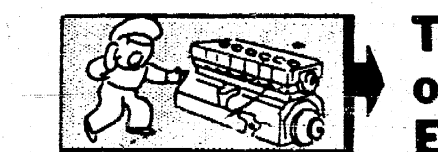

**KALAMAZOO COLLEGE NEWS**

Most Kalamazoo College sophomores are not at Kalamazoo College during the spring.

Instead they are participating in the Career-Service Program, part of the college's unique educational plan which features off-campus assignments as well as on-campus academic offerings.

During the spring career-service quarter, students pursue significant social service programs or explore career openings in areas of personal interest. The College provides pre-program orientation and counseling, as well as job placement and on-the-job visitation.

Students make their own selection of jobs, rather than being assigned to specific positions. This year, for example job placements were made in twenty-four states and six foreign countries. Some of this year's positions include one with the National Center for Atmospheric Research in Boulder, Colorado; social work with the Sioux Indians in South Dakota, under the auspices of the YMCA; and a number of situations offering training in education and counseling fields.

The career-service program, now in its seventh year, was designed to provide experience in a job related to the academic work and future career interest of each student. To date, over 1,600 students have participated in this program.

After the career-service quarter, the sophomores return to campus on June 26 for a summer in residence before beginning six months of foreign study during their junior year.

He is a laboratory technician and assistant to the pathologist at the Pathology Association of Southwestern Michigan, situated in Benton Harbor, Michigan.

**FOUR WEEK WORKSHOP BEING PLANNED**

Five area congregations will conduct a four week workshop on sharing the Christian faith beginning 8:00 p.m. on Thursday, May 10. The workshop will be held at Bethel United Church of Christ, 10425 Bethel Church Road in Freedom Township. The sessions are being held as a part of the Key 73 study-fellowship program organized by the five congregations.

The congregations taking part in the Key 73 activities are Sharon United Methodist Church in Sharon Township; Bethel United Church of Christ and St. Thomas and Zion Lutheran Churches in Freedom Township; and St. John's Lutheran Church in Bridgewater.

Featured speaker for the workshop will be Pastor Paul Foust, director of stewardship and evangelism for Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod congregations in Michigan. Pastor Foust has devoted considerable time over the past few years to developing and teaching an effective method of talking about the Christian faith which can be used by any Christian. The method emphasizes that the Christian faith is something to be shared and not something to be sold to or argued with another person.

All area residents are invited to participate in the workshop.

In a recent meeting held to discuss the workshop, Pastor John Morris from Zion Lutheran Church said, "We feel a workshop like this one will fill a real need in our community. Many people would like to say something to their

friends and relatives about what they believe, but so often they don't know what to say. This kind of program will help us to learn what to say and how to say it." "In addition," said Pastor Daniel Mattson from St. Thomas Lutheran Church, "the emphasis that any Christian can share his faith is a good one." Pastor Michael Peterlin from Sharon United Methodist Church agreed and added, "We have to get away from the idea that only ministers are qualified to say anything about the Christian faith."

Pastor Roman Reinick of Bethel United Church of Christ placed the workshop against its larger Key 73 background. "Our congregations have experienced great benefits from the Key 73 program. We've learned of the many advantages which come from working together," he said. "Further," commented Pastor Dennis Falk from St. John's Lutheran Church, "the tremendous response we had to our study fellowship meetings in February shows that large numbers of people are looking for opportunities to grow in their Christian faith and for opportunities to share that faith."

All meetings of this session of the Key 73 study fellowship will be held at Bethel United Church of Christ. The meetings will begin at 8:00 p.m. the last four Thursdays in May.

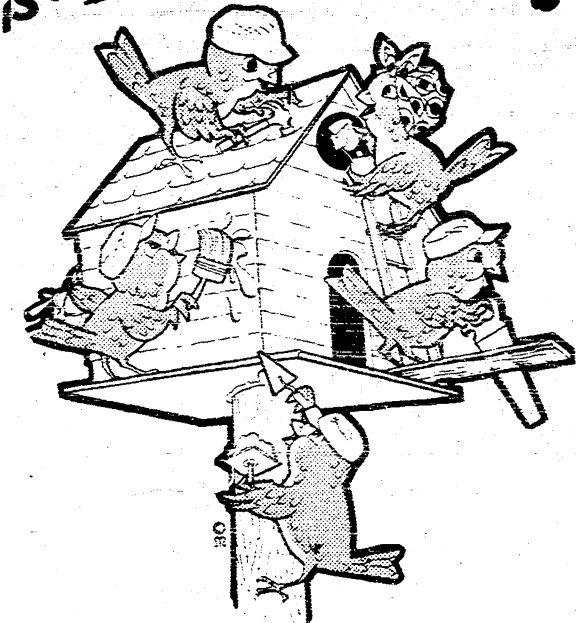

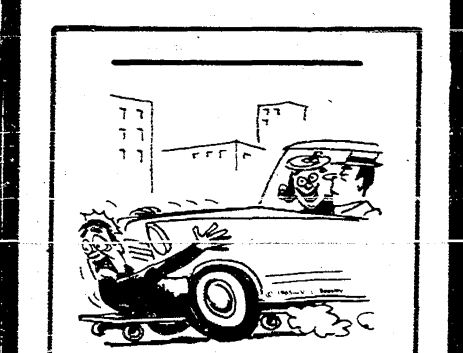

Bruce Cray, a former hurdler, found the half mile more to his liking as he breezed to a 2:11 victory. Cray was followed home by teammate Phil Krzyzanski who was 2 seconds behind.

Cray also garnered a 3rd place in the quarter mile (57.5) for a good days work.

Junior Scott Gormley, primarily a pole vaulter a year ago used some of his ample strength to gain a 39' 10 1/2" heave in the shot-put, good for 1st

place. Beside the four field event 1st places by the Dutchmen the team also swept the high jump with John Savage taking 2nd (5'6") and Bruce Cray was 3rd also at 5'6".

Randy Seeger gained a third in the shot put while Gormley took second in the pole vault to complete the loop-sided 23-3 lead the Dutchmen took into the track events.

Luckily the Dutchmen had such a commanding lead in the field events because the lack of healthy personal caused the squad to lose all 3 relays (880 relay, mile and 440 relays). But those losses were covered by the 1-2 finish of Jose Arana and John Roberts in the mile run.

The remaining place winners for the Dutchmen were, Kurt Kensler, 2nd 220; Dave Guenther, 3rd 100; Jeff Bruestle, 3rd 2 mile; and Tom Opal, 3rd high hurdles.

Michigan Farm Bureau

"It's not nice to fool Mother Nature!" TV viewers chuckle when a wrathful Mother Nature, with a single whisk of her powerful scepter, changes a gentle spring day into the fury of winter.

Farmers aren't laughing; to them, weather is a serious matter and all too often, they have been on the receiving end of Mother Nature's temper tantrums. Each season, her many moods have a direct bearing on whether it will be a "good year" or a "bad year" on the farm, and in the market place. Both the farmer and the consumer suffer when the fickle Mother Nature plays her disastrous tricks.

This year, for instance, she sent out warm spring breezes and rains to tease the buds of fruit trees into a premature birth then, as if to test the durability of her creations, subjected the tender buds to a treacherous freeze and bitter cold. A-nother of Mother Nature's "triumphs" was Hurricane Agnes, responsible for wiping out thousands of acres of onions, and the subsequent shortages and record prices. These are just a few examples of the

farmer's eternal battles with the weather. But this contest between man and Mother Nature has been going on for centuries, and farmers accept her unpredictability as a part of the gamble involved in their chosen profession.

Consumers find it harder to accept. When they choose to serve their families naked liver, rather than pay the higher price of the accompanying onions, it's difficult to vent their anger on the weather--after all, how can you boycott Mother Nature?

Farmers don't blame consumers for their concern about inflation; they share this concern. They do blame federal government officials who believe they can fool Mother Nature and the law of supply and demand with price ceilings which will only curb production and lead to black markets. No matter what "magic" formula the government tries to develop, the law of supply and demand will be the determining factor.

Scientists tell us that the day will come when weather can be controlled but in the meantime, Mother Nature will continue to have her say in the price consumers must pay for their food.

  - 2 cloves garlic, minced
  - 1/4 cup cider vinegar
  - 1/4 cup light corn syrup

Sprinkle pork with sugar, 1 teaspoon salt and soy sauce. Toss; let stand 1/2 hour. Stir eggs with 1 tablespoon water; dip pork into egg; coat with corn starch. Then dip again in egg. Heat one-half the corn oil in skillet. Sauté pork about 15 minutes, turning frequently, until browned. Remove meat from pan. Pour in remaining corn oil. Add onion, green pepper, ginger and garlic. Cook, stirring frequently, until onion has browned lightly. Mix together 4 teaspoons corn starch, 2 teaspoons salt and 1/4 cup water. Add with vinegar and corn syrup to mixture in skillet. Cook, stirring constantly, until sauce thickens. Add pork. Simmer 15 minutes. Makes 4 servings.

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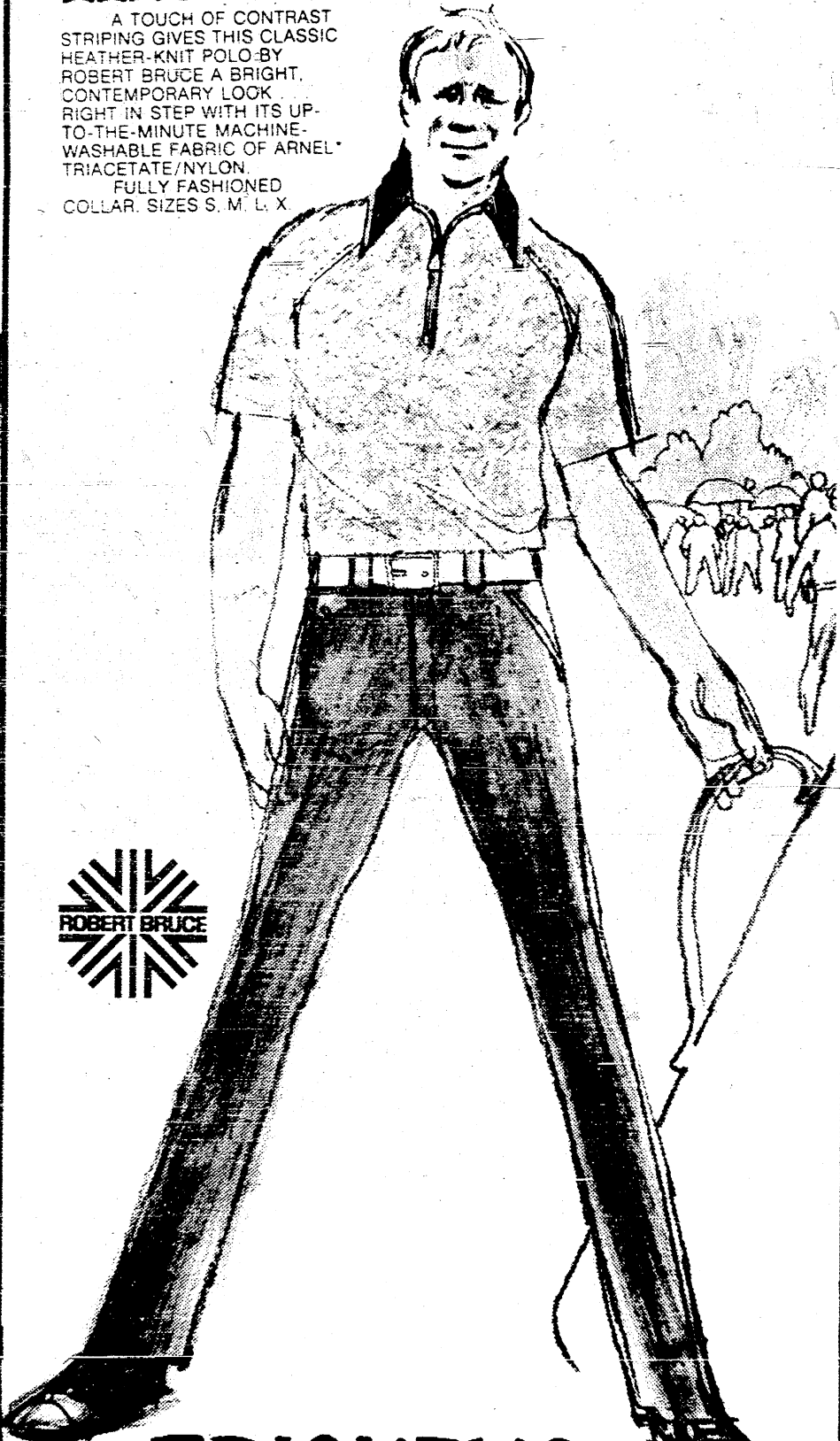

The Uniform Anatomical Gift Act provides a relatively simple procedure for donating your body in case of death or specific organs for medical research, transplantation or therapy. Once appropriate forms are signed and filed, you will be asked to carry with you at all times a Uniform Donor Card which provides instructions in case of death. Peter Kang, executive vice president of Korean Light, Inc., said his nonprofit foundation is coordinating the nationwide search for the Korean veterans.

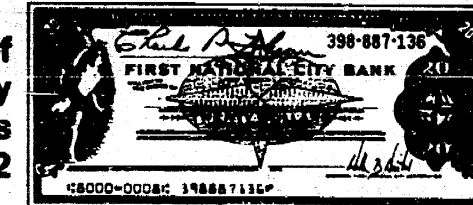

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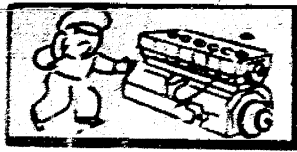
