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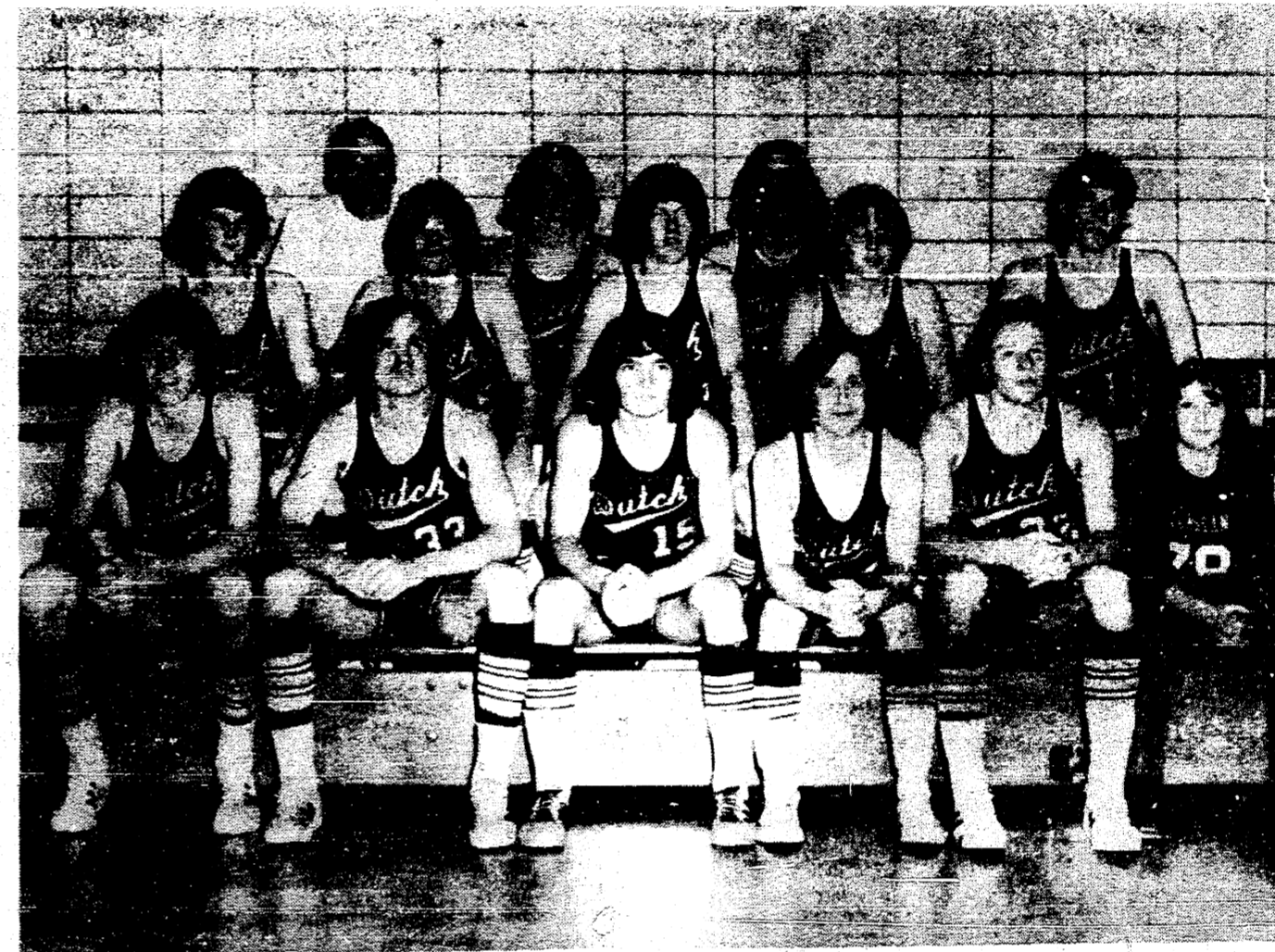

Manchester Dutch Number 1

This week saw the Flying Dutchmen take on another league opponent, both the Onsted Wildcats and Manchester are tied for the first spot in the conference with Addison. The Dutch met the challenge and crushed the Wildcats, 84-66.

The Dutch had a hot hand in the first period scoring 21 points. Both Dean Decker and Rich Kennedy scored 6 points while Scott Gormley drove the lane time and time again sinking baskets for a 9 point total. The score at the end of the first period was Manchester-21, Onsted 16. The key player of the second period was Bruce Cray as he played tenacious defense stealing the ball and on offense dumped in 12 points, helping in a 40-32 Dutch lead at half time. Starting the third period, Onsted controlled the jump ball (for the first time) but this turned out to be the only thing the Wildcats could do right. The Dutch had turnover upon turnover partly caused by the Dutchmen's scrappy defense. Kennedy, Gormley, Decker and Cray each sank 6 points and Steve Beach added 2 points but grabbed some important rebounds. The third period signified the downfall of Onsted with the score reading Dutch-66, Wildcats-42. As Manchester gathered in the jump in the fourth period, the Dutch kept up the fast break enlarging their lead, 1 minute 57 seconds having elapsed, the Dutch had scored 10 more points so Coach Schick started letting the second string play. Their performance was of course sloppy but did produce some scoring as Paul Tassie led the benches with 5 points. The sound of the final buzzer was a blessing for the Wildcats.

Cray was unstoppable as he scored 22 points and was tied for hi-rebounder with Decker, 6 each. Gormley played second in scoring to Cray by tallying 19 points, matching 5 rebounds. Kennedy and Decker rounded out the Dutch bal-

anced scoring attack with 17 points and 14 points respectively. Manchester handled the ball well having only 8 turnovers to Onsted 24.

The Little Dutch easily defeated Onsted, 72-52.

On Friday, January 25, the Dutchmen take on the Grass Lake team (in Grass Lake) for the second time this season. The first meeting will be long remembered as the Dutch opened their season by running over Grass Lake, 81-27. I'm sure Grass Lake would like to redeem themselves by upsetting the

Dutchmen. Grass Lake has a league record of 0 wins and 6 losses. The Manchester J.V. team will be looking for revenge as the Grass Lake J.V.'s beat the Little Dutch by 1 point in the final seconds of the November contest.

As you know Manchester was tied for the Conference lead with Onsted and Addison. Well, Manchester took care of Onsted and thanks go to Hudson for upsetting Addison. Now our Dutchmen are in sole possession of first place in the Lenawee County Conference.

School Board To Ask For New Facilities In The Spring

The Manchester Board of Education will be asking for citizen's approval of a new addition to the Luther C. Klager Elementary School sometime in late March or early April. At the same time the Board will also be asking the district's residents to approve a new athletic field on the Klager site.

With the district's elementary classrooms filled to capacity there is an urgent need for additional elementary classrooms. Also, if the new rooms are approved the fifth grade students presently housed in the Middle School will be transferred to the Klager School thus permitting the sixth, seventh and eighth grades to grow in the Middle School.

The proposed building addition consists of ten classrooms, an all purpose room to be used mainly as a gymnasium, an additional kindergarten room and remodeling within the existing building to provide space for additional library facilities and art and music.

Several years ago a start was made on a new football field and track facility. Rough grading for these areas was made possible with funds from the Manchester Chicken Broil Project. Since that time

a number of people have petitioned the Board of Education to complete this project, consequently the Board decided to place it on a ballot in order that the people of the district might have an opportunity to decide on this facility.

Indications from the school district's bonding attorney show that both the classroom additions and the new athletic field can be accomplished with a small amount of millage. It is estimated that both propositions can be completed for approximately 1.9 mills of additional levy. The total debt retirement levy for the district at the present time is 3.27 mills and this amount will decrease on the next levy.

At the present time the Board is inviting organizations within the district to provide representatives to serve on a citizen's advisory committee. The purpose of this committee will be to help the Board relate its needs and plans to the community.

The Kingscott Architectural Firm who designed the original Klager School is also working with the Board on these two projects.

Genetic counseling and medical research are some of the modern means used to combat birth defects. Intensive care also is offered to the critically ill newborn child.

March of Dimes and its marching mothers remind us all that birth defects are forever--unless we help.

WORKSHOP SESSION

The Workshop session of the Manchester Board of Education was held on January 7, 1974. All members and Superintendent Swartz were present.

President Klager called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m.

A new layout for the Klager School Addition developed by Eugene Bentschneider was brought before the Board. After some discussion it was recommended that the plans be submitted to the architect for cost estimates and consideration.

Don Walter moved that the school district submit the necessary building application to the Department of Education for their approval. This was supported by Lou Vogel and passed unanimously.

Reno Feldkamp moved that the Board include the new athletic field in the application request and to submit this project to the voters the same time they ask for additional classrooms. Eugene Bentschneider supported this motion and it was passed unanimously.

Plans were made for an advisory building committee.

The use of school facilities by outside groups was discussed. Due to the fuel shortage and additional costs it is necessary to curtail activities. The school gymnasium will be available to outside groups on Monday evenings only from the time the school programs per-

mit until 10:00 p.m.
Reservations for the county school officer's association dinner meeting were made.

BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING

The regular January meeting of the Board of Education was held on January 14, 1974 in the high school library. All members were present as were Superintendent Swartz and Principals Koceski, Tapping McGuire and Tassie. Also, Brooks Godfrey representing the Kingscott Architectural Firm was present to review plans and specifications.

President Klager called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m.

Inasmuch as the financial report and the monthly bills will be taken care of at the monthly work session, these items were dispensed with and President Klager invited Brooks Godfrey to lead the discussion on the building plans and the proposed athletic field.

Mr. Godfrey first presented the plans and estimated cost figures on the athletic field. An extensive discussion followed with many questions being raised. After a thorough review of the plans and estimates, Reno Feldkamp moved to accept the plans of the proposed athletic field as changed by the recommendations. Don Walter supported the motion and the Board passed it unanimously.

A long discussion was held on the proposed Klager addition with Brooks reviewing the plan presented by Eugene Bentschneider. After some discussion it was decided to use the original plan submitted by the architects with a possible change in the location of the kindergarten room. This plan totals a bonding issue of \$750,000.00. It was moved by Eugene Bentschneider and supported by Louis Vogel to accept this plan for presentation to the State Department of Education for approval. Motion carried unanimously.

Superintendent Swartz recommended that Mr. and Mrs. Keutz be appointed to the Washtenaw County Parent Advisory Committee for Special Education. Lou Vogel moved, supported by Don Walter, that this appointment be made. Passed unanimously.

Don Walter moved that the checks for the Building Trades Program be approved for payment. Andy Luchhardt supported this motion and it was passed unanimously.

At this point the principals were excused and Superintendent Swartz was

asked to give an evaluation of their workshop as well as to join in with the beginners. Partners are not required for a single adults. A donation is asked to help pay expenses; however, there is no charge for spectators. Classes will remain open for three Tuesday nights. Ken Fellows of Eaton Rapids, Michigan will be the Instructor and Caller.

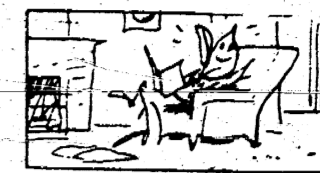
EASTERN MICHIGAN UNIVERSITY NEWS

The total enrollment figure for the 1973 winter semester was 17,690 but present enrollment in the graduate school shows an increase of 125.

There are now 8,766 men and 8,312 women studying at Eastern. Included are 2,937 freshmen, 3,075 sophomores, 3,077 juniors and 3,915 seniors. Students studying for specialist's degrees total 109.



There have been more and more newspaper articles lately about that metric system, which is supposed to replace our measuring system of inches, miles, yards, pounds, etc. Who's going to get excited about a Miss America with measurements of 80-60-80 centimeters? Are we actually converting to that foreign system?

It's interesting how you have mastered the metric system as it relates to vital statistics. Football fans might have more difficulty when the announcer says "Greg Landry threw a 45 meter touchdown pass" (approximately 50 yards).

In the last Congress the Senate passed a bill to convert to the metric system over a ten-year period. However, no action was taken in the House of Representatives. Nevertheless, the issue is very much alive in this session of Congress and proposals have been introduced in the Senate and House. It is noteworthy that the United States is the only industrial nation in the world which does not use the metric system.

If a bet was on I'm afraid your husband wins this one. Under the Constitution as originally adopted, the two U.S. Senators who represented each state were selected by the State Legislature. In 1913, the Constitution was amended to provide for direct election of U.S. Senators by the people.

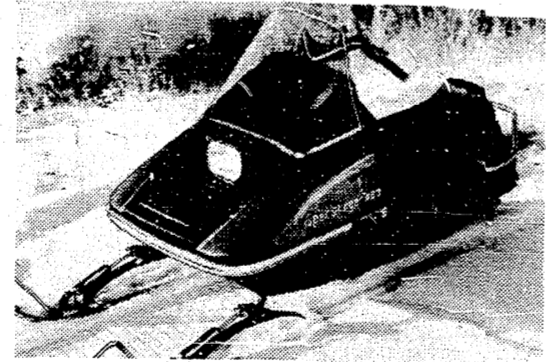
I'm writing a paper for my civics class based on my visit to Washington last month. During a tour of the Capitol our guide mentioned that the original House and Senate chambers were burned by the British. Is that true?

You are referring to one of the most embarrassing and fascinating chapters in the history of the Capitol. On August 24, 1814, the Old House and Senate Wings of the Capitol building were set afire by British soldiers who had landed on the shore at Patuxent, Maryland, and then captured the City of Washington. As the story goes, British Admiral Cockburn stood in the Speaker's chair in the U.S. House of Representatives and cried: "Shall this harbor of Yankee democracy be burned?" Agriculture in action

Michigan Farm Bureau

Bread has long been the symbol of freedom from hunger. It's been called the staff of life; we petition for it in the Lord's Prayer, and one writer included it in his description of paradise: "... a jag of wine, a loaf of bread and thou..."

So basic is bread to our daily lives that it's small wonder consumers react with alarm to threats of "\$1.00 loaf bread." Consumers aren't the only ones alarmed by the forecast; farmers are also concerned, but for different reasons.

For many years, farmers were plagued with the problem of surplus production; subsidies were paid to curtail farm production. Then, a growing world demand for food caused a sudden turnabout of that situation. Given the freedom to respond to market demand, American agriculture set new marks in crop production and broke records with \$12.9 billion in farm exports.

The irrational \$1.00 a loaf bread forecast was made (by those unwilling to compete in the market place) to force government restrictions on exports. Farmers fear that such action would endanger the national economy. Decision-makers in Washington, who have a record of acting on emotion rather than facts, have replaced the weather as farmers' principal worry. So often, the decisions made are based on fear for political lives, and cheap food, politicians believe, will net more votes than concern for future food production or maintaining a favorable balance of trade.

Not only is foreign trade economically healthy for everyone concerned—including consumers who are able to purchase products in short supply here and pay less for those things which can be produced cheaper elsewhere in the world—it also is a cultivator for improving relations with other countries.

Farmers hope that consumers will not allow themselves to be "used" by those who resort to irresponsible, unfounded forecasts such as \$1.00 a loaf bread to force export restrictions. Remaining free to compete in the world market is vital to a healthy, productive agriculture.

Bread is the symbol of freedom from

hunger—and the price tag on that symbolic bread does not read: \$1.00 a loaf. The price is an unchained agriculture which makes that freedom from hunger a reality.

ENERGY CRISIS INCREASES NEED FOR VISIBILITY

One result of the energy crisis move to daylight saving time on January 6 is that thousands of Michigan workers and school children are on the streets and roads in pre-dawn darkness when visibility is poor.

Unless safety patrolters and other youngsters take steps to make themselves easily seen in the dark, they increase the risk of becoming pedestrian fatalities or injuries.

According to Dr. Jack A. Bergstrom, president, Michigan Optometric Assoc., a simple and effective way for parents to increase their child's ability to be seen in darkness is to decorate safety patrol equipment and clothing with reflectorized material.

He suggested that safety patrol belts and flags be trimmed with reflective fabric or tape for brilliant nighttime visibility. Optometric studies have shown that only pedestrians wearing reflectorized clothing or material are safely visible to drivers at all speeds.

Circling the sleeves of a child's jacket or coat with a band of reflective fabric or tape will help drivers see the youngster walking to school along streets and roads. The fabric will light up brightly in auto headlights and increase visibility from front, side and rear.

Sew-on reflective material is available in sewing and notion departments of major department stores and in most fabric stores and reflective tape is available in most bicycle shops and notion departments, making it convenient for parents to convert regular jackets into reflective ones, Dr. Bergstrom said.

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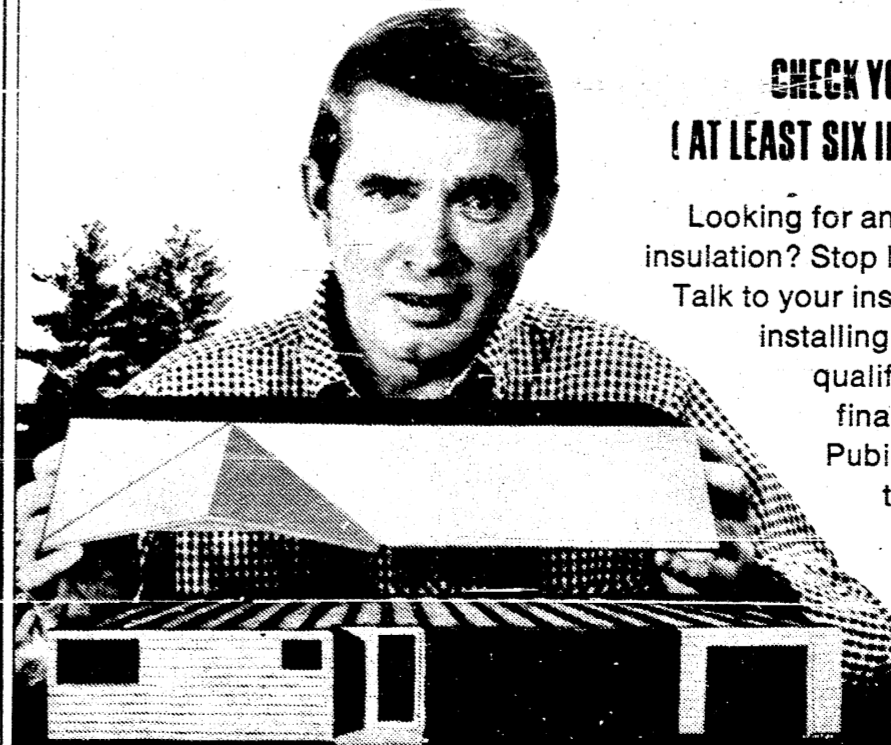
