

Why is a favorable balance of trade important to the urban housewife who was angered by headlines which tagged her as a "loser"? Because foreign currency obtained from world trade allows the U.S. to buy products in short supply here-such as petroleum products. Our country suffers from a serious balance of trade problem now, but it would be much worse if it weren't for a highly productive, export oriented agriculture.

Consumers may pay a little more for their food, but they'll be paying less for other products because of a growing world food demand -- and the U.S. farmer's ability and freedom to meet that demand. It's a bit more sophisti-
