Busy, creative and industrious, are the best description for this wonderful couple.

Lydia Hartman Luckhardt and Walter Luckhardt, both 84 years old, she born in Saline and he in Lodi Township met and married in 1916 - 56 years ago.

Living on the family farm in Freedom they raised six children, Robert, Andy, Viola, Irene, Arlene and Gilbert.

After a lifetime of farming, the golden years arrived. So also did a new occupation.

Gilbert, attending an auction a couple of years ago, bid for and bought an antique wood lathe. With Brass fittings! A lovely piece of machinery and really useful too! Dad received the lathe as a present and promptly made good use of it.

It seems Raymond Jacob just happened to have a walnut tree on his land and of course some of the wood found its way to the basement workshop at 5195 Schneider Road where the Luckhardts live.

Walnut bowls and wooden candlesticks resulted. Beautifully warm brown with lovely graining, smoothly polished, delightful to the eye and velvety smooth in handling.

The back yard has huge sections of Walnut leaning against the wall, beginning the aging process, after which it is cut in slab sections about 4 inches thick and stored in the garage for further drying. After a couple of years the wood goes on the lathe. When shaped but rough, Lydia takes over and, skill on the lathe, she applies the sandpaper, for a smooth finish. The final step of applying a sealer is also here, to finish with a softly shining handcrafted bowl. The outer layer of wood, close to the bark will sometimes be a different color,

March of Dimes Walkathon

Want to get in shape, lose weight, test your endurance and have fun at the same time? Join the parade - the March of Dimes Walkathon on Sunday, April 29, 1973.

This "orgy of physical fitness" has been organized by the Washtenaw County Chapter March of Dimes to help in the fight against birth defects and to aid those children already afflicted. All funds raised from the walk will go to the March of Dimes Programs in birth defect research, direct patient aid, pre-natal care, public and professional education.

What is the Walkathon? Most of all it will be fun! Bands will play. Refreshments and first-aid will be plentiful. It will cover a 16 mile course with checkpoints. Each person walking all or part of the course gets others to sponsor him at a monetary rate per mile. Sponsors may be parents, friends, neighbors, relatives, small businessmen or anyone who will help aid in the fight against birth defects. Sponsors may contribute any amount per mile from 10¢ up. Official Sponsor sheets will be available in Manchester by calling: Mrs. Leonard Ahrens at 428-8181. Walkers will pass through checkpoints along the route and have their route cards stamped. When the walk is over, the walker shows his route card to his sponsor for the March of Dimes. There will even be a special "Poop-Out Pickup Service" for those who can't make the whole route.

Prizes will be given two weeks after the walk. To be eligible you must have sponsor pledges collected and returned. Be sure to return your entire sponsor sheet with your pledges and checks. The meeting was called to order at 7:45 PM, by Chairman Curley. Minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Also in attendance were Mr. Sang Nam, Planner, of the Washtenaw County Metropolitan Planning Commission, and Mr. Ted Statutz, Mayor.

With reference to action taken at the last meeting, authorizing the formation of a committee to study the procedures and ramifications involved in possible annexation of adjacent areas into the Village, Ch. Curley named himself, Bruce Daniels, and Dave Little to work on this problem.

The bulk portion of the meeting was devoted to reviewing the proposed new Village Zoning Ordinance. As the Planning Commission and members of the Council have studied the preliminary document there have been many questions as to exact interpretations, as well as revisions which were felt should be made to suit the particular interests of Manchester. Moved by Lyle Widmayer, seconded by Ambrose Lentz to accept the bills as read and that they be paid. Motion carried.

The Clerk was then asked to write to Veryl Schill to pay balance of last years dust layer he owes Manchester Township,

and also that he be invited to attend our next regular meeting on April 9th. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

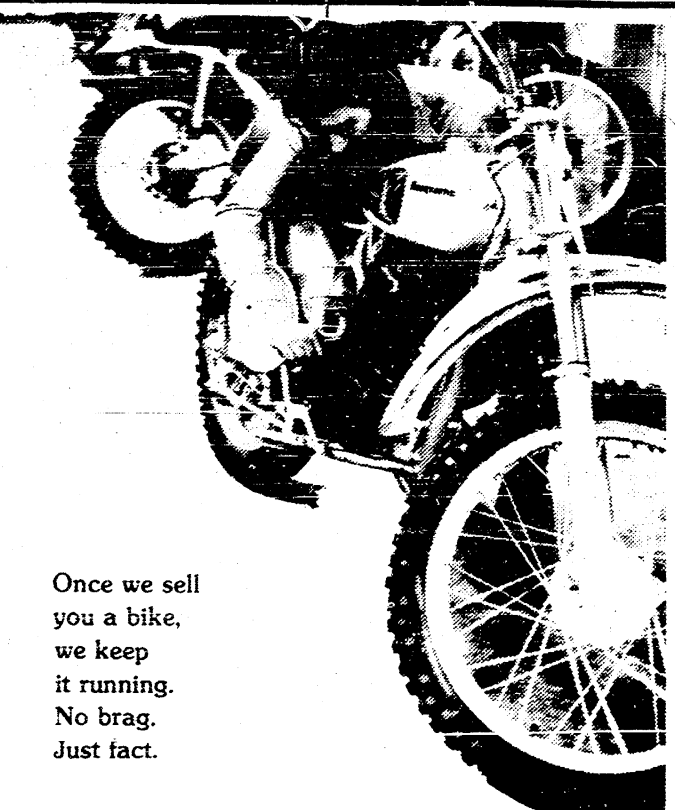



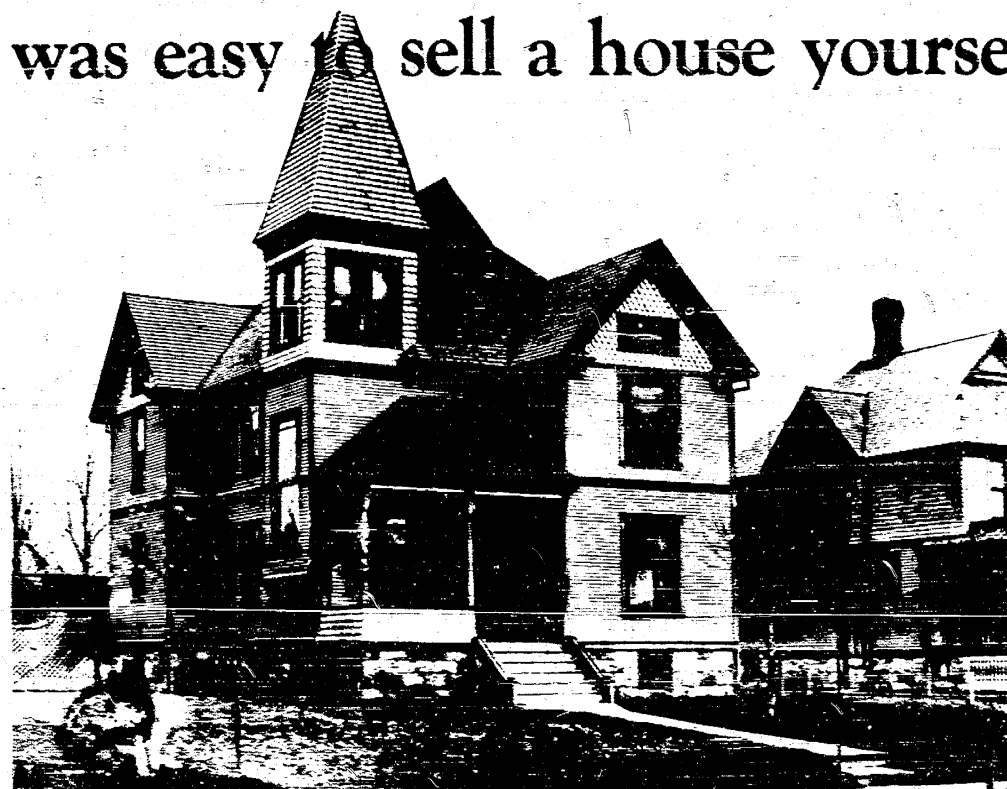

- ¾ cup sugar
- ¼ cup corn starch
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 2½ cups milk
- 2 (1-ounce) squares unsweetened chocolate
- 3 eggs, separated
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 6 tablespoons sugar

Mix together sugar, corn starch and salt in double boiler top. Gradually stir in milk until smooth. Add Chocolate. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until thick enough to mound slightly when dropped from spoon. Cover; cook 10 minutes longer, stirring occasionally. Do not remove from boiling water. Beat egg yolks slightly. Stir a little hot mixture into egg yolks. Then stir all into remaining hot mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, 2 minutes. Remove from boiling water. Add vanilla. Cool to room temperature. Turn filling into baked pastry shell. Cover with meringue made from egg whites and 6 tablespoons sugar. Bake in a 350°F. oven 15 to 20 minutes until lightly browned. Cool away from drafts. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.

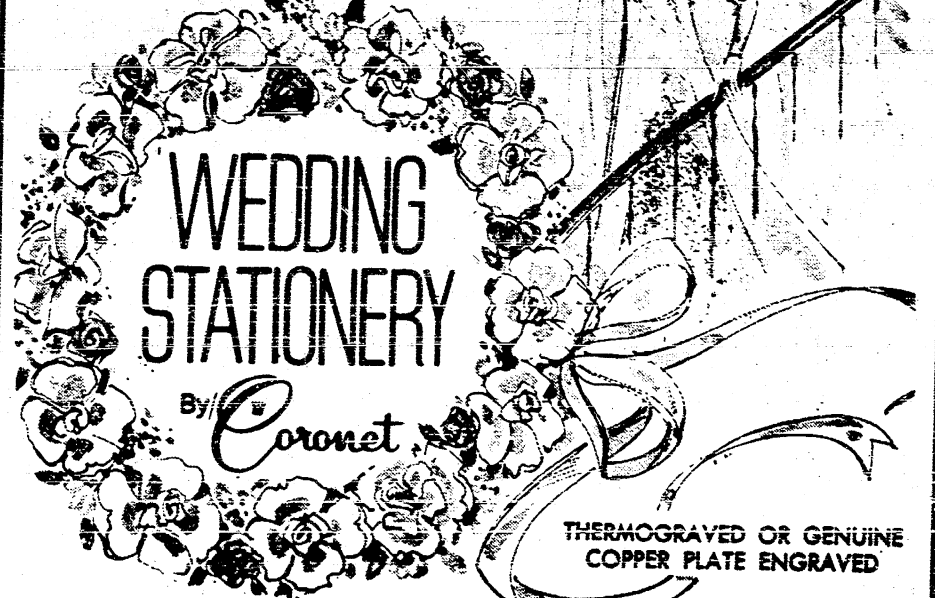

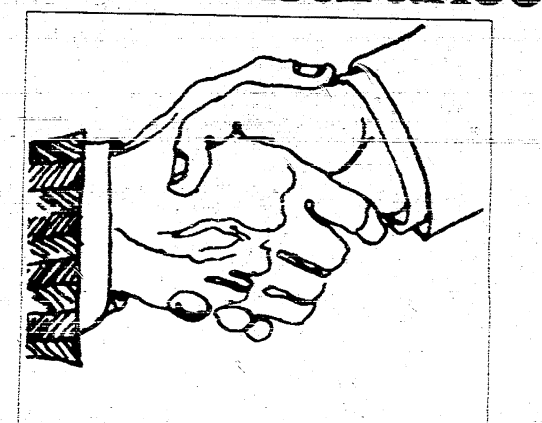

The regular meeting of the Manchester Board of Education was held in the High School Library on April 9, 1973 with all members present. Also present were Superintendent Swartz and Principals Koceski, Tapping, Raffaelli and McGurie.

The meeting was called to order by President Klager.

The secretary's report was reviewed and placed on file.

The financial report for the month of March was reviewed by Superintendent Swartz. It was moved by Gene Bentschneider and supported by Lou Vogel to place the financial report on file. Motion passed.

The bills for the month of March were reviewed and it was moved by Don Walter and supported by Jim Walkowke that they be honored. Passed unanimously.

THE MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE

A discussion was held on the financing of the Building Trades Project. It was pointed out that in order to obtain a mortgage loan on this project it would be necessary to go through the Municipal Finance Commission for the loan. In as much as the time element does not permit a waiting period on this project, it was agreed that the house would be financed with general fund monies and these monies would be returned when the house was sold. This is a legitimate educational expense in as much as it is affording young people an opportunity to receive instructions by actually working on a project.

An inquiry by Eugene Bentschneider on the availability of educational materials and supplies was made and Superintendent Swartz and the Principals responded by saying that all reasonable requests were granted and there should be no lack of supplies after a proper request is made. The procedure for requisitioning supplies was explained.

A letter was presented from the Intermediate School District concerning the annual election of the Intermediate School District Board. A representative from our board will be on hand June 4 to represent our school on this election. Lou Vogel was appointed to this position.

A report concerning the condition of the new athletic field was given. It was noted by Eugene Bentschneider, Chairman of the Grounds Committee, that the field and track was in good condition and that some work which is interesting to the Jaycees and other interested people would hopefully bring this track facility in working condition. A progress report on the lights on the present football field was given and a fixture being considered was examined by the board.

A resolution for the annual school election to be held on Monday, June 11, 1973 was presented by Lou Vogel and supported by Don Walter. This resolution was unanimously adopted.

A discussion of millage needs for the next school year was held. After consideration it was moved by Reno Feldkamp, supported by Don Walter, that the Board of Education levy the same amount of 11.5 mills as was levied last year. This millage amount will be subjected to revision, if possible, after knowing what will be forthcoming in the way of state aid. Motion passed unanimously.

It was moved by Reno Feldkamp and supported by Andrew Luckhardt that we accept the bid from Kenneth C. Kleinachmidt of Northville, Michigan in the amount of \$226, for Bus 16. Motion carried.

Senior trip changes and recommendations were presented for consideration by the board. The Student Council will be invited to discuss this with the board at the next meeting.

The minutes of the Professional Council meeting was read by Superintendent Swartz. The council recommended to the board that Steve Halchishak be granted a leave of absence of eight school days to travel to Central America to study Indian ruins and artifacts.

It was moved by Don Walter and supported by Reno Feldkamp that Mr. Halchishak be granted this leave of absence. Motion carried.

It was noted that the new bleacher seats for the Middle School will be installed during the coming summer. Also, work on the backboards on the athletic field and painting of the tennis courts will be done as soon as weather permits.

Proposed changes in the forthcoming new teacher contract as presented by the Manchester Education Association were discussed by the board and administration.

A workshop meeting was scheduled for April 30, 1973 at which time curriculum matters and related interest items will be discussed.

Meeting adjourned at 10:45 p.m.

The first event of its kind, the 4-H Horse Jamboree, was held at Michigan State University in East Lansing this past Saturday. The day long jamboree was well attended by 4-H members, leaders and parents from all over the state of Michigan, including the upper peninsula. Many members competed in the various activities that were a part of the jamboree.

The annual 4-H horse judging contest was held along with the 4-H horse demonstrations, the 4-H public speaking contest for horse and pony project members and the 4-H horse bowl contest, which was patterned after the College Bowl program of TV fame. Washtenaw County 4-H members were active in most of the events.

The Washtenaw County Junior Horse Judging team, consisting of four members, were Mike Fisk, age 13, of Manchester, a member of the Sharon Valley Saddle Club; Cheryl Hawis, age 13, of Ypsilanti, a member of the Range Riders 4-H Club; Cathy Tobias, age 11, and Rita Drouare, age 12, both of Grass Lake and both members of the Sharon Valley Saddle Club. The Junior team finished in sixth place in the final standings. All team members received placing ribbons. There were approximately thirty teams competing in the Junior Division. Rita Drouare also made the top twenty in the individual standings. She finished in fourteenth place and received a placing ribbon. Rita's score was 369 out of a possible 500. This was the first time that Juniors have been allowed to compete in this type of contest on the state level.

The four members of the Senior Judging team were Flory Lewis of Milan, age 15, a member of the Range Riders 4-H Club; Lori Smith also of Milan, age 15, a member of the Wranglers 4-H Club; Anna Tobias of Grass Lake, age 17, a member of the Sharon Valley Saddle

Club and Chuck Schmidt of Ypsilanti, age 17, a member of the Brand X 4-H Club. At the end of a very long day, the Senior team of Washtenaw County stood in eighth place in the state. All the members of the Senior team received placing ribbons. There were approximately forty teams competing for honors in this Senior Division. Also making the top twenty senior judges list was Flory Lewis. Flory stood in eleventh place in the final individual standings with a score of 462 out of a possible 550. She also received a ribbon for her efforts.

Mr. Clinton Fisk of Manchester was the team coach for both judging teams. Mr. Fisk is also the administrative leader for the Sharon Valley Saddle Club in this area.

Not to be outdone by the horse judges was Grace Mooneyham of Manchester. Grace placed third in the public speaking contest. Grace, better known as "Toby", received a ribbon and an Olympic type bronze medal for her speech. So states Toby, who is a Junior at Manchester High School and a member of the Sharon Valley Saddle Club. Toby has an ambition to go on to college when she graduates from high school. Her one desire is to be able to teach deaf children and help them learn to talk. No sign language, if you please, but real honest to goodness sounds.

The horse bowl teams from the county were eliminated in the first rounds of the contest. There was no one from the county participating in the demonstration part of the jamboree.



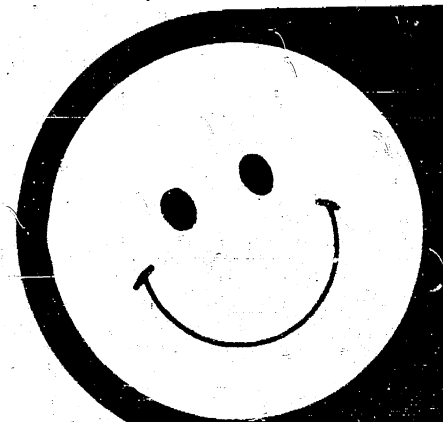
By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. As a political science major at Wayne State University, I often need government publications to do my work. By writing to the agencies and departments in Washington, I have sometimes had to wait as long as six months for what I want. I know that bureaucracy moves at a snail's pace, but this is ridiculous. Any suggestions? —B. L., Detroit

Yes. Last June the Government Printing Office, at my request, opened a "bookstore" in the Federal Building in Detroit, at 231 West Lafayette. More than 2,000 titles of publications from the many government agencies and departments are on hand and available. You will be pleased to know that the bookstore also has copies of public laws, presidential reports, in addition to the Federal Register and the Congressional Record. Anything the GPO prints that the store does not have in stock can be ordered at the bookstore, and they promise much better service than you describe in your letter. As a bonus, I have found the Detroit staff to be enthusiastic and very friendly people.

My husband has taken a job in Washington, D.C. and we will be moving there next month. We want to keep some ties with Michigan and Michigan people while we live there. I understand that some states have clubs in Washington made up of former residents. Does Michigan have one and how can we join? —R. A., Kalamazoo

Every state in the Union is represented by a State Society in Washington. The societies are strictly social in nature, and dues are used to finance activities. The Michigan State Society has the distinction of being the oldest State Society. It was formed by Michiganders working in Washington during the Civil War (it was called the "Sons of Michigan" then). The Society has a membership of several hundred and hosts various get-togethers throughout the year. I have given the Society your name, and you should receive an invitation to join.

Why was the boycott set-up during Lent? This question has not been answered.
 Americans eat according to seasons,

traditions and religious beliefs. We just naturally figure that turkey should be eaten on Thanksgiving, ham goes with Easter and steak is for a banquet. We eat less hot dishes in the summertime or we refrain from eating meat on a certain day of the week or specific religious seasons.

It seems to me that it would be normal to experience some decline in the demand of red meat during the Lenten season. A boycott set-up at that same season perhaps could look better than it would at any other time of the year.

Any change in the eating habits of consumers, natural or instituted, affect farmers.

The production of red meat is not something that can be turned on or off like a water pigot. Farmers must plan their production goals one, two or even three years in advance.

Presently, farmers are concerned about the effects of a boycott on meat. Not only on the agricultural industry, but also on the consumer who may want to eat steak in the future.

An emotional attack on farmers, such as the meat boycott, may discour-

age them from increasing production or even make it impossible for them to continue producing meat at all.

Farmers have been caught in an inflation cost-price squeeze for many years. They can no longer afford to produce animals for market unless they can be assured a reasonable profit.

Consumers would do better to call for curtailed government spending, which would go a long way towards correcting the real problem--inflation, than to stage a meat boycott.

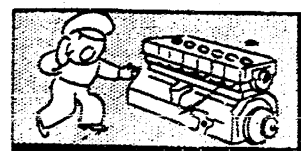

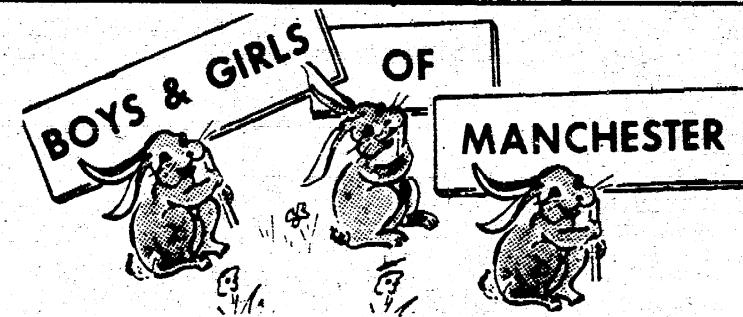

Saline Hospital Telethon



Saline Community Hospital's fund-raising Telethon concluded successfully with the announcement by Telethon Committee Chairman Harold Gage that more than \$100,000 had been raised during the eight-day project.

are awaiting final decisions. We're also following up with many individuals who were contacted during the telethon and who indicated they'd like to make a pledge in the near future. As these additional gifts are received, we look forward to successfully concluding our drive in the near future."
