Nearly everyone, at year's end, takes inventory of the year that was-how well he has met the challenges, weighing victories against failures, and calculating accomplishments, with





Winter's first freeze-over of inland waters often is not the "scal" of approval for fishermen and other recreationists to venture out on the ice, reminds the Department of Natural Resources' Marine Safety Section. It takes prolonged free zing temperatures to produce solid ice. Look for bluish ice as a safety sign. On the other hand, look out for clear or honey-combed ice and stay clear of dark spots in the ice. A good place to start sizing up conditions on your favorite lake is right around the shore. If ice there is squashy or broken up, it's a pretty good bet that the whole lake is unsafe. Beware of lake inlets and outlets. They generally have some thin patches of ice throughout the winter. Don't tread into areas of lakes where the snow cover looks discolored. To be sure of your ice instead of sorry, test its thickness with an auger or spud. The bottom chart here gives an index on how much activity different thicknesses of ice will safely support as a general rule.





1974 WASHTENAW COUNTY ASC

The Washtenaw County ASC Committee for 1974 is Chairman, Earl Doletzky, Vice-Chairman, Lawrence Stein and Member, LeRoy Braun.

Terms of office for county commi men are on a 3-year basis, with one new member normally being elected each year at a convention of newly elected ASC community committeemen. This year LeRoy Braun was elected to serve on the County Committee for a 3-year term. In addition, first and second alternates are elected for one year. The newly elected alternates are 1st alternate, Lloyd Grau and 2nd Alternate Simon

The ASC farmer-committee system is unique. No other group of citizens has so direct a voice in developing and running Government programs. Farmers eligible to take part in programs administered by the committee first elect community committeemen, who in turn elect county committeemen. While the county committee is in actual charge of administering the programs locally, including expenditures of Federal funds, the community committeemen lend operating assistance where needed and are particularly responsible for keeping their neighbors informed about the programs available.

The elected committees are not Federal office holders. Congress holds the Department of Agriculture responsible and the Department in turn relies on the judgement and leadership of the locally elected farmers and the county office employees. The county office serves as the headquarters for farmer business connected with program participation.

Major ASC activities in Washtenaw County include the Feed Grain Program, the Wheat Program, the National Wool Program, Price-support Loans, Storage Facility Loans, Dryer Loans, the Cropland Adjustment Program and the Setaside Public Access Program.

CARE LABELING OFFERS MANY HELPS

for the fabric you buy can be one of the most important steps in home sewing, says Bernetta Kahabka, extension clothing specialist at Michigan State University.

"Much time and money can be wasted on a finished garment that's cleaned once and ruined forever," she says. "Permanent care labels are the sewer's guide and helper in avoiding mishaps." The care instructions or a code num

ber representing a specific set of care nstructions should be found on the end of the bolt on which fabric is wrapped.

When you buy fabric, the salesperson should give you a care label which has Knowing the necessary care procedures these same directions on it. Miss Kahabka suggests keeping track of the cleaning instructions by sewing the label right into seam of the garment for a permanent

> "Care labeling can also be helpful in choosing lining and interfacing fabrics that require the same care as your outer garment fabric," the specialist explains. You might also decide that a certain fabric requires care you don't want to bother with even though you like the fabric. And if you follow the care instructions and obtain unsatisfactory results,

you have a better basis on which to lodge a complaint."

Care labeling was instituted by the federal government for the consumer's protection. It's up to you to use it foryour own benefit in choosing, evaluating and caring for your fashion fabrics.

Marshmallows—Make Your Own

If you haven't tried making marshmallows, you've a double treat in store. They are very very easy and the flavor is superior to commercial made, so much so that it's a different thing entirely commercial made, so much so that it's a different thing entirely. Incidentally, this is a good confection for a cholesterol watcher, it has no fat or egg yolk.

2½ envelopes (2½ table-spoons) gelatin ½ cup cold water 11/4 cups sugar

1/2 cup hot water 1 cup light corn syrup 1 teaspoon vanilla

Coating: Equal parts powdered sugar and cornstarch (about % cup of each). Or 2 cups chopped coconut, toasted, or 2 cups finely hopped nuts, or 2 cups cereal.

Combine gelatin with ½ cup cold water in a cup. Stir with finger until well mixed. Set aside for at least 10 minutes. Combine sugar with the 15 cup hot water in small saucepan. Bring to boiling, wipe down sides of pan with damp cloth, then cover and boil 3 minutes. Remove from heat and pour into large bowl of electric mixer. Add white corn syrup, soaked gelatin and the vanilla. Beat at medium speed for 20 minutes. or until it holds a stiff peak when beaters are raised. While candy is beating, prepare two 8-inch square beaters are raised. pans (inch deep) by buttering them very lightly. Pour beaten march-mallow into pans and smooth top with spatula. Let stand 4 hours or ernight in a cool room. Place desired coating in a large shallow baking pan, run knife around edges of marshmallow and turn out into coating. With a long knife, lightly buttered, cut into 1-inch squares, pick pieces apart and coat each piece thoroughly. Let stand about 2 hours to dry out before storing, with wax paper between

He wore a flaxen beard and a wreath of mistletoe on his head.




