#### **Dutch Travel To** Sand Creek Friday

When the Dutchmen travel to Sand Creek this Friday night they will be resuming a grid rivalry that has seen just two games played previously. The Manchester eleven has won both of them taking a 13-0 win in 1955 and coming back the following year for a 32-6

Sand Creek has been a member of three other leagues during their twenty year grid history and now become the eighth member of the LCAA. They have been in the Little Six, the Tri-County, and the River Raisin. They have never won an outright title, but have shared the River Raisin crown twice with Ida in 1967 and 1968.

The Dutchmen of Manchester first entered the LCAA back in 1940 and that year's crew under coach Ron Momani shared the LCAA crown with Blissfield. The next five years proved to be rather unsuccessful compared to that as the best they were able to do was a fourth place finish in 1943 with a 2-2 league mark. Why doesn't the federal government set an example by recycling and reusing its waste and trush? I think this could help the taxpayers as well as the environment. \_\_D. S., Cedar Springs

You'll be pleased to know that such a policy is being pursued. For example, the Defense Department is pushing a program to save money by recycling or reusing waste paper, motor oil, tires, and even cafeteria wastes.

A recent directive by Deputy Defense Secretary William R. Clements, set a short-term goal of recycling 50 percent of the Department's domestic solid waste, and a longer term goal of saving \$20 million by recycling up to 80 percent of such materials. At present 70 tons of Pentagon trash, including 20 tons of paper, are being re-used each day. The paper is sold for recycling into new paper; the rest is pulped and burned in Pentagon furnaces as a coal supplement.

The Army recaps 75 percent of the tires used on its general purpose vehicles. In addition, the Pentagon's Environmental Quality Office has been urging bottling companies, dairies, and others who produce large quantities of containerized goods for the military to use uniform colors and materials that can be easily classified by recycling

The tennis court is not the only place where women are making real headway. After a successful 10-college pilot program, coeds are eligible this year for ROTC at more than 290 colleges and universities.

The four-year ROTC program includes a basic course for freshmen and sophomores, plus an advanced course for juniors and seniors. Successful completion can earn you a commission as an Army second lieutenant at the same time you earn your college degree. During the last two years, all ROTC cadets receive \$100 a month for up to 10 months of the school year and approximately \$400 for summer camp between the junior and senior years. In addition, you may also compete for ROTC scholarships.



Manchester Plays Redskins Friday

The Dutchmen of Manchester High dominate the series throughout the 20's.

Manchester's first win over a Clinton eleven came in 1931 by a score of 31-0 although they did manage a couple of ties in 1925 and 1927 (13-13 and 0-0 respectively). The Dutchmen of those years suffered through five straight shutout defeats at the hands of Clinton, including the infamous 112-0 massacre in 1928 that still stands as an LCAA
