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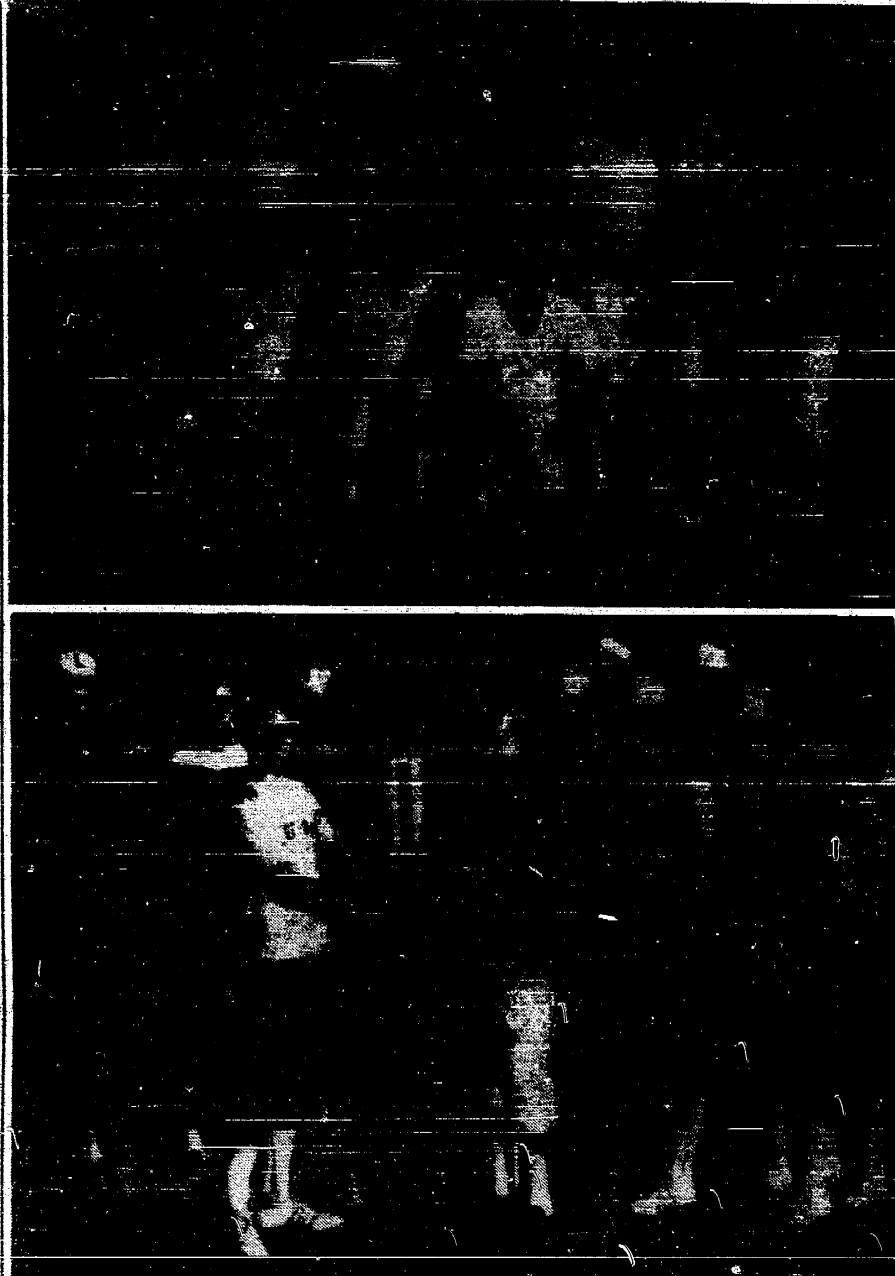

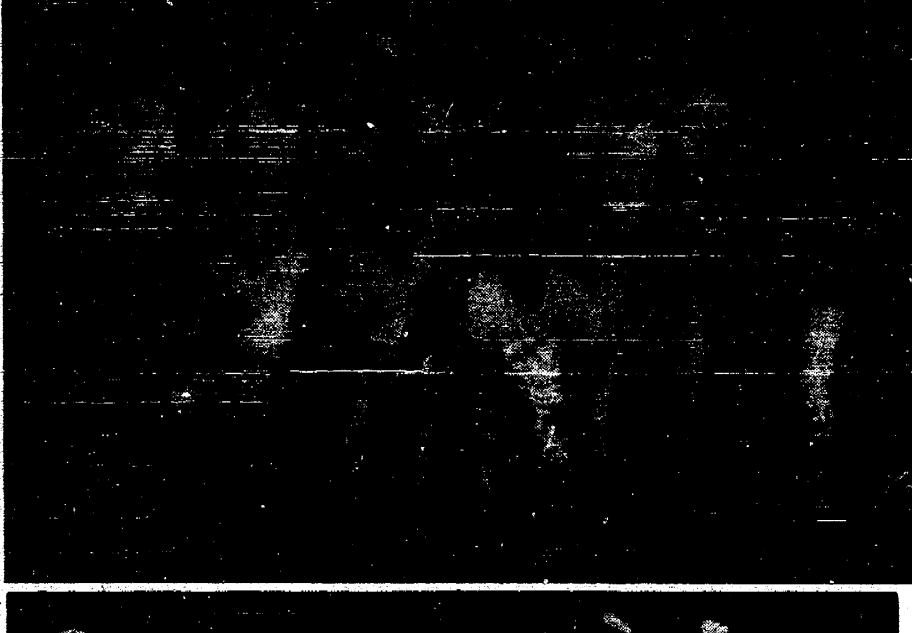

### GALS DONNING HARD HATS, TAKING OVER ROAD JOBS

For the first time in the 68-year history of the Department of State Highways, women are working as seasonal engineering aides on construction projects.

Dressed in construction garb including hard hats, they assist state engineers inspecting highway construction, staking grades, filling out construction reports and doing dozens of other jobs that go with the rush of activity during the summer construction season.

Robert J. Hamill, personnel administrator for the Department, says the women construction aides are required to perform the same tasks as men-- "and are doing very well."

Neither the Department nor the Civil Service exams ever excluded women, he says, but changing concepts of the female role in society apparently has encouraged more women to apply for jobs previously considered "for men only."

Hamill said several young women were hired as engineering aides in 1972, but they ended up in the more traditional women's office role instead of in the field.

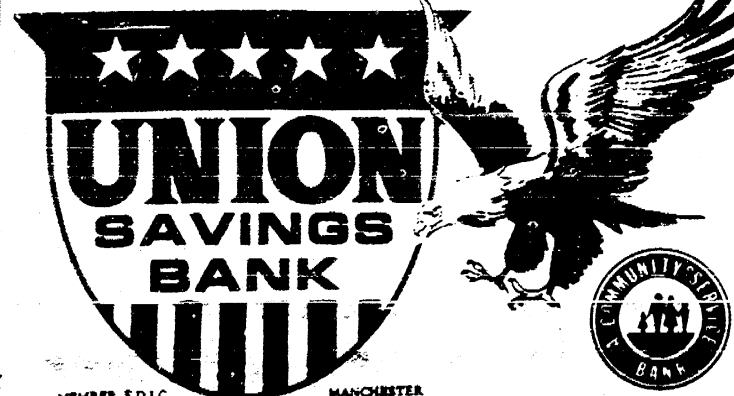
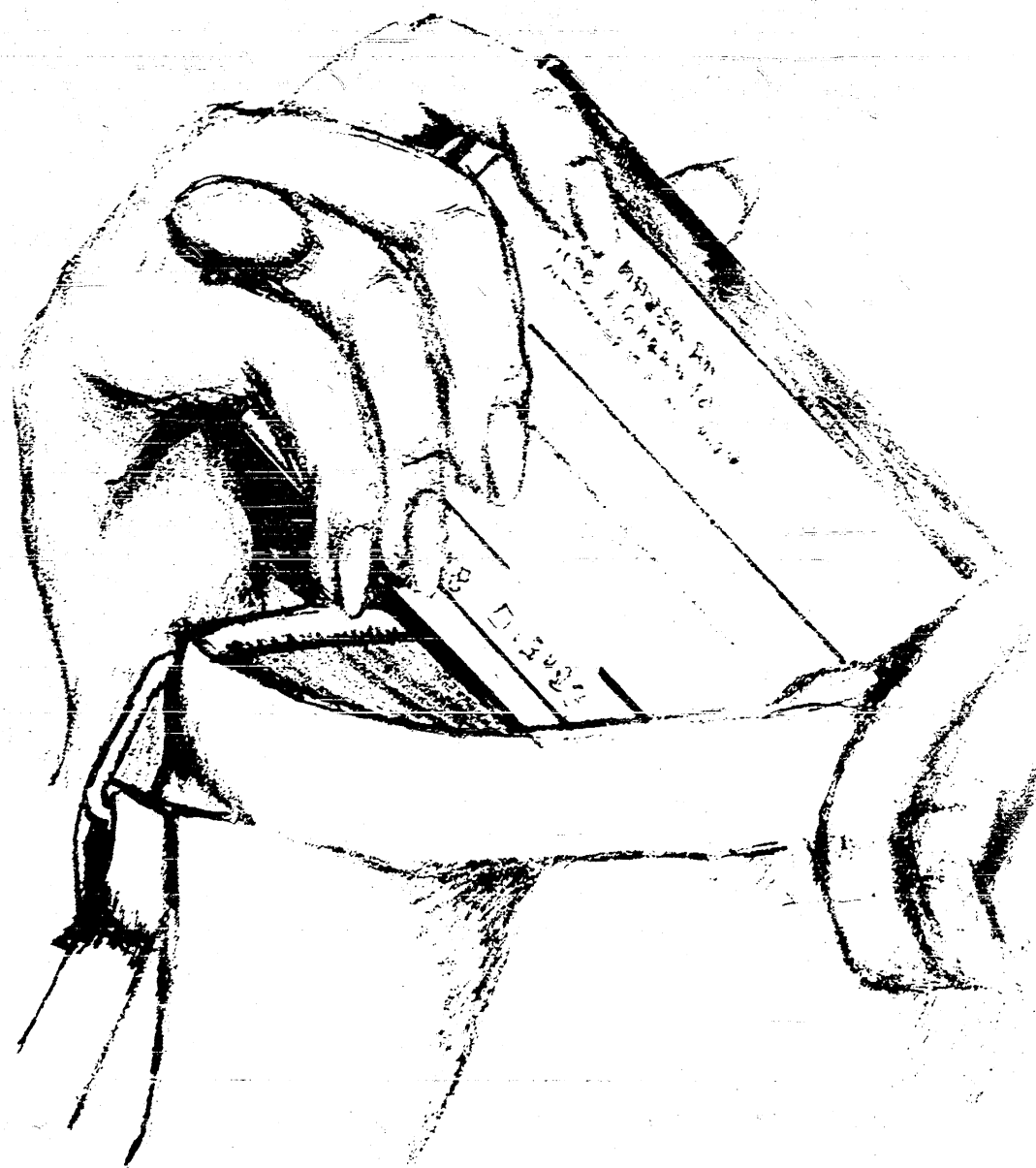

## Agriculture in Action

Michigan Farm Bureau

"Try the udder uncola-drink milk," a large billboard proclaimed. This is one of the methods milk and dairy promoters have used to increase the consumption of nature's most nearly perfect food in order to help bring down the surplus that had built up due to over-production and lower usage.

Now things have changed. Consumption of dairy products is up and it's become a problem to get enough produced. U.S. milk production in the first five months of this year was down two percent from the same period last year. This was the first drop in production in four years. Another significant drop in the second half of this year could put the dairy output considerably below present demand for milk and dairy products, and hence bring on some shortages.

The problem faced by dairymen is the same faced by other agricultural producers. Their costs have increased faster than their income, and an alarming number are discouraged to the point of calling it quits. The favorable beef price encourages farmers to cull their herds closely. That means a cow not paying her way through milk is sold for beef.

For a dairyman to earn an average living wage, he has to risk approximately \$200,000 and work at least 60 hours a week. This huge investment is in land, buildings, equipment and cattle. It does not include his home, or personal living items such as the family car. What is a little disconcerting is that most factory workers can earn more in a 40 hour week with no investment whatsoever.

It's no wonder some dairy farmers are selling out. They can put their investment in a savings account and make more on the interest than they can by milking cows twice a day, 365 days a year.

If consumers put the "udder uncola" in their shopping carts and complain about its price tag, it's because they don't realize the investment and effort it took to put it in the dairy case. Politicians find it hard to tell consumers the unvarnished truth and make promises

they can't fulfill about lowering food prices. Farmers believe they should be told the facts—that the days of cheap food are over. They believe consumers will understand that nobody is willing to invest 10 cents to produce something the government says he must sell for a nickel.

### MICHIGAN STATE POLICE

Michigan State Police employees preparing for the department's 19th annual auction report there will be lots more lots of merchandise for sale this year than there was in 1972.

As a matter of fact, the number of lots will probably approximate 1,000 when the counting is done. This is a distinct increase from about 600 last year. The number has averaged from 500 to 600 in recent years.

What's more important to auction goers is that the sale of unclaimed, confiscated, or otherwise owner-unknown merchandise will be held at a new location --- at the Boys Training School field house at 400 N. Pennsylvania in Lansing. The sale will be conducted two days, Thursday and Friday, August 16 and 17, beginning at 9 a.m. each day. Previous sales have been at East Lansing. Need for storage space for the

merchandise resulted in the use of the BTS facility and for convenience the sale will be conducted there also.

Articles to be sold include a pickup truck, minibikes, bicycles, motorcycles, rifles and shotguns, television and radio sets, hand and power tools, cameras, rings, watches, snowmobiles, car parts and accessories, and office equipment.

A greater amount of merchandise almost certainly assures a new record net return for the state treasury where the proceeds go. The previous record net was \$10,444 from the 1972 sale.

Auctioneers will be Wayne Feighner, Mason, and James Korrey, Holt, Sale Director is Ernest J. Banning, head of the State Police business administration division.

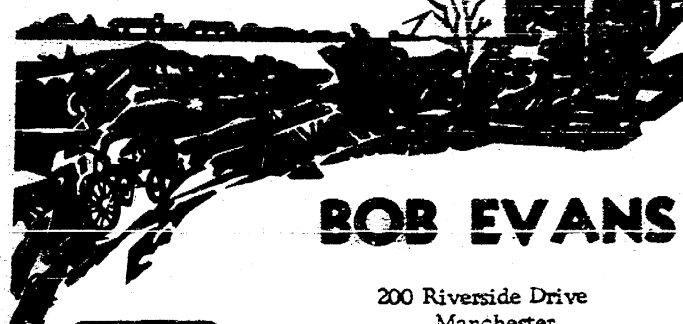

Yes, it's possible. But you should hurry. Last year Congress passed a bill which allows military personnel who retired prior to September 21, 1972, to participate in a new Military Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP). However, the enrollment period for participation ends on September 20, 1973. Any retired military person who receives military retirement pay (including disability or reserve retirement pay) may enroll in the new plan. Under SBP, the military retiree may leave up to 50% of his retirement pay at time of death to his surviving dependents. The plan isn't free, but it's very reasonable. For additional information and application form, contact the Military Finance Center of your branch of the Armed Forces. Since your husband retired from the Army he should write to: Retired Pay Division, U.S. Army Finance Support Agency, Indianapolis, Indiana 46249.

### Meadow Brook Hall Rose Petal Jam

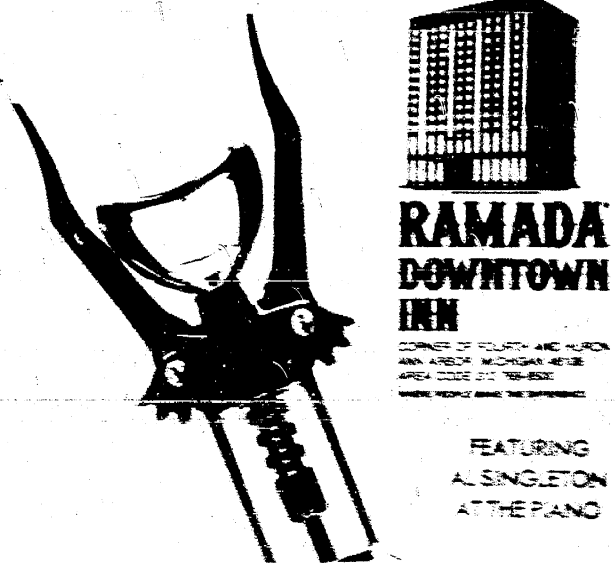

Mix 1 package of powdered pectin and 3/4 cups water in saucepan; bring to a boil and boil hard for 1 minute. Put in a closed container. Refrigerate or freeze. Makes about 4 small jars. Keeps for 6 months.

## Notice To Middle School Students

All Middle School students will begin classes on Tuesday September 4. Fifth and sixth graders should report to Nellie Ackerson building, locate their name on one of the room lists posted in the hall, and then report to that room. Seventh and eighth graders should report to the gym by 8:30 A.M. for a short assembly and further registration information.

## Manchester JC Membership Grows

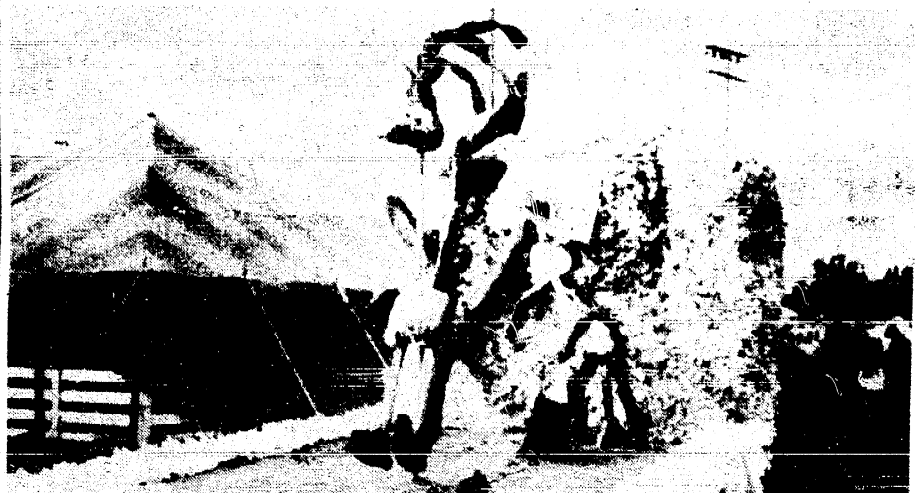

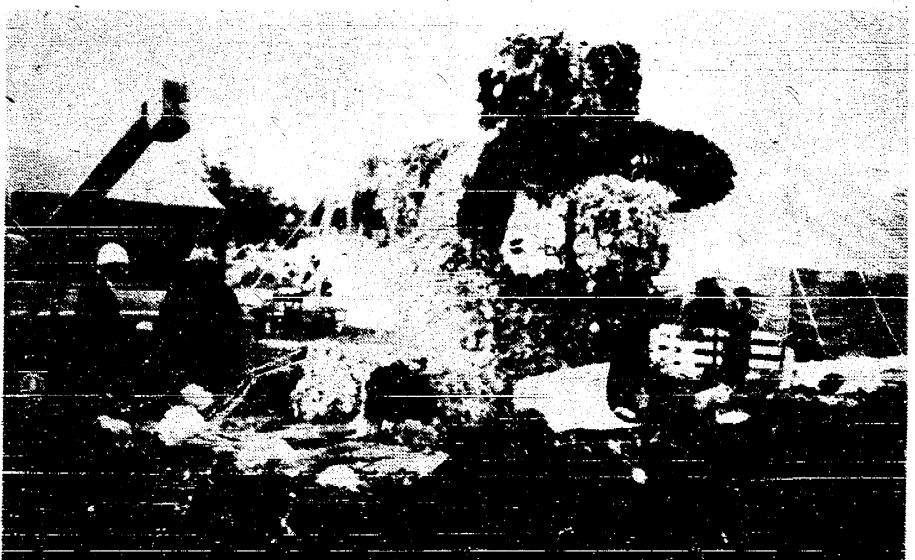
According to President Ron Mann, this ranks Manchester as the 8th largest Jaycee chapter in the State of Michigan.
