PLAN TO MOVE? NOTIFY SOCIAL SECURITY

If you plan to move and you're one of the almost 29 million people who get Social Security checks every month, you should notify the Social Security Administration promptly, according to Robert A. Kehoe, Social Security District Manager in Ann Arbor.

"Notifying Social Security before you move will assure delivery of your Social Security check to your new address without delay or interruption," Kehoe said.

"Just call or write any Social Security Office and give them the Social Security claim number that appears on your check -- as well as your complete old address and complete new address, with ZIP codes," Kehoe said. "Also notify your Post Office of your address change." A notice only to the Post Office is not sufficient.

Social Security pays over \$4 billion a month to people getting checks under the retirement, disability, and survivors insurance programs.

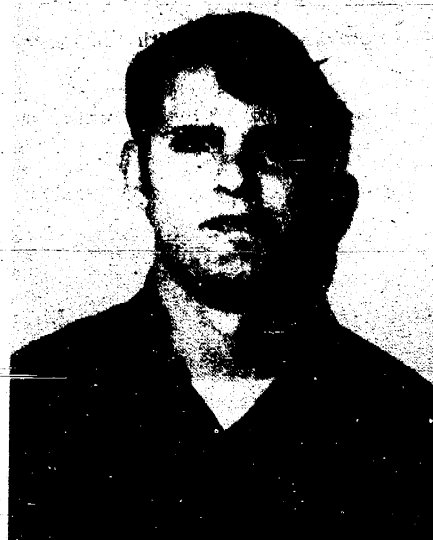

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TO THE ELECTRIC CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY

NOTICE OF HEARING ON MOTION FOR PARTIAL AND IMMEDIATE ELECTRIC RATE RELIEF

On April 18, 1973, Consumers Power Company filed an application with supporting testimony and exhibits with the Michigan Public Service Commission in Case No. U-4332, which requests authority to amend its retail electric rates so as to increase its retail electric revenues by approximately \$36,100,000 on an annual basis. On August 27, 1973, Consumers Power Company filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief, which seeks authority, on an interim basis, to amend its rate schedules so as to increase its electric rates by approximately \$33,810,000 on an annual basis. On April 18, 1973, Consumers Power Company also filed an application in Case No. U-4331 with the Commission for authority to increase its rates for the sale of gas and at the same time filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief to increase its gas rates on an interim basis. At the hearing hereinafter noticed, the motion for partial and immediate gas rate relief, Case No. U-4331, will be heard concurrently with the motion for partial and immediate electric rate relief, Case No. U-4332. In its motion, Consumers Power Company has stated that significant increases in the cost of capital, fuel, taxes, wages, equipment, materials and supplies have had a serious adverse impact upon the earnings level of its electric business and that it has not been able to attain the level of earnings in its electric business found to be reasonable in the prior electric rate order of the Michigan Public Service Commission. Consumers Power Company further alleges in its motion that interim rate relief is required to attract on reasonable terms the capital required to serve the increasing needs of its service area.

The Michigan Public Service Commission has scheduled a hearing on the motions for partial and immediate rate relief filed in Case Nos. U-4331 and U-4332 and has ordered that notice be given that:

A. A public hearing on Consumers Power Company's motions for partial and immediate gas and electric rate relief will commence at 9:30 a.m. on October 8, 1973 in the offices of the

Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, and will continue, if necessary, on the succeeding days of the week of October 8 at the same location and at such time as shall be determined by the presiding officer until the matter has been fully heard.

B. The parties who have already intervened in the above-entitled proceedings shall be entitled to participate as parties in the hearing on Consumers Power Company's motions for partial and immediate rate relief. On April 18, 1973, Consumers Power Company filed an application with the Michigan Public Service Commission with supporting testimony and exhibits in Case No. U-4331, which requests authority to amend its gas rates so as to increase its gas revenues by approximately \$50,400,000 on an annual basis and, at the same time, Consumers Power Company filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief which seeks authority, on an interim basis, to amend its gas rates so as to increase its gas revenues by approximately \$33,729,000 on an annual basis. On August 27, 1973, Consumers Power Company also filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief in its pending electric rate proceeding, Case No. U-4332. At the hearing hereinafter noticed, the motion for partial and immediate electric rate relief, Case No. U-4332, will be heard concurrently with the motion for partial and immediate gas rate relief, Case No. U-4331. In its motion, Consumers Power Company has stated that substantial increases in the cost of capital, gas, taxes, wages, equipment, materials and supplies have had a serious adverse impact upon the earnings level of its gas business and that it has not been able to attain the level of earnings in its gas business found to be reasonable in the prior gas rate order of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

The Michigan Public Service Commission has scheduled a hearing on the motions for partial and immediate rate relief filed in Case Nos. U-4331 and U-4332 and has ordered that notice be given that:

A. A public hearing on Consumers Power Company's motions for partial and immediate gas and electric rate relief will commence at 9:30 a.m. on October 8, 1973 in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, and will continue, if necessary, on the succeeding days of the

week of October 8 at the same location and at such time as shall be determined by the presiding officer until the matter has been fully heard.

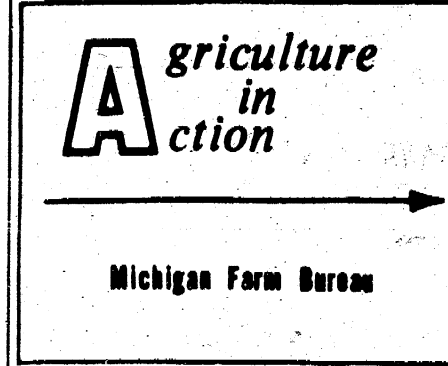


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One of the reasons that farmers' incomes have finally caught up with the rest of the nation's workers is increased exports. Farm exports have increased each year for the past four years and these sales have helped bring farmers' income to 100 percent of parity for the first time in 21 years. Last fiscal year, farm exports amounted to \$12.9 billion, and some predict that they will reach as much as \$15 to \$18 billion in the next few years.

There are some who would like to take away these markets that farmers have worked for years to obtain. They want to do this by placing export controls on agricultural products, and they'll even stretch the truth to try to get the job done.

For example, some bakery industry spokesmen are trying to alarm housewives by saying that bread could go to a dollar a loaf in 130 days unless something is done about the price of wheat. What consumers ought to know is that even at \$5.00 per bushel, the farmer's return on the less-than-one pound of wheat in a one pound loaf of bread would have to triple for the retail price to reach \$1.00. Tripled wheat prices would be \$15 a bushel, and no one is expecting that.

The problem with some members of the baling industry is that for years they have simply gone to the government warehouses for their wheat stocks. They did not have to seek sources of supply, they did not have to store supplies, and they knew they could get it cheaply. Now, they have to do more planning ahead, compete in the market place, and make provisions for storage.

Naturally, they liked the old way

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better, and they want to go back to it. Placing export controls on farm products could take them back.

But, it would also take farmers back to strict controls, increased costs, lower prices, dependence on government handouts, and more farmers going out of business.

Such a route is the fastest one we know to real famine and higher consumer prices.

SELECTIVE SERVICE NEWS

High schools, post offices and other public buildings will be ablaze with multi-colored posters in September to inform young men that (1) they must still register for the draft at age 18, and (2) they must notify their local boards of any change of address.

This is all part of a nation-wide Selective Service effort to help young men comply with the draft law even though inductions have been halted by Congress. The law requires registration of males at age 18. Local draft boards will classify registrants and maintain an available pool of manpower in case any national emergency requires resumption of inductions.

State draft headquarters expects that 85,000 men will be subject to

registration in Michigan this year. During July 7, 165 men registered to bring the seven months total for the year to 48,355.

In another move to spur timely registration, local boards have been directed to review cases of all young men who fail to register within 60 days of their 18th birthday. Cases of registrants who willfully and deliberately fail to register on time will be referred to the legal counsel at National Selective Service Headquarters for determination as to prosecutive action by the Department of Justice.

Young men may register at any Selective Service Office or with registrars located at most high schools, colleges, federal, county and city buildings.

The Ann Arbor local board offices are open between the hours of 8:00 AM and 4:30 PM, Monday through Friday. Young men who have any questions may write or call the draft board office at Room 210, First National Building, 201 South Main Street, Ann Arbor - phone: 665-3766.

A small yellow flag in a grassy field on a Manchester Township dairy farm marks the spot of the final acre of 458,000 acres mapped for Washtenaw County's first modern soil survey since 1930.

About 40 persons representing various local, county and state agencies were present for the "last acre ceremony." The event was held Thursday afternoon on Whippoorwill Farms on Sharon Hollow Road. The property is owned by George Macomber & Sons.

The field work for the survey began in February, 1968. The survey has been a joint effort of the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners, the

Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station at Michigan State University and the U.S. Soil Conservation Service.

The total cost of the project is \$265,640. Of this total, the county is paying \$127,380 or 48 per cent; the SCS \$100,259 or 38 per cent and the Experiment Station, \$38,000 or 14 per cent.

This year, the remainder of Lyndon Township and the Townships of Sharon and Manchester were mapped for the project.

48 different types of soil have been mapped during the past six years. The field work is conducted from April through November.
