Your United Fund Dollar At Work

Local Agencies receiving money from the Manchester Area Community Chest & Red Cross Drive.

Manchester Student Council: Budget \$200 - Monies used to subsidize school assemblies so that all students can afford to attend. During the past year they sponsored three assemblies for the student body, contributed to the Band Fund, the Christian Children's Fund, helped support the L.C.A.A. Scholarship program, sent flowers to hospitalized students and sponsored the year end dance.

Manchester Family Service: Budget \$200 - Gives direct emergency relief and locates client with proper agency for further care. 52 families with 69 children were assisted last year. 19 volunteer drivers totaled 9985 miles, in transporting those in dire need of keeping medical, Social Service, Legal Aid, Dental or Social Security appointments. Handles this area Christmas Bureau for the County. The Christmas Project was aided by the area churches, industries, Jaycee's and Jaycee Auxiliary, Optimist Club, and individuals.

Manchester Recreation: Budget \$4,000 - This program is financed by the Community Chest and the Village Council. It hires qualified staff, furnishes equipment and uniforms. Summer playground is included in their activities. Children participate in the following activities: 7 Little League teams, 5 Farm teams, 5 girls Softball teams, 2 Junior League teams. An average of 60 children went roller skating once a week. Beginning Swimming class were attended by area children including advanced swimmers. Ball players and their parents attended a Tiger Ball Game.

Pleasant Lake Recreation: Budget \$125 - Funds used to purchase special equipment for the use of the children at Pleasant Lake School. Monies spent this year on expendable items were books for the Pleasant Lake School Library. Total cost \$99.77.

Moore Organization: Budget \$132 - Each month pay a visit to Veteran's Hospital in Battle Creek to entertain, help the patients and providing treats and extras. Red Cross furnishes transportation. At Christmas packed 75 boxes for Battle Creek, 22 for local citizens and 2 for Vietnam servicemen. They do not have Tag Day, raise extra monies from affairs within the organization. Donations come from local people, organizations and business in Manchester to help with their activities.

Last year a special project was helping a family of eight whose father, a veteran, was hospitalized and unable to work. Groceries totaling \$45 were donated by the MOMS to this family.

400 Mile Trip Ends In Manchester

Four hundred miles in a week. Buffalo, New York to Manchester, Michigan on bicycles.

Gary Neuderfer of 128 Greystone Lane, Rochester, New York, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Neuderfer of Manchester and wife Judi Neuderfer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Amleto Simmons of Manchester, together with Robert and Cathy Bauer of Lima, New York planned vacations together this year and decided on a bike trip home.

Gary is a biologist and Robert a chemist with the New York State Fisheries Dept., and working together they became good friends. Judi, Gary's wife is a Public Health Nurse in Rochester and when all four became interested in biking and camping the trip was laid out and routed to stay as close to Lake Erie as possible, using all secondary roads through Canada.

Beginning at Buffalo they crossed the Peace Bridge and following as nearly as possible the shoreline, they began each day on the road by 7 A.M. and rode till 3 P.M. Cooking out was a problem because of the weight of the food and utensils, so they simply ate at whatever lunchroom was available. Bob pulled a small trailer behind his bike, called a bugger and the only casualty on the trip came when it flipped over on a rainy day. The two couples carried repair equipment but did not have any flat tires. Each bike could carry only 20 lbs., so the wardrobe was limited, spare jeans and shirts.

Arriving in Windsor, they biked across the Ambassador Bridge, a real thrill, and when they reached Ann Arbor, got a Motel Room, the first of the trip, for they had used Mountain tents and sleeping bags, then after a bath and cleanup, came into town.

The bikes were taken apart and crated and the two couples flew home with the bikes as baggage. The primary topic of conversation before leaving had to do with plans for biking to Nova Scotia next year.

Cross Countrymen Win Big

Our Manchester High Cross-Country Team opened the Fall sport season on a winning note as they took 15-42 and 21-34 victories, Monday, over Stockbridge and Dearborn Sacred Heart in a triangular meet at Carr Park.

Dutchmen Coach Larry Steeb was of course pleased with the performance but stated, "the top five men performed up to expectation but our 6th and 7th men were over 3 minutes behind our 5th man and in a big invitational or important dual meet that could be a disaster!"

The team feels it can improve last years great 7-3 season (the winningest in the history of Dutch Cross-Country) but understands that to do so a couple of Freshmen or first year Sophomores will have to have solid seasons.

Against Stockbridge and Dearborn Sacred Heart the first finisher was Senior Co-Captain Tom Guenther, which came as no surprise to his coach as Guenther has logged over 600 miles since last spring in preparation for this season.

Guenther's time of 16:30 in the meet Monday was a new course record and a swift clocking for this early in the season.

Junior, Phil Kryzaniak was the next Manchester finisher in third place with a solid 17:38 time. Coach Steeb feels that this will be the year that Kryzaniak blossoms into one of the really strong runners in the area.

Manchester's 3rd, 4th, and 5th men were Sophomore Dan Schaible at 17:50, Junior Co-Captain Joel Tobias at 18:08 and Sophomore Tom Opal at 18:14.

This is the group that Coach Steeb feels must stay healthy if the Dutchmen are to move up on league powers Addison and Onsted.

Finishing as 6th and 7th men in Mondays meet and completing the Varsity squad were Freshman, Bob Smith at 21:16 good for 18th place and Junior, Kurt Kensler in 19th place with a 21:41 clocking. Both Smith and Kensler have worked very hard so far this year in practice.

Completing the scoring Monday were Senior Brad Frey who clocked a 21:57 time and Freshmen Lester Janish, Bob Padley and Gary Bondy who were timed at 22:27, 23:16 and 23:25 respectively.

Completing this years squad of 16, the largest ever, are Freshmen Mark Weidmeyer (Last Years Middle School Champ) and Dan Heslip; Sophomore, Ken Schwab; Junior, Dean Decker; and Senior, John Savage.

These boys did not run Monday because of lack of pre-season conditioning.

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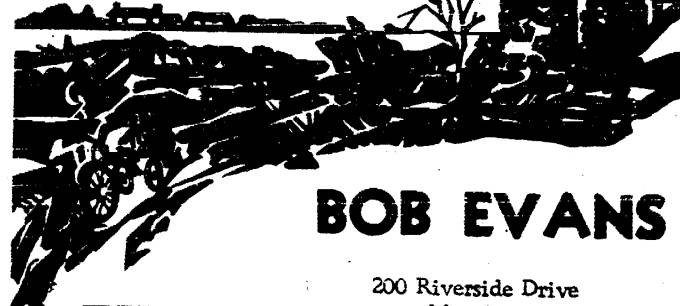

SOCIAL SECURITY CHECKS SHOULD BE CASHED WITHIN REASONABLE TIME TO PREVENT LOSS OR THEFT.

Dr. John Miles, President of "The Grand Rapids School of the Bible and Music", Father of Pastor Timothy Miles, conducted the installation service, which was well attended.

Social Security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to Robert A. Kehoe, Social Security District Manager in Ann Arbor. Since you know when the check is expected, it's a good idea not to leave your house that day until after your mail has arrived and the check taken out of your box. Otherwise, you provide an open invitation for theft of the check from your mailbox.

"If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest Social Security Office at one," Kehoe said. "The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced."

Social Security pays over \$99,000 a month in benefit checks to almost 698 people in Manchester - eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under Social Security.

Ask Senator GRIFFIN



By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. Since the voting age has been lowered to 18, young people are getting more involved in politics. Why, then, isn't something done about lowering the eligibility age for service in Congress?

—R. N., Ann Arbor

Two proposed constitutional amendments have been introduced in the Senate this year to do just that. They are pending before the Subcommittee on Constitutional Amendments of the Senate Committee on the Judiciary.

The amendment which seems to have the most support would, if approved by Congress and ratified by three-fourths of the States, lower the eligibility age for Senators from 30 to 27 and for Members of the House, from 25 to 22.

Incidentally, 42 states now allow young men and women under 22 to serve in the lower house of their legislatures. In 18 of those states this is permitted in both houses.

What has happened to the idea of a joint U.S.-Russian space project? Is this getting anywhere?

—A. C., Saginaw

Yes. Space officials are very pleased with the progress to date. Needless to say, there are many problems, not the least of which is the language barrier. However, Soviet cosmonauts conferred in Houston last month with U.S. astronauts and an American space team is scheduled to visit the Soviet Union in November.

Sometime in 1975 two Russian cosmonauts will be launched into orbit in a Soyuz spacecraft. Hours later on the same day two Americans will lift off. The two space vehicles will then be docked in space so the crews will be able to move freely between the two crafts and conduct experiments. Two days later the spacemen will part company and return to their home bases.

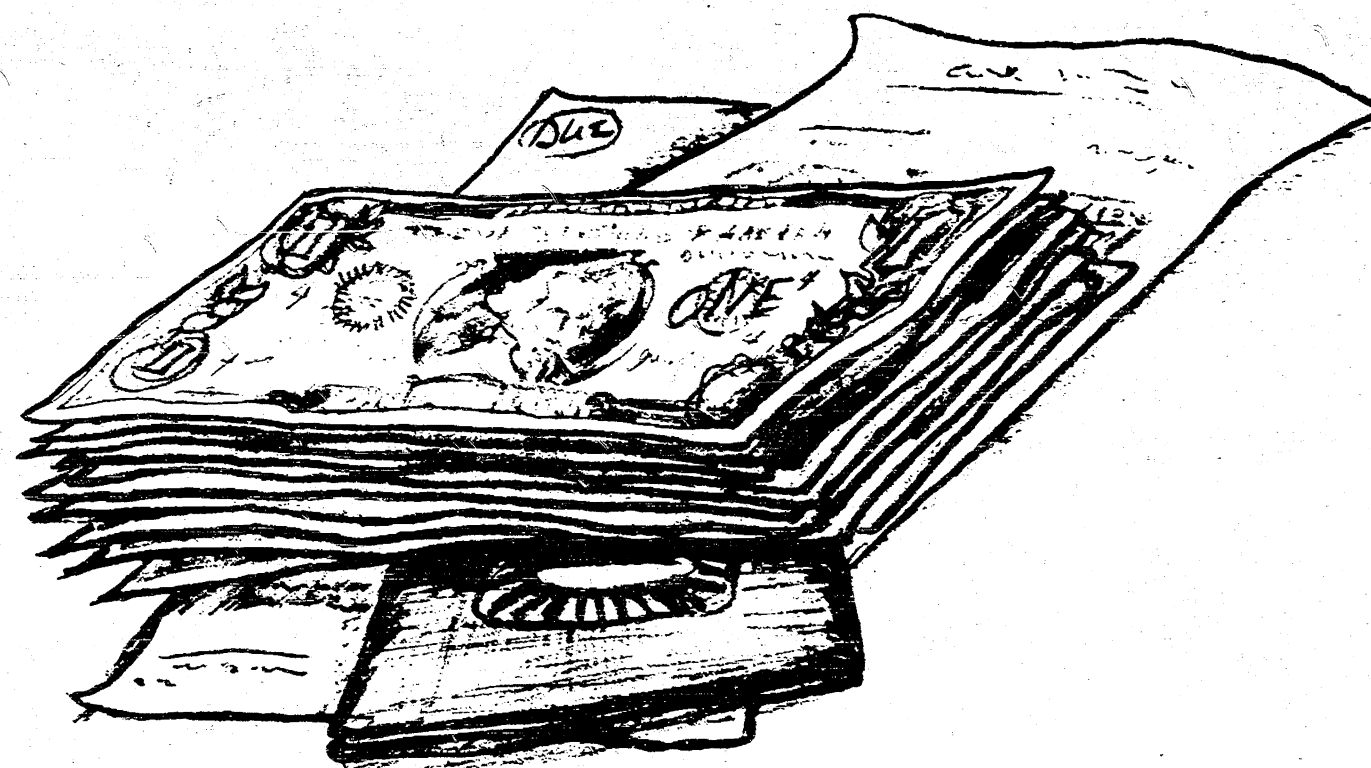

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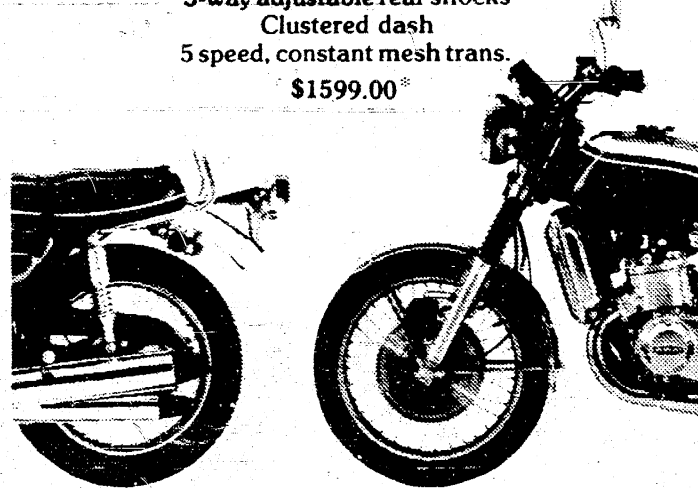

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THE ATHLETIC TRAINER

The ideal athletic trainer is a "trouble shooter" for the squad. He is an efficiency expert in mental and physical condition. Taking trouble as a matter of course, he strives continually to keep the entire squad fit to win.

The trainer's problems may include sickness, ineligibility, injuries and mental states; in short, anything that interferes with the functional efficiency of the squad. He cannot predict beforehand what particular types of handicaps he will be called on to remove.

He can have no set procedure. He may need to treat blisters, or homesickness, sprains or fatigue, Charley horses or "blues." Injuries vary with the season and with the sport; for example, the cartilage injury in the knee is common to football but extremely rare in track.

Of course, the most intelligent approach is prevention. The trainer's best work - prevention - is never known, because no trouble

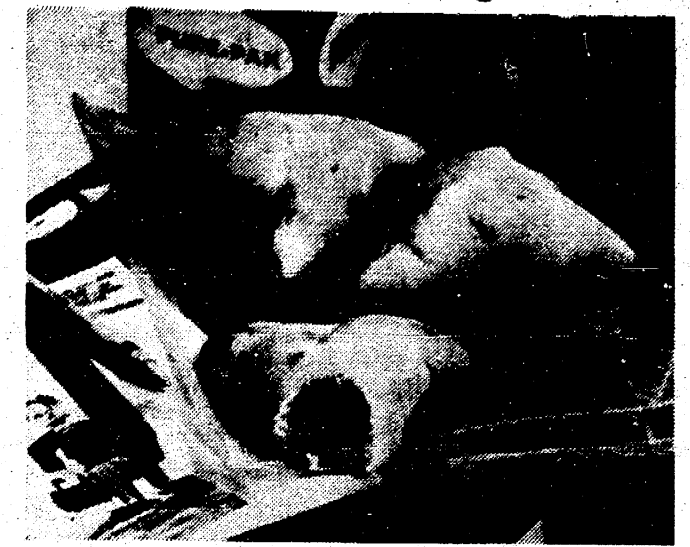
develops. A conscientious trainer can do much by equipment suggestions, by detecting the mild beginnings of injury, by noting signs of overfatigue, and by knowing the idiosyncrasies and needs of each player.



In certain circumstances, he can advise players to use non-prescription medicines. If someone asks him which he should use-a powder or a cream-to treat athlete's foot, for example, he must know the advantages of each. What were once prescription drugs are now sold over-the-counter at drugstore everywhere.

Whether he's working with a professional, college or high school team, the athletic trainer must really know the score.

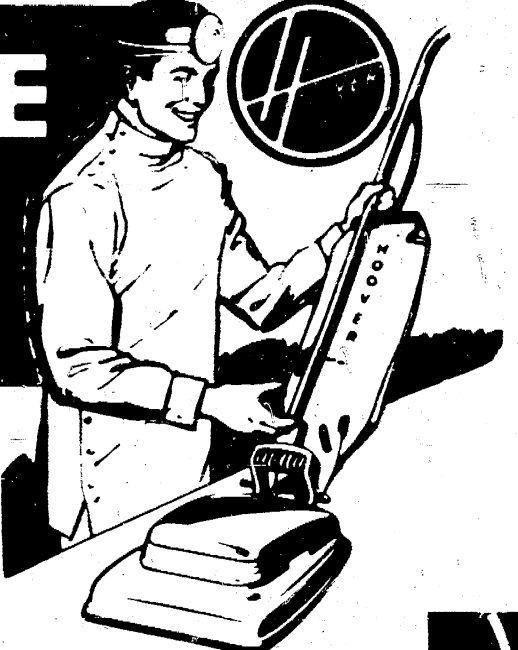

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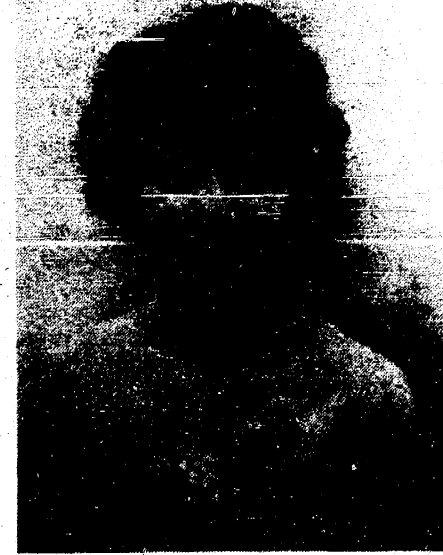

County, State and National agencies receiving money from the Manchester Community Chest & Red Cross Drive follow.

Catholic Social Services: Budget \$700. Miss Carol Dick comes into Manchester on Tuesday mornings to work with children along with family and marriage counseling. For an appointment, call the Ann Arbor office, NO2-4534. Manchester office hours, held at St. Mary's Church, are between 8:30 AM and noon Tuesdays. Other programs of this agency include emergency foster care, adoption, unmarried mother and drugs. Catholic Social Services serve people of any religious background.

Child & Family Service of Washtenaw County: Budget \$400. 32 people in our area were served. These included family and individual counseling, broad home studies, adoption screening and beginning adoption study. Total hours spent in services to these individuals for 1972 totaled 1,359 3/4 hours. This agency is a branch of the Michigan Children's Aid.

Cystic Fibrosis: Budget \$200. An educational agency which trains families to care for their afflicted children. One in 1000 babies are apt to be victims of this disease. Funds go for assistance to families, medical student research grants, equipment for CF patients and to National for CF research, care and training.

Huron Valley Child Guidance Clinic: Budget \$100. This is the child-adolescent service division of the Wash. Co. Mental Health Center. The Clinic has been in the county since 1944. The services are child-centered diagnostic, therapeutic, preventative, educational, training, evaluative, planning and rehabilitating. Diagnostic and treatment interviews for our area totaled 181 through schools, physicians, Dept. of Social Services and York Woods Center and Nursery.

Huron Valley Girl Scout Council: Budget \$1,500. In 1972 there were 6 troops with 147 girls involved. The girls worked closely with Jaycees on community projects. Brownies painted Christmas card decoration. Girls helped on river clean-up serving coffee and
