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

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

For example, an individual who retired at 65 in 1972 and receives the maximum benefit of about \$259.40 per nonth would have to earn over \$8,300 in wages before he would lose all of his Social Security. If his wife was also on the rolls and they receive a combined benefit of about \$389 per month, the man could earn over \$11,400 in wages before the couple would lose all of their terprise that the public can learn - then

\$1,680 per year, to \$2,100 per year.

The average Social Security paynent now is approximately \$167 per nonth, and this individual would need arnings in excess of \$6, 100 before losing all his benefits. Even the individual reeiving the minimum benefit of \$84.50 per month would require earnings of over \$4, 100 before being ineligible for at least some of his Social Security.

He explained that the dramatic inreases in Social Security benefits over he past 4 years, coupled with the liberalization of the Retirement Test. will probably mean many people are eligible who don't even realize it. This especially applies individuals over 65 who are enrolled for Medicare, but are having their benefit checks withheld due to continued emloyment. Imposition of price controls on raw farm products as demanded by the AFL-CIO executive council could only lead to food shortages, rationing and black markets as experienced during World War II, according to William J. Kuhfuss, president of the American Farm Bureau ederation.

"If consumers want well-stocked meat counters, they must be prepared to pay farmers a fair price."

Record high production costs which promise to hit new highs this year make producing beef a risky business and there must be a reasonable opportunity for profit and a return on huge capital investments," declared the national farm leader.

It has taken more than twenty years for farm prices to even come close to what they were in 1952. During that period, farmers experienced some disastrously low prices.

As long as union contracts call for higher and higher wages, which drives up the cost of everything that farmers must buy for production, we cannot expect cheap food. Farm prices go up and down, but under union wage contracts, wages keep going up and stay there. In addition, many union contracts provide for cost-of-living wage increases. The United Auto Workers, for example, just received a three-cent an hour increase under such provisions. This increase went to 150,000 workers producing agricultural equipment as well as 700,000 auto workers and 50,000 workers in parts factories.

"Probably few consumers realize that current estimates indicate farmers will get less net income in 1973 than in 1972. An upsurge in production cost for 1973 is expected to place net farm income for the year at \$19 billion as compared with \$19.2 billion in 1972," Kuhfuss said.

APPLE CUSTARD PIE

Three-fourths pkg. (1½ cups) Flako Pie Crust Mix 3 tablespoons cold water

1/4 cup firmly packed 3/4 cup granulated sugar 1/4 cup all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon cinnamor 1 cup dairy sour cream 1 tablespoon butter or 1 egg, slightly beaten

For crust, heat oven to hot (400°F.). Measure mix into bowl. Sprinkle cold water by tablespoonfuls over mix; stir lightly with fork until just dampened. Form into ball. Roll out on lightly floured board or canvas to form 13-inch circle. Fit loosely into 9-inch pie plate. Trim; fold edges under; flute.

For filling, sift together sugar and flour; stir in sour cream, egg and vanilla. Lightly stir in apples. Pour into unbaked crust. Bake in preheated oven (400°F.) 30 minutes. Remove from oven; sprinkle with topping (see below). Return to oven for an additional 10

For topping, combine remaining pie crust mix, brown sugar and cinnamon. Cut in butter until crumbly.



Drain Commissioner, Jerome K. Fulton, today issued a warning to property owners in Washtenaw County of possible damage resulting from Spring flooding. Property in low areas and areas near creeks, lakes, and drains is specially susceptible.

Much flood damage can be avoided by simple actions that individuals can take immediately to protect their property. Valuable goods should not be stored in flood prone areas. Storage areas should be relocated to higher ground, or if this is not possible, goods should be raised above the floor level. In other words, materials stored 6 to 12 inches above a basement or cellar floor.

Property owners should also check to make sure outlet drains are clear of debris. These outlets should be cleared and the debris placed in an area where it can not immediately wash back into the outlet. The Washtenaw County Drain Commission should be notified (663-7511 - Ext. 282) of obstructions in established County Drains. It is also

The long range strategy for avoiding flood damage involves strict controls over land use in flood plains and building codes that control the construction of homes and home improvements in flood prone areas. The Washtenaw County Drain Commission, in cooperation with the County Board of Commissioners and local units of government, is now developing plans to make flood insurance available on a county-wide

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

Open dumps are getting closed.

Mission 5000 sounds like another James Bond extravaganza. Actually, it is a nationwide citizen project to close up 5000 open dumps. Launched in 1970, it represents a combined attack on environmental poliution by local, state, and federal governmen

Something has been done. Anyone 62 or older is entitled to a Golden Age Passport, which admits you free to any national park or national forest. You may pick up your Golden Age Passport in person, with proof of age, at the post office or in areas of the National Park System where fees are charged. In addition to free admission, the Golden Age Passport will get you 50 per cent off on special user charges made for campsites, equipment, services and facilities.

Right now my history class is discussing World War II, and I would like to have some film of actual war scenes. I know the army has some of these. Is there any way I could use these films? Is there a charge involved?

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IRS REMINDS TAXPAYERS TO ANSWER REVENUE SHARING QUESTIONS

Thomas A. Cardoza, District Direcor of Internal Revenue for Michigan, reminded taxpayers of the importance of answering two Revenue Sharing quesions appearing on Forms 1040 and 1040A

In order for the Federal Government o distribute Revenue Sharing Funds properly to states, counties, townships, and nunicipalities, the Government must snow how many people live in each location, Mr. Cardoza said.

Correct information supplied by axpayers, Mr. Cardoza continued, will elp insure that all areas in Michigan receive their fair share of Federal funds Since the first Revenue Sharing

checks were mailed out in early Decem ber, Mr. Cardoza said, Michigan has received \$217,482,828 in Federal funds. Mr. Cardoza said that one of the Revenue Sharing questions relates to the taxpayer's place of residence on December 31. 1972 while the other question deals with dependents who lived elsehere on that date.

Helpful information on completing the Revenue Sharing questions appears in both the 1040 and 1040A instructions according to Mr. Cardoza. Mr. Cardoza emphasized that taxpayers who fail to provide the Revenue Sharing information or who give incomplete data may find that their refunds are delayed because of the additional time required to pro-

The law also provides a \$5 penalty for failure to answer the Revenue Sharing information or who give incomplete data may find that their refunds are delayed because of the additional time required to process the return.

The law also provides a \$5 penalty for failure to answer the Revenue Sharing questions, unless due to reasonable cause, Mr. Cardoza said.

Taxpayers should contact their county or local government if they need specific information as to the governmental units in which they reside, Mr. Cardoza said.
