







Recently the youth group of Emanuel United Church took a week-end trip to see the former parish of their pastor which is located in Hanover, Pennsylvania. There were thirteen youth and four adults in the group.

Leaving Manchester at 6:30 a.m. on a Saturday morning, the group traveled in three cars and arrived at New Windsor, Maryland about 3:00 in the afternoon. On Sunday morning the youth group left New Windsor for a surprise trip to Washington, D.C. The climax of the visit was a ride to the top of the Washington Monument which overlooks the nation's capital. The youth of Emanuel left Washington at 4:00 in the afternoon and drove to Gettysburg, Pennsylvania for a brief tour of the Gettysburg battlefields. Rev. Theophil W. Menzel

Age 71, passed away suddenly Sunday morning. Born September 28, 1902 in Washington, D.C., he was the son of the Rev. Paul A. Menzel and Emma nee Efinger.

He attended Elmhurst College, George Washington University (AB 1922), Washington University (MA, 1924) Eden Seminary and Yale Divinity School (BD, 1925). Ordained by his father in 1925, he served a pastorate in N. Tonawanda, N.Y., taught at Eden Seminary and then at Elmhurst College which awarded him a Doctorate of Divinity in 1955.

Coming to Michigan with his family in 1948, he served as pastor at Bethel United Church of Christ in Freedom Township until his retirement in 1969. Since then he had been interim or associate minister at the Church of the Good Shepherd, Bethlehem Church, and at Emanuel Church in Manchester and St. Andrews in Dexter. Throughout his life he wrote Sunday School and devotional literature, as well as articles on church history, recently completing a History of Bethlehem Church (Ann Arbor).

He married Anemarie Mueller in 1932. He is survived by his wife, two daughters, Rhea (Mrs. Ray Whitehead of Hong Kong) and Anne (Mrs. James Helm of Oberlin, Ohio), one son, Paul (of Tacoma, Washington), three brothers, Emil, Kurt and Robert, three sisters, Margaret, Olga (Burning) and Rhea (Hale), and five grandchildren.

The body has been willed to the University Medical Center and a Memorial Service was held Tuesday at 3 p.m. at Bethel Church, with the Rev. Herbert Lowe officiating.

# Agriculture in Action

Michigan Farm Bureau

A milking machine which automatically disconnects itself when the job is done will be a great labor and time saving device for dairy farmers. One which automatically connects itself would be an even greater boon and such modern equipment is currently being perfected at Michigan State University. But farmers are now wondering—would they be better off if researchers had concentrated their efforts toward developing a method of toilet-training livestock? The mental picture of diapered

cows, horses, pigs and poultry might bring giggles to some, but farmers aren't laughing. The Federal Water Pollution Act, enacted by Congress in October, 1972, aims toward a goal of zero discharge of wastes into the waters of this nation by 1985. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is responsible for implementing the Act and, according to officials, they mean to enforce the law.

The EPA recently published the proposed standards of performance which apply to all dairy, beef, swine, sheep and poultry feedlots that have discharges of pollutants into navigable waters. In Michigan, with its many lakes, streams, ditches and other surface waters, farmers are especially concerned. Under the proposal, these feedlots have until July 1, 1977 to meet the no discharge standard. Farmers think it's rather ironic that the EPA standards are based largely upon recommendations of the Hamilton Standard Division of United Albers Corporation. They weren't aware that the livestock industry had the knowledge or experience

in the field of agriculture to come up with realistic recommendations; they could hardly see themselves in the role of advisors for designing space vehicles.

What concerns farmers most is the economic and production impact the proposed standards will have on the agricultural industry, especially the average-size family enterprise which has long been the backbone of our economic system. EPA estimates costs of providing adequate water run-off protection will be between \$2 and \$12 per head of beef cattle, while other researchers say it will be closer to \$23 per head. Whatever the cost, farmers and consumers (who already think their steak is high enough) will pay dearly for the idealistic zero discharge goal.

Farmers are not against protecting the environment—but they are for producing food. They believe, given time, these two goals can be compatible without such unnecessary standards.

When I started high school this year, I made friends with some new kids, who get "high on quaaludes." I can't ask my parents about methaqualone, so I wonder if you can provide any facts. My friends don't think they are doing anything illegal, but isn't it against the law to use methaqualone?

—R. R., Detroit

Your letter is a timely and important one, and I hope the information I have will help you and your friends.

The use of methaqualone without a doctor's prescription is indeed illegal. Methaqualone is an addictive and dangerous drug which has ruined the future of too many young users. Because of its harmful effects, the drug has been placed under strict control by the Drug Enforcement Administration.

For additional information concerning dangerous drugs and what can happen to those who use them, write to the Drug Enforcement Administration, 1405 I Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20537. Incidentally, I hope you will decide to discuss this subject with your folks, even if it means that you may have to choose some different friends.

I am a Vietnam War veteran eager to get started in my own business. I would like to know if there is any help for Vietnam vets like me?

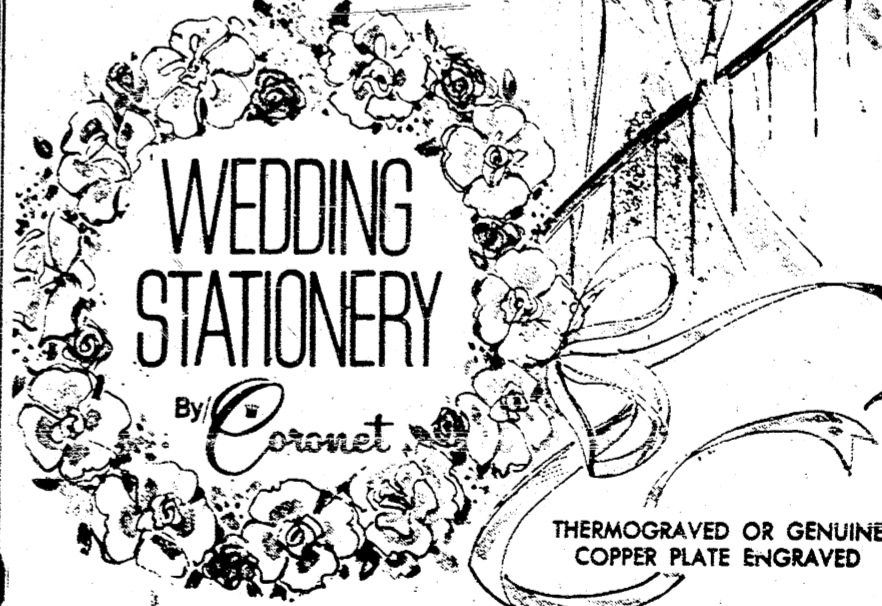

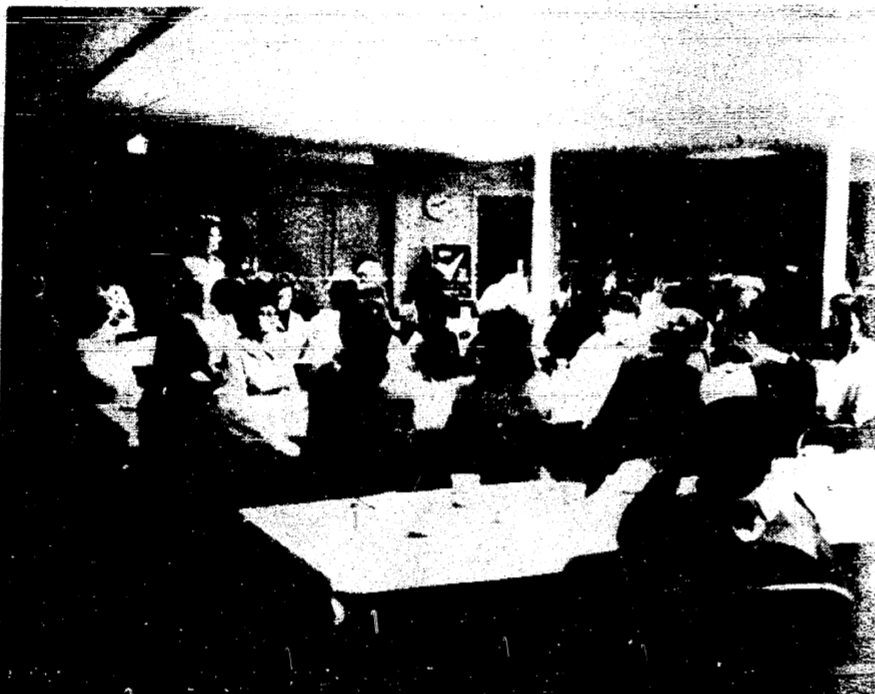

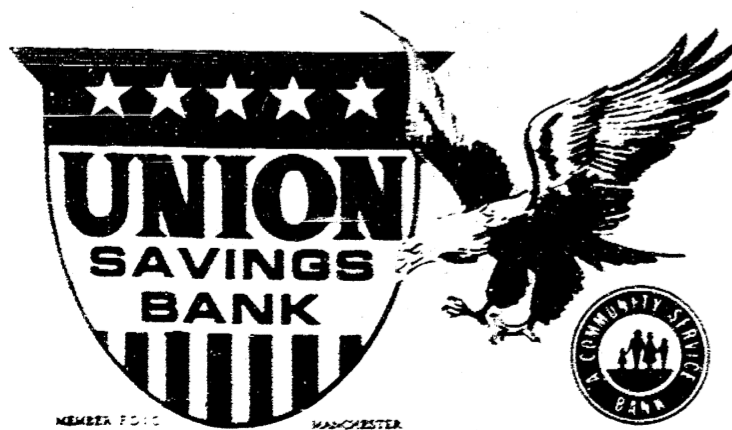

Dutchmen To Host Hudson Friday

The Dutchmen of coach John Korcan will play host to the Tigers of Hudson this week in the sixteenth encounter between the two on the gridiron. Hudson has won eleven to four for Manchester.

The two first met back in 1938 and Manchester took a 13-6 win. The Dutchmen went on to win the next three also to account for their four wins in the series.

Hudson's first win against the Dutchmen came in 1942 by a 28-12 score and they have gone on to dominate the series since that time. The rivalry was halted in 1946, a year after Manchester had left the LCAA, and was resumed in 1968 when they re-entered the league.

Among the more outstanding games in this rivalry are the 1940 game which Manchester won 19-13 to keep alive their hopes of a share of the LCAA crown; the 1968 game in which Manchester gave the Tigers one of their stiffest tests of the season before bowing 20-12; and the 1971 contest which saw the Tigers pushed virtually to the limit for a 12-6 win to keep their long victory string going.

In that 1968 contest both teams entered the game unbeaten and for three quarters it appeared that things were mighty even as Hudson led 7-6. The Tigers scored early in the final period, however, and then added another midway through to make it 20-6. Manchester was not through, however, as they came back to score with time running out in the game on a pass from Lowrey to Pratt, but they were unable to convert on the point after and their attempt at an onside kick failed on the ensuing kickoff.

The 1971 game was perhaps the single outstanding game of this rivalry as the Tigers boasted a 31 game win streak coming to town. They played in the mud and fog with the Dutchmen providing no better hospitality than the weatherman.

After Hudson scored early in the game to take a 6-0 lead, the Manchester defense rose to the occasion led by big Hugh Haussler, to hold the Tigers at bay for the next two and a half quarters of play.

Behind the hard running of half-back Don Tapping, the Dutchmen threatened to score on three occasions in the first half, but couldn't get that

The United Nations Children's Fund's "Trick or Treat for UNICEF" program offers the youth of one of the world's most developed countries a chance to help less fortunate children around the world by substituting coins for candy in their door-to-door quests. In Manchester this year, Joseph Wise, of Emanuel United Church of Christ will direct a UNICEF Halloween drive. Plans for the canvass are set for Tuesday, October 30, from 6:30 to 8:00 pm.

Millions of children in the developing nations are haunted year round by poverty and consequent nutritional, medical, educational and social deficiencies. When youngsters don costumes and make their rounds for UNICEF, when adults drop coins in the orange and black collection box held out on a spooky Halloween's Eve, they send hope to those who formerly had little to hope for.

No amount is too small. A nickel provides five children with smallpox vaccinations. A quarter buys 200 vitamin capsules for a mother and child clinic. A penny in the box protects a child against tuberculosis, and 36¢ buys seeds to produce 6000 tomato plants for an applied nutrition project. Last year the "small change" collected through the UNICEF Trick or Treat program amounted to over \$3.4 million.
