## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Last October when we were forced to move from 109 Clinton St., we were confident that we would soon find another location, and with some of my machinery, tools and merchandise at our home, we have strived to be very considerate of our neighbors and thank them for bearing with us.

With no intentions of making this permanent or asking for a permit to operate here forever, only to help farmers and customers until we could make a favorable move.

In December, 1972, we approached the Manchester Township Planning Commission with a request for a use permit for a parcel of land on Logan Road. The reply "we do not issue any more use permits, it must be rezoned".

Asking their approval, before going the legal way etc, the township board and planning commission acted like they might be in favor.

Now after nine months of a denial by the planning commission, tabled till the next meetings, and the next meeting set for October 9, 1973, I have been served a warning from the Village

Council and Chief Thomas that we must remove all junk from our property in ten days due to a complaint from Mr. J. L. Beldine on behalf of his mother-in-law who lives next door and was unwilling to file the complaint that a junk yard business adjoins her property.

We understand that the last planning commission's agenda was a use permit for the speedway. They told us they were not giving anymore!

We were not given any reason for our denial except that they would like to abide by the New Zoning Map for the future. But on the other hand they are still building without permits in the township, and I understand they approved some spot rezoning lately also. Maybe I should go ahead and build without a permit, but I can bet I'd be the first to land in jail!

In our opinion when we vote for our officials, they are to be working for the people of the township and village. Now, are these officials doing the kind of work the people voted for them to do?

We are by no means opposed to these zoning laws, but all we ask is to treat everyone alike. Remember, Manchester residents, the next meeting is October 9, 1973 at 8:00 pm. If our request is turned down which I have been told it will be, and the Village Council kicks us off our property, is this what Manchester wants? Any help or suggestions appreciated. We would like to serve the farmers and our customers as we have in the past.



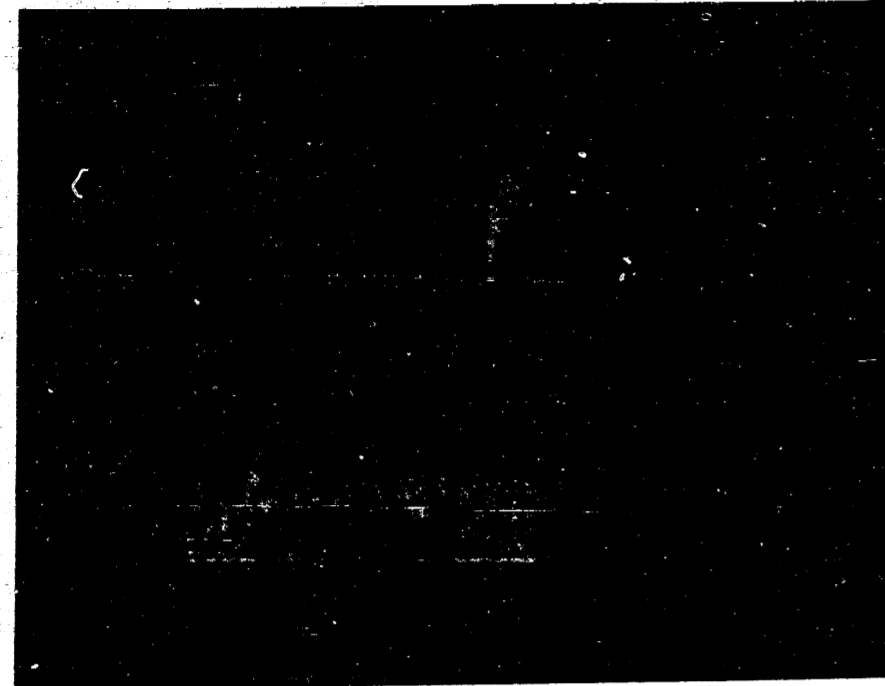

## Old Football Injury Flares Up

Q. My husband's "old football injury" keeps flaring up in his back all the time. He's forty-five years old and has had this back trouble since he played football in high school. He can go along and have no trouble for several months. Then one bright morning, he can't even reach over to tie his shoes. Once in awhile, it gets so bad he has to miss a day or two of work.

A. I suggest you leave the boy alone and let him play football if he wants to. It's bound to improve him physically as well as mentally and help him to prepare for the adult life he must face soon.

There are several ways to look at your husband's "old football injury."

(1) Your husband's problem may not have been caused by playing high school football. After this many years, he may have forgotten some other slip or fall.

## BOYSVILLE OF MICHIGAN TO OBSERVE SILVER ANNIVERSARY

Boysville of Michigan, a home for problem youths ranging in age from 13 to 18 located near the Lenawee County community of Clinton, will observe its 25th anniversary Sunday, October 7, with an open house on the school grounds.

The celebration will run from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. and will feature food, entertainment, games and tours of the facilities.

A chicken dinner will be served from noon to 5 p.m. Boys enrolled at the school will stage a rodeo in the afternoon to highlight festivities. Along with games for children, art displays, various booths and entertainment throughout the day.

Boysville of Michigan was established in 1948 by the Catholic Bishops of Michigan for boys with a problem. It is operated by the Brothers of Holy Cross of Notre Dame, Ind., under the direction of Bro. Edward Overstreet, C.S.C.

The home is situated on a 400-acre farm that once was the Henry Ford Edison Institute at Macon Village, 16 miles south of Ann Arbor. Henry Ford II gave the complex to Edward Cardinal Neoney of Detroit in 1948.

Boysville has always been the principle charity of the 60,000 Michigan Knights of Columbus who annually donate \$150,000 to the operation of the school, more than 3,000,000 since it's founding.

In recent years the Brothers of Holy Cross have begun accepting wards of the court at the school and have adopted what is known as the Positive Peer Culture program of rehabilitating the young men for a return to their home environment.

The school, which now has 132 students enrolled, still uses some of the buildings originally on the property when donated by Henry Ford II but new structures have been built and more are plan-

Although built on Catholic principles and operated by a Catholic religious order, Boysville of Michigan places no restrictions of admissions on the basis of race, religion or nationality.

It serves boys from throughout Michigan, accepting no out-of-state students.

Masses will be offered in the school chapel at noon and 4 p.m. for guests wishing to attend services.

Macon can best be reached from Saline, on US 12 (Michigan Avenue) 6 miles west of US 23 - Turn left at cemetery and follow the signs to Boysville.

Everyone is welcome.

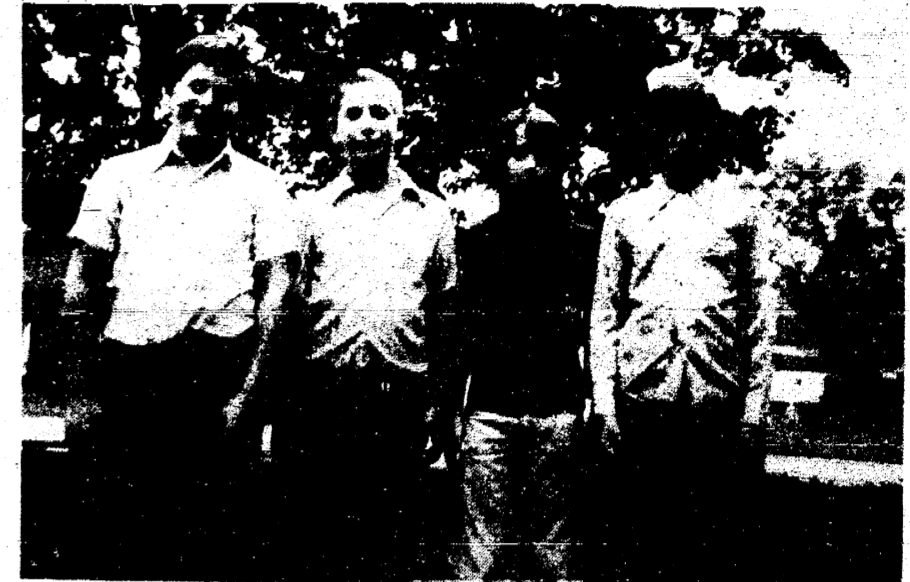
AREA MEN ATTEND U OF M

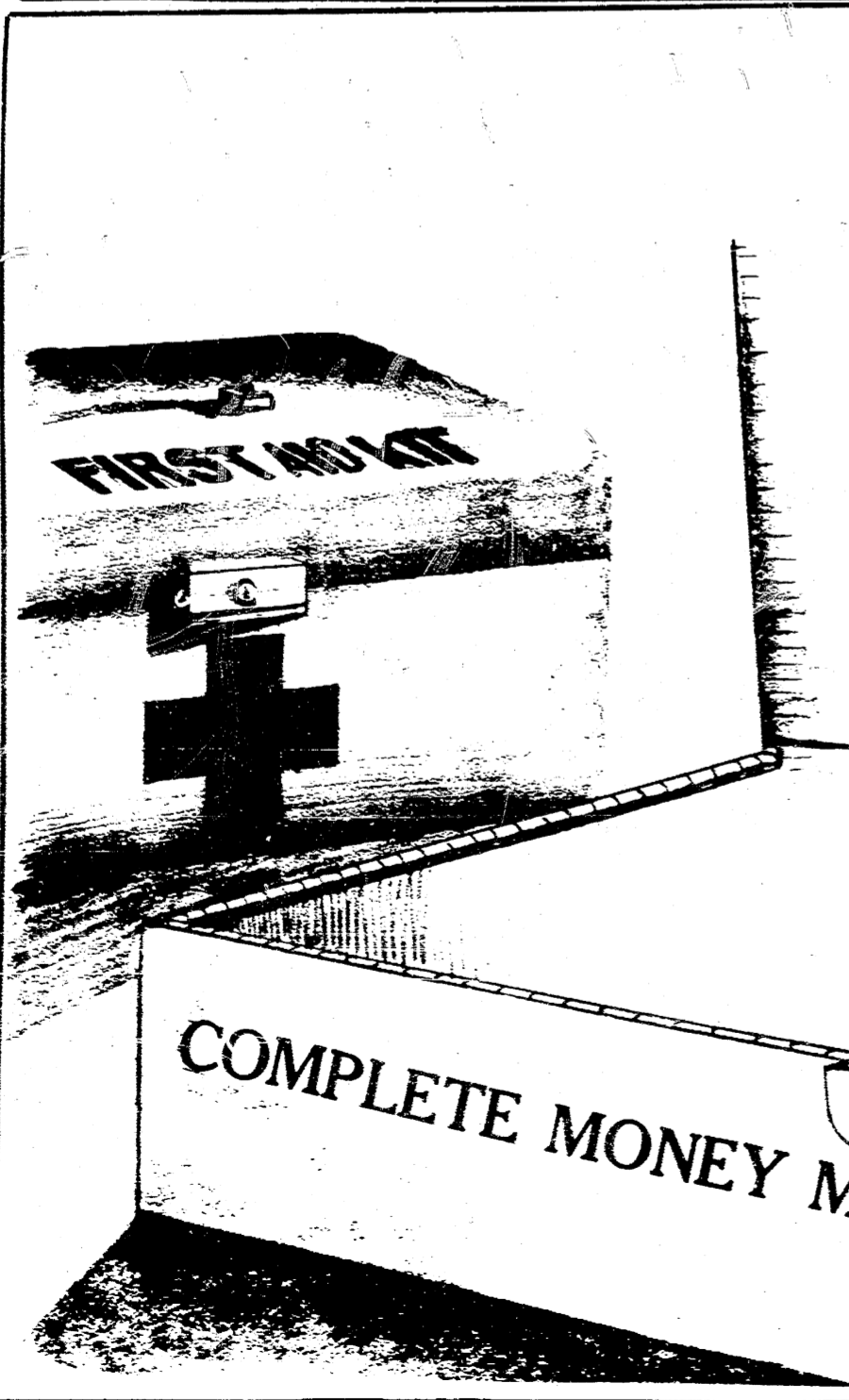

September 17, 1973

Fitzgerald reported that Adrian Street paving is now complete, further work has been done on the transfer site, and sewer problems have been taken care of. Morgan Street is scheduled to be blacktopped next. Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully that the Village Council appoint Fitzgerald as Council's representative on the Manchester Area Transfer Station Board. All yeas, carried.

Mahony discussed the Federal Revenue Sharing Report which would be published in the local newspaper.

Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald to transfer \$13,563 from the Revenue Sharing Fund with \$7,349 going to the General Fund -(\$1,929 to cover additional street lighting for public safety, \$300 to cover additional

funding for summer recreation, \$200 to cover additional funding for the library, and \$4,920 to cover site development and equipment for the Manchester Area Solid Waste Transfer Station), and with \$6,214 going to the Equipment Fund to cover costs of an asphalt roller and truck. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Benedict that Council agree with the petition to the Water Resources Commission for the formation of a Raisin River Basin watershed Council pursuant to Act 253, P.A. 1964, as amended. All yeas, carried.

Moved by Walton, supported by Mahony to adjourn at 9:57 pm. All yeas, carried.

*I've had the opportunity with my family to ride on the Delta Queen, an old-fashioned paddle boat on the Mississippi River. I understand that Congress is trying to put the Delta Queen out of business. Why would you want to take from the American landscape something of such beauty, dignity and historic value?*

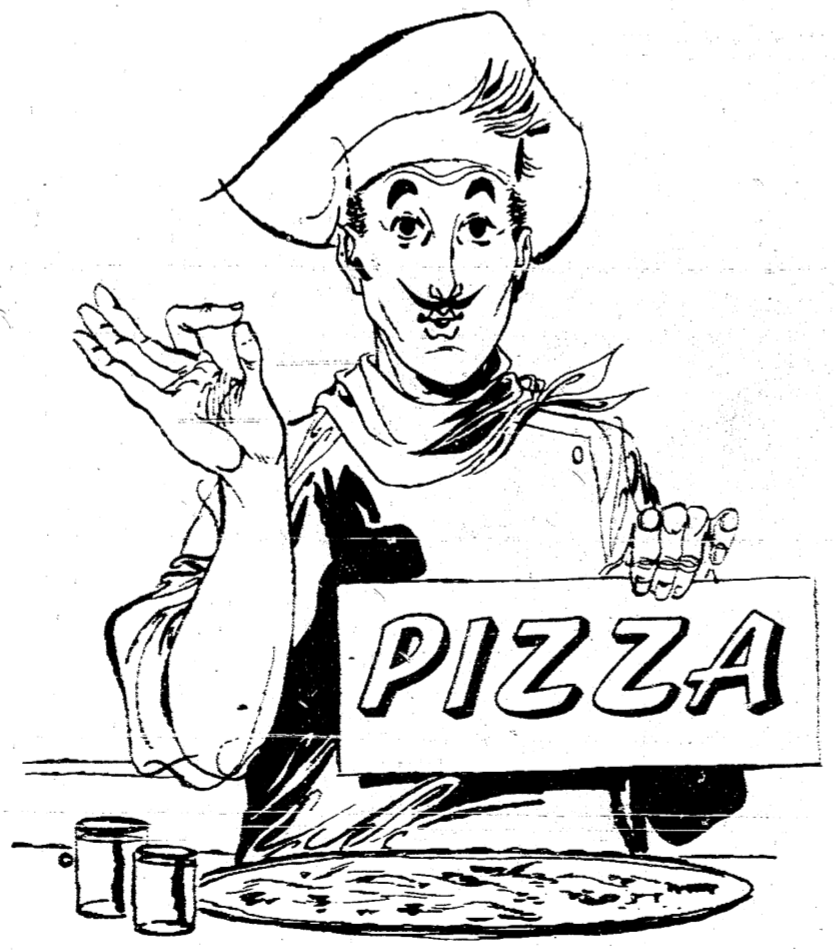

Since the ship was built in another era, it was constructed mostly of wood, and the Coast Guard says the Delta Queen does not meet standards set under the 1966 Safety at Sea Law. For example, some of the safety requirements called for in the 1966 act require the use of fireproof materials in the construction of a ship which carries human passengers. Instead of putting it in dry dock, however, Congress has actually passed special legislation on three occasions to give the Delta Queen reprieves. So far, despite the safety code which applies to other vessels, the Delta Queen hasn't missed a single day of its schedule.

*Is it true that President Nixon once worked for J. Edgar Hoover as an FBI agent?*

No, but he tried. After he graduated from law school, Mr. Nixon sought an assignment with the FBI. Dean H. Claude Morack of Duke University wrote a letter to J. Edgar Hoover recommending young Mr. Nixon, then 24 years old. Neither the future President nor his sponsor received an acknowledgement. Years later they both learned why. Apparently, just as Mr. Hoover was about to notify Nixon to make formal application, FBI budget funds were cut by Congress. Eventually, former Director Hoover made a conciliatory gesture by presenting President Nixon with an honorary FBI agent's badge.



### Fudgie Scotch Ring



**You Can Make This Chocolate-Walnut Candy Even Though You've Never Made Candy Before**

Candy making time is any time, but homemade candy is especially welcome at holiday time. Sweeten up your holidays this year by making this Fudgie Scotch Ring. Just four ingredients—semi-sweet chocolate morsels and butterscotch morsels, sweetened condensed milk (the sugar and milk are already blended for you) walnuts and vanilla do the trick.

Ring in the holiday season by making Fudgie Scotch Ring for gifts. Wrap in gay wrapping and place the recipe atop the package. Here's the recipe:

- (Makes about 36 slices)
- 1 cup (one 6-oz pkg.) semi-sweet chocolate morsels
  - 1 cup (one 6-oz pkg.) butterscotch morsels
  - 1 can sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated)
  - 1 cup coarsely chopped walnuts
  - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
  - 1 cup walnut halves

Melt chocolate and butterscotch morsels with sweetened condensed milk in top of double boiler over hot (not boiling) water. Stir till morsels melt and mixture begins to thicken. Remove from heat. Add chopped walnuts and vanilla. Blend well. Chill for 1 hour until mixture thickens. Line bottom of 9" pie pan with a 12" square of foil. Place 1/4 cup walnut halves in pan bottom to form a 2" wide flat ring. Spoon chocolate mixture in small mounds atop walnuts to form ring. Decorate with remaining walnut halves. Chill in refrigerator until firm enough to slice into 1/2 inch slices.

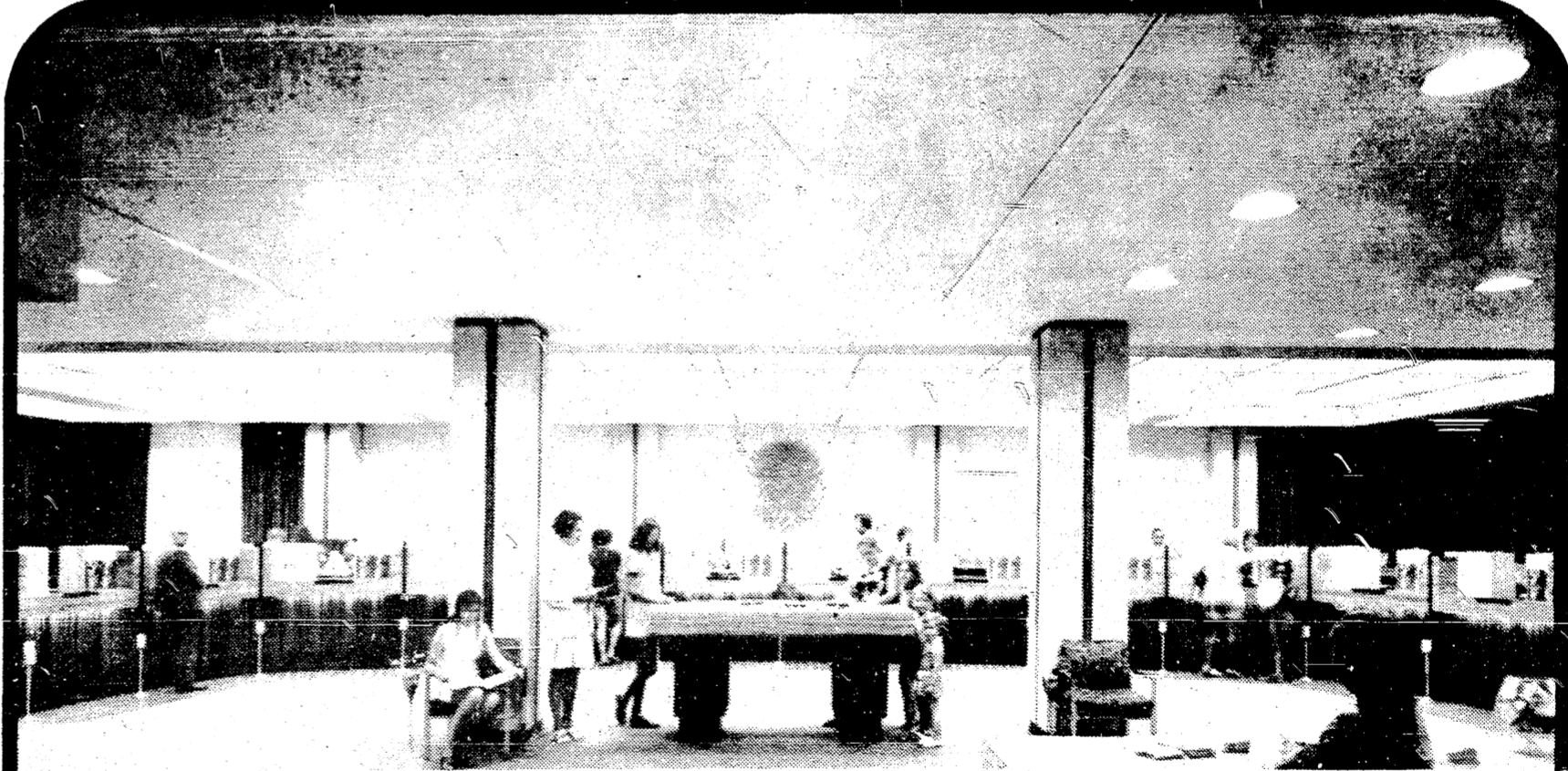

## Dutch Travel To Morenci

The Flying Dutchmen will travel to Morenci this Friday night to tangle with the Bulldogs whom they defeated handily a year ago. Coach Korican will certainly not overlook the Bulldogs, though, as the Morenci team is one of the few LCAA schools to hold a winning edge over Manchester.

The two teams have met nineteen times previously and the Dutchmen have won 8 while losing 11, including 4 of the last 5 games.

The first time the two met on the gridiron was back in 1936 in a non-league affair which the then LCAA champions, Morenci, won 25-6.

The two next met in 1940 when Manchester entered the LCAA the first time and what a game that one was. The Dutchmen had dropped their reason opener to Vandercook Lake 13-7 and the Bulldogs had been edged out 7-0 by Hillsdale in their opener. Both teams figured as contenders for the LCAA title as coach Rom Momani was at the helm for Manchester. The Bulldogs took a 7-0 win to hand Manchester their only LCAA loss of the season before they went on to win their last six games in a row and ended up sharing the LCAA title with Blissfield.

Manchester had won a thriller in 1956 and didn't win again until 1943 in another tight one, 14-6. In fact, during the ten year span (1936-45), the two teams played several close games as seven of the ten were decided by one TD or less with Morenci winning 8 of the 10 games.

Manchester has held the upper hand during the last nine years since the series resumed in 1964, winning 6 while losing 3, including 4 in a row (1967-70). Included in this was a 41-6 walloping of the Bulldogs in 1964 which is the highest single game point output by either team in this series. The 1968 contest was one of the wildest games played in more recent years in the LCAA as the Dutchmen took a 32-31 win.
