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"The outdoors is one big science lab," says Michigan State University Child Development Specialist Jeanne Brown, "and you don't have to be a scientist to help your child learn and discover."

Your part is to provide the child with the opportunity to get acquainted with nature and to encourage his questions and curiosity, says Mrs. Brown.

Something as simple as a walk through the woods, along a creek or riverbank or across a vacant lot will turn up a hundred wonders. Take the time to stop and look at pretty rocks or funny bugs, sniff the flowers -- even if they're just weeds to you -- listen to the calls and songs of birds, watch a bee working in a flower, touch a fuzzy leaf, see how close you can get to a turtle sunning on a log. Use a magnifying glass to enter a whole

new world. Look at salt and sugar crystals, leaves, fabric, rocks, insects, wood, flowers, grass, hair.

"Why does he do that?" "What makes grass grow up?" "Where does it go in the winter?"

You may not know the answers to all your child's questions, but you can encourage him to ask them and you can use them as springboards to further talk, thought and investigation. Let them lead you on an expedition to the library or look for the answer in your home reference books. You'll help the child satisfy his desire to know, and acquaint him with ways he can use to find out on his own.

Collections are one way youngsters can bring nature home to study, Mrs. Brown suggests. Children are natural collectors of pretty stones, feathers, pine cones, weed seed pods and the like, and they enjoy watching caterpillars or tadpoles as they grow and mature into adult butterflies and frogs.

**LATTICE-TOPPED APPLE PIE**

Makes 8 servings

| Filling:                         | 1/2 teaspoon salt                             |
| 3/4 cup sugar                    | 1/2 cup shortening, soft                      |
| 2 tablespoons cornstarch         | 3/4 cup quick or old fashioned oats, uncooked |
| 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon            | 5 to 7 tablespoons cold water                 |
| 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg              |   |
| Dash salt                        |   |
| 6 cups sliced, pared tart apples | 1 tablespoon butter or margarine              |

Pastry:  
1-1/4 cups sifted all-purpose flour

Heat oven to hot (425°F.). For filling, combine sugar, cornstarch, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt. Stir in apple slices until well coated.

For pastry, sift together flour and salt. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in oats. Sprinkle water by tablespoons over mixture, stirring lightly with a fork until dry ingredients are moistened. Form into a ball.

Divide dough in half. Roll out one half on a lightly floured board or canvas to form a 13-inch circle. Fit pastry loosely into a 9-inch pie plate. Spoon filling into pastry-lined pie plate. Dot with butter.

Roll out remaining half of dough to a 12-inch circle; cut into 1-inch strips. Place pastry strips over filling. Trim; fold edges under and flute. Bake in preheated oven (425°F.) 15 minutes. Reduce heat to moderate (375°F.). Bake an additional 30 to 35 minutes. Remove from oven and sprinkle pie lightly with sugar.

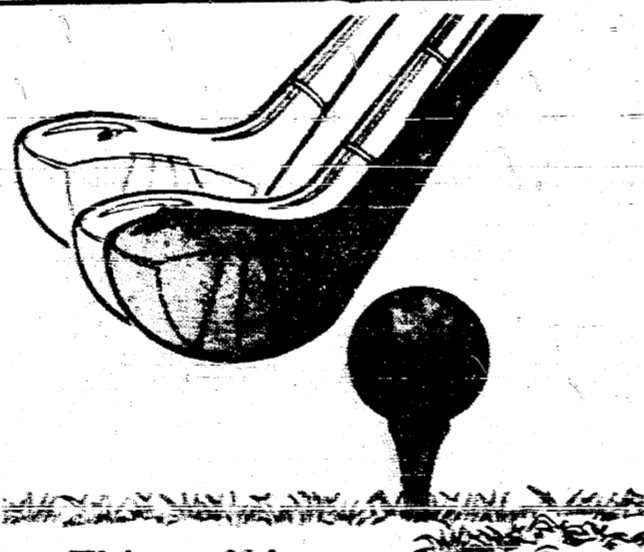
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# Agriculture in Action

## Michigan Farm Bureau

"Who's Chavez?" The publicity-seeking farm labor crusader, marching under the banner of the United Farm Workers, would not be flattered by this question from an urban housewife. Cesar Chavez, who works hard at projecting an image of piety while supposedly fighting for the rights of his union members, works equally hard at seeking headlines. Sometimes he's successful. But those who have studied his background are skeptical of his real aims and question the credibility of some of his statements.

It's difficult to separate what Cesar says from what Cesar does. For example, he was in Michigan recently seeking support for secret ballot elections for his workers; yet

a look at the record clearly shows that Cesar and the UFW have, for years, taken unyielding opposition to the secret ballot method of voting. He outwardly endorses a policy of non-violence in keeping with his image of sacrifice and saintliness; yet there have been reports of violent eruptions in several produce markets, lugs of grapes thrown off trucks and destroyed, and stores picketed and harassed because they do not handle lettuce picked by UFW workers.

A professional at arousing public sympathy with unsubstantiated tear-jerker facts and figures, he has recruited some well-intentioned but uninformed supporters to join him in the picket lines. But the majority recognize Chavez's "crusade" for what it is—a jurisdictional dispute between two unions, the United Farm Workers and the Teamsters. It's a battle which unfairly puts farmers, farm workers, and consumers in the middle of a dispute which should be settled by legislation. To restore order in the food production and distribution system, legislation which brings farm workers under a Labor Management Relations Act, providing for the recognition of the climatic and biological factors of food production, seems to be the best solution to the problem for all concerned parties.

In the meantime, Cesar may find it tough going to gain support from consumers. With tactics that create food shortages and higher prices, his "campaign" in Michigan is doomed to failure. Consumers believe as farmers do—that farm workers should have the right to organize, if they wish, but do so under fair and legal procedures and don't rock the boat of food production. Consumers are the ones who must do the balling when the system springs a leak....

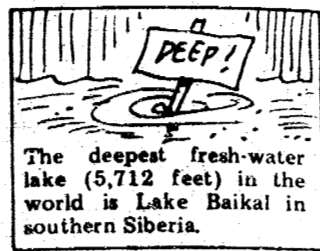

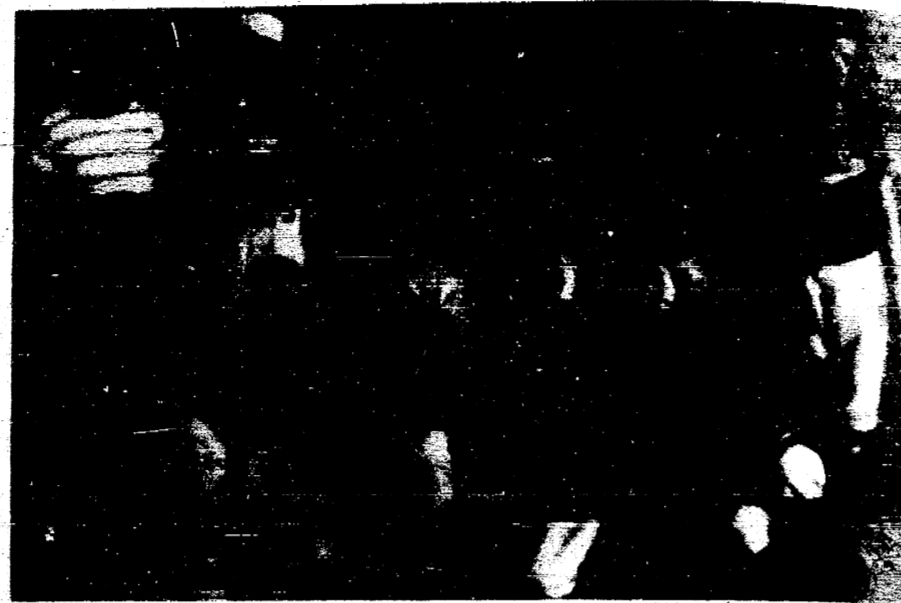

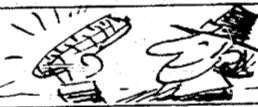
In 1939, a young journalist named Alan Cranston was sued by Adolf Hitler for illegally publishing "Mein Kampf" in the United States. Correspondent Cranston, who later was elected in 1968 to the U.S. Senate from California, discovered that the version of "Mein Kampf" being sold in the U.S. was heavily edited. "Most of Hitler's most vicious statements about conquering the world had been taken out," said Senator Cranston. Along with another newsman he translated the original German version and had it published for ten cents a copy. In just ten days more than half a million copies were sold. However, Hitler's publishing agents sued Cranston and won. "A beautiful example of democracy in action," said Senator Cranston. "After all, I had violated his rights."

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

July 17, 1973

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 8:15 pm. Trustees present were Walton, Fitzgerald, Stautz and Mahony; absent were Benedict, Scully and Clerk Mary Wheeler. Minutes from the July 2, 1973 regular meeting were read and approved as corrected with a motion from Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald. All yeas, carried.

Guest Mrs. Post requested permission to build a duplex-style building on approximately one acre of railroad property on Sutton Road. The area in question is presently zoned R-1; however, the new zoning plan for the Village proposes that the area be zoned R-2A. Since R-2A calls for medium-low density, multiple dwellings, Mrs. Post's plan would be appropriate for that property. Mrs. Post was referred to the Planning Commission for their decision. She was asked to set up the meeting per her request and have a legal description and building plan available for presentation.

Fitzgerald reported on Public Works activities. Catch basins have been cleaned, some of the open lots have been mowed, brush has been cut for traffic safety at Duncan and Adrian, parks have been mowed and some asphalt patching has been done. Two sealed bids were received from Tibb Chevrolet and Tom Marshall Ford on a new dump truck for the Public Works Dept. Moved by Mahony, supported by Walton that the Public Works Committee review the bids with the power to purchase. All yeas, carried.

A meeting was held with the Township concerning the landfill. Bruce Daniels was contacted by the County Health Dept. about the landfill site. They requested a construction plan of the new wall.

Additional street construction is scheduled. Repair of the southwest corner of the Village Hall was discussed. Manchester Township has voiced willingness to split the cost of any repair with the Village.

In response to a letter from Pres. Little, Mr. Richard C. Mastin, District Engineer for the Michigan Dept. of State Highways wrote concerning improvement plans for M-52 within the Village. The proposed project, scheduled for the current fiscal year, includes resurfacing a section of M-52 to improve the riding quality and reduce maintenance costs, and making minor improvements to the drainage system. The problem related to the curve in front of Klager Elementary School will be reviewed in the near future to consider the possibility of adding work to include a guard rail to the previously mentioned resurfacing project. Acquisition of right of way, realignment, and construction of curb and gutter along M-52 must be programmed according to priorities and

availability of Department funds; consequently, a copy of Pres. Little's letter requesting these improvements is being directed to Mr. S. Cryderman, Engineer of Transportation Planning, for consideration. Mr. Mastin indicated that nothing would be done about the Main Street-M-52 intersection because the accident problem seems related to parking. As the Village has already acted on this by changing the parking, Pres. Little was asked to write Mr. Mastin advising him of this change and requesting further consideration by the Dept. of Highways towards improvement of the intersection.

Police Chief Thomas reported that the problem of drinking in public areas, which Mr. Limpert had brought up at the July 2, 1973 council meeting, has been almost completely resolved. There is a \$25.00 fine for drinking beer on the streets, which is being strictly enforced.

Stautz reported that the following permits had been taken out: building-Porter Lumber Co., Wager Street, alteration-Erwin Paul-109 Beaufort Street, alteration-All's Custom Plumbing-227 W. Main St.

There have been 26 electrical inspections up to July 9, 1973. The Village electrical inspector, Wm. Brady, has requested that he be replaced. He will continue on the job until a replacement is found. Brady has given Stautz a list of suggested individuals for the position. Stautz indicated he would have a recommended replacement by the next meeting. Motion to adjourn at 9:52 pm by Stautz, supported by Walton. All yeas, carried. Claudia D. Wise, Acting Clerk
