School Board To Ask For New Facilities In The Spring

The Manchester Board of Education will be asking for citizen's approval of a new addition to the Luther C. Klager Elementary School sometime in late March or early April. At the same time the Board will also be asking the district's residents to approve a new athletic field on the Klager site.

With the district's elementary classneed for additional elementary classrooms Also, if the new rooms are approved the fifth grade students presently housed in the Middle School will be transferred to the Klager School thus permitting the sixth, seventh and eighth grades to grow n the Middle School.

The proposed building addition consists of ten classrooms, an all purpose coom to be used mainly as a gymnasium an additional kindergarten room and emodeling within the existing building to provide space for additional library cilities and art and music.

Several years ago a start was made on a new football field and track facility. Rough grading for these areas was made cossible with funds from the Manchester Chicken Broil Project. Since that time

a number of people have petitioned the Board of Education to complete this project, consequently the Board decided to place it on a ballot in order that the people of the district might have an opportunity to decide on this facility.

Indications from the school district's onding attorney show that both the classroom additions and the new athletic field coms filled to capacity there is an urgent can be accomplished with a small amount of millage. It is estimated that both ropositions can be completed for appromately 1.9 mills of additional levy. The total debt retirement levy for the district at the present time is 3,27 mills and this amount will decrease on the

At the present time the Board is nviting organizations within the district o provide representatives to serve on a citizen's advisory committee. The purpose of this committee will be to help the Board relate its needs and plans to he community.





Bread has long been the symbol of freedom from hunger. It's been called the staff of life; we petition for it in the Lord's Prayer, and one writer included it in his description of paradise: "...a jug of wine, a loaf of bread and thou..."

So basic is bread to our daily lives that it's small wonder consumers react with alarm to threats of "\$1,00a loaf bread." Consumers aren't the only ones alarmed by the forecast; farmers are also concerned, but for different reasons.

For many years, farmers were plagued with the problem of surplus production; subsidies were paid to curtail farm production. Then, a growing world demand for food caused a sudden turnabout of that situation. Given the freedom to respond to market demand, American agriculture set new marks in crop production and broke records with \$12.9 billion in farm

The irrational \$1.00 a loaf bread forecast was made (by those unwilling to compete in the market place) to force government restrictions on exports. Farmers fear that such action would endanger the markets they have worked for years to obtain -- and have a devastating effect on the national economy. Decisionmakers in Washington, who have a record of acting on emotion rather that facts, have replaced the weather as farmers' principal worry. So often, the decisions made are based on fear for political lives, and cheap food, politicians believe, will net more votes than concern for future food production or maintaining a favorable

Not only is foreign trade economically healthy for everyone concerned--including consumers who are a ble to purchase products in short supply here and pay less for those things which can be produced cheaper elsewhere in the world--it also is a cultivator for improving relations with other countries.

Farmers hope that consumers will not allow themselves to be "used" by those who resort to irresponsible, unfounded forecasts such as \$1.00 a loaf bread to force export restrictions. Remaining free to compete in the world market is vital to a healthy, productive

ENERGY CRISIS INCREASES NEED FOR

One result of the energy crisis move daylight saving time on January 6 is that thousands of Michigan workers and school children are on the streets and roads in pre-dawn darkness when visibilit

Unless safety patrollers and other oungsters take steps to make themselves easily seen in the dark, they increase he risk of becoming pedestrian fatalities

According to Dr. Jack A. Bergstrom resident, Michigan Optometric Assoc., a simple and effective way for parents o increase their child's ability to be seen in darkness is to decorate safety patrol equipment and clothing with flectorized material.

He suggested that safety patrol belts and flags be trimmed with reflective fabric or tape for brilliant nighttime visibility. Optometric studies have hown that only pedestrians wearing reflectorized clothing or material are afely visible to drivers at all speeds.

Circling the sleeves of a child's acket or coat with a band of reflective abric or tape will help drivers see the oungster walking to school along streets and roads. The fabric will light up orightly in auto headlights and increase isibility from front, side and rear.

Sew-on reflective material is availble in sewing and notion departments of major department stores and in most fabric stores and reflective tape is available in most bicycle shops and notion departments, making it convenient for parents to convert regular jackets into reflective ones, Dr. Bergstrom said.


