## Fire Damages Home



The Manchester Fire Department responded to a call at 3:00 p.m. Monday afternoon. An enclosed porch of the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Ross had caught fire from a spark from an ash container. Fire Chief Kensler estimated the damages at over \$1000. Damages included the porch floor and rug, porch wall and extensive smoke damage to interior.

## Manchester Family Service Report

Each year Manchester Family Service is instrumental in directing the community's desire to help the less fortunate. This year 16 senior citizens, and 23 families including 63 children were remembered. The Department of Social Services, the Washtenaw County Health Department, local churches and civic groups were the sources of the names of the recipients.

Many people assisted the agency with preparation, collection, and distribution of supplies. The FFA and Girl Scout Cadette Troup Number 186 did a fabulous job of collecting the provisions for the grocery boxes for the families. Over 700 items were collected on the night of the Scavenger Hunt. These were delivered to the Catholic Church basement where the committee boxed them for pick-up on December 22.

The Kieger School grocery-store-project also helped fill this need. Candy was provided by the Optimist Club. Dolls, toys, hand crocheted slippers, tams, scarves, mittens, games and even Christmas trees and many other things were donated by concerned citizens to add Christmas cheer for each of the 120 people on the list.

On the 13th of December the Emanuel Church of Christ opened a Clothing Shop for the families. Sixteen of them, representing 46 children were able to attend before the pre-Christmas snow storm brought activity to a halt.

Since the list provided by the County included some families in Manchester Township outside the Manchester School District, the Salvation Army took care of the costs for that portion of the project which was otherwise handled by Manchester Family Service. In addition to this, the Manchester Community Chest, churches, groups and individuals assisted with financial aid.

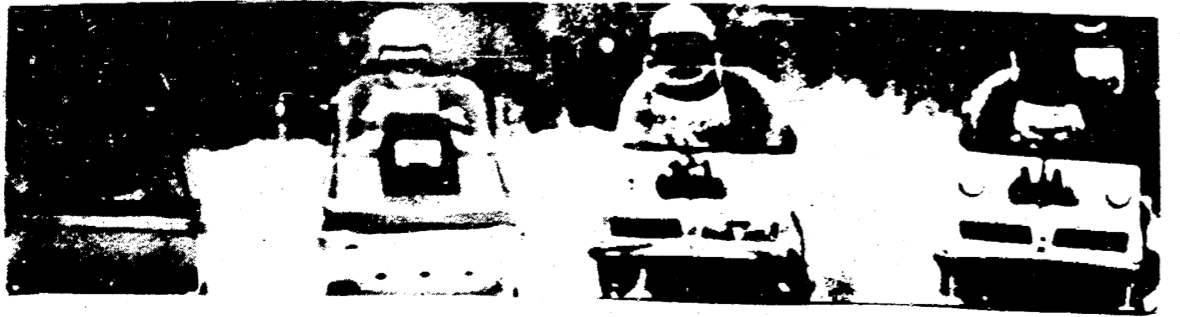

Suppose you want to fish for pike. You know his feeding habits and at what depths and over what kind of bottom he would be. ### CUT HOME SEWING COSTS

Higher fabric prices have both home sewer and clothing manufacturer considering ways to cut costs, says Bernetta Kahabka, extension clothing specialist at Michigan State University.

"The availability and price of natural and manmade fibers to be processed into fabrics are key factors in the economics of home sewing," the specialist explains. "And when fibers are scarce

and demand is high, prices per yard of fabric go up accordingly. Sewing then costs more for both the clothing manufacturer and the home sewer."

Linings, interlinings, interfacing, trim or accessories needed for your garment also add to the total cost of a finished product.

So when fabric is scarce and high in price, cut costs by making adjustments like these: Substitute a less expensive fabric in pocket linings. Make styles which use fewer garment pieces. Elim-

inate flaps, extra trims, and cuffs or make false cuffs. Use less interfacing and lining.

Your best bet to make real savings in home sewing is to use uncomplicated patterns, Miss Kahabka says. Simpler styles usually don't require as many extras and may take less time to sew. So you make a double savings.

# COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

December 17, 1973

Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:10 pm. Present were Benedict, Daniels, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Scully, Stautz, Thomas and Walton. Minutes from the December 8, 1973 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Scully, supported by Fitzgerald. All yeas, carried.

Fitzgerald reviewed activities of the DPW. Over 200 cu. yds. of fill have been hauled to Kirk Park to cover leaves from the curbside pickup. The tops of catchbasins have been cleaned. The doors of the rest rooms at Carr Park have been replaced with plywood due to the destruction and vandalism of the previous doors. Bruce Daniels met with the State Auditor and reviewed accounting of the Act 51 monies; he also met with the State Health Water Division regarding cross connections and a suggested ordinance on that matter. The brush has been cut on the railroad area. Snow and ice removal consumed two days time.

Fitzgerald conveyed several requests that the Christmas decorations be lit from December 19 to December 26. Mahony suggested that this would not be in keeping with what the National Government has requested. Moved by Fitzgerald, supported by Walton that the pole decorations be lit from December 19 to December 26 and unplugged if requested to do so for any reason during that period. Yeas: Benedict, Fitzgerald, Scully, Stautz, Walton; nay: Mahony.

A letter of complaint to the Attorney General from Joseph Catalana and the subsequent answer by Chief Thomas were discussed.

Scully and Thomas reported that Tom Marshall Ford had a bid of \$3,507.20 for the 400 cu. in. engine, the size comparable to that of the other bidders. Tom Marshall Ford was awarded the bid for the new police car. The additional amount of \$550.00 is for air-conditioning bringing the total to \$3,557.20.

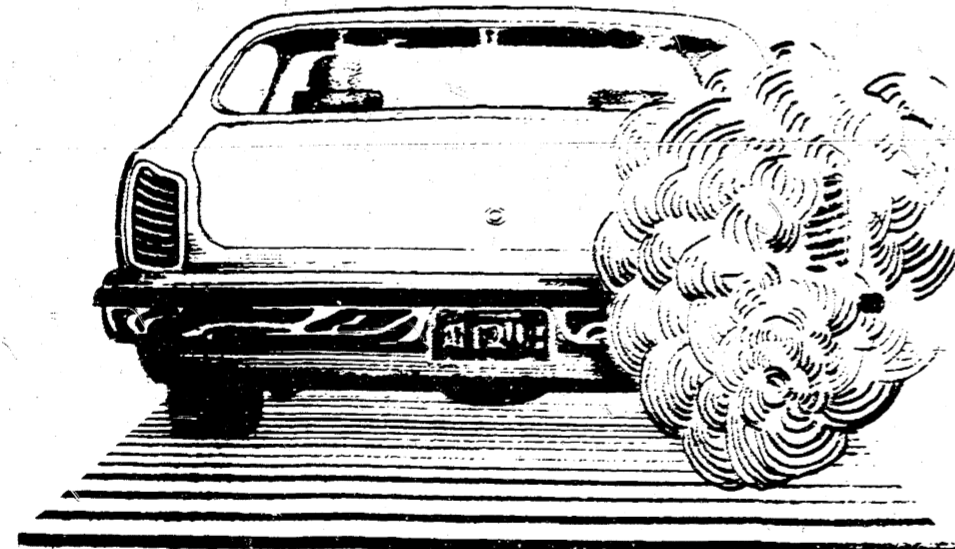

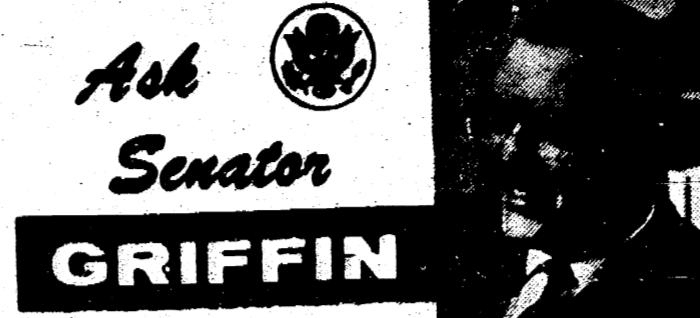

None of my older brothers or sisters went to college, mainly because my folks couldn't afford to send them. Now I'm a junior in high school with good grades, and I'm determined to go to college. Do you have any advice? —S.T., Mt. Clemens

First, I recommend that you confer with your high school counselor or principal. They will be able to put you in touch with admission directors and financial aid officers at colleges you are interested in attending.

I suggest you write to the Scholarship Service of the College Entrance Board, 888 Seventh Avenue, New York, New York 10010 for detailed information and forms which will be useful in applying for scholarships and other student aid. For information about financial assistance available under federal government programs, write to Student Aids, U.S. Office of Education, Washington, D.C. 20202, and request a copy of "More Education—More Opportunities." There is no charge for this publication. Finally, lots of luck to you, keep working hard, and don't get discouraged!

Now that I have earned my high school equivalency diploma, I want to attend a vocational school so I can get a good skilled job. But I'm confused about how to tell the difference between a good vocational school and a bad one. Does the government have anything to help a guy in my situation? —T.M., Detroit

Yes! You will be interested in a new publication entitled "Guidebook to Select a Vocational School," prepared by the Federal Trade Commission. ## GIRL SCOUT COUNCIL NEWS

Facilities at Camp Crawford, the 10-acre campsite owned by the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council, will undergo renovations costing nearly \$10,000 during the winter, it was announced today by Council President, Mrs. Louis Galan.

Camp Crawford, located on Crane Road between Willis and Bemis Roads in southeastern Washtenaw County, is used by area Girl Scouts primarily for primitive camping in tents pitched on the ground and daytime activities such as hiking, outdoor cooking, ecology projects and the like.

Among the improvements slated are fencing and posting camp boundaries, expanded lavatory facilities, repairing and painting two open shelters, and repaving the entrance road and parking lot. Money for the renovation will come from Girl Scout Cookie Sale profits.

A volunteer committee composed of Girl Scouts and Camp Crawford neighbors will do some of the repair work and watch over the property. A petition signed by 13 Camp Crawford neighbors

asking that the Council retain its ownership of the land and volunteering to assist with its maintenance was received recently by the Council Board of Directors.

Camp Crawford is available for use by all Girl Scouts in the Huron Valley Council area which includes Washtenaw, Livingston, western Wayne and northern Monroe counties.

Other Huron Valley Council camps are the 400-acre Camp Linden in Livingston County near Linden which has 10 buildings and other facilities for resident camping, as well as primitive camping, and the 7-acre Camp Hilltop on North Main Street in Ann Arbor which has a single troop house and is used primarily for day camping.
