Engagement Announced



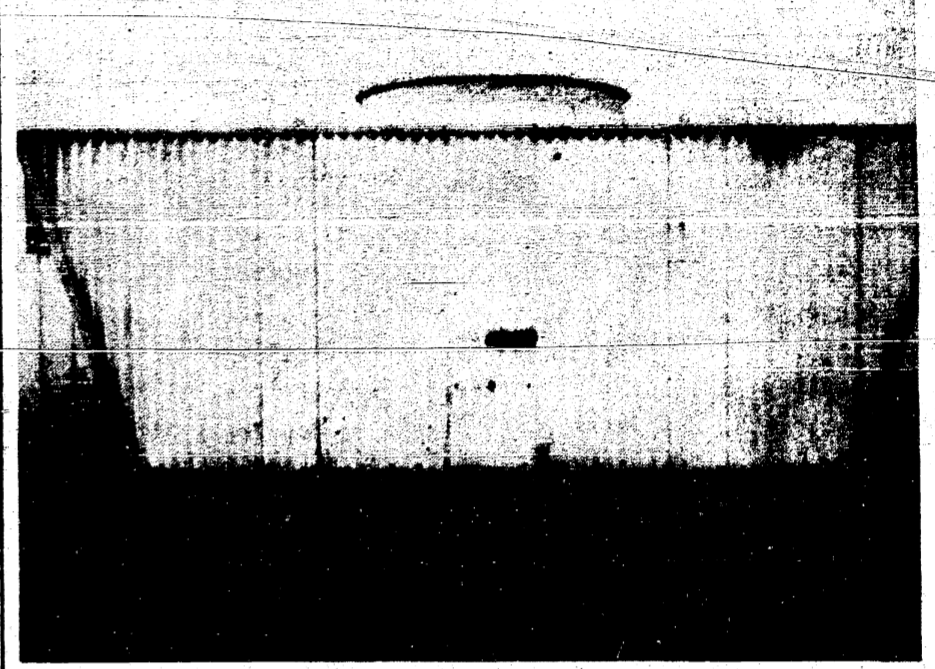

Manchester Plastics Using Ecology



A step towards ecology has taken place at Manchester Plastics. A new water recycling system has been installed by Manchester Plastics whereby the water used to cool the injection molding machines is recycled through an outside air cooler-chiller where the water is run through a series of filters and purified and recycled through the machines. Our second phase is to reuse the water in our heat make-up unit and use for secondary heat for the plant. The Homer plant has also installed a water recycling system such as this. Mr. Max Kenyon, president of Manchester Plastics, says the water recycling system has resulted in a substantial saving in the use of village water. As far as we know, this is the first unit of this type to be installed and used in this area.

INCOME TAX COUNSELORS GO TO SCHOOL

It takes study to keep abreast of changes in federal and state income tax law, even for the individual who makes income tax preparation his profession. More than 900 income tax practitioners from Michigan will take part in 11 income tax schools to be held in 10 Michigan cities, late this month and next.

The schools will deal with 1973 changes in the law, capital gains and losses, commodity futures and hedging, farm factors, information returns, insurance proceeds, net operating losses, partnerships, self-employed retirement plans and the state income tax.

The school schedule follows: East Lansing, Nov. 29-30 and Dec. 11-12; Farmington, Gaylord and Grand Rapids, Dec. 3-4; Kalamazoo, Mt. Clemens and Saginaw, Dec. 6-7; Romulus, Dec. 10-11; Marquette, Dec. 12-13, and Detroit, Dec. 13-14.

Each participant will receive a notebook of current work materials as well as workshop-type instruction. Sponsoring the schools are the Detroit District, Internal Revenue Service; the Income Tax Section, Michigan Department of Treasury, and the Department of Agricultural Economics, Co-operative Extension Service and Continuing Education Service, Michigan State University.

The booklet answers the questions most often asked by participants and beneficiaries of private pension plans. It is designed to help the employee plan intelligently for the retirement years. Each chapter begins with a brief explanation of a basic aspect of pension plans. This is followed by questions for the participant to answer about his own plan.

"Know Your Pension Plan" emphasizes the fact that being covered by a pension plan does not automatically guarantee that you will get pension payments. It gives the facts you need to know to insure your receipt of the benefits.

Young Basketball Star Cooled By Back Pain

Q. Our 16 year old son is developing into a real fine basketball player. The way he's going, it appears certain that he will be offered a basketball scholarship. This would certainly take a big load off the family budget.

A. During the past few games, however, he has been shooting and scoring under a severe handicap. It seems that sometimes when he jumps to shoot, there is a rather sharp pain in the low part of his back. Of course, he is involved in every aspect of athletics and is exceptionally good at the high hurdles. He is also experiencing some pain in going over the hurdles. Don't get the idea that we are pushing him to be a great sports figure, but he certainly does have the ability to excel in almost every sport he attempts, and I really believe if the pain persists, he will have to quit. I know this would break his heart.

He took a spill this winter on the court and fell on one knee. The coach taped it up, and he has had no trouble with the knee. Do you suppose here is a relationship between the back pain and the knee injury?

A. Anytime any part of the skeletal framework receives a shock, it is transmitted in one degree or another to all parts of the skeleton. The low back being in the center of the body as it is, takes an awful lot of stress. The knee injury and back pain could very well be related. The boy should be examined at once.

TO THE GAS CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY

NOTICE OF HEARING ON GAS CURTAILMENT PROGRAM

On October 26, 1973, Consumers Power Company filed an application with the Michigan Public Service Commission in Case No. U-4453, which requests authority to adopt as part of its rate schedule a new Rule 15 relating to curtailments of gas service. Consumers Power Company states in its application that there exists in the State of Michigan and elsewhere throughout the United States a severe gas supply shortage, which shortage has made it necessary that many pipeline suppliers of natural gas, including Applicant's pipeline suppliers, substantially curtail deliveries of natural gas to their customers. Consumers Power Company also states in its application that greater curtailments of gas deliveries from its pipeline suppliers are expected in 1974 than those currently in effect, and that prudent operating practices make desirable the establishment of procedures whereby gas service to its customers may be curtailed in the event it is necessary to do so in order to maintain a balance between gas requirements and gas supply. Consumers Power Company further states in its application that it does not presently anticipate that it will be necessary to initiate curtailments under proposed Rule 15 in the near future, but that it cannot predict when a worsening in its gas supply situation and/or an unanticipated increase in demand may make necessary the initiation of such curtailments. As set forth in proposed Rule 15, Consumers Power Company proposes to establish six curtailment categories, as follows:

1. All commercial and industrial gas requirements for boiler use in excess of 8,334 Mcf per monthly billing period of customers served under the provisions of Rate "E" other than those requirements falling within Curtailment Category 6. Twenty-four months from the date of the order approving this curtailment procedure, this curtailment category will be consolidated with Curtailment Category 2.
2. All commercial and industrial gas requirements for boiler use in excess of 8,334 Mcf per monthly billing period other than those requirements falling within Curtailment Categories 1 and 6.
3. All industrial gas requirements other than those requirements falling within Curtailment Categories 1, 2, 4, 5 and 6.
4. All commercial gas requirements other than those requirements falling within Curtailment Categories 1, 2, 5 and 6; and all industrial gas requirements for plant protection needs or process needs in excess of 1,250 Mcf per monthly billing period.
5. All commercial and industrial gas requirements of 1,250 Mcf or less per monthly billing period other than those requirements falling within Curtailment Category 6.
6. Residential gas requirements and requirements for services essential for public health and safety; provided, however, that requirements for boilers which have alternate fuel capability shall not qualify as requirements for services essential for public health and safety without the express authorization of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

Consumers Power Company proposes to implement curtailments within the foregoing curtailment categories when necessary in the Company's opinion to balance gas requirements with gas supply, after giving effect to interruptions permitted by the Company's rate schedules. Curtailments could be simultaneously instituted in more than one curtailment category, provided, that no curtailment would be made of gas usage falling within any curtailment category during any period in which the gas usage falling within all lower-numbered curtailment categories had not been completely curtailed. Curtailments of less than 100 percent of the gas usage falling within a curtailment

category would be made pro rata, based upon the customer's historical gas usage falling within the category being curtailed. Any gas usage by a customer in excess of volumes authorized to be used would be subject to excess use charges of up to \$15.00 per Mcf and would constitute sufficient cause for Consumers Power Company to discontinue gas service to the customer. The application of Consumers Power Company in Case No. U-4453 sets forth in more complete detail the manner in which the proposed curtailment procedure is to operate. The application, together with proposed Rule 15, is available for public inspection at the offices of the Michigan Public Service Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, and at each local office of Consumers Power Company.

The Commission has scheduled public hearing on the application in Case No. U-4453 and has ordered that notice be given that:

A. A public hearing be held from 9:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and from 6:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. on December 13, 1973 in the Auditorium of the Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for the purpose of taking statements from the interested public concerning Applicant's proposed gas curtailment program.

B. Any interested parties may attend the hearing and participate, subject to the provisions of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure. Any party seeking to intervene in this proceeding, notwithstanding Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, shall file with the Commission, on or before December 13, 1973, an original and 6 copies of the petition to intervene, together with proof of service upon Consumers Power Company.

C. A prehearing conference will be held at 9:30 a.m. on December 14, 1973 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for the purpose of exploring and, if possible, agreeing upon matters which will expedite the proceedings in Case No. U-4453 and including the following:

1. Determining the parties to the proceeding, the nature of their appearance and the positions they are taking in the proceeding.
2. Simplifying and defining the issues.
3. Establishing procedures for the hearing.
4. Specifying a further schedule of dates of hearing.
5. Expediting any other matters that may aid in the orderly conduct of the hearing and the disposition of the proceedings.

D. THE CURTAILMENT CATEGORIES AND PROCEDURES DESCRIBED IN THIS NOTICE ARE IN THE FORM REQUESTED BY CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY. THE MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION MAY EITHER AUTHORIZE THEIR ADOPTION IN THE FORM REQUESTED, DENY THEIR ADOPTION OR MAY ORDER THE ADOPTION OF A CURTAILMENT PROCEDURE WHICH CONTAINS PRIORITIES OR PROCEDURES DIFFERING FROM THOSE DESCRIBED HEREIN.

Jurisdiction of the Commission in this matter is pursuant to Act 300, PA 1909, as amended, MCLA 462.2; Act 419, PA 1919, as amended, MCLA 460.51; Act 3, PA 1939, as amended, MCLA 460.1; Act 9, PA 1929, as amended, MCLA 483.101; Act 306, PA 1969, as amended, MCLA 24.201; and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1954 Administrative Code, Supplement No. 54, R460.11.

It has been strengthened considerably in recent months as farm women have taken the story of agriculture to urban groups through a speakers' bureau, and to metropolitan shopping malls through commodity promotions.

But there are areas where that bond is strained by misunderstanding, especially in sub-divisions which have mushroomed over into farmland. An example is a Macomb County dairy farmer who was harassed by his neighbors because they disliked the smell around their \$40,000 homes. It mat-

tered not to them that the farmer's ancestors had cleared the land for a homestead in 1876 and it had been operated as a dairy farm since that time. The newcomers to the farmer's neighborhood complained until police ticketed him for "depositing unwholesome substances" on his field. "I don't know any way you can house-train cattle," the dairy farmer said.

Between 1960 and 1970, the number of dairy farms in Michigan decreased by nearly 19,700, from 33,200 to 13,500. How many more will go out of business from 1970 to 1980? This has been a good year, financially, for most farmers. But if they are continually faced with unrealistic environmental regulations, fertilizer and fuel shortages, and odor-conscious neighbors, then even the price won't keep them in business.

Strengthening the bond between farm and city people is a responsibility of both groups. Neither can prosper without the other.....

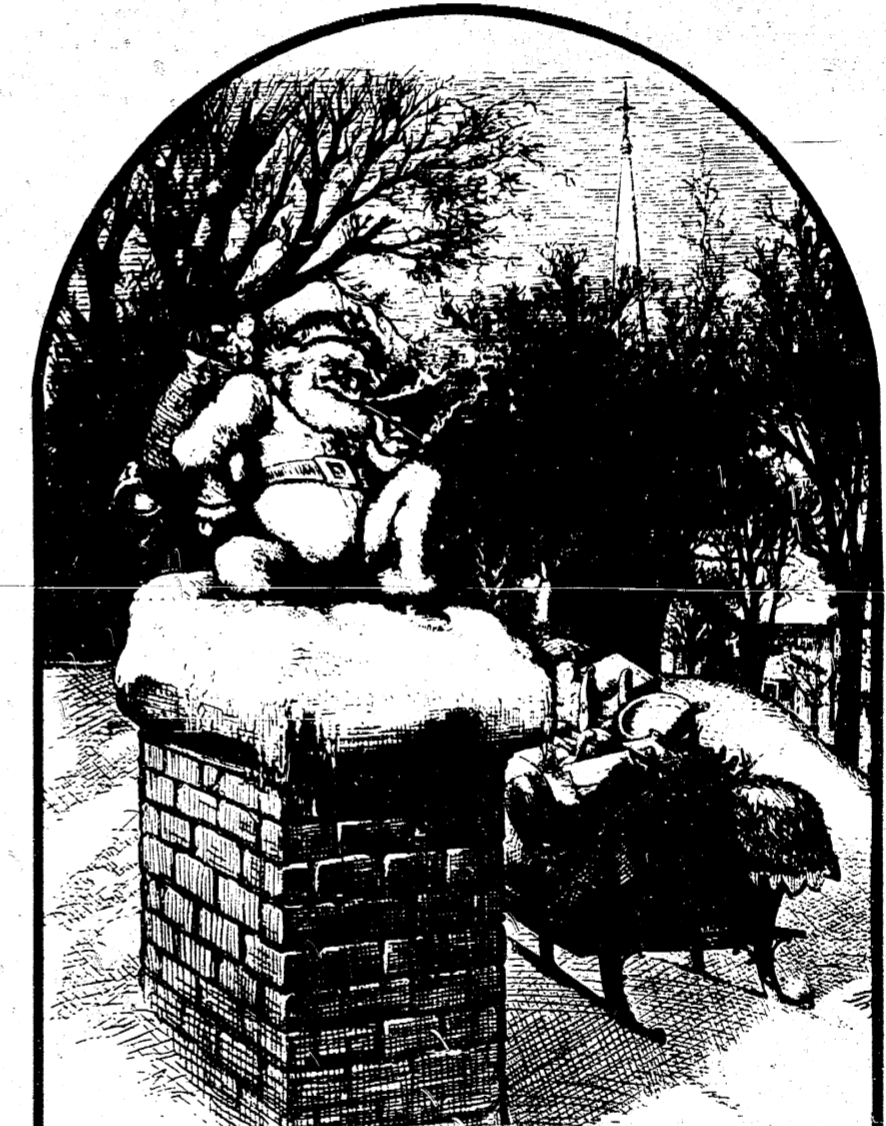

Red Cross Blood Club

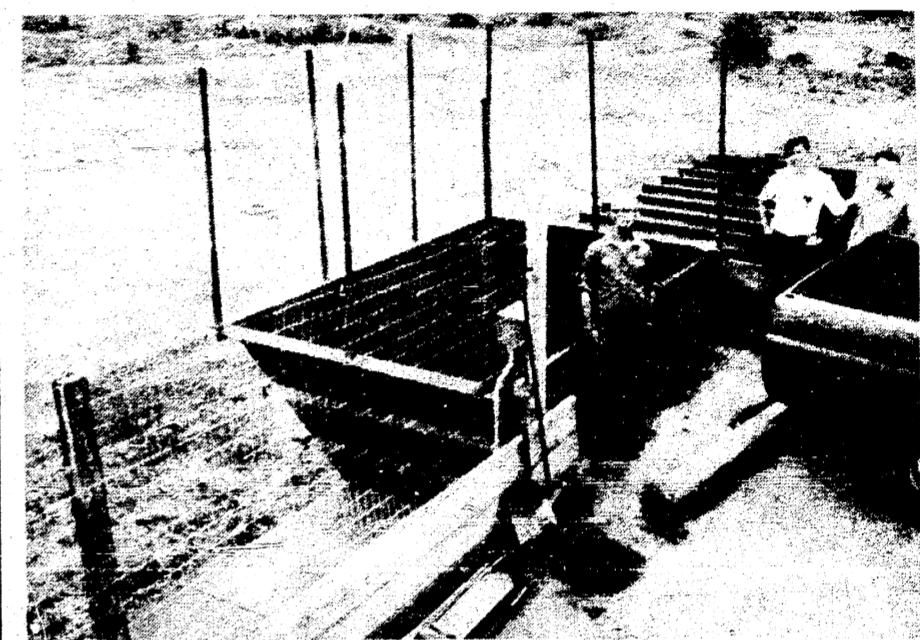

Information needed is the name and address of the recipient, the name and address of the hospital and the number of units of blood needed.

All participants in the 20% Plan made their goals and are thereby covered by that contract. These include employees of Manchester Tool and Die, Stamping Corporation, and Double A Products; members of Jaycees and the following churches in the area: Bethel United Church of Christ, Emanuel United Church of Christ, Iron Creek Church, Manchester United Methodist Church, North Sharon Community Bible Church and St. Mary's Catholic Church.

The "5 in 1" or "20% Plan" means that if 20% of the employees or membership (in the case of churches, 20% of the families who are listed in the membership of the church) donate within a twelve month period, these groups receive the following coverage: All group members, their spouses, children under 18, children over 18 unable to donate, parents and parents-in-law, grandparents and grandparents-in-law, brothers and sisters of single members and in case of industry, re-insures and their wives. A person who leaves the group or place of employment retains eligibility for one year if a donor. A non-donor covered by this contract loses his eligibility immediately.

During 1973, donors have given 272 units of blood for their club. The next Bloodmobile in Manchester is at St. Mary's Church on March 29, 1974. In case the amount in the Manchester Bloodbank is used up, the Red Cross will continue to cover the local blood bank until a collection can be made. The local club was organized in 1951 and has been serving the community continuously since that date.
