Red Cross Blood Club

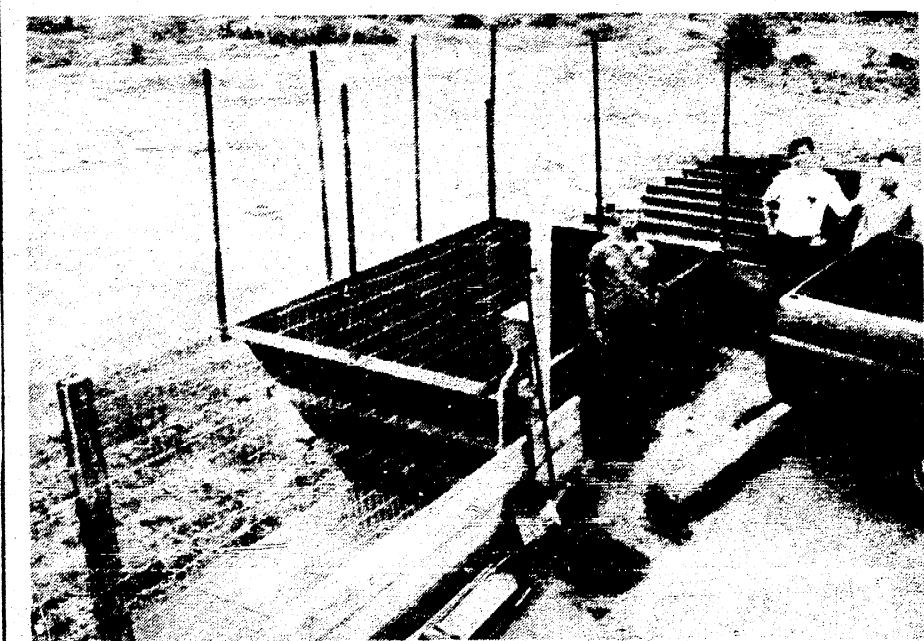
Records for the October 29th Red Cross Bloodmobile in Manchester have been received and checked by the local Blood Club. It is important to remember that every resident of the Manchester Township as well as the entire School District is covered by the Manchester Red Cross Blood Club. In case a person needs blood replaced at a hospital anywhere in the United States and many parts of Canada, he or the family should contact Mrs. Franklin Reck, Mrs. Rolland Crossman or Mrs. Millard Uphaus with the request. Information needed is the name and address of the recipient, the name and address of the hospital and the number of units of blood needed.

All participants in the 20% Plan made their goals and are thereby covered by that contract. These include employees of Manchester Tool and Die, Stamping Corporation, and Double A Products; members of Jaycees and the following churches in the area: Bethel United Church of Christ, Emanuel United Church of Christ, Iron Creek Church, Manchester United Methodist Church, North Sharon Community Bible Church and St. Mary's Catholic Church.

The "5 in 1" or "20% Plan" means that if 20% of the employees or membership (in the case of churches, 20% of the families who are listed in the membership of the church) donate within a twelve month period, these groups receive the following coverage: All group members, their spouses, children under 18, children over 18 unable to donate, parents and parents-in-law, grandparents and grandparents-in-law, brothers and sisters of single members and in case of industry, re-insures and their wives. A person who leaves the group or place of employment retains eligibility for one year if a donor. A non-donor covered by this contract loses his eligibility immediately.

During 1973, donors have given 272 units of blood for their club. The next Bloodmobile in Manchester is at St. Mary's Church on March 29, 1974. In case the amount in the Manchester Bloodbank is used up, the Red Cross will continue to cover the local blood bank until a collection can be made. The local club was organized in 1951 and has been serving the community continuously since that date.

"Nothing less is at stake than our jobs, the prices we pay, the very quality of our lives," Abel said. He cited the fact that between 1960 and 1972, the average annual productivity rise in the U.S. was only 3.1% while the growth rate in a number of foreign countries was double and even higher. By last year, Abel said, 18% of all the steel sold in this country was being produced elsewhere.

Statistics are sometimes dull, the union leader said, but these leap to life when we think of all the businesses that have shrunk, jobs gone down the drain, and families that have suffered lower living standards as a result.

What happened? Well, Mr. Abel concluded, things have been so good for so long that Americans have become wasteful and inefficient. So wasteful that, incredibly enough, many firms today actually expect to scrap 20% of what they produce!

The union leader then pointed out what most American farmers learned long ago—that improvements in productivity can be achieved by stepping up the efficiency of each worker and by improving technology and really using the technology we already have. The advertisement noted that the company and the union recently signed a landmark agreement in which both labor and management guaranteed to resolve their bargaining issues without an industry-wide strike, believing that continuity of production is basic to a higher rate of productivity.

Such an attitude could well serve as a needed guide to a nation that already has suffered too much from a "what's-in-it-for-me" psychosis.

Tax Credit Forms Available

To Senior Citizens, Veterans and Blind Persons in Manchester Township: 1973 Michigan Homestead Property Tax Credit forms and instructions may be obtained from Supervisor Clarence Fielder at 124 Macomb St.

With the new tax exemption law of 1973, Senior Citizens, Veterans and Blind Persons will file form MI1040CR and send to Michigan Income Tax, Lansing, Michigan instead of filing with your township supervisor as has been done in previous years. It is possible for larger tax exemptions with the new law, and more people will be eligible to file.

If you have to file Michigan income tax return, this form (MI 1040CR) will be part of your Michigan Income Tax return MI 1040. If you do not file an income tax, you may get an early refund by filing this form (MI 1040CR) as soon as you receive your property tax bill in December. YOU MUST FILE TO GET YOUR REFUND!

FREE TAX HELP AVAILABLE TO LOW-INCOME TAXPAYERS

Many low-income taxpayers in Michigan could receive free assistance with their income tax returns after the first of next year if the Internal Revenue Service can enlist enough volunteers to participate in a unique public service program, Thomas A. Cardoza, District Director of Internal Revenue Service for Detroit said today.

For the fourth consecutive year the IRS is conducting its Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program which provides an excellent opportunity for concerned individuals and groups to assist taxpayers with fairly simply filing requirements, especially short form 1040A files, Mr. Cardoza said. The assistance is given in local communities, usually at community centers, church halls, or neighborhood meeting places.

Many of these low-income taxpayers turn to paid professional preparers for assistance even though they cannot afford the cost, so the IRS believes it should provide a viable alternative for these taxpayers, according to Mr. Cardoza.

The idea behind VITA, Mr. Cardoza said, is that the IRS trains volunteer assistants who, in turn, help taxpayers to complete their returns fully, accurately and without charge. Assistants can devote as much time as they wish to the program. Mr. Cardoza said that the IRS provides VITA assistants with a brief self-instructional course in basic income tax procedures. The IRS also makes available the necessary forms, schedules, and background materials, and conducts workshops for prospective assistants.

Individuals or groups wishing to participate in VITA should call the IRS office in Detroit at 313-226-7227 and ask for Ronald Adams, the Training Officer.

Mr. Cardoza invites VITA assistants from all elements of the community, including colleges and universities, community action and welfare groups, religious and governmental organizations, and fraternal societies.

Gordon Andrews, Sault Ste Marie, and Mark Hale, Dafer, consigned a total of 37 Maine Anjou heifers and steers to the first A.J. organization sponsored sale.

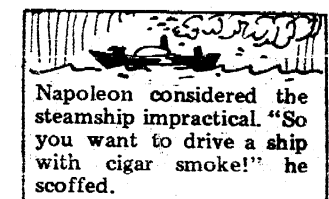
