The horse bowl teams from the county were eliminated in the first round of the contest. There was no one from the county participating in the demonstration part of the jamboree.

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

GRIFFIN



By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can of-ten lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. As a political science major at Wayne State University, I often need government publications to do my work. By writing to the agencies and departments in Washington, I have sometimes had to wait as long as six months for what I want. I know that bureaucracy moves at a snail's pace, but this is ridiculous. Any suggestions?

0

Yes. Last June the Government Printing Office, at my request, opened a "bookstore" in the Federal Building in Detroit, at 231 West Lafayette. More than 2,000 titles of publications from the many government agencies and de-partments are on hand and available. You will be pleased to know that the bookstore also has copies of public laws, presidential reports, in addition to the Federal Register and the Congressional Record. Anything the GPO prints that the store does not have in stock can be ordered at the bookstore, and they promise much better service than you describe in your letter. As a bonus, I have found the Detroit staff to be enthusiastic and very friendly people.

My husband has taken a job in Washington, D.C. and we will be moving there next month. We want to keep some ties with Michigan and Michigan people while we live there. I understand that some states have clubs in Washington made up of former residents. Does Michigan have one and how can we join?

Every state in the Union is represented by a State Society in Washington. The societies are strictly social in nature, and dues are used to finance activities. The Michigan State Society has the distinction of being the oldest State Society. It was formed by Michiganders working in Washington during the Civil War (it was called the "Sons of Michigan" then). The Society has a membership of several hundred and hosts various get-togethers throughout the year. I have given the Society your name, and you should receive an invitation to join.

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

It seems to me that it would be formal to experience some decline in the demand of red meat during the Lenten season. A boycott set-up at that same season perhaps could look better than it would at any other time of the

Any change in the eating habits of onsumers, natural or instituted, affect

The production of red meat is not omething that can be turned on or off like a water spigot. Farmers must plan their production goals one, two r even three years in advance, Presently, farmers are concerned

about the effects of a boycott on meat. Not only on the agricultural industry, but also on the consumer who may want to eat steak in the future. An emotional attack on farmers,

such as the meat boycott, may discour-

age them from increasing production or even make it impossible for them to continue producing meat at all. Farmers have been caught in an

inflation cost-price squeeze for many

years. They can no longer afford to produce animals for market unless they can be assured a reasonable profit. for curtailed government spending,

Consumers would do better to call which would go a long way towards correcting the real problem -- inflation, than to stage a meat boycott.






