## Congratulations Regional Champs

You could say the Dutch really muddled thru this one and lucked out in winning. For most of the game the old Dutch snap wasn't there then the beginning 4 minutes of the third period showed improvement as the Dutch jumped to a 10 point lead but preceeded to lose it. The Dutchmen did maintain a 3 point edge and slowly enlarged it to send the Royals back to Blissfield 69-55.

The Regional #17 tournament was played in a huge arena at Jackson Parkside High School. The Dutch controlled the opening tip but fell to hot field shooting from the Royals, 14-12. By the second period the Dutchmen had discovered Blissfield wasn't as easy an opponent as their 10-8 record showed. The Dutch fought the clock to go to the locker room up by 1, 28-27. Rich Kennedy and John Savage kept the Dutch in the game scoring 10 and 8 points respectively. Supersub Scott Evislizer entered in the second period to add 6 points.

I kept waiting for "it" to happen-- "it" being the Dutch offensive explosion. The third period saw the Dutchmen's full court press finally force the Royals into some costly mistakes. Soon the Dutch were sitting back the proud owners of a 10 point lead. But Blissfield couldn't be written off yet as they rallied to close the period 45-41. In the fourth period Blissfield couldn't crack the 3 point mark as the Dutch basketballers traded buckets for awhile then started pulling away, paced by Kennedy's 11 point effort. Savage and Cray added 10 each with Gormley offering 7 points in the second half. Final tally was 69-55.

Kennedy was high tonight hitting long and short for 21 points. Savage had a well balanced game posting 19 counters and grabbed 11 rebounds. Gormley made his first start since breaking his ankle February 16 to toss in 11 and sweep the boards 8 times. Cray and Evislizer had a good night pumping for 10 and 6 points respectively. The powerful Dutchmen just kept rolling, this time sending the Blackhawk home to Leslie. Leslie was the number 8 school in the State but this didn't scare the mighty Dutch. Some say the 3,000 delirious fans were the most to witness a contest in Jackson Parkside, these fans saw Manchester take it to the Blackhawks and come away 71-62 victors to win their first Regional title since 1946.

Manchester had the height and Leslie were small but fast. Leslie controlled the opening tip but not the score. The Dutch took advantage of Leslie's cold field shooting to jump into a 7 point lead, 20-13. In the second period the Dutchmen tied the Blackhawks up in the sense Manchester showed speed and superb ball handling to hold a 13 point lead. The Blackhawks started hitting from the field to close the half down only 6, 36-30. At this point I was feeling pretty good because Leslie hadn't been very impressive. We had broken their press for easy buckets and on offense they were cold. I was soon to discover why Leslie was number eight. Savage got the tip to start the third period then Leslie showed me their class. They just ran and shot so in 3 minutes they captured the lead at 39-38. ## School Board Answers Your Questions

The proposed addition to the Klager Elementary Building is planned to provide one extra classroom for each grade housed in that building Kindergarten through fourth and allow the school district to move the fifth grade students from the Nellie Ackerson Building to the Klager Building. This move would provide room for the Middle School, grades six through eight, to grow in and alleviate the class size problems in this school. With classrooms in the Klager Building and the Middle School filled to the negotiated size or above, it stands to reason that new, additional rooms are needed now for the growth that is coming to the school and to the community.

There are some who feel that extra elementary classrooms, when built, should be added to both the Klager School and the Pleasant Lake School. In other words, if ten new classrooms are built in the district five should be added to each school. Unfortunately, our overall growth pattern and the enrollments in the Pleasant Lake School do not justify this particular plan. Also, of the forty new families who have moved into our school district this current year only seven families were in the area serviced by the Pleasant Lake School. At the present time the need for additional classroom space is in the village schools, both elementary and middle. When the enrollment and the growth in the Pleasant Lake Area warrant additional classrooms at the Pleasant Lake School, the Board will certainly act upon this need.

Because a number of good questions concerning the proposed athletic field have been raised, we would like to respond to them through this newsletter.  
Q. What will the new facility cost the taxpayers?  
A. The total new athletic facility including the football field, all weather track, lights, bleachers, fencing and supporting facilities will cost the district taxpayer forty cents (40¢) a thousand dollars of assessed valuation. A taxpayer with a twenty thousand dollar assessment would pay eight dollars a year or a fraction over two cents (2¢) per day.  
Q. Why can't we remodel the present field?  
A. The present field is already over-taxed for space with the extensive use by middle school gym students. (Approx. 130 each school hour in good weather) It would be impossible to place a running track on this field because of the placement of the baseball diamond, the softball diamond and the refreshment building. To improve the football field as it should be improved would require relocating the present ball diamond and the existing light poles. This is not feasible nor practical without additional land. This is not available in this area.  
Q. Why is a track necessary to our athletic program?

**LETTERS TO THE EDITOR**



This letter is written in reference to the two articles in the March 14 issue of the Enterprise regarding the proposed athletic field and track.

I agree the field does get hard usage, but why should hard use ruin it? There is sufficient time at the end of the baseball program to get the field in shape for the football season. Yes, it does take a good maintenance program, and I think that should be the responsibility of our athletic director. I understand that in past years a portion of the infield on the softball diamond was sodded each fall. Why isn't this done now? I also think it is common knowledge that our athletic field is cleaned up and mowed completely once a year—at Chicken Broil time. Now, just how could we maintain two facilities when one can't be maintained properly?

I would also like to know who authorized the School Board to spend \$10,000.00 in 1966 on the site behind Klager School? Regarding the track—yes, it would be nice if we had one, but let's check out some other possibilities first for the site. Is there room behind the high school? There we already have lockers,

rest rooms and parking facilities. Would there be room on the present athletic field if we moved the baseball diamond behind the high school? The cost would be much less than what is proposed. Let's look into these ideas before we vote for a complete new facility.

I am aware of the fact the schools are not responsible for the economic conditions existing today; however, people have reached their limit on high taxes, and if we are the ones getting by with less to meet these higher demands, then I think the schools should do the same.

*Another Taxpayer's viewpoint*

To the Editor:

In a recent public meeting at the Pleasant Lake School, a number of questions were directed to the School Board regarding their proposed expansion of \$1,000,000.

I came away from the meeting not convinced that this much building is needed. Consider the following:

- The birth rate is drastically down.
- There are fewer children per family.
- The Board was unable to advise how many children in the district from 0 through 4 years of age (School census no longer taken.)
- We were told that past records indicated enough new families to warrant expansion, but that is all past performance and does not take into account that: (a) The low tax inducement to move is no longer here. (b) There is no new industry to offer more jobs. (c) The high cost of gas to work would discourage families from moving in. (d) The Board could not indicate if new homes being built had children or not (e) What would be the affect of the proposed parochial school for Sharon Township?

Also, were mobile school rooms considered to alleviate the present "squeeze"? This would be a considerable saving in taxes and could be moved if not later required.

In June of this year we will vote on a substantial increase in operating mileage. If this is not passed, the school will be in deep trouble. This, plus our increase in valuation, will place a considerable burden on all property owners.

These are a few questions that all thoughtful voters should ponder on March 26. Let's all get out and vote!

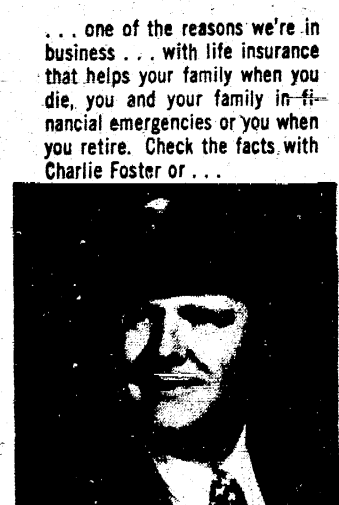

Chief Zsenyuk reported that a meeting has been set up with the Auxiliary and the school officials. Problems have arisen regarding the enforcement of rules at school functions. The Auxiliary has complained of being hampered in enforcing the rules as presented to them.

Stan Erickson, Jr., who formerly worked in the Public Works Dept. of the Village, presented a program to Council which would replace trees in the Village and further the health of those already planted. He advocated planting 100-120 trees of varying species at an approximate cost of \$1800. Moved by Scully, supported by Fitzgerald to order the replacement trees at an approximate cost of \$1800. All yeas, carried.

Bruce Daniels discussed the receipt of a letter on the funding of the wastewater system. Fitzgerald reviewed DPW activities. A great deal of time has been spent cleaning up litter. Two tires were purchased for the Trojan Loader, at a cost of \$375.47. The comminor at the waste treatment plant will have new bearings and seals installed shortly. This unit has required no work since 1964. The recirculating pump has been repaired for the digester. The Washtenaw County Health Department looked at the lake site and requested DNR to send necessary materials should the area surrounding it be used for a beach. Work is being done to ready equipment for spring and summer. Holes were patched on Main Street and gravel streets were graded. The price of asphalt has increased from \$7.50 in September, 1973 to \$10.50 current. Complaints have been received, Fitzgerald indicated, regarding the corner of Main and Riverside being used as a junkyard. The Police Dept. was asked to check into the matter. In conclusion, Fitzgerald reported that the Public Works Committee was working up a full cost estimate for Ron Mann and the Manchester Jaycees regarding restrooms at Kirk Park. A similar structure to the existing one at Carr Park has been proposed with additional space allotted for storage. Mahony described the Major Medical Extension to the Blue Cross-Blue Shield Plan now held by the Village for full-time employees. Moved by Mahony, supported by Stautz to extend the Village coverage to include the Major Medical option. All yeas, carried. A letter from the Dept. of Treasury, State of Michigan, requesting copies of the Village audits for the fiscal years ending February 1971 and 1973. The clerk was requested to check and see if these were the ones which had been sent.

Moved by Scully, supported by Mahony that invoices be paid as listed. All yeas, carried.

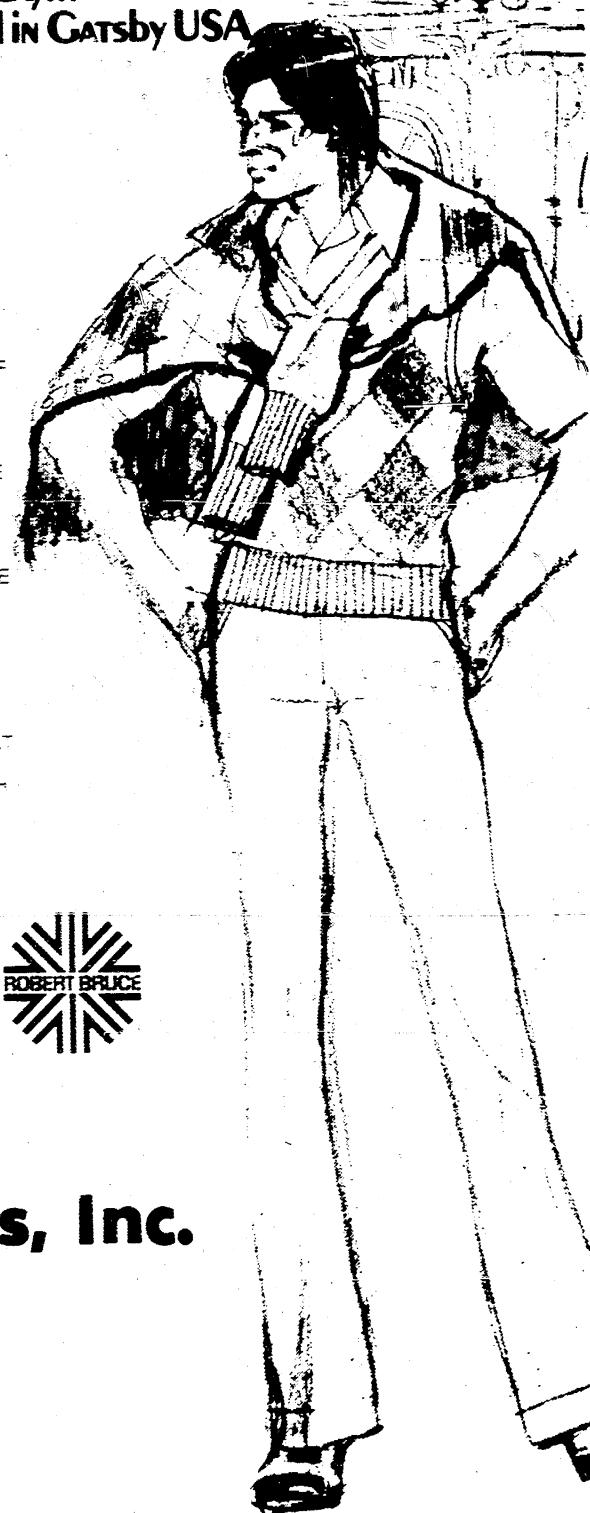

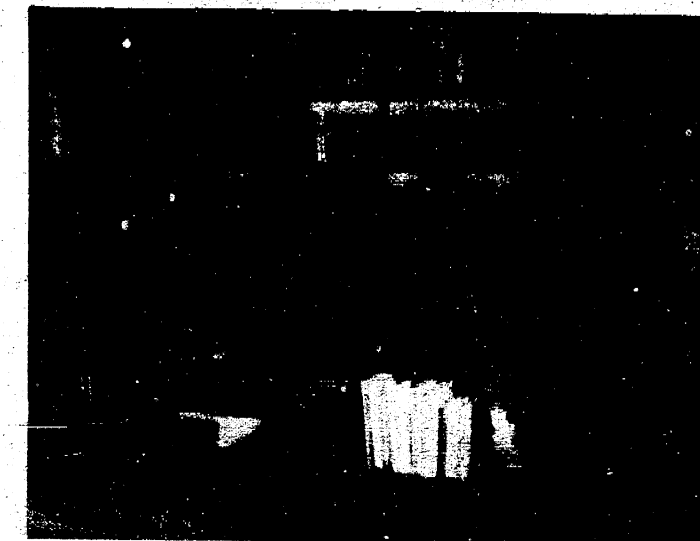

#### NORTH SHARON SIGNS CONTRACT FOR CHRISTIAN SCHOOL

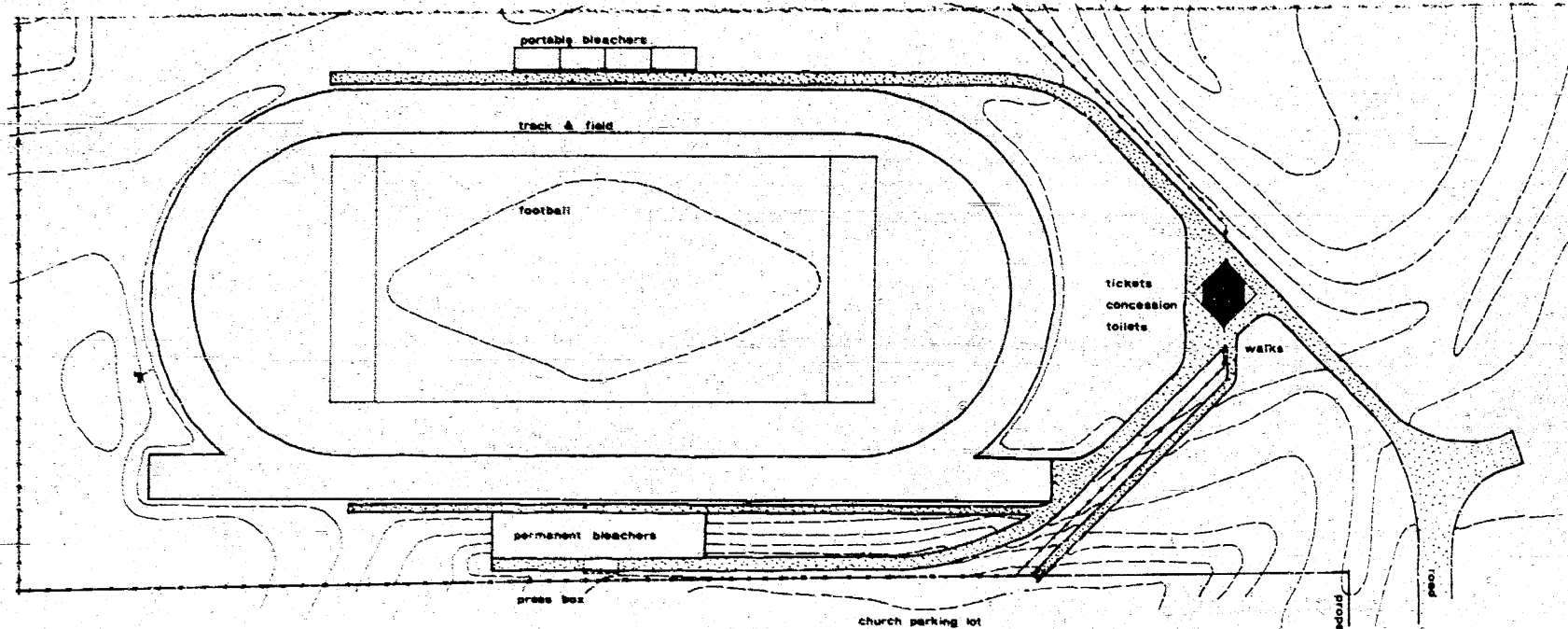

# PROPOSED NEW ATHLETIC FIELD



### Why is a new Athletic Field needed?

1. The present field is now used for Football at the Varsity, J.V. 8th and 7th grade levels; Varsity baseball; girls softball; middle school track practice; middle school boys and girls phys. ed; middle school noon hour; Athletic Boosters Summer Slow Pitch League; Church Softball League; Babe Ruth League; Summer Recreation program; Community Fair; Chicken Broil; Invitational Slow Pitch Tournament and occasional little league games.
2. We have approximately 100 boys and girls involved in a track program. These students have no facility for practicing or for holding track meets. Presently our home track meets must be held on the Grass Lake Track.
3. It appears that both our community and our schools will continue to grow in population. Sooner or later a new or additional athletic facility will be needed and there is no question about the fact that the longer we wait the more it will cost.
4. There are several reasons why the present field cannot be adequately expanded to meet the needs of our students and the community; first-to have room for a track the football field would have to be moved; the baseball and softball fields eliminated and room for the chicken broil and fair reduced if not eliminated, second-to eliminate the water problem the entire area would have to have a new drainage system, third-

because the present field is used so much it is hard to find a time when the work could be done without interfering with something.

The above information is provided to help people understand why the new facility is needed. The actual cost for both the Klager Addition and the Athletic Field would be a Maximum of 1.84 mills and with the decrease in debt retirement the actual total millage for both projects would be only 1.34 mills. This would amount to an increase of 1.34 per thousand dollars of assessed evaluation. For most of us this would cost between \$1.50 and \$2.00 per month in increased taxes. With the crowded conditions that now exist and most certainly will continue it seems both the Klager Addition and Athletic Field are worthwhile projects is not essential.

The over crowded conditions lend very little to the ability of children to learn or teachers to teach. We understand that both Klager School and the Middle School are filled to capacity. Also that it is impossible to make any additions at the Middle School. Therefore it seems in our opinion that if we intend to furnish our children with a proper education and to keep up with the growing enrollment we have not to ask should we provide the additional facility, but when? (NOW!!)

It is hoped that facts and figures that have been presented will be useful in helping voters to more fully understand the needs of our students and the community. **WHATEVER YOUR FEELING MAY BE, WE URGE EVERYONE TO GET OUT AND VOTE.**

## Agriculture in action

Michigan Farm Bureau

The truth that foresight is better than hindsight is illustrated by Dr. Laurence J. Peter in his book, "The Peter Principle." (He told the story of an overweight man who wanted to be a mountain climber. After practicing until his arms were strong enough to support his immense weight, he started his climb up the granite face of El Capitan in Yosemite National Park.

Halfway up the sheer cliff, he discovered that his rope was fraying and would break in a second or two. He looked down and saw nothing to break his fall before he hit bottom. He made a quick decision—to use a heavier rope. His hindsight came too late.

Consumers, shocked by inflation and shortages, showed lack of foresight when they sent up cries for rigid controls in 1973. Their experience, when their cries were answered, should have provided them with some hindsight. They should have learned that when you substitute controls for the sensitive "antennae" of the market place, shortages are caused rather than contained.

Consider the "Beef War of '73" when boycotts and price controls sent negative signals from the market back to producers. And when controls were placed on fertilizer, its producers went abroad to find more profitable markets, creating worse shortages at home. Even when controls were lifted, this inspired hindsight only drove prices up, because by then the commodities were in short supply. Again, hindsight came too late.

Our private enterprise, free market system has been responsible for this

# School Board Answers Your Questions

A. Manchester has never had a running track and is one of few schools in 53 area schools that does not have a track. At the present time track is one of the fastest growing sports with over a hundred boys and girls involved. It is extremely important for a school district to provide competitive sport opportunities to those students who do not have the physical makeup for football and basketball. Wrestling, track and cross country sports provide these kinds of opportunities. Without a proper track the best abilities that the students presently have are not coming out because of poor practice facilities. We, as a school district and a community, are not being fair to our young people when we do not provide these facilities.

Q. Who would use the new athletic facility?

A. The new football field would be used by the Varsity, Jr. Varsity and Middle School football teams while the track would be used by the boys and girls Varsity track teams, the Middle School

track teams, by community track programs such as the "Manchester Track Club", age group track meets, summer recreation meets, joggers, and League, Invitational and Regional meets.

The old facilities would continue to serve as a playground and physical education area for middle school students, accommodate our baseball and softball programs and the community use that it has traditionally served.

Q. Are there advantages to building a new athletic field now, or would it be better to wait?

A. One big advantage of building an athletic field now is an economical one. The longer the school district waits to provide this facility the more it is going to cost. Labor costs and material costs are constantly rising. While we are projecting an approximate cost of \$230,000 for this project now, it could easily cost much more than this in five years.

The major advantages, however, are the benefits our students would have in being able to use such a facility.

Ross then went into the lower bracket and had to wrestle his second round opponent and this time won a decision 5-4 for a 5th place.

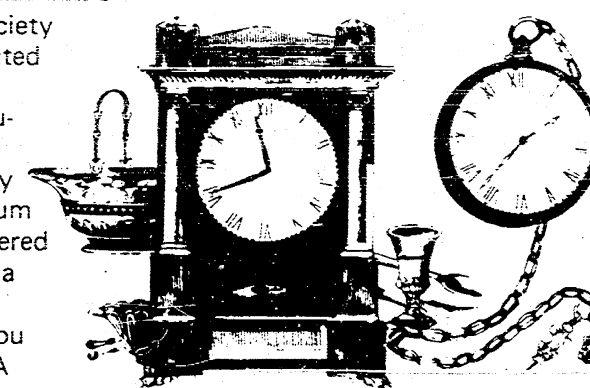

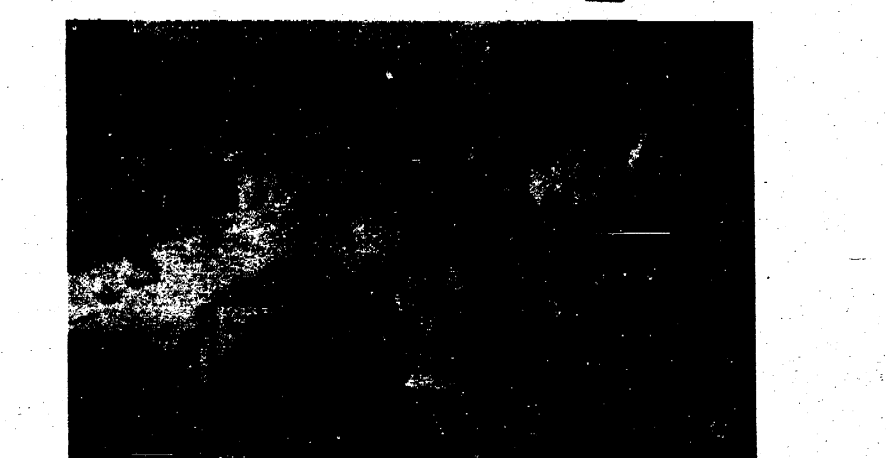

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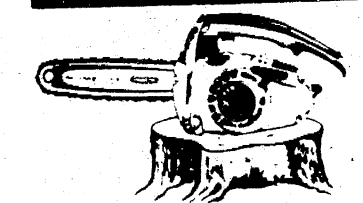

Unfortunately with 4 seconds remaining in regulation time a player launched a 25 foot desperation shot, with this shot rode the future of 2 squads, Manchester Dutchmen and Detroit Servite Panthers. This Panther player, George Fuller, sank his jumper at the buzzer giving his school a 69-68 Quarter-Final Victory.
