The honorable John B. Swainson, Associate Justice of the Michigan Supreme Court this week announced the opening of the 1973 Easter Seal Campaign for crippled children and adults.

Justice Swainson is the Honorary State Chairman for the campaign which opens in Michigan and throughout the nation on March 1, culminating on Easter Sunday, April 22.

Justice Swainson is an excellent example of a man who overcame a tremendous handicap, having lost both legs while in service with the United States Army in France under General George S. Patton, Jr. in November,

Upon release from the Army Hospital System he entered college and earned both a Bachelor of Arts and Law Degree at the University of North Carolina. He then entered private law practice in Detroit.

Entering the field of politics Swainson's progress was meteoric. In 1954 he was elected to the Michigan State Senate and re-elected in 1956. In 1958 he was elected Lieutenant Governor of the State of Michigan. In 1960 at the age of 35, he became the 40th Governor of the state. Continuing in public service John B. Swainson was elected Judge of the third circuit in 1965 and one year later re-elected. In November, 1970 he was elected to an 8 year term on the Michigan Supreme Court in which Continued on page 5

LOCKWOOD MARTLING PAYS RETURN It was snowing and far from ideal

Farmers are planning for spring planting and expressing hope that all will go well in this summer's contract negotiations between West Coast union lockworkers and their employers. Any work stoppage at West Coast ports would affect U.S. wheat, fruit, vegetable and rice exports.

In voicing his concern, William Kuhfuss, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation said, "We hope that agreements can be worked out so we will not have a repetition of the 135-day work stoppage of 1971 which paralyzed West Coast ship operations.

"If we are to maintain and expand U.S. exports, both farm and industrial, we must be able to guarantee delivery on schedule anywhere in the world. If buyers lose confidence in our reliability, they will quickly turn to other sources of supply. Markets lost in this manner are difficult, if not impossible, to regain. In the case of farm exports, we lose not only the sale, but the time, effort and money invested in trade pro-

Past labor disputes, which tied up most major shipping ports, resulted in some one billion dollars in losses to U.S. farmers, plus additional losses to exporters of non-farm products.

During 1972, \$9 billion worth of U.S. farm products were sold overseas and by the end of the present fiscal year, ending June 30, 1973, farm exports are expected to reach \$10 billion.

For every one billion dollars in goods and services we export, we are supporting about 100,000 jobs here in our country. If we can increase our exports, it would be a great step in solving our unemployment problem as well as retaining the jobs that are now being provided.

How does the undramatic savings deposit really compare to the widely discussed more glamorous stock market?





GRIFFIN

By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can af-ten lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. Just to get along these days, a person has to re-member an awful lot of numbers. Everything from my birth certificate to my social security seems to be programmed and numbered. Which makes me wonder: Why do we have to put up with zip codes? Do they really mean anything, or does some bureaucrat just affix a figure from his last expense account to an area of the country and call it progress?

In this case, the federal government isn't quite as arbitrary as that. Zip codes are very logical and useful. Take your own zip code for example-49660. The first number, 4, refers to a geographical region, which in this case is Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana and Michigan. When an 8 or 9 is the second number, it signifies Michigan. The third number refers to a sectional center within the state—in this case Traverse City, which services about ten counties. And the last two numbers in your zip code direct your mail to the Manistee post office.
