





Why is a new Athletic Field needed?

- 1. The present field is now used for Football at the Varsity, J.V. 8th and 7th grade levels; Varsity baseball; girls softball; middle school track practice; middle school boys and girls phys. ed; middle school noon hour; Athletic Boosters Summer Slow Pitch League; Church Softball League; Babe Ruth League; Summer Recreation program; Community Fair; Chicken Broil; Invitational Slow Pitch Tournament and occasional little league games.
- 2. We have approximately 100 boys and girls involved in a track program. These students have no facility for practicing or for holding track meets. Presently our home track meets must be held on the Grass Lake Track.
- 3. It appears that both our community and our schools will continue to grow in population. Sooner or later a new or additional athletic facility will be needed and there is no question about the fact that the longer we wait the more it will cost.
- 4. There are several reasons why the present field cannot be adequately expanded to meet the needs of our students and the community; first-to have room for a track the football field would have to be moved; the baseball and soft-ball fields eliminated and room for the chicken broil and fair reduced if not eliminated, second-to eliminate the water problem the entire area-would have to have a new drainage system, third-

The above information is provided to help people understand why the new facility is needed. The actual cost for both the Klager Addition and the Athletic Field would be a Maximum of 1.84 mills and with the decrease in debt retirement the actual total millage for both projects would be only 1.34 mills. This would amount to and increase of 1.34 per thousand dollars of assessed evaluation. For most of us this would cost between \$1.50 and \$2.00 per month in increased taxes. The truth that foresight is better than hindsight is illustrated by Dr. Laurence J. Peter in his book, "The Peter Prescription." (He told the story of an overweight man who wanted to be a mountain climber. After practicing until his arms were strong enough to support his immense weight, he started his climb up the granite face of El Capitan in Yosemite National Park.

Halfway up the sheer cliff, he discovered that his rope was fraying and would break in a second or two. He looked down and saw nothing to break his fall before he hit bottom. He made a quick decision—to use a heavier rope. His hindsight came too late.

Consumers, shocked by inflation and shortages, showed lack of foresight when they sent up cries for rigid controls in 1973. Their experience, when their cries were answered, should have provided them with some hindsight. They should have learned that when you substitute controls for the sensitive "antennae" of the market place, shortages are caused rather than contained.

Consider the "Beef War of '73" when boycotts and price controls sent negative signals from the market back to producers. And when controls were placed on fertilizer, its producers went abroad to find more profitable markets, creating worse shortages at home. Even when controls were lifted, this inspired hind-sight only drove prices up, because by then the commodities were in short supply. Again, hindsight came too late.
