

### Building Trades Class



This past fall the Manchester Public Schools initiated a Building Trades Class for area High School Students. The program provides stuas related classroom instruction in all phases of home constriction.

Thirty - seven (37) students were enrolled from 4 school districts. Thirteen (13) students from Manchester are participating along with three (3) from Dexter, ten (10) from Chelsea and eleven (11) from Saline. Mr. Tom Armstrong, a Manchester building contractor, is the Instructor for the program.

These students will construct a 1 1/2 story, 3 BR Colonial home and will gain practical experience in; excavation, masonry, carpentry, electrical, plumbing and heating trades. Local tradesman will serve as resource people in working with the students on the job.

The students spend 2 1/2 hours per day, 5 days per week, in this program. The remaining portion of the school day the students attend their home high school for course work required for graduation.

An advisory committee, comprised of individuals from 5 communities representing business, the construction industry and education assisted in designing the program.

Students who desire to enter the construction industry upon completion of the program will have entry level skills. This could pave the way for an apprenticeship, enployment in the construction industry or in some related

While waiting for the land acquisition to be settled, the students have been getting classroom instruction in the basics of building, along with con structing a 12 X 16 storage building for the job site.

Manchester Family Service, a local volunteer agency, will hold its annual meeting Tuesday, January 30 at the Manchester Township Library at 8:00.



been compiled on compactors and was presented to the local government officials. A feasible solution to the existing situation would entail installing a compactor on a nearby site. A 40 cubic yard container, attached to the compactor, would receive compacted rubbish. Arrangements would be made on a contract basis to have the filled container hauled away and emptied. A second container would be attached at the time of removal of the first one. The degree of compaction of the refuse would probably necessitate this service

once a week at most. Should a compactor be purchased the solution to the refuse problem, t would be operated on approximately the same schedule as the present transfer station. All controls would be handled by a qualified operator to eliminate danger to the users of the station. The size of the compactor would allow a truck to dump directly into it. Two vehicles might possibly be accommodated at one time. Once refuse is dumped into the loading hopper, the operator would set the compactor in motion. The cycle time on the machine is 40 seconds. Refrigerators and other large tems, as well as normal household trash, can be-crushed by the compactors.

The local governmental representatives intend to discuss the proposal with their respective units and report further findings on land site, installation costs, etc., at the next joint meeting scheduled for 8:00 pm, February 7.
