Try the udder uncola-drink milk, large billboard proclaimed. This is one of the methods milk and dairy promoters have used to increase the consumption of nature's most nearly perfect food in order to help bring down the surplus that had built up due to overproduction and lower usage.

Now things have changed. Consum tion of dairy products is up and it's become a problem to get enough produce

U.S. milk production in the first five months of this year was down two percent from the same period last year. This was the first drop in production in four years. Another significant drop in the second half of this year could put the dairy output considerably below present demand for milk and dairy prodTHE MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE

ects, and hence bring on some shortages The problem faced by dairymen is the same faced by other agricultural producers. Their costs have increased faster than their income, and an alarming number are discouraged to the point of calling it quits. The favorable beet price encourages farmers to cull their herds closely. That means a cow not paying her way through milk is sold

For a dairyman to earn an average living wage, he has to risk approximatel \$200,000 and work at least 60 hours a week. This huge investment is in land, buildings, equipment and cattle. It does not include his home, or persona living items such as the family car. What is a little disconcerting is that most factory workers can earn more in a 40 hour week with no investment

It's no wonder some dairy farmers are selling out. They can put their investment in a savings account and make more on the interest than they can by milking cows twice a day, 365 days a year.

If consumers put the "udder uncola in their shopping carts and complain about its price tag, it's because they don't realize the investment and effort it took to put it in the dairy case. Politicians find it hard to tell consumer the unvarnished truth and make promises

they can't fulfill about lowering food prices. Farmers believe they should e told the facts -- that the days of cheap food are over. They believe consumers will understand that nobody is willing to invest 10 cents to produce something the government says he mus sell for a nickel.

MICHIGAN STATE POLICE



I am 21 years old, foot-loose, and not especially trained for anything. I've been thinking of making the Army my career. Since there's no Army Recruiting Office near my home, I wonder if yeu can tell me how to get information about opportunities in the Army?

-M. H., Stephenson

Yes, indeed. Now that the draft is ended and our nation is dependent upon an all-volunteer armed force, your inquiry is very welcome. For the information you seek, write to: Army Opportunities, U.S. Army Recruiting Command, Hampton, Virginia, 23369. And, Good Luck!

My husband returned from the Army five years ago. We have a little bit of life insurance but if anything happened to him it wouldn't go very far toward supporting the children and me. I've heard that retired service personnel can qualify for a new survivor benefit plan. Is that true?

Yes, it's possible. But you should hurry. Last year Congress passed a bill which allows military personnel who retired prior to September 21, 1972, to participate in a new Military Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP). However, the enrollment period for participation ends on September 20, 1973. Any retired military person who receives military retirement pay (including disability or reserve retirement pay) may enroll in the new plan. Under SBP, the military retiree may leave up to 50% of his retirement pay at time of death to his surviving dependents. The plan isn't free, but it's very reasonable. For additional information and application form, contact the Military Finance Center of your branch of the Armed Forces. Since your husband retired from the Army he should write to: Retired Pay Division, U.S. Army Finance Support Agency, Indianapolis, Indiana






