Need House For Burned-Out Victims



Mr. and Mrs. Harry Ion and their five children, a 12 year old girl and four boys ages 11, 7, 5 and 4 were left homeless, Saturday, when fire destroyed their 9880 Crossman Road residence.

The self constructed home which was still being built and all of its contents were lost in the disaster. The family car was also destroyed by the blaze which was reportedly caused by one of the children who was playing with matches back of the house.

Thirteen firemen and three trucks responded to the call which required attention for three hours. There were no injuries to Mrs. Ion or the two younger children who were home at the time due to the quick action of Mr. and Mrs. James Drake, next door neighbors, who reported the fire and rushed to the aid of the victims.

The Washtenaw County Chapter of the American Red Cross is providing temporary lodging for the family at the Mayflower Motel on US 12 at Carpenter Road. A house in Manchester School District is the prime interest of the family now. Your United Fund Dollar At Work

County, State and National agencies receiving money from the Manchester Community Chest & Red Cross Drive follow.

Catholic Social Services: Budget \$700. Miss Carol Dick comes into Manchester on Tuesday mornings to work with children along with family and marriage counseling. For an appointment, call the Ann Arbor office, NO2-4534. Manchester office hours, held at St. Mary's Church, are between 8:30 AM and noon Tuesdays. Other programs of this agency include emergency foster care, adoption, unmarried mother and drugs. Catholic Social Services serve people of any religious background.

Child & Family Service of Washtenaw County: Budget \$400. 32 people in our area were served. These included family and individual counseling, broad home studies, adoption screening and beginning adoption study. Total hours spent in services to these individuals for 1972 totaled 1,359 3/4 hours. This agency is a branch of the Michigan Children's Aid.

Cystic Fibrosis: Budget \$200. An educational agency which trains families to care for their afflicted children. One in 1000 babies are apt to be victims of this disease. Funds go for assistance to families, medical student research grants, equipment for CF patients and to National for CF research, care and training.

Huron Valley Child Guidance Clinic: Budget \$100. This is the child-adolescent service division of the Wash. Co. Mental Health Center. The Clinic has been in the county since 1944. The services are child-centered diagnostic, therapeutic, preventative, educational, training, evaluative, planning and rehabilitating. Diagnostic and treatment interviews for our area totaled 181 through schools, physicians, Dept. of Social Services and York Woods Center and Nursery.

Huron Valley Girl Scout Council: Budget \$1,500. In 1972 there were 6 troops with 147 girls involved. The girls worked closely with Jaycees on community projects. Brownies painted Christmas card decoration. Girls helped on river clean-up serving coffee and

Agriculture in Action

Michigan Farm Bureau

The words "growth" and "progress" are considered positive words in our vocabulary; who can be against them? They denote what has brought our nation from Plymouth Rock to a world power, from the Wright brothers to astronauts in space. To farmers, growth and progress have meant graduation from back-breaking labor behind a horse and plow to modern, efficient farm machinery.

Farmers, and other concerned citizens, are not ready to call a halt to progress, but they do believe the time has come to give it some wise and strong guidance in the area of land use planning. They don't want the "green, green grass of home" to become only a fairy tale to their great-grandchildren, or their nutrition to be in

the form of tiny, tasteless pills, or have their crayon boxes minus the green because there are no trees or fields in their coloring books.

As urban sprawl inches its ugly path across our land, replacing the green and golden landscape with shopping centers and subdivisions, environmentalists call it an "outrage" against nature. Farmers agree, but they have another vitally important concern—the very real threat of continued loss of productive farm land. According to the Department of Agriculture, Michigan will need eight million acres of agricultural land for food production in the year 2,000. Yet, with 50,000 acres of Michigan farmland converted to urban use every year, a great amount of good farmland in the state will have been lost by the end of the century.

What is the answer to this complex and pressing problem? What areas should have top priority in land use planning—agricultural lands? Wildlife habitats? Recreation areas? It's going to take a dedicated, cooperative effort of national, state and local leaders to come up with the answers and farmers are actively involved in the search for a solution. They take their responsibility to feed the nation seriously and in order to fulfill that obligation, it's imperative to keep agricultural land in production. It's a certainty they'll make a concerted effort to do just that—and also to fight

for the survival of traditional private property rights.

Farmers admit their thinking is colored by their heritage and responsibility—but the color is a glorious green and every citizen will benefit from its salvation.

Here it is football season again, and the politicians are making noises about televising home professional football games when they are sold out. What are the chances that anything will actually happen?

—D. D., Detroit

Very good. As you probably know, the Senate already has passed a bill to allow home games to be televised when sold out 72 hours before kick-off time. The House appears to be moving rapidly and I confidently expect that you will be viewing some home games before this season is over. You know, the President is an avid football fan who has urged Congress to pass such legislation, so I don't think we have to worry about a veto on this one.

TO THE GAS CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY
NOTICE OF HEARING ON A CONSERVATION PROGRAM INVOLVING NATURAL GAS RATES

On September 7, 1973, Consumers Power Company applied to the Michigan Public Service Commission for approval of a program for the conservation of natural gas by encouraging and assisting residential customers in the insulation of their homes heated by natural gas. (Case No. U-4416.)

The Company's application states that large numbers of the Company's residential space heating customers reside in older houses which do not have insulation meeting current standards established by the Federal Housing Administration. Studies by the Company indicate that installation of ceiling insulation meeting current FHA standards in a typical house built in the Company's service area prior to 1942 would reduce the quantity of gas used for heating by about 21 percent; and that installing sufficient ceiling insulation to meet current FHA standards in a typical house built in the Company's service area after 1942 would reduce the quantity of gas used for heating by about 10 percent.

The application states that, despite extraordinary efforts, the Company has been forced by the current national shortage of natural gas and resultant curtailments in deliveries from the Company's interstate gas suppliers, to institute restrictions upon gas sales in the Company's service area which currently affect all but residential customers. The application states that the proposed home insulation service program is in the public interest because it seeks to partially relieve the shortage in natural gas supply.

The program which the Company proposes would include the use of mass media and other means to communicate to the public the need for conservation of natural gas and the contribution which home insulation can make to that goal.

The Company would urge homeowners to install insulation themselves or to hire a contractor to do so. The Company would also offer, on a non-profit basis to the Company, to arrange for the installation, in residential premises owned by any qualified residential space heating customer, of ceiling insulation meeting the most recent FHA standard. A residential space heating customer would qualify for the program if he has a satisfactory utility bill payment history. Where the Company thus arranged for installation, it would finance up to the smaller of 80 percent or \$300 of the cost, over a period of up to 36 months, at an interest rate of 1 percent per month on unpaid balance. The Company would not itself sell insulation or install insulation, but would subcontract the work

to dealers and contractors. Under the proposed amendments, any sums owed the Company for installation or insulation would be a part of the charge for residential space heating gas service rendered to the insulated premises; and the cost of such installation, if not paid for by the residential space heating customer who contracted for the work, would be charged to successor customers at the insulated premises at the rate of \$5 per month.

The application asks the Michigan Public Service Commission to authorize the Company's participation in the home insulation service program; and to authorize the Company to include all costs associated with the program as a part of utility cost of service, to be reflected in rates hereafter prescribed by the Commission for the Company.

A public hearing will be held at 9:30 AM, on October 5, 1973 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for the purpose of determining whether the approvals sought should be granted. Any interested parties may attend the hearing and participate subject to the provisions of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure. Copies of the application may be obtained from the Secretary of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, or from the Secretary of Consumers Power Company, 212 W. Michigan Avenue, Jackson, Michigan 49201.

The Commission's jurisdiction of this matter is pursuant to Section 4 of 1919 P. A. 419, as amended, M.C.L.A. 460.54; Sections 4, 6 and 6a of 1939 P. A. 3, as amended, M.C.L.A. 460.4, 460.6, 460.6a; Section 63 of 1969 P. A. 306, M.C.L.A. 24.263, and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1954 Administrative Code, as amended, No. 54, R 460.11, et seq.

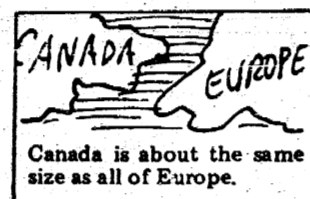

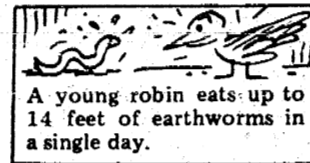

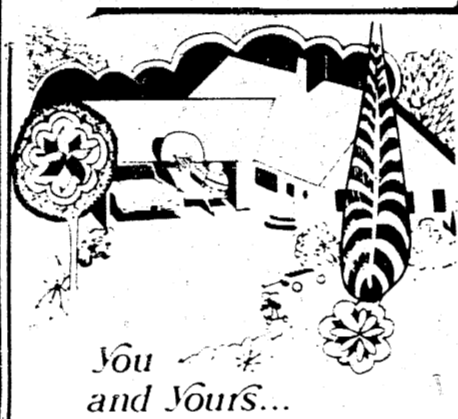
Well, I suggest you first go to the recruiting officer of the branch of service of your choice. If it is of any help, the starting pay for Privates is \$307 a month and \$355 a month if you've got an associate degree from your junior college. In addition, a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision held that women members of the Armed Forces are entitled to dependents' benefits on the same basis as men. For many years, men in the Armed Forces received automatic medical allowances for their wives, whether they actually supported them or not. Not so for the women; the nearly 9,000 married women in the Armed Services had to prove that they contributed more than half of their husbands' support. That's all been changed now, and for thousands of women the Armed Services are offering even more rewarding and challenging careers. Good luck!

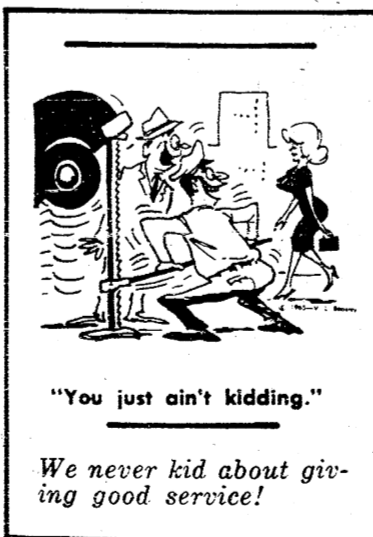
