the fires of inflation. If taxpayers are beginning to wonder why inflation is so hard to control, they have only to read some letters to constituents from Congressmen.

One such letter describes to the home folks how their Senator helped to get a "fair share of federal funds" for their state. The writer was so successful that this particular state received \$300 million more in federal funds than its citizens paid in federal taxes in 1972. If every state considers its "fair share" of the federal pork barrel to be hundreds of millions of dollars in excess of its contribution in taxes, how can there be anything other than continued inflation or devaluation of the dollar?

Charges of a Watergate "cover-up" have citizens aghast and disillusioned, yet relatively few seem aware of the dangerous cover-up of free-spending elected officials who are largely responsible for our country's runaway inflation. Rather than practicing fiscal control and curbing excessive government spending,

they turned to price and wage controls to treat the symptoms--not the cause--of inflation.

It's a clever tactic. It temporarily soothes taxpayers while shifting the guilt away from their doors. But taxpayers--now aware that disruptions in availability of needed commodities, including energy, are caused by government price controls and regulations--no longer want to be temporarily soothed. They want constructive action to stop our nation's headlong plunge toward economic disaster. They're willing to do their part--by insisting that their legislators slow down federal spending, by taking a second look at socially-desirable, but economically unfeasible, government programs, and by casting their votes for representatives who have not been a part of the inflation cover-up.

Representatives who brag in letters home about their spending prowess won't make it the next time around.....

Manchester Township Ordinance No. 8

AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT LITTERING OR VANDALISM ON ANY PUBLIC BUILDING, PLACE OR STREET WITHIN THE TOWNSHIP OF MANCHESTER

THE TOWNSHIP OF MANCHESTER ORDAINS:

Section 1. **DEFINITIONS:**

A. **LITTER:** The term "litter" as used in this ordinance means all rubbish, refuse, waste material, garbage, offal, paper, glass, cans, bottles, trash, debris or other foreign substances of every kind and description.

B. **VANDALISM:** The term "vandalism" as used in this ordinance shall mean the willful, malicious or wanton destruction or injury to personal or real property of another.

Section 2. **LITTERING:** It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to litter or permit litter on any street, alley, sidewalk or other public places within the Township of Manchester by throwing, depositing, tracking, dropping, dumping or spilling any trash, paper, dirt, mud, ashes, sand, glass, leaves, garbage, debris or other materials or to deposit or cause the same to be deposited upon or permit the same to be accumulated upon any premises other than those designated as official disposal sites.

Section 3. **COMMERCIAL WASTE:** It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to discharge any commercial or industrial waste or any polluted or contaminated waste upon the sidewalks, streets, alleys or gutters within the Township of Manchester at any time.

Section 4. **VANDALISM:** It shall be unlawful for any person to commit any act of vandalism on any public building, thing, place or street in the Township of Manchester.

Section 5. **PENALTIES:** Any violation of any of the provisions of this or-

6th Annual Jaycees Snowmobile Race Sunday, January 6, 1974

Come snow or cold weather, the Manchester Jaycees will hold their 6th Annual Snowmobile Race on January 6. Last Year when the weather didn't cooperate with some snow, but the temperature did drop to around zero, the Jaycees pumped thousands and thousands of gallons of water on the banked oval track. The snowmobiles came, and speed and safety ruled the day as not a single injury occurred. Drivers and spectators alike congratulated the Manchester Jaycees for the hours of work put in to get the track ready for the race. This kind of work and enthusiasm has been the story since the first race 6 years ago.

This yearly event is MISA sanctioned and this year will be featured as a Class B race, one day only. Entry fee is \$10, 00 per driver with 90% of the entry money going for prizes. (Expected to reach \$2,000 this year.) Registration starts at 9 a.m. and ends at 11:30. The first race of the day starts at 12:00 noon. Admission is \$2.00. Money is paid for 1st, 2nd and 3rd.

A junior race is scheduled. Ages are 12 - 16 with a 300cc machine as the maximum. Boys and girls may enter the races, novice or pro. Other features include free parking, bleachers and a concession stand plus a ramp for cars from which fans can watch the races from their cars.

The race is sponsored by the Manchester Jaycees and all 400 men are needed to make the race go smoothly.

Catching Up

By Jon Roger Hardenbergh Maybe it's a good thing Sand Creek didn't get to play the Dutchmen Friday night, for the simple reason that Manchester hasn't lost a game yet. Sand Creek has won 1 while losing 2 (in league play).

I thought because Friday's game was called off it would be a good time to fill you in on the Lenawee Conference play so far this season. Manchester and Addison are tied for the lead, both teams having a 3-0 record. Onsted is in sole possession of second place with a 2-1 record. Four teams occupy third place (Clinton, Morenci, Sand Creek and Hudson) with 1 win and 2 lost. Grass Lake has the unfortunate honor of being the cellar dwellers. They have failed to win in 3 league outings.

Also I thought I would add some statistics about the top 3 league teams. Manchester has scored 76, 5 points while holding their opponents to 51 points per game. Addison has scored at a clip of 79.6 points per game while their opponents have scored 62.3. Comparing the 2 teams, statistics wise, Addison scores more than the Dutch but Manchester has a stronger defense. The second place team, Onsted, scores 61.6 points but their opponents out-scored them with 68 points (causing Onsted's 1 defeat).

A little bit about the Manchester Basketballers. Co-captains Rich Kennedy and Scott Gornley have scored 54 points and 35 points in the 3 games respectively. The Dutch center, John Savage, has pumped in 44 points.

I will inform you of the date of the Sand Creek contest when it is re-scheduled. The Dutch play an away, non-league game, Saturday, at East Jackson. The next league game for the Dutchmen is January 4 against their rivals and last year's league champions, Clinton, at Clinton.

The proceeds from the race are then used by the Jaycees for community betterment. Examples are scholarships for students, sponsoring boy and girl scout troops, Halloween party, etc.

Snowmobiles Must Be Registered

The Snowmobile must be registered if riding off your property or property not under your control.

The registration must be with the snowmobile when it is in operation regardless of who is operating it.

You can not ride on any roadway in Washtenaw County or any part of the roadway that is normally snowplowed, including the burm of the roadway if it is snowplowed.

You can ride on the right of way, off the plowed portion, with the flow of traffic, as far to the right side of the right of way as possible. Remember this does not mean to the right of the plowed part of the road way (Road and Shoulder) you must be off the plowed portion.

There must be at least four inches of snow to ride on state land or recreation areas.

You must be equipped with a tail light and head light for night operation and the brakes must be able to lock the traction belt or be capable of stopping the machine in a safe distance.

Persons under 12 years of age can not cross streets or highways. Persons between the ages of 12 and 16 must have a snowmobile safety certificate to cross roadways and streets. This certificate must be in their possession and presented to a law enforcement upon demand. Persons under the age of 13 must be accompanied by an adult or legal guardian. Operation is prohibited with in a

100 feet distance of a residence from 12 midnight until 6 A.M., 100 feet from fishermen or their shanties, skaters, people walking, shelters, etc. Also on frozen lakes or ponds unless you are at a minimum speed required to maintain forward momentum.

Fire arms can not be transported on snowmobiles unless they are unloaded and incased. At no time can a pistol be transported on a snowmobile, this is a felony.
