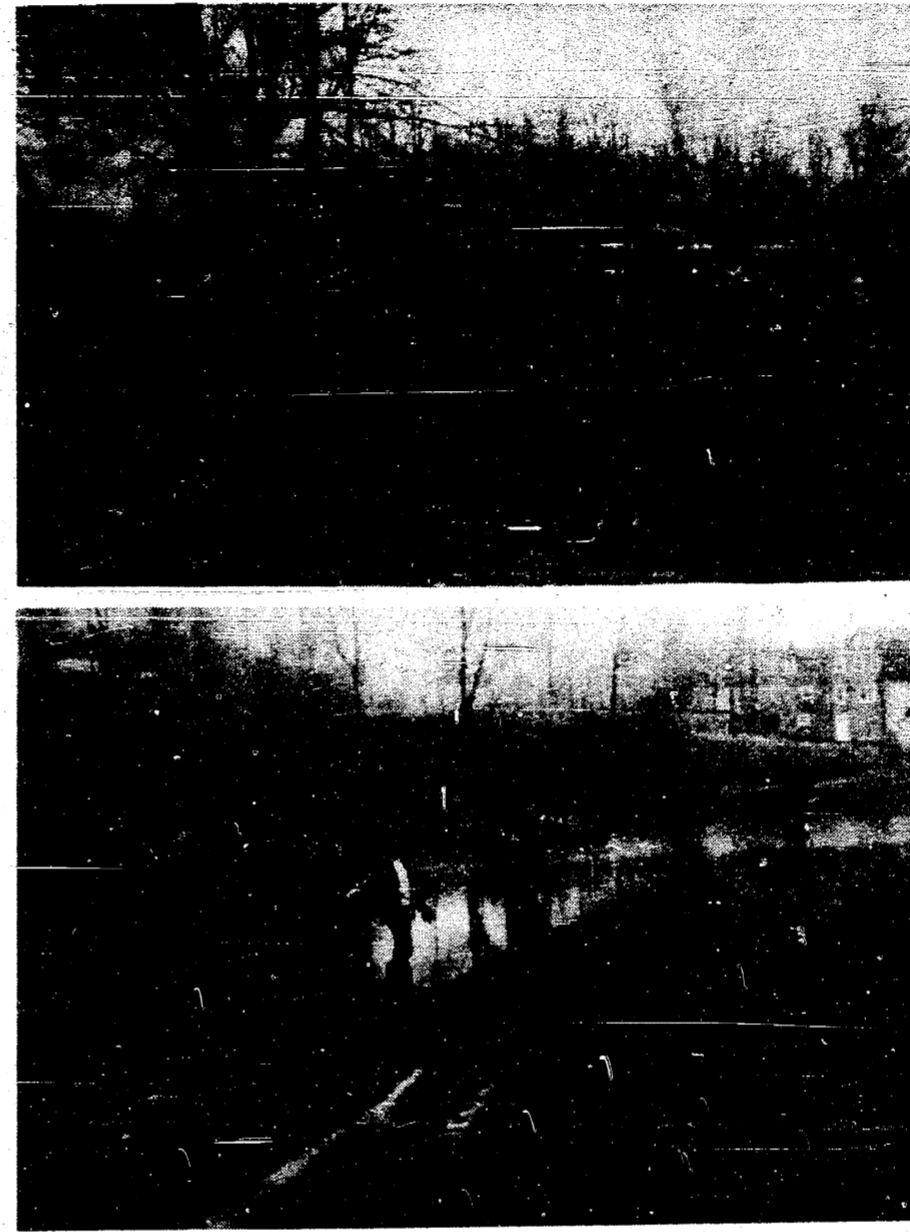

Apple Pie Par Excellence

APPLE CUSTARD PIE Makes 8 servings Crust: Three-fourths pkg. (1 1/2 cups) Flako Pie Crust Mix 3 tablespoons cold water Filling: 1/2 cup granulated sugar 1/4 cup all-purpose flour 1 cup dairy sour cream 1 egg, slightly beaten 1 teaspoon vanilla 3 cups pared, cored and cubed apple Topping: One-fourth pkg. (1/2 cup) Flako Pie Crust Mix 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar 1 teaspoon cinnamon 1 tablespoon butter or margarine For crust, heat oven to hot (400°F.). Measure mix into bowl. Sprinkle cold water by tablespoons over mix; stir lightly with fork until just dampened. Form into ball. Roll out on lightly floured board or canvas to form 13-inch circle. Fit loosely into 9-inch pie plate. Trim; fold edges under; flute. For filling, sift together sugar and flour; stir in sour cream, egg and vanilla. Lightly stir in apples. Pour into unbaked crust. Bake in preheated oven (400°F.) 30 minutes. Remove from oven; sprinkle with topping (see below). Return to oven for an additional 10 minutes. For topping, combine remaining pie crust mix, brown sugar and cinnamon. Cut in butter until crumbly.

Drain Commissioner, Jerome K. Fulton, today issued a warning to property owners in Washtenaw County of possible damage resulting from spring flooding. Property in low areas and areas near creeks, lakes, and drains is specially susceptible.

Much flood damage can be avoided by simple actions that individuals can take immediately to protect their property. Valuable goods should not be stored in flood prone areas. Storage areas should be relocated to higher ground, or if this is not possible, goods should be raised above the floor level. In other words, materials stored 6 to 12 inches above a basement or cellar floor.

Property owners should also check to make sure outlet drains are clear of debris. These outlets should be cleared and the debris placed in an area where it can not immediately wash back into the outlet. The Washtenaw County Drain Commission should be notified (663-7511 - Ext. 252) of obstructions in established County Drains. It is also

possible to petition the Drain Office for cleaning and improvement of chronically plugged outlet drains.

The long range strategy for avoiding flood damage involves strict controls over land use in flood plains and building codes that control the construction of homes and home improvements in flood prone areas. The Washtenaw County Drain Commission, in cooperation with the County Board of Commissioners and local units of government, is now developing plans to make flood insurance available on a county-wide basis.

A giant step towards this goal was taken in Lansing on Jan. 16, when an organizational meeting of the Michigan Horse Council was held.

Horse leaders from throughout the state attended the meeting, which was hosted by the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Temporary officers elected by the council were: Chairman, Dr. Jim Rooker, Davison; Vice-Chairman, Dr. Gerald O'Connor, Ann Arbor; Secretary, Mrs. Judy Dryer, Eaton Rapids.

Dr. Rooker emphasized that the goals of the council are to "1. act on behalf of the horse industry as a whole to coordinate horse-related activities, organizations, research efforts, etc., 2. assist the legislature with information on the horse industry so they may be better equipped to act upon horse-related legislation; 3. promote educational programs for horse owners and prospective

horse owners; and 4. to impress upon the government and the people of Michigan the economic impact and value of the horse industry upon our state."

Many organizational guidelines will be set forth at the next meeting of the council in February. In the meantime, the council has appealed to the horse industry for support to get this long-awaited venture into action. Inquiries should be mailed to: The Michigan Horse Council, P.O. Box 494, Lansing, 48902.

"If there ever was a time this council was needed, it is now", stated Dr. O'Connor. "We hope the breed organizations and individual horse owners won't let us down. We need them and they need us."

"Where is my refund?" is a question asked by thousands of Michigan taxpayers every year, District Director of Internal Revenue, Thomas A. Cardoza, said today.

For many, the answer is that the refund is held up because the Post Office cannot deliver the check. People move without leaving a forwarding address, Mr. Cardoza said.

Another reason is that the taxpayer's name or address is illegible on the return. You can avoid this problem by using the pre-addressed label on your tax forms package.

Peel the label off the outside of the tax forms package, and place it on the return filed. You can make corrections on the label itself, Mr. Cardoza said.

IRS REMINDS TAXPAYERS TO ANSWER REVENUE SHARING QUESTIONS

Thomas A. Cardoza, District Director of Internal Revenue for Michigan, reminded taxpayers of the importance of answering two Revenue Sharing questions appearing on Forms 1040 and 1040A.

In order for the Federal Government to distribute Revenue Sharing Funds properly to states, counties, townships, and municipalities, the Government must know how many people live in each location, Mr. Cardoza said.

Correct information supplied by taxpayers, Mr. Cardoza continued, will help insure that all areas in Michigan receive their fair share of Federal funds.

Since the first Revenue Sharing checks were mailed out in early December, Mr. Cardoza said, Michigan has received \$217,482,828 in Federal funds.

Mr. Cardoza said that one of the Revenue Sharing questions relates to the taxpayer's place of residence on December 31, 1972 while the other question deals with dependents who lived elsewhere on that date.

Helpful information on completing the Revenue Sharing questions appears in both the 1040 and 1040A instructions, according to Mr. Cardoza. Mr. Cardoza emphasized that taxpayers who fail to provide the Revenue Sharing information or who give incomplete data may find that their refunds are delayed because of the additional time required to process the return.

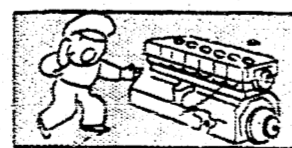

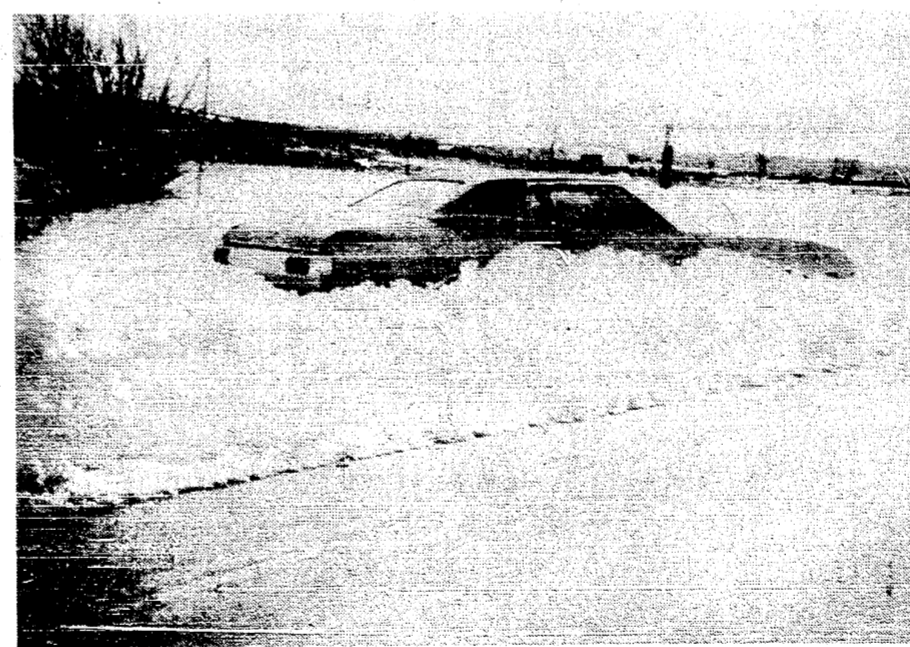
Joe Catalana has received com-
