Dutch Travel To Morenci

The Flying Dutchmen will travel to Morenci this Friday night to tangle with the Bulldogs whom they defeated handily a year ago. Coach Korican will certainly not overlook the Bulldogs though, as the Morenci team is one of the few LCAA schools to hold a winning edge over Manchester.

The two teams have met nineteen times previously and the Dutchmen have won 8 while losing 11, including 4 of the last 5 games.

The first time the two met on the ridiron was back in 1936 in a noneague affair which the then LCAA champions, Morenci, won 25-6.

The two next met in 1940 when Manchester entered the LCAA the first time and what a game that one was. The Dutchmen had dropped their season opener to Vandercook Lake 13-7 and the Bulldogs had been edged out 7-0 by Hillsdale in their opener. Both teams figured as contenders for the LCAA title as coach Rom Momani was at the helm or Manchester. The Bulldogs took a 7-0 win to hand Manchester their only LCAA loss of the season before they went on to win their last six games in a row and ended up sharing the LCAA title with Blissfield.

Manchester had won a thriller in 1938 and didn't win again until 1943 in another tight one, 14-6. In fact, during the ten year span (1936-45), the two teams played several close games as seven of the ten were decided Saturday October 27 by one TD or less with Morenci winning 8 of the 10 games.

Manchester has held the upper and during the last nine years since the series resumed in 1964, winning 6 while losing 3, including 4 in a row 1967-70). Indluded in this was a 41-6 walloping of the Bulldogs in 1964 which is the highest single game point output by either team in this series. The 1968 contest was one of the wildes games played in more recent years in the LCAA as the Dutchmen took a 32-

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

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

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

The Federal Water Pollution Act, enacted by Congress in October, 1972, aims toward a goal of zero discharge of wastes into the water of this nation by 1985. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is responsible for implementing the Act and, according to officials, they mean to enforce the law. The EPA recently published the

roposed standards of performance which apply to all dairy, beef, swine, sheep and poultry feedlots that have discharges of pollutants into navigable waters. In Michigan, with its many lakes, streams, ditches and other surface waters, farmers are especially concerned. Under the proposal, these feedlots have until July 1, 1977 to meet the no discharge standard. Farmer think it's rather ironic that the EPA standards are based largely upon rec-ommendations of the Hamilton Standard Division of United Aircraft Corporation. They weren't aware that the sircraft industry had the knowledge or experience

The Semifinalists were the highest scorers in each state on the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) administered last October to over one million students in about 17,000 schools nationwide. These students, who constitute about one-half of one percent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States, will complete high school and enter college in 1974.

The use of methaqualone without a doctor's prescription is indeed illegal. Methaqualone is an addictive and dangerous drug which has ruined the future of too many young users. Because of its harmful effects, the drug kas been placed under strict control by the Drug Enforcement



The two first met back in 1938 and Manchester took a 13-6 win. The Dutchmen went on to win the next

Hudson's first win against the Dutchmen came in 1942 by a 28-12 score and they have gone on to dominat the series since that time. The rivalry was halted in 1946, a year after Man-chester had left the LCAA, and was resumed in 1968 when they re-entered

Among the more outstanding games in this rivalry are the 1940 game which Manchester won 19-13 to keep alive their hopes of a share of the LCAA crown; the 1968 game in which Manchester gave the Tigers one of their stiffest tests of the season before bowing 20-12; and the 1971 contest which saw the Tigers pushed virtually to the limit for a 12-6 win

to keep their long victory string going, In that 1968 contest both teams entered the game unbeaten and for three quarters it appeared that things were mighty even as Hudson led 7-6. The Tigers scored early in the final period, however, and then added another midway through to make it 20-6. Manchester was not through, however, as they came back to score with time running out in the game on a pass from Lowrey to Pratt, but they were unable to convert on the point after and their attempt at an onside kick failed on the ensuing kickoff.

The 1971 game was perhaps the single outstanding game of this rivalry as the Tigers boasted a 31 game win streak coming to town. They played in the mud and fog with the Dutchme providing no better hospitability than the weatherman.

After Hudson scored early in the ame to take a 6-0 lead, the Manchester defense rose to the occasion led by big Hugh Haussler, to hold the Tigers at bay for the next two and a half quarters of play.
