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#### New Federal Program Underway

ederal government checks circulating round the county since the first of the ear. Early in January the first monthly upplemental Security Income checks ere delivered to former recipients of tate Old-Age Assidtance, Aid to the Disabled, and Aid to the Blind who were

inverted to the new Federal program. Robert A. Kehoe, District Manager f the Social Security Office in Ann Arbo nnounced that the new SSI checks, alough resembling other Federal government checks such as income tax refunds and Social Security checks in shape and ormat, are a bright gold in color.

Some 1,770 former state assistance cipients were automatically converted the new Federal Supplemental Security income program, which replaced the state program, and the Social Security Office is now accepting applications from new individuals over 65, or disabled or blind, who were not receiving state assist

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION, APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 506. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City of Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a signed request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto, and the address from which he was last registered, or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration coads, and shall place the original registration coad in proper precinct file. The applicant for transfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 523 of this act, shall then be permitted to vote in such precinct for that primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City er Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. 
