LETTERS TO THE EDITOR



On May 21, 1973, I had the pleasure of attending a meeting of the Manchester Township Planning Commission. Yes, it's true that my observations and reactions may be biased, because part of the meeting concerned a petition for rezoning a piece of land to be used by my father, to re-establish his business. But if I have learned anything in my education at Manchester's sand-box system and a well known university, it has been that EVERY piece of work, including verbal communication, created by the human species is biased. There is no way to get around it, you must therefore try to see things as objectively as possible.

What I observed was not the widely publicized characteristic of Manchester being a friendly, closely knit community working TOGETHER for the BENEFIT of the community. Instead I saw every-one offensive, producing extremely bad communication problems. I certainly do not envy any of the commission members, for they are forced with previously bad planning and present imposing situations while trying to construct a

system feasible for the future of Manchester township. But the past is past, never to be changed, all that can be done is to make adjustments for the present and learn by these experiences for the future.

As for the future, Manchester will have to expand or decrease, sorry as it may be. There is absolutely no way we can remain stable. With existing resource problems and migration of urban people to rural areas, commerce and industry logically have to follow. Farm land is also being chopped into pieces, in an increasing rate, to be used to construct residential houses. What is left, with commercial and industrial expansion frowned upon, and agriculturally productive land decreasing? A township of residences! Anyone for a seven story apartment building? Just wait, the Wright brothers couldn't fly either.

It is fine to plan for the future, but these plans should not be rigid and absolute law, for we are living in the present. What is life if we can't enjoy it while we are here. Future plans are great, but with the fast pace the human race is moving, yesterday is already outdated and calendars are planned for years in advance. We are here today and our needs presently are of more concern than any others. Are you more concerned what you had in your lunch last year, today, or in two years? Today, of course, for without today there would be no tomorrow.

As for the piece of land my father wanted to use for his business, (yes, his petition was denied) it appears agriculturally unproductive and unprofitable, covering one and three quarters acres, including a swampy pond, and undesirable as a site for a home, being bound by M52.

The next step down on the zoning scale being commercial, but because Mr. Lyle Widmayer, Mr. Ronald Manin and Mr. John Fahey believe this also is not the proper use of the land, it will desirably sit uselessly idle. What efficient land use.

In closing, I would like to say I hope your (and I mean everyone reading this who support absolute futuristic planning) grandchildren and their children remember and thank you for planning their futures. I'm glad my ancestors didn't, for I might be beating rugs, making lye soap, sleeping on straw, carrying water and using that little house out back.

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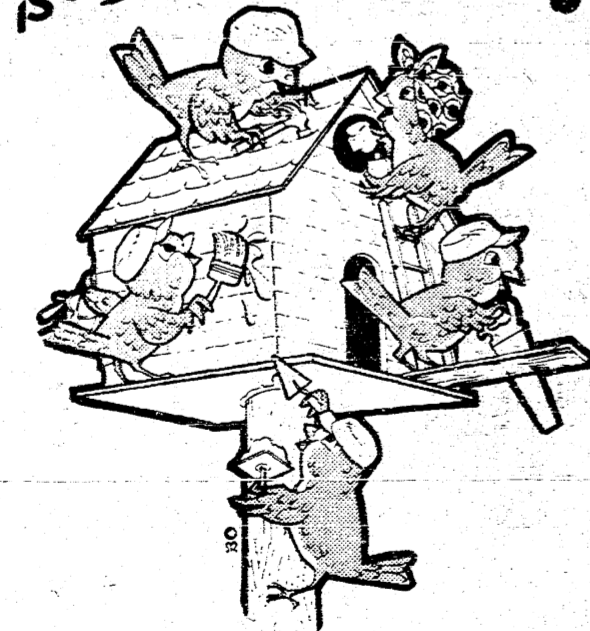
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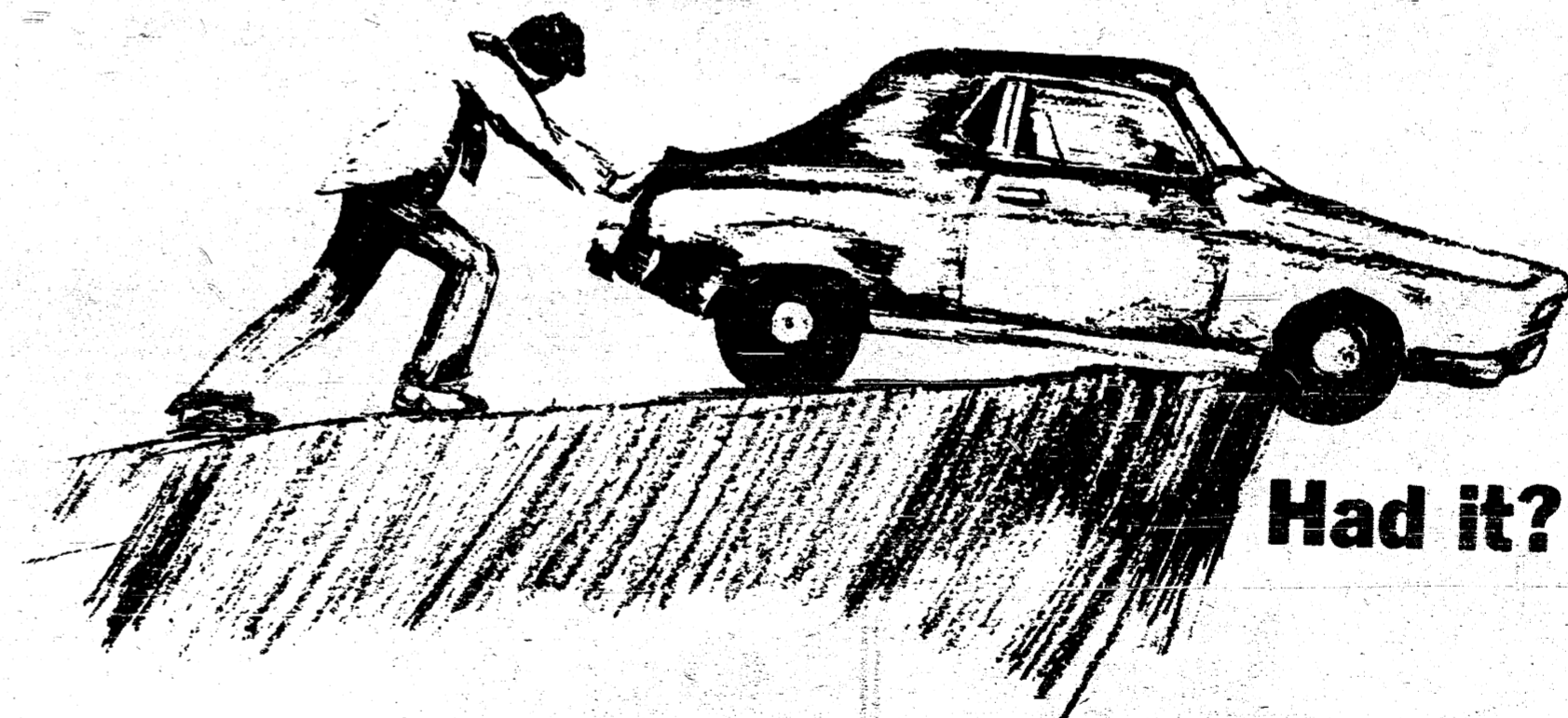



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MICHIGAN TB AND RESPIRATORY DISEASE ASSOCIATION

A total of 72 persons were reported to have active tuberculosis in 1972 in the five counties which comprise the Huron Valley Region of the Michigan TB and Respiratory Disease Association, according to James A. McLean, MD, Ann Arbor, president of the regional Christmas Seal organization.

This is a five percent decrease from the previous year, Dr. McLean explains, when 76 cases were reported. This is a case rate of 11.5 per 100,000 population.

Counties reporting new active cases of TB to the Michigan Department of Public Health were: Hillsdale 5, Jackson 13, Lanawee 6, Monroe 16, and Washtenaw 32.

New active cases of TB for 1972 in the state decreased 6 percent from 1971, however, with 1,261 new active TB cases reported in 1972 for a case rate of 13.9 per 100,000 population, Dr. McLean continued. In 1971, a total of 1,312 new active cases were reported for a rate of 14.8 per 100,000 population.

Despite the sixth consecutive year of a decline in reported TB cases, Michigan still has not reached its goal, established at a national conference of health leaders in 1959, of an average annual decrease of 10 percent in rate from 1960 to 1970. Achievement of the goal would have resulted in a rate of 11.5 for 1970 in the state, Dr. McLean says.

The annual figures of new active cases, however, he cautions, do not reflect the scope of the TB problem, because they do not take into consideration all the cases under treatment or supervision.

"Total cases under treatment or supervision at the end of 1972 were 8,875, or approximately seven times the number of new active cases reported in the state during the year," Dr. McLean said.

Soil Stewardship Week, a nationwide observance which emphasizes Man's obligation to God as stewards of the soil, water, and other resources, will be observed, May 27 - June 3, according to William Fishbeck, Chairman, Washtenaw County Soil Conservation District.


"Changing Challenges", the theme of this year's observance, invites you to increase your understanding, expand your perspective, and consider your responsibility to the challenges and changes of the world around you.

The Washtenaw County Soil Conservation District and some 3000 conservation districts throughout the nation along with their State and National Association are sponsoring the event for the 19th consecutive year.

The Washtenaw County Soil Conservation District has distributed Soil Stewardship Week sermon materials created particularly for this year's observance to over 170 churches in Washtenaw County.

The materials were prepared by the National Association of Conservation Districts, in consultation with a Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee, composed of prominent religious leaders in the nation. 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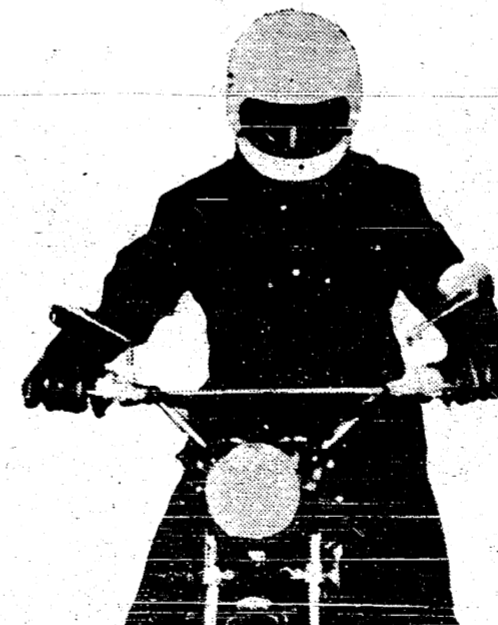
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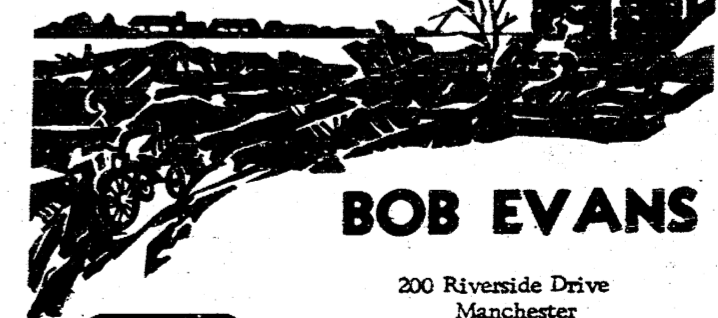
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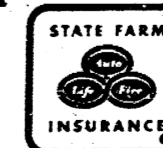
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FOURTH ANNUAL ARTS AND CRAFTS FAIR TO BE HELD IN MILAN

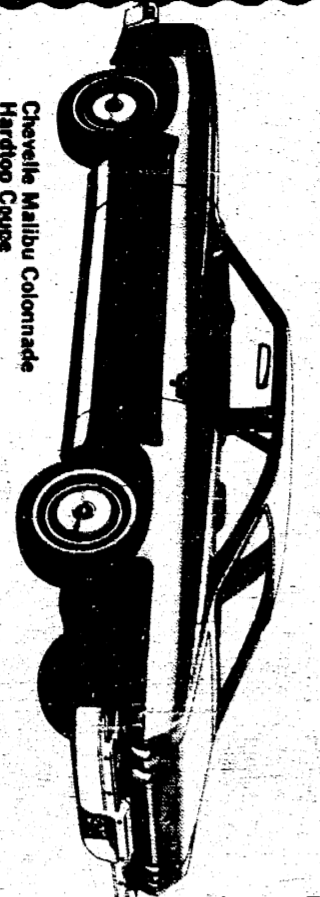
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ALBION COLLEGE GRADUATES 352 DURING CURRENT ACADEMIC YEAR

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TO THE GAS CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY NOTICE OF GAS RATE HEARING AND NOTICE OF HEARING ON MOTION FOR PARTIAL AND IMMEDIATE RATE RELIEF

On April 18, 1973 Consumers Power Company filed an application with the Michigan Public Services Commission with supporting testimony and exhibits in Case No. U-4331 which request authority to amend its gas rates so as to increase its gas revenues by approximately \$50,400,000 on annual basis. Filed in Michigan State Court under Case No. U-4331, Partial and Immediate Rate Relief which seeks authority, on an interim basis to increase the gas rates to increase its gas revenues by \$33,729,000 on an annual basis. On April 18, 1973, the Michigan Public Services Commission filed an application in Case No. U-4332 with the Michigan Public Services Commission for authority to increase its rates for the sale of electric energy. At the hearing hereinafter noticed, U-4332 will be heard concurrently with the application to increase gas rates. Case No. U-4331. In its application, Consumers Power Company has stated that significant increases in the cost of capital, gas, taxes, wages, equipment, maintenance and supplies of fuel and services, along with other factors, have caused it to incur substantial losses. It has not been able to attain the level of earnings in the gas rate of the Michigan Public Service Commission. The Michigan Public Service Commission has scheduled a hearing on the application in Case Nos. U-4331 and U-4332 and on the Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief in Case No. U-4331 and has ordered that notice of a preliminary conference be held at 9:30 a.m. on June 6, 1973, in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for the purpose of exploring and, if possible, agreeing upon matters which would expedite the hearing.

1. Determining the appropriate nature of the proceedings, the nature of their parties and the positions they are taking in the proceedings.

2. Scheduling of testimony and exhibits.

3. Scheduling of testimony and exhibits, the facts, of documents, and matters of public record.

4. Determining the number and identity of witnesses.

5. Specifying the schedule for the exchange of proposed exhibits and written testimony, and the reduction of oral testimony to written form.

6. Establishing procedures for the hearing.

7. Specifying a further schedule of dates of hearing.

8. Expediting any other matters that may aid in the orderly conduct of the hearing and the disposition of the proceedings.

B. A public hearing will be held at 9:00 a.m. on July 2, 1973, in the Auditorium of the Law Building, 525 W. Ottawa, Lansing, Michigan for the purpose of taking statements from ratepayers and representatives of consumer groups. Hearings will commence at 9:00 a.m. on July 3, 1973 and continue July 5 and 6, the week of July 16 and the week of July 23, 1973, in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913 for the purpose of offering in evidence the direct cases of

Consumers Power Company in Case Nos. U-4331 and U-4332 and cross examining such direct cases of Consumers Power Company.

C. A public hearing will be held on Consumers Power Company's Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief at an appropriate time during these rate proceedings following the conclusion of the cross-examination of the direct cases of Consumers Power Company and the receiving of the report of the Staff of the Commission, notice of the hearing date, time and place of said public hearing will be mailed to all participants of record in the July 2, 1973 public hearing and in the hearing commencing on July 3, 1973 in Case No. U-4331.

D. The Commission, on its own motion during the course of these proceedings, Case Nos. U-4331 and U-4332, will carry on an investigation and hearing into the existing rates, charges, revenue deficiencies or excesses, services, practices, procedures and operations of Consumers Power Company, and the investigation and hearing will not necessarily be confined to matters contained in Consumers Power Company's applications but will include all matters pertaining to the reasonableness and justice of its rates, charges, operations and practices as may be necessary to enable the Commission to determine whether the existing or proposed rates and charges are unreasonable and excessive and should be reduced or altered.

E. Any party seeking to intervene in this proceeding in accordance with Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, shall file with the Commission, at least five (5) days prior to June 6, 1973, an affidavit of the party of the petition to intervene.

F. Consumers Power Company, on or before June 6, 1973, shall serve upon each intervening witness a copy of the written direct testimony of its proposed witnesses and proper exhibits therewith to the Commission, and if before June 6, 1973.

G. Public hearings shall be held, in addition to the dates aforementioned, at such times and adjourned dates as shall be determined by the presiding officer until the matter has been fully heard.

H. The rate increases described in this notice have been requested by Consumers Power Company. The Michigan Public Service Commission may either grant or deny the requested increases or may grant lesser or greater increases than those requested.

Jurisdiction of the Commission in this matter is pursuant to 3-4 of Act 419, P.A. 1919, as amended (M.C.L.A. 3-460(54); Sections 4, 6 and 6a of Act 3, P.A. 1939, as amended (M.C.L.A. 38-460.4, 460.6, 460.6a); and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1964 Administrative Code, as amended, No. 54, R. 450.11 et seq.

NOTICE TO THE ELECTRIC CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY OF ELECTRIC RATE HEARING

On April 18, 1973, Consumers Power Company filed an application with supporting testimony and exhibits with the Michigan Public Service Commission in Case No. U-4332, which requests authority to amend its retail electric rates so as to increase its retail electric revenues by approximately \$36,100,000 on an annual basis. On April 18, 1973, Consumers Power Company also filed an application in Case No. U-4331 with the Commission for authority to increase its rates for the sale of gas. At the hearing hereinafter noticed, the application to increase the gas rates, Case No. U-4331 will be heard concurrently with the application to increase electric rates, Case No. U-4332. In its application, Consumers Power Company has stated that significant increases in the cost of capital, fuel, taxes, wages, equipment, materials and supplies have had a serious adverse impact upon the earnings level of its electric business and that it has not been able to attain the level of earnings in its electric business found to be reasonable in the prior electric rate order of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

The Michigan Public Service Commission has scheduled hearings on the applications filed in Case Nos. U-4331 and U-4332 and on the Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief in Case No. U-4332 and has ordered that notice be given that:

A. A prehearing conference be held at 9:30 a.m. on June 6, 1973, in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for the purpose of exploring and, if possible, agreeing upon matters which will expedite the proceedings in Case Nos. U-4331 and U-4332, including the following:

1. Determining the parties to the proceeding, the nature of their appearance and the positions they are taking in the proceeding.
2. Simplifying and defining the issues.
3. Obtaining admissions as to, and stipulations of, the facts not remaining in dispute, the authenticity of documents, and matters of public record.
4. Determining the number and identity of witnesses.
5. Specifying the schedule for the exchange of proposed exhibits and written testimony, and the reduction of oral testimony to written form.
6. Establishing procedures for the hearing.
7. Specifying a further schedule of dates of hearing.
8. Expediting any other matters that may aid in the orderly conduct of the hearing and the disposition of the proceedings.

B. A public hearing will be held at 9:00 a.m. on July 2, 1973 in the Auditorium of the Law Building, 525 W. Ottawa, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for the purpose of taking statements from ratepayers and representatives of consumer groups. Hearings will commence at 9:00 a.m. on July 3, 1973 and continue that week

on July 5 and 6, 1973, the week of July 16 and the week of July 23, 1973 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913 for the purpose of offering in evidence the direct cases of Consumers Power Company in Case Nos. U-4331 and U-4332, and cross-examining such direct cases of Consumers Power Company.

C. The Commission, on its own motion during the course of these proceedings, Case Nos. U-4331 and U-4332, will carry on an investigation and hearing into the existing rates, charges, revenue deficiencies or excesses, services, practices, procedures and operations of Consumers Power Company, and this investigation and hearing will not necessarily be confined to matters contained in Consumers Power Company's applications but will include all matters pertaining to the reasonableness and justice of its rates, charges, operations and practices as may be necessary to enable the Commission to determine whether the existing or proposed rates and charges are unreasonable and excessive and should be reduced or altered.

D. Any party seeking to intervene in this proceeding, in accordance with Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, shall file with the Commission, at least five (5) days prior to June 6, 1973 an original and eleven copies of the petition to intervene together with proof of service upon Consumers Power Company.

E. Consumers Power Company, on or before June 6, 1973, shall serve upon each intervening party a copy of the written direct testimony of its proposed witnesses and proposed exhibits as filed with the Commission, and proof of service shall be filed with the Commission on or before June 6, 1973.

F. Public hearings shall be held, in addition to the dates aforementioned, at such times and adjourned dates as shall be determined by the presiding officer until the matter has been fully heard.

G. The rate increase described in this notice has been requested by Consumers Power Company. The Michigan Public Service Commission may either grant or deny the requested increase or may grant a lesser or greater increase than that requested.

Jurisdiction of the Commission in this matter is pursuant to Sections 1, 2, 6, 7 and 8 of Act 106, P.A. 1909, as amended (M.C.L.A. 460.551, 460.552, 460.556-8); Act 300, P.A. 1909, as amended (M.C.L.A. § 462.2 et seq); Sections 3 and 4 of Act 419, P.A. 1919, as amended (M.C.L.A. 460.53, 460.54); and Sections 4 and 6 of Act 3, P.A. 1939, as amended (M.C.L.A. 460.4, 460.6); and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1954 Administrative Code, as amended, No. 54, R 460.11 et seq.

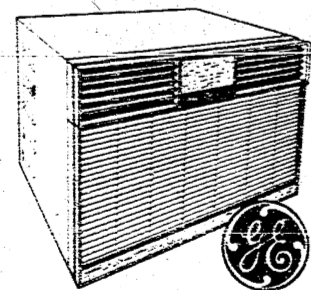

Michigan Farm Bureau

The average farm wife isn't uptight about the current women's liberation movement. "Liberated from what?" most would ask. If "liberated" means being free to "do your own thing," and able to function as a first-class citizen within her world -- these rights are already hers. She has no hand-ups about her identity so the "Mrs." label doesn't turn her off. She knows who she is -- a full-time partner in a business enterprise where she has no need to break any discriminatory barriers to

drive a tractor or help deliver a calf. Off the farm, she takes no back-row seat in public affairs and in her farm organization's activities. Well-educated and well-versed on current affairs that effect her chosen way of life, you'll find her where the action is. She's a legislative leader traveling to Washington, D. C. to discuss issues of importance with her Congressman. She's a delegate to the state or national conventions to take part in deciding what the policies of her farm organization shall be. She's at a local store promoting the products raised on her farm.

When her urban counterpart took up picket signs and marched to the marketplace with demands for food price rollbacks, the farm wife went into action. The city consumer was not her enemy; on the contrary, their relationship was one of cooperation and compatibility with many common goals. Because she knew that boycotts and price controls could mean food scarcity and higher prices, she took her only "weapon" -- truth -- to the arena

of public opinion. In the supermarkets, at shopping malls, in the schools, she told the amazing story of a productive agriculture. Through the Farm Bureau Women's "Speakers' Bureau," she shared with urban groups the facts about food production and food prices.

How effective will she be in her efforts for understanding and support? Will consumers join forces with her in fighting the real reason for higher prices -- inflation caused by irresponsible government spending?

The farm woman hopes so. Empty meat counters and bare grocery shelves are not her idea of "liberation" -- for either the consumer or the producer.

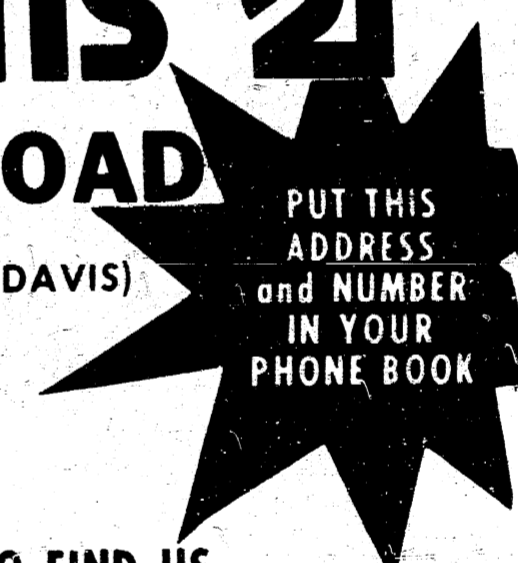

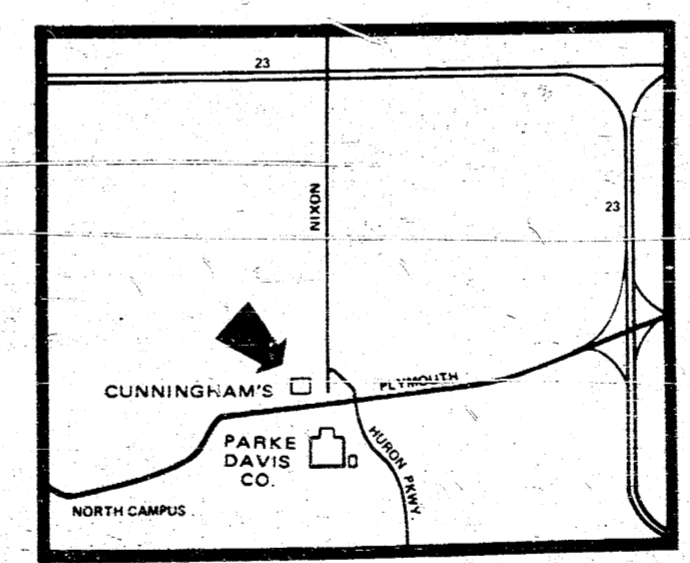

Subsequently he became a free lance musician in the Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti and Detroit area, and maintained a teaching studio, giving lessons in piano, clarinet and saxophone. In 1940 he went into the Army and remained on active duty until 1948, then was in the reserves, retiring as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1965. Prior to this, in 1949, he received his Bachelor Degree from Sherwood Music School in Chicago and commenced teaching music in the Manchester Public Schools. Shortly after Mr. Sortor received his Masters Degree in Music Education at the University of Michigan.
He has been with the Manchester Public Schools for 24 years, at first being the only music teacher, and now sharing the load with two others. He has advocated offering Manchester students a variety of musical experiences, including stringed instrument instruction, which is unusual for a school of this size.
Mr. Sortor played clarinet with the Ann Arbor Civic Symphony, almost from its beginning until the late 1950's except

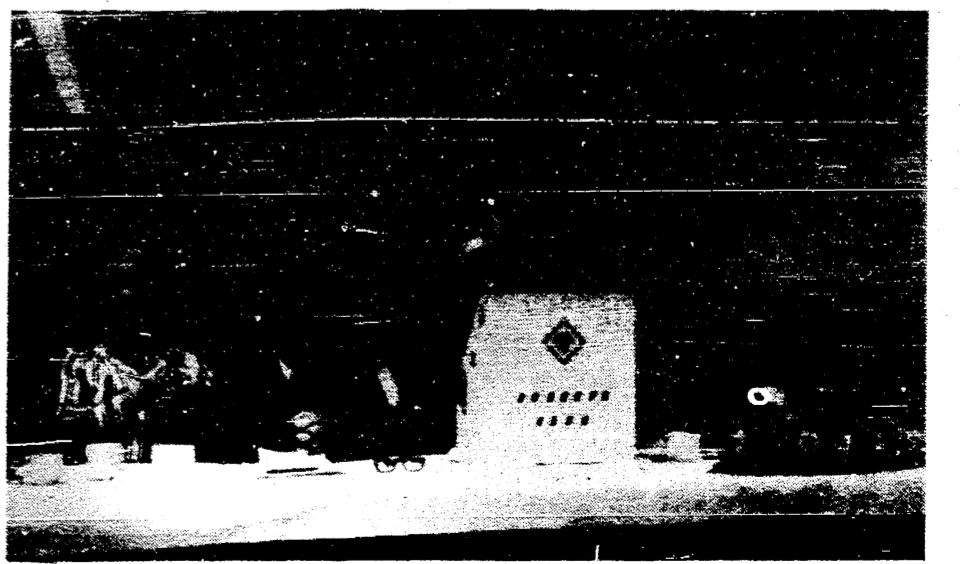
The Optimist Bicycle Safety Check will be held Saturday, June 9, from 9:00 am. to 12 noon on the Manchester Athletic Field.

Annual School Election June 11

Registered voters in the Manchester School District will be asked to approve an extra voted operational millage of 11.5 mills at the annual school election on June 11, 1973. This amount is the same millage levied for this purpose the last two years.
The Board of Education feels that a slight increase in the district's equalized valuation will help provide the extra monies needed to fund the 1973-74 fiscal year. Therefore, they are holding the line on their request for extra voted millage.
The additional funds available to the school from the district's valuation increase will provide the two additional teachers needed for the growing enrollment and modest salary increases for school personnel.
The 11.5 mill levy of extra voted funds is crucial to the school district's program because it represents approximately a third of all operational monies. Without these funds the school could not maintain its present program. Also, without these funds we would not qualify for State funds under proposed legislation.
All registered voters in the Manchester School District are urged to support this request at the annual election. The polls will be opened from 7:00 AM, until 8:00 PM, in the high school on June 11, 1973.
In addition to the millage issue one seat on the Board of Education will be filled. Lou Vogel, whose term expires this year, has filed petitions for this vacancy. No other petitions were received by the May 14, 1973 deadline.
