## Manchester Plays Redskins Friday

The Dutchmen of Manchester High will host Clinton this Friday night in the annual clash between the two schools that dates back to 1920. The Redskins of Clinton handed the Manchester crew a 37-0 lacing that year and went on to dominate the series throughout the 20's.

Manchester's first win over a Clinton eleven came in 1931 by a score of 31-0 although they did manage a couple of ties in 1925 and 1927 (13-13 and 0-0 respectively). The Dutchmen of those years suffered through five straight shut-out defeats at the hands of Clinton, including the infamous 112-0 massacre in 1928 that still stands as an LCAA record.

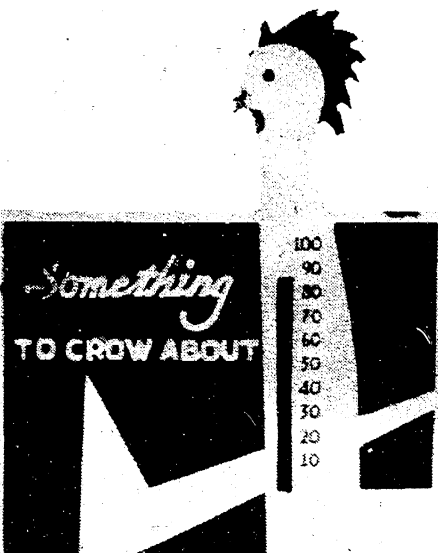
Manchester gained some measure of revenge in 1970 when they romped to a 62-0 win over the Redskins. The locals have won the last three in a row and four of the last five.

The rivalry has been a good one featuring many close games down through the years. Of the 49 games played to date between the two Clinton has won 29 to 15 for Manchester and there have been five ties. In addition to the five ties, there have been 13 games decided by one TD or less (two of those by a single point) and ten others by no more than two TD's.

Among the more outstanding games of the rivalry would be the 1940 game when a stubborn Clinton team finally fell before Manchester in their final LCAA game to enable the Dutchmen to share the LCAA title.

Then there were the 1964, 1965, and 1967 games which were won by Clinton 13-12, 12-6, and 8-0 respectively. Each of these three games was the final league game and each of the three was for the LAA title.

Manchester salvaged last season from becoming a complete failure with a stunning 16-13 upset over the Clinton team as quarterback Rich Kennedy scored on a 27 yard touchdown run with just 1:49 remaining in the game.

## Manchester Wins Baseball Pennant

Before Big Crowd at Tecumseh Manchester Team Wins Decisive Game 2 to 1.

We win! The pennant of the South Michigan League for the Year 1974 comes to Manchester. Manager and Captain Walter Vogt has led his men through a brilliant series of games and then landed them as contestants for first place. And then he won. Hurrah for Vogt, and then again Hurrah for Marx, who at the mound has done more than his full share toward victory. Hail to them all!

Before a crowd of nearly 2,000 people, one of the largest ever at a ball game in this section, Manchester defeated Tecumseh 2 to 1 last Sunday on the Tecumseh diamond.

The game was one of the hardest fought and closest of the season. It was marked by good fielding and superb pitching. Manchester led throughout, but a threatened rally by Tecumseh in the ninth inning made Manchester's loyal fans somewhat nervous. The rally, however fell short when Tecumseh's last batter fanned.

The outstanding feature of the game was the excellent pitching by Marx, whom Tecumseh had said was easy for them. But three hits were taken from his delivery and only one came before the ninth inning.

In the fourth inning, Hawley, first up for Tecumseh, tripled and it was here that Marx did his most effective work. With none out and a man on third base it looked as though Tecumseh must surely score. "Cushion," however said "No," for he settled down to his task like a veteran and pitching deliberately and slowly, struck out the next three men, Tecumseh's heaviest hitters, and snuffed out the run which would have tied the score.

Marx struck out 11 men and only five balls were hit to the outfield. Each fielder took care of one fly, all making nice catches of their chances. To George Wenner must be credited a sensational capture of a wide fly to right field which was only taken in after a hard run and which ended in a complete somersault, but the ball safely in the glove.

Marvin behind the bat was a tower of strength, holding up Marx in approved style. Kiebler, Sepanek and Mahoney each handled several hard chances in big league style.

Manchester scored first in the fifth inning. Marvin hit and stole 2nd, and scored on Marx's hit. Poor base running here lost a good chance to score at least another run.

In the eighth inning Chilton was walked. He stole 2nd and scored on Mahoney's hit to center. This ended Manchester's scoring, but later events proved this was enough.

Tecumseh threatened only once after the fourth inning. In the ninth, after 1 was out. This game was played October 12, 1974.

I am concerned and a little cantankerous over developments which are upon us here, and I am taking this opportunity to express this. It particularly concerns me because I represent the so called "out county residents" who I believe are being discriminated against in many ways. This is illustrated by the following points.

In the past, the tax levy has been held at 5 1/2 mills. Included in this are fundings for the following three items:

1. Huron-Clinton Authority - The current committee plan to put this outside the 5 1/2 mills, which the tax payers in my area are not in favor of to begin with, and certainly do not entertain good thoughts about a tax increase to support large parks.

2. The Building Authority - When the Board of Commissioners assumed this responsibility it was done very reluctantly and only because it could be assumed at no tax increase. -- Now you tell the people they'll have to pay for it above the 5 1/2 mills.

3. County Drains - The drains are mainly in Ypsilanti Twp, and my people are not enthusiastic about paying for them at all, least of all by an increase in cost to the entire county. In fact, let's be truthful and agree that Ypsilanti Twp, is alienating themselves with all other county units because of their individualistic demands and this is just one more incident to add to a long list.

Now for the suggested CIP program -

1. Medical Care Facility. Less than 5 years ago we did away with a county operated medical facility because facts presented assured us that our county medically indigent could be better cared for, and much less expensively to the County. Not one of my constituents have complained to me about this plan and I have no facts to show that a government operated facility is wise at this time -- yet your committee is ready to fund such a facility. There needs to be a long hard look given to this with much citizen input before such plans are formulated.

Maybe you think that as an experienced Republican Commissioner, I do not know how such plans get promoted. -- I do know. It is because the committee head is drawing up the plan, the balance of his committee is agreeing with the plan without understanding or perhaps without even an opportunity to review the plans and then you try to shove it down the throats of all commissioners and county resident -- without divulging pros & cons.

It may well be we can go along with the idea of a new jail but we must know what is needed - cost, size and location. If it can be proven that we need additional office space and court rooms it might be well to consider a county-city building. A Ypsilanti Service Center may be needed but plans are so vague without size - cost and location, and the agreements with the City of Ypsilanti that I must give it much thought.

Why do you allow a committee head to do all the planning and in effect be a committee unto himself, because the dominate regime of commissioners are so inexperienced and so "hungry" for self authority that they do not know how to work together as a team, (call it a committee or team as you will.) This is not only seen in the suggested C.I.P. plans but in all phases of the current Board of Commissioners in the handling of county government. This is vividly illustrated in the appointments of various boards and commissions when none of the outlying area residents were appointed to these positions. By this discrimination our Boards or Commissions will certainly not be responsive to the total county. It is bad enough that nearly every minority person previously appointed has dropped out of service for one reason or another, but now without outer county representation and only one political party being represented, the county boards and commissions are made up in a discriminatory manner and will be of little value to anyone.

The committee engaged in appointing county residents to serve on these boards and commissions should have one goal and that is to "appoint individuals who will better the effectiveness of

county government through their participation and interest." This of course includes returning to their communities and encouraging support of the people to the programs that they have helped formulate. If only one or two units of the county are represented you cannot expect all units to support your cause.

The same goal for the appointment of personnel to administrative positions in county government should be applied. Since January 1, 1973 several top level positions have been created, funded and filled and already over half of them have resigned. Their hiring and leaving is another example of the ruthless inexperienced handling done by the dominate regime. None of the young men were qualified by experience to handle the responsibilities of their job, nor could they cope with the same weaknesses found in the retiring party -- similar comings & goings can be anticipated if changes do not occur. What the county needs, and more pointedly, what the Board of Commissioners need is more experienced people who are willing to work as a team for better government, despite what they call themselves politically.

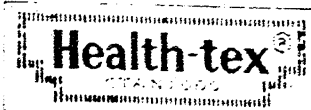

## INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE

The Internal Revenue Service has completed a survey of 602 retail gasoline dealers in Michigan and found approximately 93 percent of the stations operating in full compliance of Economic Stabilization Program Regulations.

According to IRS District Director, Thomas A. Cardoza, those dealers whose prices exceeded the guidelines voluntarily rolled back to the legal ceiling twice established by the Cost of Living Council. The District has received and investigated 85 complaints of alleged unlawful increases of retail gasoline prices.

Gasoline dealers are now allowed to raise prices to the May 15, 1973 level plus wholesale cost increases through September 27, 1973. Any such increases incurred after September 27, 1973 may be passed on to the customer only if an exception to the Regulations is secured from the IRS, Cardoza said.

The IRS has the authority to grant exceptions of less than one cent per gallon. Exception requests of one cent

or more also are filed with the IRS, but are forwarded to the Cost of Living Council for approval or denial.

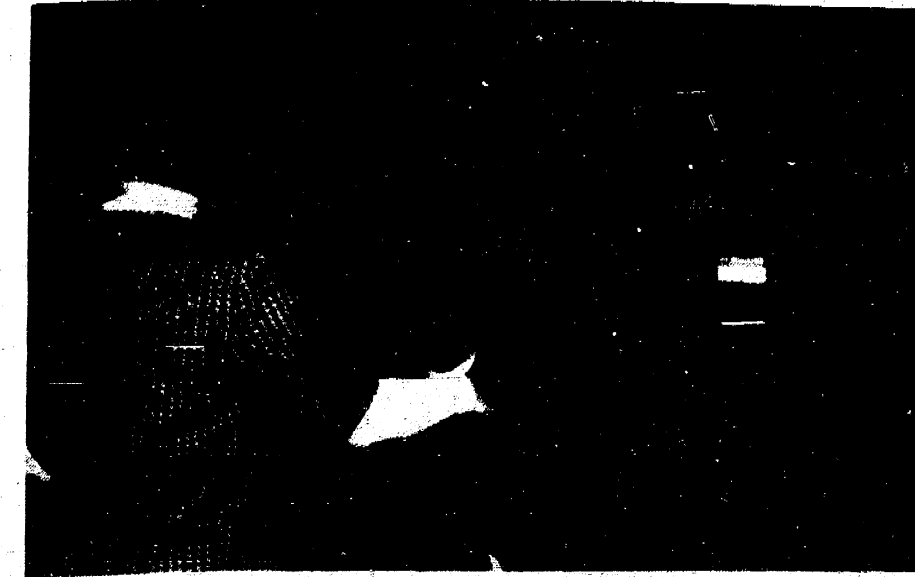

It sometimes surprises city folks to discover that farmers think a lot about what goes on beyond their acres. They keep up with international trade legislation and whether Secretary of State Henry Kissinger arranges formal diplomatic relations between China and the U.S. during his Peking tour. Such relations, farmers know, could mean more of those corn sales and perhaps another market for soybeans... and who knows what else?

If today's farmer is concerned about his local weather forecast, he is also concerned about weather conditions in other parts of the country and the world, since they affect him and his operation, too.

He keeps an eye on the growing rail crisis of the Northeast where a number of important rail lines are in big financial trouble. Fifty percent of this nation's gross product lies in this area, and the things farmers need and the things they produce are involved.

Farmers worry about the energy crisis, the scant supplies of natural and LP gas for grain drying. They realize that natural gas is the raw material for ammonia, and that ammonia is the raw material for nitrogen fertilizer. Further, the government's program of mandatory allocation of propane gas only solves

the immediate problem and does so at the expense of getting us more engaged in government edicts and actual rationing.

It's a growing list of problems that today's farmers face and they realize that it takes their own direct personal interest to find the best solutions. During this time of year, they take time from their work to identify these problems and to figure out the best ways to solve them.

They do this through personal involvement in studying the issues, in attending Farm Bureau policy development meetings, by speaking up in those meetings and stressing their concerns. And they do more than just worry and study; they formulate policies and action programs to solve their problems.

It's a grass-roots system in action and farmers look way beyond the horizons of their farm property lines as they tackle their list of concerns. They look at what's happening at the county seat, the state capitol, and also in Washington, Peking, and Moscow. They know their future depends upon their willingness to get involved-- wherever the action is.

## JV's Romp Over Sand Creek 68-0

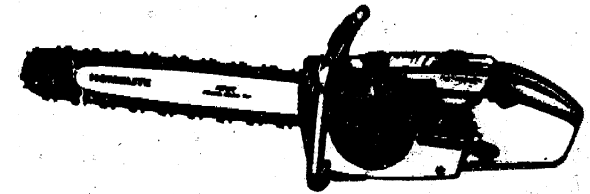

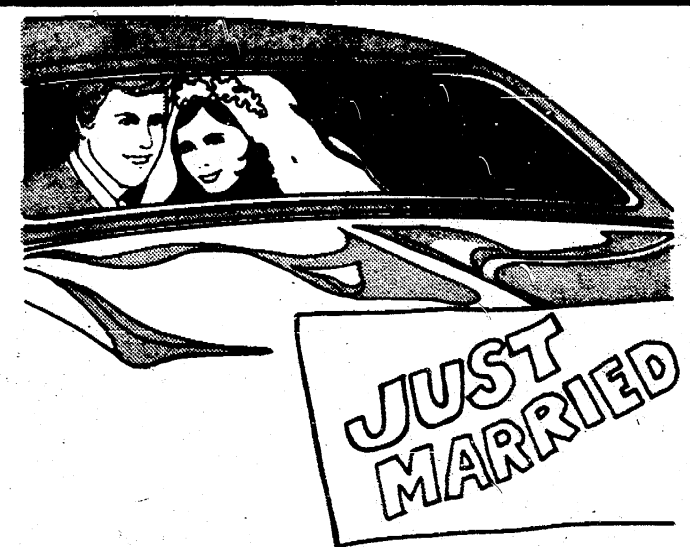

The Dutchmen were running with a completely healthy and injury free team for the first time this season and the Dutchmen needed every man as they took the title with 51 points to runner-up Danville's 57.

Although Sophomore Dan Schablie and Senior John Roberts didn't figure in Manchester's total they helped push up the others teams scores as they finished 23rd (17:53) and 33rd (18:55) respectively in the 1.20 runner field.

It's been quite sometime since any Dutch team has won a State/Regional Championship in any sport so the Cross-Country team can feel justifiably proud.

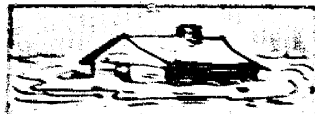

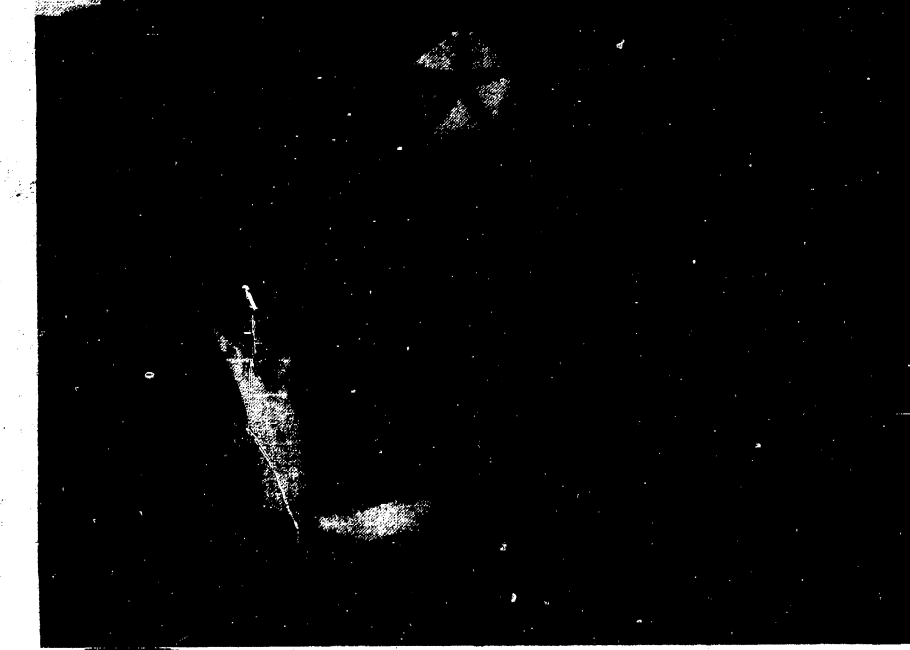

## Ratify Salary Pact

A two year salary agreement between the Manchester Education Association and the Board of Education has been ratified by both organizations. The new pact provides a 3 1/2% increase over the annual increment and full family hospitalization benefits for the 1973-74 school year. The 1974-75 increase will be based on the cost of living increase as determined by the Consumers Price Index as published by the Bureau of Labor.
