KNOW YOUR MICHIGAN LAW

While Michigan law does not require a person to have a will, expensive litigation and tax problems can be the result if you die without one. In addition, difficulties may arise for survivors if no will has been drafted.

The fee for having a proper will drawn up is minimal compared to the possible costs if there is no will, or an improper will is written. A well-drafted document can take care of the immediate needs of the heirs, and at the same time result in tax savings and reduced legal

Anyone wanting to avoid unnecessary complications -- whether his estate is large or small--should consult an attorney for advice and direction in the preparation, drafting and execution of his will. He should also carefully select the person to administer his estate, carry out his final directions, and dispose of his assets. Perhaps the executor might be a member of the family, an attorney, a long-time friend, or a trust division in a financial

institution. A well-drafted document, and a competent executor guided by an attorney, will insure a minimal amount of problems in settling the estate. In addition, this will cut down on difficulties with creditors, at the underprivileged pig. Question: How can a dentist tell a tooth is dead? Does he have to drill to find out? J.M.

Answer: As a rule, it is not necssary to drill a tooth to determine if it a "dead" tooth. In fact, some patients have such a high threshold of pain (the point when they say something hurts or uncomfortable) that they do not particlarly notice even when a nerve is exosed during drilling. This is particularly true in older people.

Probably the simplest test as to thether the nerve or pulp of a tooth is dead is to apply hot or cold to the tooth. An ice cube may be used-and if it produces pain when held on the tooth for a few moments, it is a fairly good indication the nerve is alive. Similarly, heat produces a response when applied to a ooth, but in this instance one mus not onclude the nerve is alive, because if t is partially dead, or if there are gasroducing organisms in the root canal

ery likely there will be pain produced. Probably the most accurate way to etermine if the pulp of a tooth is dead alive, is for the dentist to use an electric "Pulp Tester". This is an instrument which delivers a low voltage, regulated electric shock to the tooth. The dentist touches the tooth in question with a snall tube, something about the size of a pencil. The tooth is wet, in order to get good contact, and the dentist adjusts slowly the amount of electric current applied to the tooth, until the patient feels a twinge of pain, or until the tooth feels warm. There is a gauge which the dentist reads, to tell how much

turrent is required to produce the pain. The same procedure is followed. applying the current to one or more different teeth which appear to be norma and a comparison between the current readings is made. For example, if the readings for the normal teeth are 2 or 3 or 4, and the questionable tooth registers o response until 14 or 15, or perhaps no conse at all to the current, we conclude pulp is dying or dead. Now it would

probably follow that the dentist would irill the tooth, entering into the pulp hamber and sealing in some medication as the first step in a root canal filling

Pulp testing by the electric instrument is also usually done when an individual, particularly a child, sustains a severe blow to the teeth. In such a case however, if the testing is done within a few hours after the accident, we do not expect the tooth to register its normal esponse. The test is given in order to ompare the tooth's response after a period of time, because the shock of the slow may just numb the nerve, and it may return to normal in due time.
