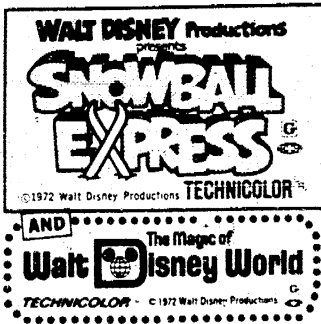

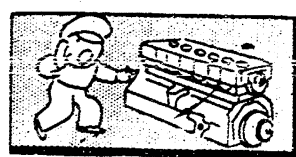

He has been a member of the Manchester Jaycees, the Washtenaw Livestock Council, the Washtenaw County

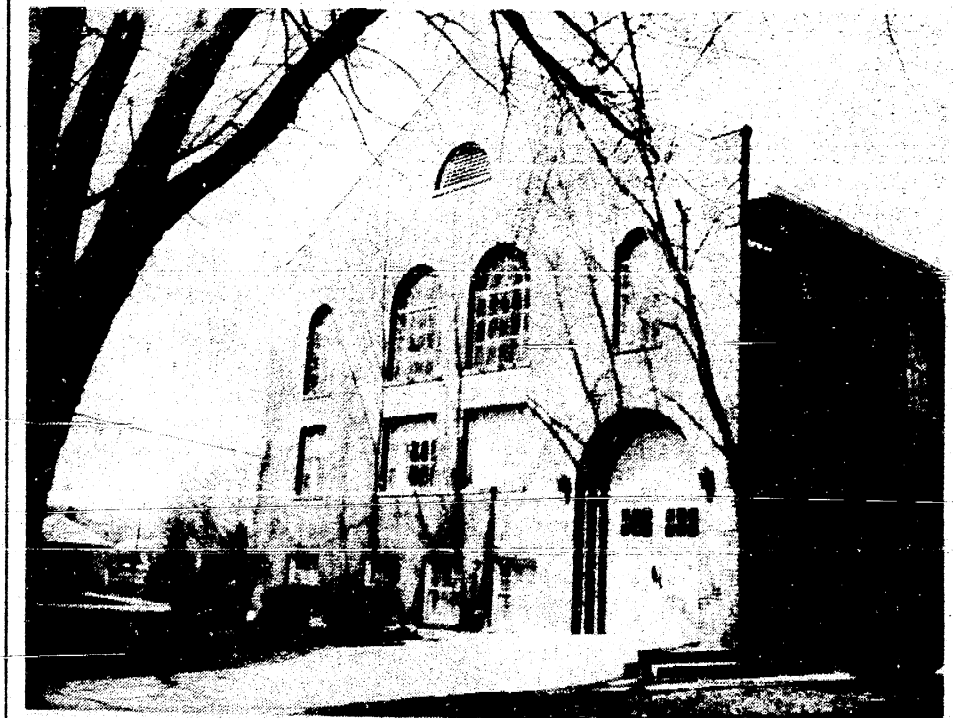

are going to decrease. Certainly there is not much hope that taxes will be cut at the local, state or federal levels.

We must expect food prices to reflect wage increases which have gone up 129 percent in the last twenty years.

During the same period, farm prices of food products increased less than 11 percent, while retail food prices went up 46 percent.

There seems to be few signs from Congress that federal spending will be cut to the level of present government income. When government spends more money than it takes from taxpayers, it generally borrows a part of the deficit from commercial banks. This increases the supply of money and credit available to purchase goods. This can only result in increased taxes or an increase in our federal deficits which cause inflation.

Today's high food prices, and high prices for almost everything, are the result of inflation.

It might take some doing, but consumers are faced with considerable adjustment in their thinking about food prices. They can't have high wages and low food prices. Twenty-cent hamburger goes with 60-cent an hour wages.

There is a possibility that American consumers may never again have some of the low food prices they have had in the past decade.

Some economists are saying food prices may level off in the last half of 1973, but none are predicting that the clock is going to be turned back to the so-called good old days when hamburger was 20 cents a pound.

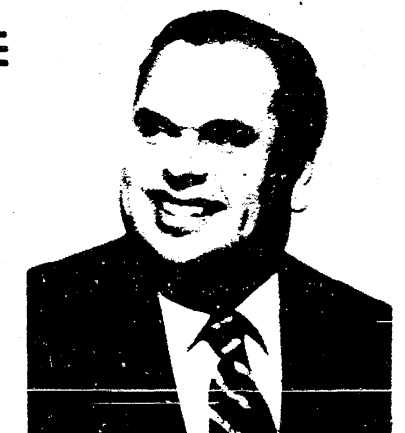

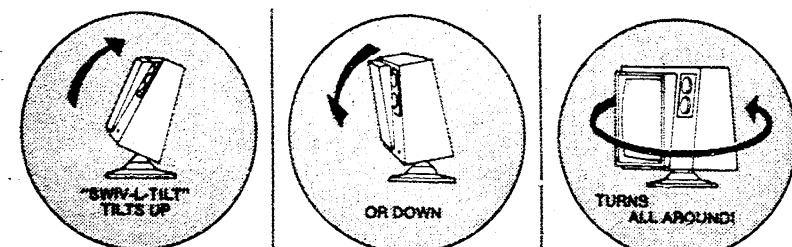

Ask **Senator GRIFFIN**



By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. I am a real underwater nut. My wife and I try to visit as many unusual underwater scuba and snorkeling spots as possible. I've heard that the federal government has such a spot. Where?

—T. S., Detroit

The National Park Service maintains a unique underwater trail in the Virgin Islands off of St. John Island. It averages 12 feet in depth, ranging from 6 ft. to 25 ft. There are guides to show novices around and teach them how to snorkel. A reef surrounds the island, making the water calm and good for watching the many varieties of small fish. The reef is also good for keeping the big fish out.

The high school class I teach is studying the space program. I would like my students to actually see a moon rock while we are talking about it. Can I rent or borrow a moon rock from the government to show my class and to put on display in the school?

—R. S., Lansing

Yes, it may be possible. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) can arrange to loan a moon rock to a school, museum or civic organization on a short-term basis. After making security arrangements with NASA, a person representing the borrowing organization must pick up and return the moon rock in person. In your area, such a moon rock display, encased in plastic and weighing about 45 pounds, would be picked up at the Lewis Research Center in Cleveland. If this project would involve too much expense for your school, you might get together with other schools in your area. Townships Approve Budgets For 1973

Manchester Township's budget, as approved by residents at the annual meeting, is a bit above last year's \$48,960. Now it's \$53,000. The road improvement portion has been hiked from \$2,000 to \$3,000, allocation for chloride on roads is up to \$4,500 from \$4,000, election expenses down to \$100 from \$1,000, the salaries of the supervisor and treasurer are up \$500 each and the clerks salary is increased \$750. The township trustee's salaries has been increased \$100 each.

Freedom Township residents okayed a \$44,500 budget which compares with \$30,450 expenses last year. The only township official's salary which was increased was that of the clerk, from \$1,800 to \$2,400. Residents decided to use some \$15,000 in revenue sharing funds for a landfill, Saline fire truck, voting machine and a new office safe. A \$12,000 paving program will be set up to be administered by a five-man committee to be named by the clerk.

Sharon Township residents voted Saturday to levy one mill for township operating expenses, marking approval of the township's first millage. The millage will put \$6,700 into township coffers. That \$6,700 is most of the difference between a \$25,000 1973-74 budget and last year's \$17,000 budget. Other items in the new budget approved at the annual township meeting include salary hikes for township officials. The supervisor's salary was raised from \$2,400 to \$3,600; the clerk's from \$1,600 to \$2,600; and the treasurer's from \$2,000 to \$2,600; and trustees from \$5 to \$7.50 per meeting. The budget includes \$5,600 for road improvements. Trustees also discussed revenue sharing funds, explaining the township's \$4,400 in federal monies would be used for fire prevention and use of the landfill.
