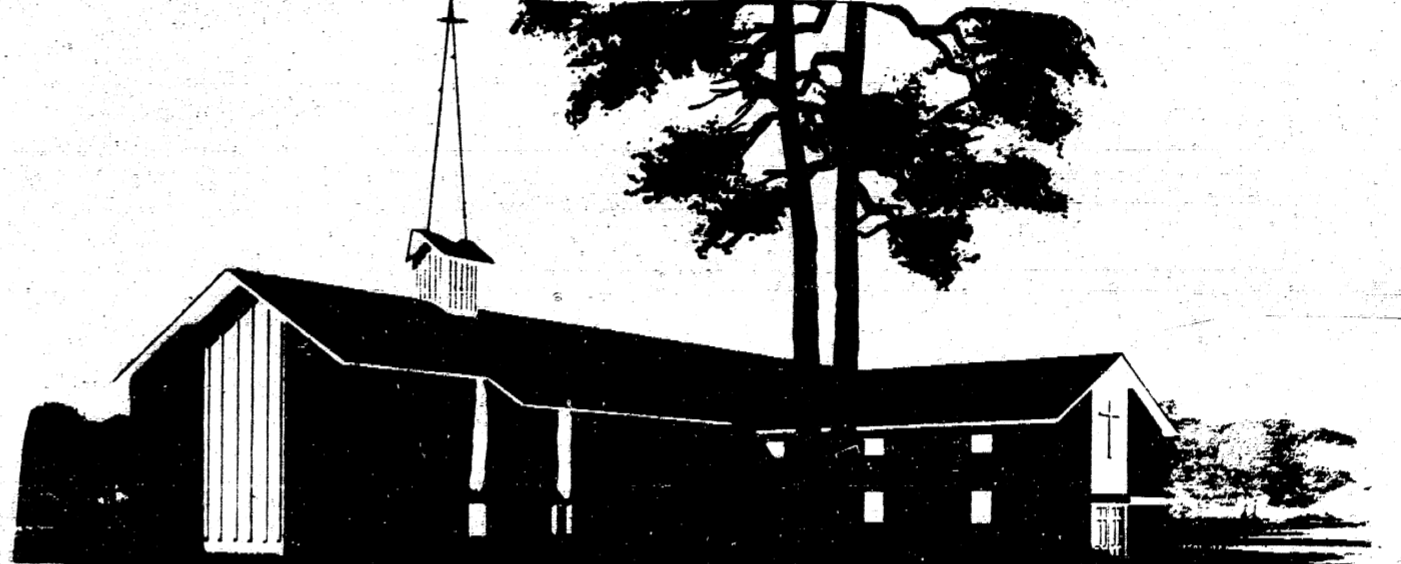

Ground Breaking Ceremony July 22



Sunday July 22nd will be another historic day for the 106 year old Zion Lutheran Congregation of Chelsea. Having continuously worshipped in its present church structure erected in 1867, the congregation will break ground on the same corner for its new church and remodeled educational unit to meet its present and future needs. At a special congregational meeting on June 12th, members gave final approval for the construction which includes nave seating for 280 with ample overflow areas, provision for 14 classrooms in the full basement and 8 other classrooms in the restyled existing parish hall to which the new church attaches. Other areas will provide rooms for offices, choirs, sewing activities, program and fellowship. Cost of the construction project is set at approximately \$363,000 and when completely finished and furnished with full equipment will approach \$390,000. Construction will take about one year. The firm of Hahn and Hayes, Architects & Engineers, Toledo, Ohio have furnished the drawings and will oversee the construction. The General Contractor, Bridgewater Lumber, together with Luchhardt Plumbing and Heating, Saline, and Heller Electric, Chelsea are to do the work. Mr. Alton Horming is chairman of the Building Committee. The ground breaking service is to be the conclusion of the morning worship at 9:30 AM when the congregation and guests assembled will process to the site and form the outline of the building and together pull a plow which will break the ground. Manchester Fair Adds New Classes

There are many new classes added to the Fair Book this year. We hope that the selection of classes will do more to represent our community's interests and achievements. Next year we will completely revise the book, and your comments and suggestions will be greatly appreciated.

In the Livestock tent we have limited the height of ponies to 50" and excluded stallions from competition. A meat pen class has been added to the rabbit division.

In the Home Economics department we have added several pickled products to the Canned Goods division, and we will greatly revise this division in the next Fair Book.

Handicraft have more defined classes for Afghans (knitted, crocheted, and loomed) and a latched rug class. We have also added a section specifically for handicapped children including classes for hoplads and mats, hooked rugs, and miscellaneous handicrafts. In the sewing division we have defined the age groups to 15 years and older, 9 - 14 years, and eight and under.

The Hobbies and Collections has had the most changes and additions to it. In collections we have added several more classes and decided the age competition to 14 years and under and 15 years and older. In crafts we have changed the ages to 9 years and under, 10 - 15 years and 16 years and older. We've also added two sections for picture crafts such as paper toling, beaded string, etc. In the Painting Division we have defined classes as water color, drawings, oil or acrylic, paint by number, sculpture and misc., in age groupings of 12 years and under, 13 - 18 years, and 19 years and older. Photography is a new Division for the Fair this year with class subjects of nature, animals, people, scenery and misc. There will be sections for black and white pictures and color prints.

The Fair book will be out the first part of August, and more detailed information will be available then. One rule change made for the exhibit tent will be enforced without exception. No exhibit may be removed before 10 pm, Saturday, August 25, 1973. The reason for this rule change is so that everyone can enjoy the Fair, for the entire time the fair is open.

KNOW YOUR MICHIGAN LAW

Consumers who purchase meat by carcass weight or by primal cuts often learn too late that there is a significant weight loss when the fat is trimmed and the meat cut for the table. This weight loss ranges from 20 percent to 30 percent and sometimes is even higher.

Because of this, a consumer who pays \$200 for a side of beef weighing 200 pounds, believing he is paying \$1.00 per pound for the meat, finds he has only 150 pounds after the meat is cut and the excess fat trimmed. In reality, he has paid \$1.33 per pound for the meat he puts on his table. In the interest of ensuring that the consumer is better informed, the Michigan legislature has recently passed a law regulating the advertising and sale of meat by primal cut or carcass weight.

The law requires the seller to furnish a statement at the time of sale, on forms approved by the Michigan Department of Agriculture. The

consumer must be told in writing - the weight of the carcass or primal cut purchased, the type of animal and carcass section, and the estimated price range per pound, including all costs, of the final weight actually delivered. If the seller cuts the meat, he must furnish a written statement disclosing the weight of meat, by type of cuts, actually delivered to the consumer.

In addition, the law requires all prices advertised to include the estimated net price range, including all costs, of the delivered product.

The act makes violation a misdemeanor, and also provides for civil action by consumers for actual and punitive damages against violators. * Public Act 315 of 1972.

FLOURIDE PROGRAM

Topical applications of flouride will again be offered to the Manchester Pleasant Lake area children the week of November 12, 1973 according to

Karen Bristle, chairman of the flouride committee. This is the first time since 1969.

The flouride program which is supervised by the Michigan Dept. of Public Health and Dr. Glenn Lehr will be made available to preschoolers, second, fifth and eighth graders and to special cases referred by dentists.

The procedure consists of four visits to the flouride clinic. The child's teeth are cleaned on the first visit and a flouride solution is applied directly to the surface of the teeth. The flouride application only is then repeated during the three succeeding visits. This technique has been shown to reduce tooth decay by about forty percent.

In addition to providing protection against cavities, the program offers a valuable dental experience for children with no discomfort. Dental health education by the clinic personnel, including instruction in the proper method of brushing teeth.

Parents will be given an opportunity

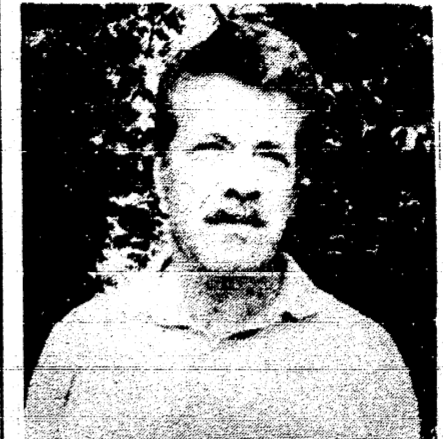

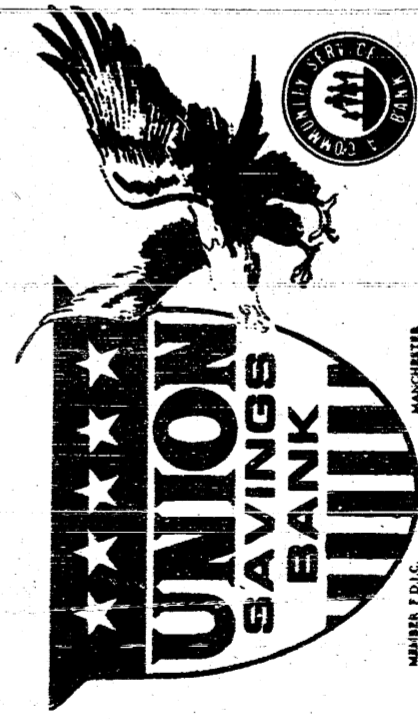

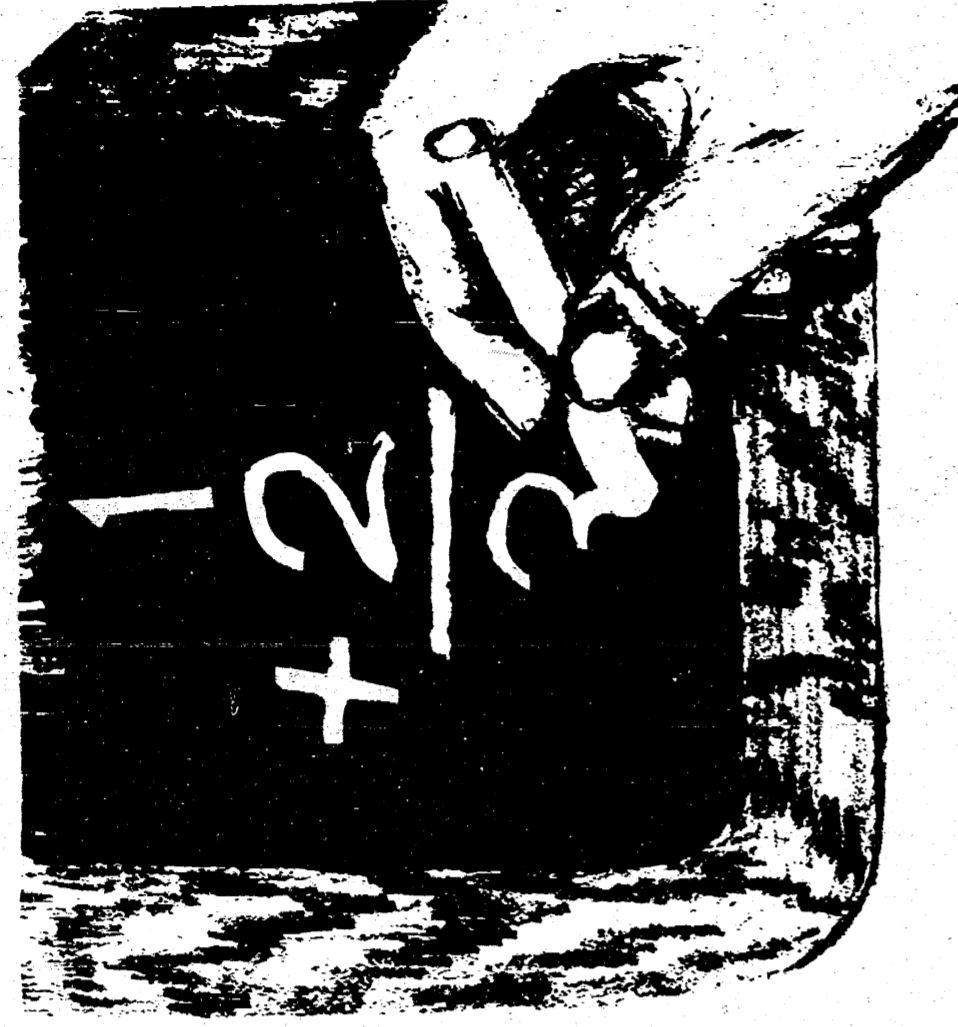

VISIBILITY CAN MEAN SURVIVAL

Anyone who mounts the saddle of a motorcycle has got to think about survival.

Accidents--bad accidents--come easy for the cyclist. He has all the hazards of automobile travel plus several of his own.

A prominent middle-aged man in an eastern city decided to abandon the bumper-to-bumper rush hour scene in favor of a motorcycle with its convenience and economy.

Visibility. That's the message government safety experts are sounding to try to prevent such accidents: if you get on a motorcycle be sure the car and trucks on the road can see you.

During the day, bright-colored clothing and even headlights may help. At night they suggest lavish use of retro-reflective material on clothing and sides of the motorcycle (in addition to headlights, of course).

The safety helmet continues to be the best single factor in cutting the death and injury risk when accidents do occur.

There are other protections recommended by the injury control specialists at the Bureau of Community Environmental Management, a component of HEW's Health Services and Mental Health Administration:

* Goggles or face-shield, to improve vision and protect against flying gravel. * Tough clothing to help absorb the scrapes, scratches, cuts and bumps -- leather jacket and gloves, sturdy trousers and footwear even in hot weather.

* A vehicle equipped with rear view mirror and windshield.

These protective measures together with good driving skill and judgement can let the motorcycle be a convenient, fun, economical and safe way to get around.

DRAFT REGISTRATION STILL REQUIRED

Young men must still register with Selective Service at the time of their 18th birthday even though induction authority ended July 1, Arthur A. Holmes, state director of Selective Service, announced today.

He urged those men who have not registered to do so promptly. "Failure to register is a violation of the law," Mr. Holmes emphasized, "and could result in prosecution by the Department of Justice."

While the President's authority to induct men into military service expired on July 1, all other provisions of the Selective Service Act remain in force. The annual lottery will be held. Young men must continue to register. Local boards will classify them as to their availability for possible military service in the event of a national emergency.

The law requires that all male persons, except certain non-immigrant aliens, must register with Selective Service within the 60 day period commencing 30 days prior to their 18th birthday. Under the law young men have three obligations: (1) they must register at age 18, (2) they must notify their draft boards when they change addresses, and (3) they must carry their draft cards with them until their liability expires, which for most men today is at age 26.

Michigan draft boards have been reorganized at 27 area offices to carry on the standby draft operation. Volunteer registrars are also available in most communities to accept draft registrations. Area offices are now located at Allen Park, Alpena, Ann Arbor, Battle Creek, Benton Harbor, Cadillac, Cheboygan, Detroit, Escanaba, Flint, Grand Rapids, Houghton, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Livonia, Marquette, Midland, Mt. Pleasant, Muskegon, Pontiac, Port Huron, Roseville, Royal Oak, Saginaw, Sault Ste. Marie and Traverse City.

Ask Senator GRIFFIN



By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. When we visited the Senate Chamber during our Senior Class trip to Washington, several of us wondered why some Senators remained standing while another Senator was speaking. Were they doing it out of courtesy or respect, or did it have another significance?

—S. A., Concord

The Senate has many unusual and interesting traditions which often baffle visitors and, at times, freshmen Senators. A Senator must be on his feet if he seeks recognition by the Chair (the Presiding Officer of the Senate) in order to speak. A Senator who has "the floor" may yield temporarily to another Senator. If he sits down it is considered that he has yielded the floor entirely. Generally, if a Senator knows debate may follow his remarks, he will also ask for prior unanimous consent, in order to yield time to his colleagues while still being able to retain the floor.

I understand that complaints about price freeze violations are to be taken up with the Internal Revenue Service. That's fine except that I work every day but Saturday—and the IRS office is closed on Saturdays. What kind of a price freeze is this?

Several days ago, IRS announced that its economic stabilization offices hereafter will be open on Saturday as the price freeze continues in effect.

Agriculture in Action

Michigan Farm Bureau

On March 15, President Nixon said rigid price controls on meat would not work. He added that such a freeze would discourage supply and lead to black markets and rationing. A few days later, Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz said anyone who favored such a freeze on food would be a "damn fool." Then on March 29, reacting to consumer advocates and labor union leaders, the President did impose a freeze on meat. Then, in mid-June, another freeze was imposed on all items, and the two freezes together prove both Mr. Nixon and the Secretary were right in their mid-March statements.

Instead of lowering food prices, the current freeze is resulting in a much lower supply now and in months

to come, and will eventually result in much higher prices. This can be seen in the large number of sows and cows going to slaughter. These are breeding animals that would have produced thousands of baby pigs, and hundreds of baby calves that now will never see the light of day. The hundreds of thousands of baby chicks that are being killed, and the even larger amount of eggs not being hatched, will show up in greatly reduced broiler numbers this fall.

Both the consumer and the producer are losers in this game being carried out by officials in Washington. Producers can't afford to produce when it costs more to produce the product than what they can sell it for. They don't have the incentive to produce under such circumstances, and shortages and high prices to consumers are bound to happen.

The ultimate blame for the mess we're in must be at the feet of those consumer advocates and labor union officials who pressured the Administration into placing the freeze on meat and other foods. Somehow, someday, the consumers of this country must be made aware of those factors that go together to encourage or discourage food production. It could be that the current situation, and subsequent lower supplies of pork, beef, poultry, and

dairy products will help make them more aware.

But let's a tough way to learn... tough on both the producer and the consumer.

1973 SPECIAL ENROLLMENT EXAMINATION

A Special Enrollment Examination will be held on September 24 and 25, 1973 in Detroit for accountants and others who wish to qualify to represent taxpayers at all levels of the Internal Revenue Service.

Tax practitioners who are not certified public accountants or attorneys must demonstrate their technical competence before they can be enrolled to represent clients before IRS. This right to practice is governed by technical and ethical standards set by the Treasury Department.

A sample of the Special Enrollment Examination, Publication 693, information about the examination and application forms may be obtained by writing to the Internal Revenue Service, Taxpayer Service Section, P.O. Box 2258, Detroit, Michigan 48231. Applicants must file no later than August 31, 1973 and must include with their application form a \$25 fee to cover the costs of administering the examination.

MEDICARE NOW COVERS SOME CHIROPRACTIC SERVICES

Beginning July 1, Medicare can help pay for limited chiropractor's services under medical insurance, but only under certain conditions.

According to Robert A. Kehoe, Social Security District Manager in Ann Arbor, the Chiropractor must be licensed or legally authorized to furnish chiropractic services by the State and also meet Federal criteria. In addition, Kehoe said, "We want to emphasize that coverage of Chiropractor's services under Medicare is very limited. It is important for beneficiaries to know that Medicare can help pay only for manual manipulation of the spine for the purpose of correcting a subluxation which can be demonstrated by X-ray. No payment can be made for any other kind of chiropractic treatment or for any diagnostic services by the Chiropractor, such as X-rays or laboratory tests."

A subluxation is defined as an incomplete dislocation, off-centering, misalignment, fixation or abnormal spacing of the vertebrae. Kehoe asked that beneficiaries with any question about chiropractic coverage get in touch with the local Social Security office at 2929 Plymouth Rd., Phone 769-7100.
