The honorable John B. Swainson, Associate Justice of the Michigan Supreme Court this week announced the opening of the 1973 Easter Seal Campaign for crippled children and adults.

Justice Swainson is the Honorary State Chairman for the campaign which opens in Michigan and throughout the nation on March 1, culminating on Easter Sunday, April 22.

Justice Swainson is an excellent example of a man who overcame a tremendous handicap, having lost both legs while in service with the United States Army in France under General George S. Patton, Jr. in November,

Upon release from the Army Hospital System he entered college and earned both a Bachelor of Arts and Law Degree at the University of North Carolina. He then entered private law practice in Detroit.

Entering the field of politics Swainson's progress was meteoric. In 1954 he was elected to the Michigan State Senate and re-elected in 1956. In 1958 he was elected Lieutenant Governor of the State of Michigan. In 1960 at the age of 35, he became the 40th Governor of the state. Continuing in public service John B. Swainson was elected Judge of the third circuit in 1965 and one year later re-elected. In November, 1970 he was elected to an 8 year term on the Michigan Supreme Court in which Continued on page 5
