Summer Recreation Starts June 18th

The dates for the Manchester summer recreation program have been established. The program will begin on Monday, June 18, with activities at both the junior and senior playgrounds and end Friday, August 3. This year's seven week program will include such activities as roller skating, basketball, volleyball, softball, swimming at Wampler's Lake, and field trips.

Junior playground will be held at the Nellie Ackerson school this year and will be open to those children who will be five by December 1, 1973 and to those who have finished the third grade. The hours will be from 9:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. Monday through Friday except on those days selected for field trips. There will be no afternoon playground for this group. The junior-playground will be under the supervision of Mrs. Kristin Schick. All children participating in the program should assemble on the small playground adjacent to the Nellie Ackerson building and be picked up promptly at 11:30 a. m. if this be the case. If you have any questions concerning junior playground, please contact Mrs. Schick at 1-423-3588.

All youngsters who have finished the fourth grade and who will not be sixteen years old before August 1, 1973 are welcomed to attend senior playground. Senior playground will run from 9:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m. Monday through Friday and from 1:00 p. m. to 3:00 p. m. on Wednesday afternoons unless a field trip has been planned for this day. Senior playground activities are held at the Athletic Field.

Swimming trips will be made every Monday and Friday afternoon beginning June 22. Children who are going into the third grade, and those above this grade level, are eligible to take part in the swimming program. Swimming instructions will be provided for all youngsters who have not yet passed the recreation departments swimming test. No youngster is allowed to go with the advanced swimmers until he passes this test.

All youngsters who are in the beginning swimmers category will be required to take the bus which leaves from the Athletic Field at 12:30 p. m. on Mondays and Fridays. The bus for the advanced swimmers will also leave from the Athletic Field at this time. All swimmers will be back at the Athletic Field at 2:30 p. m. All youngsters taking part in the swimming program must return a permission slip signed by their parents before they will be allowed to participate in the program.

In order to get even more youngsters involved in the recreation program we have decided to hold our roller skating activity again this year. Roller skating will be offered twice a week this summer at a reduced rate. Arrangements have been made with the Skatedium in Adrian to rent their facilities on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from 1:00 p. m. to 2:30 p. m. The total cost for each youngster will be 85¢ (50¢ admission and 35¢ for skate rental). This price would be paid each time a youngster decided to go. Youngsters from the Pleasant Lake area are invited to participate in this program. Bus service will be provided. A bus will pick up all those youngsters interested in roller skating at the Pleasant Lake school at 12:10 p. m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays and drop them off at about 3:15 p. m. All participants in this program will be required to bring a permission slip signed by their parents. Participation in this program is limited to those youngsters eligible for senior playground. This activity will begin on Thursday, June 21. If there are any questions concerning the summer recreation program, please contact Mr. Brian Schick at 1-423-3588.

School Millage Request Approved



Registered voters in the Manchester School District gave approval to the request for a continuation of the 11.5 mills of operational millage. Official returns showed 226 affirmative votes and 65 against the millage. Although it was one of the lightest votes in recent years the percentage in favor of the millage was high. A total of two hundred and ninety-two voters turned out for this election despite the warm weather and the urgency to get seed planted after an unusually wet season.


Louis Vogel was returned to his second four year term in Monday's election. Mr. Vogel, Treasurer of the Board of Education, ran unopposed. Board of Education members expressed opinions of gratitude to the citizens of the school district for their support of the operational millage. In as much as the 11.5 mills represents approximately a third of all revenues, it was extremely vital to the existing program.

Receives March of Dimes Award

Mrs. Leonard Ahrens of 416 Ann Arbor Street, Manchester, was recently honored by the Washtenaw County Chapter of The National Foundation - March of Dimes with a special award for her services as Chairman of Manchester's 1973 March of Dimes.

Contributions to the March of Dimes from the Village of Manchester amounted to 97 cents per capita, the highest of any community in Washtenaw County. Mrs. Ahrens (Carolyn) attributes the unusually high per capita figure to a growing awareness on the part of the people of Manchester to the problem of birth defects and the advantages of supporting the March of Dimes, the health agency with a proven record of achievement.

It is also interesting to note that the entire Southwestern Washtenaw area has greatly increased its contribution to the March of Dimes. The townships of Sharon, Freedom, Bridgewater and Manchester, although less densely populated than the rest of the county, have been raising the level of their support for the March of Dimes faster than the other 14 townships. While the overall 1973 contributions from Washtenaw County's rural townships showed a decrease from 1972 figures, the four townships surrounding Manchester all reported substantial increases, thanks to the efforts of their individual chairmen who were: Mrs. Reno Feldkamp - Sharon; Mrs. Earl Huehl - Freedom; Mrs. Milton Weidmayer - Bridgewater; Mrs. Danny Caywood - Manchester.

Ask Senator GRIFFIN

By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to Senator Robert P. I'm waiting for my tax refund. How many refunds have to be processed by the Internal Revenue Service? Do many taxpayers take the time to itemize their returns?

-R. P. Lansing

You shouldn't have to wait much longer. Believe it or not, as of April 18, more than 40 million 1972 refunds had been approved by the IRS, totaling \$14.1 billion—an average of \$346 per refund. That's a jump from last year's average of \$252. The IRS predicts that approximately 60 million refunds will be approved after review of all returns filed. Itemizing tax returns is the most common method of filing. As of April 20, about 52 million taxpayers filed the Form 1040, and 21.4 million made use of the short form, 1040A.

At our recent coin collectors meeting, the question came up on the shortage of President Eisenhower silver dollars. Even though they have been heavily minted, the "like dollars" don't seem to enjoy wide circulation. Can you explain this?

-M. R., Kalamazoo

The Director of the Mint tells me that plenty of the "like dollars" have been minted, but some local banks just don't carry them in stock. The "like dollars" will be minted for another 10 to 12 years, with the dates changing each year. If more people ask for this coin at local banks, demand will influence the availability. By making a few phone calls I am confident that you can find local banks in your area which have "like dollars" on hand. Incidentally, visitors to Washington can purchase them directly from the Cash Room at the Treasury Building, 15th and Pennsylvania Avenue.

PLAN EASY MEALS Whether you're an old hand at camping or a first-timer, one thing's sure: you won't want to spend a lot of time over the old cook stove. To cut meal preparation time, Dr. Portia Morris, foods and nutrition specialist at Michigan State University, suggests you take advantage of some of the same time-savers you use at home. One of these is convenience foods. Canned soups, fruits and vegetables, meat and gravy dishes, potato and bean salad, beef stew, corned beef hash, chili and baked beans, package mixes for macaroni and cheese, add-the-meat main dishes, instant potatoes, pancake mix and ready-to-eat cereals reduce preparation time, measuring and cooking time and eliminate the need to carry a fully equipped store of basic ingredients and spices. One-dish meals—chili, chicken and noodles, ham and beans—are great favorites with both cooks and hungry campers. Whether for meals or nutritious snacks, many fruits and vegetables are good to eat raw. Stock your cooler or ice chest with individual cans of juice for a thirst-quenching and nutritious snack. To keep sugar, flour and other staples from becoming damp, pack them in plastic bags, Dr. Morris suggests. Put each bag in a large can with a plastic lid to protect it while traveling. At the campsite, use the can as a cooking pot. Make a cover with a couple thicknesses of aluminum foil. Canned vegetables can be heated in the cans. Open the can and bend the lid back for a handle. After dinner there's no pan to scrub -- simply throw the can away. To transport liquids -- milk, distilled water for a baby's formula, juice keep in mind that plastic containers don't shatter and are much lighter than glass. They will melt, however. Quick-and-easy may be foremost in your mind, but don't forget about food safety when you're camping, Dr. Morris urges. Keep perishable foods hot--above 140 degrees--or cold--below 40 degrees, she advises. Eliminate storage problems with leftovers by combining hearty outdoor appetites with careful planning to eliminate leftovers. "One mistake many beginning campers make," the specialist observes, "is trying to take all their food with them. But part of the fun of visiting new towns is prowling through the local grocery store and trying products you might not find at your local store." Shopping also gives you the chance to get acquainted with the proprietor, she notes, who is often a gold mine of information about what there is to see and do in the area.

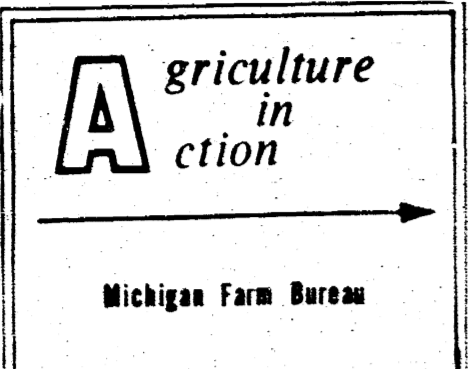

first cows in 1624 brought new hope to the suffering Plymouth citizens and later the cow was a valuable part of the pioneers' trek westward.

In the 20th century, milk went to the moon with explorers. Apollo 11 astronauts carried puddings, cream soups and cocoa in dehydrated form. With added water -- milk foods for moon meals!

Perhaps because milk has been recognized for centuries as a vital, life-giving, health-promoting product, consumers have come to take it for granted. That's one of the reasons our nation's dairy farmers designate June as Dairy Month. In Michigan, especially, there is good cause to "celebrate" this month. For many years, milk has been the largest single source of income for the state's farmers. Total 1972 production for Michigan was 4,916 MILLION pounds!

There was a time when nearly every child had a first-hand acquaintance with a cow; today, many city children have never seen the original source of their milk. Throughout the state, Farm Bureau members are taking time during

June, Dairy Month, to invite these children to visit their farms.

It is difficult to determine who gets the biggest thrill out of these experiences the child who apprehensively meets the productive animal for the first time, and pulls the udder which releases the nutritious liquid... or the proud farmer who sees the look of wonderment on the child's face as he witnesses this "miracle."

One thing is certain -- when these children grow up to be the explorers of tomorrow's unknowns, milk will go with them.

On Saturday, June 23, the friends of Mike Wolfe will host a "Mike Wolfe Day". For three hours, from 9 - 12 Saturday morning at the Union Savings Bank, Mike will greet friends and bid good-bye to the town he has served faithfully for so many years.

Born on August 8, 1885 at Cape Elizabeth, Alaska, Mike, 5 years old was sent to Presbyterian school at Sitka, which he attended until age eleven.

With the help of Sheldon Jackson, then Commissioner of Education for Alaska, he was sent to Indian School at Carlisle, Pennsylvania where he graduated in 1902.

This well-traveled young man then journeyed to Parkview, Mississippi, to enroll at Park College. Enlisting in the Army in 1907 he was discharged with the rank of Sergeant in 1910.

Working on the Railroad, (the good old Wabash) until 1918, Mike met and married Lily Lampton in 1918. A brother-in-law had a shoe repair business in Manchester, Michigan and when hard times came, they came North to our town.

His oldest son Louis was born February 19, 1919 and another son David in 1933. Tragedy befell the family when David died very young.

Mike settled here and made Manchester his permanent home, becoming the Township treasurer in 1945 and serving with great dedication until his retirement in April of 1972.

Leaving now to live near son Louis at 568 Brookside, Ypsilanti, Mike will be missed by everyone who has seen his familiar face up and down Main Street.

Such a long and extraordinary life this gentleman has lived, with such memories. The boat which transported him in Alaska as a child was the Revenue Cutter "Bear", later taken by Admiral Byrd on his expedition to the South Pole.

In 1969 Mike and Son Louis traveled back North to visit Juneau and Sitka, a sort of homecoming, a touching of the soil of home.

The greatest interest of Mike's later years has been in the work of the Alaska Land Claim Settlement,

in which the monies will be distributed to all Native Alaskans of 1/4 blood, wherever they may live.

Many hours have been spent trying to locate these people so they may share in their heritage and Mike earnestly expresses the hope that anyone who is qualified would get in touch with him.

Public servant, good citizen, business man, husband and father, we wish you well and thank you Mr. Wolfe.
