

TOY SAFETY PROJECT LAUNCHED

Volunteers are now being recruited to implement a toy safety project in Washtenaw County. The program, designed to remove banned toys from store shelves, will begin within the next two weeks.

The project is sponsored by the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), a new federal safety agency. It will be coordinated locally by Prosecuting Attorney William Delhey's

consumer protection division. "This is a preventive measure, said Delhey, "and it will help consumers and county merchants alike.

The inspectors, called Consumer Deputies, will be trained by the CPSC. After an orientation period they will be given a letter of introduction to store managers, a list of approximately 1500 banned toys, and a pecket of reporting forms. If banned toys are being sold, the Deputy will notify the

"Deputies will have no legal power, savs Lynne Bukky of the CPSC's Cleveland office, "but their reports may bring about legal action if banned toys

The volunteer Deputies will be asked to make at least three inspections per week until Christmas and to report their findings to the Consumer Action Center, the consumer protection division of the Prosecuting Attorney's Office.

According to Vivian Shevitz, Consumer Action Center staff member and director of the project, "Banned toys are still being sold. We want to get

DINNERTABLE HAZARDS

Thanksgiving dinner means gravy and family get-togethers. But dinnertable talk can be hazardous to your

Talking and eating -- simultaneously can cause havoc. Ordinarily, both food and air go into your upper throat. But at a critical point they take two very separate pathways. If there is a mixup directions, the results can be disastro

Just before you swallow anything, ncluding food or saliva, you take in a little air and then hold your breath. Without even realizing it. When you do, this closes a valve in your throat called a glottis. Then, everything you swallow is forced down the tube to your stomach. Only after your swallow is finished does the glottis reopen. You tart breathing again.

On the other hand, when you breathe, the air goes through your nose or mouth. down your throat, then into your windpipe. From there, it moves into two main tubes, called bronchial tubes, which branch into smaller and smaller passageways. The passageways end in nundreds of millions of air sacs, where zygen and carbon dioxide are exchanged

The minute you talk, you start to breathe. Try holding your breath and see how hard it is to talk. Then food can "go down the wrong way." If food completely blocks the windpipe and annot be dislodged in minutes, then Thanksgiving dinner and everything else is all over. Steak and big portions of food are the major offenders. If the food travels past the windpipe into he air passageways, it can cause a ung disease called bronchiestasis.



GRIFFIN

By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. I know that Michelangelo painted the frescoes in the famous Sistine Chapel while lying on his back on a scaffold. After seeing the Capitol Rotunda during a recent visit to Washington, it dawned on me that it, too, may have been painted in the same fashion. Am I right?

The paintings in the Rotunda, along with the murals in many rooms and hallways in the Capitol, were created by the great Italian-born artist, Constantino Brumidi. Brumidi began his paintings in the Capitol in 1855 and continued painting there until his death in 1880. He often expressed the wish that he would live long enough to "make beautiful the Capitol of the one country on earth in which there is

liberty."

Brumidi often worked on his back, lying on a scaffold. Unfortunately, this led to his death. Late in 1879 he fell from the scaffold, but managed to grab a platform where he hung until help came. Brumidi never fully recovered from the shock and died a few months later in 1880. Tragically, he never fulfilled his great desire in life, but we are indebted for his devotion to his adopted land, and the beautiful works which he left to all Americans in our National Capitol.






Thursday, November 15, 1973 HISTORIAN SEARCHES FOR TRACES OF MISSING CIVIL WAR SOLDIER

An historian's professional curiosity can lead him into lengthy searches for the little personal mysteries of history that never appear in the textbooks. -

That's what has happened to Central Michigan University historian George Blackburn, and he's turning to Jackson County people for help.

During some of his research recently, Blackburn became intrigued with a letter written by Austin Blair, Michigan' Civil War governor, regarding a Jackson County soldier in the Civil War.

The soldier was Allen Maxson who deserted in 1863, was sentenced to be shot and who escaped the day before President Abraham Lincoln suspended his execution with the observation: "Must I shoot a simple-minded soldier boy who deserts, while I must not touch a hair of a wiley (sic) agitator who induces him to desert?"

Until shortly before his desertion, Maxon's service record and his family background were good. And the turn

of circumstances led Blackburn to wonder what happened to him, The CMU historian's search led him

to the National Archives, the State Archives, records of the Michigan Soldiers' Home, a Jackson County history, county and township census and a special 1890 county veterans' census,

And while he's found post-war evidence of Allen Maxson's brothers and father remaining in the county, Allen Maxson, the deserter, apparently slipped beyond the bounds of historical record.

Allen was one of four boys from the family of Abram C. Maxson who served in the Union Army. His father was a respectable farmer of Leoni, Mich., advanced in years and quite blind, according to Blackburn.

As a member of the First Michigan Infantry Volunteers, Allen Maxson was a good soldier for his first two years of service. Shortly before the battle of Chancellorsville, however, he was robbed of \$300, and asked his colonel's permission to search another soldier who

Maxson believed had the money.

His request was refused and Maxson

developed a hatred for the service. After being wounded at Chancellorsville in 1863, he and his brother Horton, who was ill, were sent to Baltimore to recuperate. Two months later, in July of 1863, the fully recovered brothers started forth to rejoin their regiment. Some Maryland acquaintances persuad them to desert.

In early December of 1863, Horton oluntarily returned to his regiment. Illen was soon arrested, convicted and entenced to be shot.

His brother wrote Governor Blair for aid in securing clemency. Blair, in turn, appealed to Michigan Congressman John W. Longyear to try to win a commutation. It is from Longyear's papers, at the

Historical Collections of the University f Michigan, that Blackburn discovered nd became interested in the case. Longyear's appeal to Lincoln was ccessful, but the day before the president suspended the sentence, Maxson

escaped.
"Where Maxson went and what appened to him is a mystery that can-

not be solved from available sources," Blackburn writes in a brief account of his search in "What Became of Allen Maxson?", an article appearing in the "Chronicle," a publication of the Historical Society of Michigan.
"Did he join the flood of wanderers


to the West and find a nameless grave?", Blackburn asks.
