Mark Sitarz was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital in Ann Arbor where he passed away at about 8:30 a.m. January 23rd. 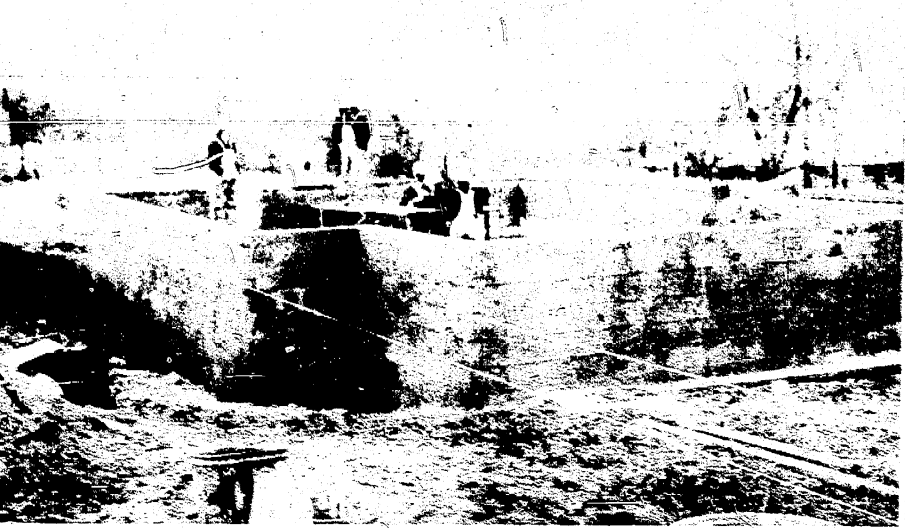

**HOMESTEAD TAX EXEMPTION**

The Michigan Commission on Aging reminds all people 65 and older that they might now qualify for Michigan's Homestead Tax Exemption.

Applicants, who must file for this exemption each year at their local assessor's office, may apply from now until sometime about the middle of March -- a date set by each local assessor.

Persons who qualify are exempt from the taxes on the first \$2,500 of the valuation of their home.

To qualify under the revised Homestead Tax Exemption law persons must have lived in Michigan for five of the past ten years, and in their home for at least six of the preceding 12 months.

Assessors will require legal proof of age, (a driver's license cannot be used), proof of home ownership such as a deed, land contract, or mortgage, the applicant's social security number, and the contract that was signed.

Under the revised law, there are no restrictions placed on the value of the property. That is, no matter how much the applicant's homestead is worth, if he meets the other requirements he should be able to obtain this exemption.

This exemption is an outright grant from the State of Michigan to the local community. There are no lien provisions so no attempt will be made by the State or local government to collect from the heirs or otherwise attach the property.

Senior Citizen, Veteran and Blind Exemptions may be obtained by calling Clarence Fielder, Russell Widmayer or Clayton Parr.

**ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE**  
 SEC. 504. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by recording from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and attaching in duplicate the registration affidavits before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

**UNREGISTERED PERSONS NOT ENTITLED TO VOTE**  
 SEC. 491. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the Township, Ward or Precinct in which he is to vote. (As provided under Act 116, P. A. 1954.)

**TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME**  
 SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by recording to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date such address was last registered, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall issue through the local assessor, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfer shall not be made after the Fifth Friday next preceding any regular or special election or primary election, (unless such Fifth Friday shall fall on a legal holiday in which event registration transfers shall be accepted during the following day).

**TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY**  
 SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and has not recorded such removal with the local Clerk shall execute a transfer of registration request, stating the new residence address, thereon, over his signature, with the date of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration request. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 503 of this act, shall also be permitted to vote in such precinct for the primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who will transfer the voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any voter in a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of voter in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration and reappear thereat in order to be eligible to vote.

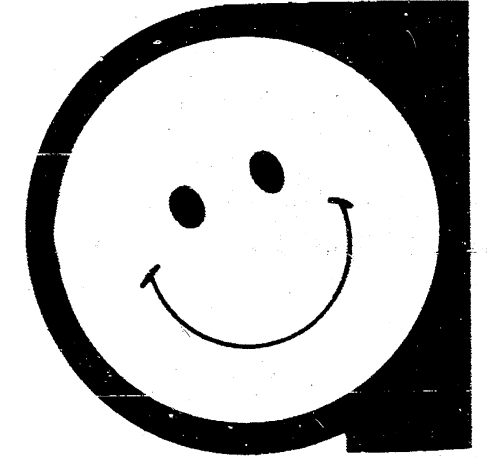

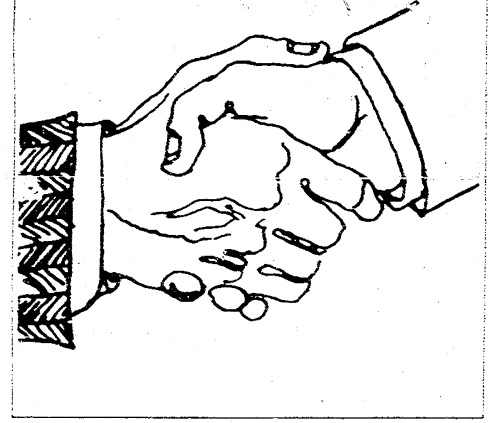

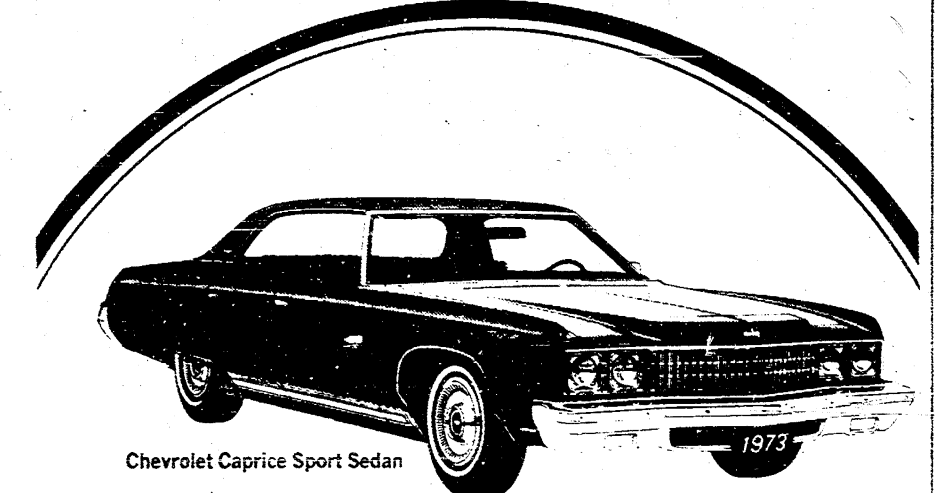

## AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU

It is almost traditional to complain about the price of food. Since the day of the corner grocery, consumers have said that food was too expensive. Why? One reason is that food is not a durable item. We eat it and then have to go buy more.

There are other reasons, too. We commit so much of our disposable income to fixed payments for a home, a car, appliance and other items that we often have little flexibility in our budget to cope with variable food prices. It is a lot easier to notice a change in food prices. We go to the supermarket one, two or three times a week. We know when food prices change. We don't buy anything else quite as often, so we're less likely to notice other price changes.

According to Secretary of Agriculture Butz, "Farmers are receiving about 40 cents of each dollar spent for food. That figure has gone up modestly, a round a penny from last year, but it is well in line with the average over a long period of time, and much less than the 50 cent share of the consumer food dollar farmers received 20 years ago."

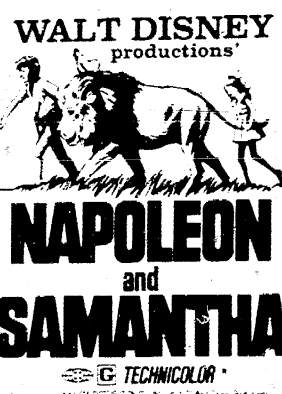

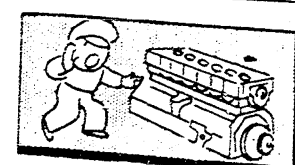

## Vaccination Clinic

January is the time to make sure your dog's Rabies Vaccination (licensing is up to date!) Dr. George J. Veterinarian with the Health Department, released the schedule for January biennial clinics today. Washenaw County Health Department and the Veterinary Association are coordinating this program. "Washtenaw County has been able to keep rabies from infecting dogs for many years even though wild animals can infect dogs, sporadically in this dread disease," said Dr. Veterinarian.

The fee for rabies vaccination at clinics will remain at \$3.00 per animal as has been charged in the past. The certificate the owner will receive will be good for 2 years from the date of vaccination and will entitle the owner to get his dog's license upon presentation to the township or County Treasurer. been compiled on compactors and was presented to the local government officials. A feasible solution to the existing situation would entail installing a compactor on a nearby site. A 40 cubic yard container, attached to the compactor, would receive compacted rubbish. Arrangements would be made on a contract basis to have the filled container hauled away and emptied. A second container would be attached at the time of removal of the first one. The degree of compaction of the refuse would probably necessitate this service once a week at most.

Should a compactor be purchased as the solution to the refuse problem, it would be operated on approximately the same schedule as the present transfer station. All controls would be handled by a qualified operator to eliminate danger to the users of the station. The size of the compactor would allow a truck to dump directly into it. Two vehicles might possibly be accommodated at one time. Once refuse is dumped into the loading hopper, the operator would set the compactor in motion. The cycle time on the machine is 40 seconds. Refrigerators and other large items, as well as normal household trash, can be crushed by the compactors.

The local governmental representatives intend to discuss the proposal with their respective units and report further findings on land site, installation costs, etc., at the next joint meeting scheduled for 8:00 pm, February 7.
