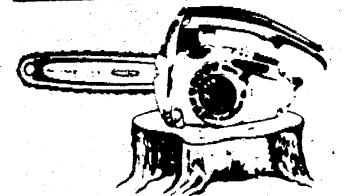

Unbelievable Shot Finishes Dutch

Manchester knew that this contest was a do or die situation. For 31 minutes and 55 seconds we saw 2 teams fight it out to advance to the State Semi-Finals. Unfortunately with 4 seconds remaining in regulation time a player launched a 25 foot desperation shot, with this shot rode the future of 2 squads, Manchester Dutchmen and Detroit Servite Panthers. This Panther player, George Fuller, sank his jumper at the buzzer giving his school a 69-68 Quarter-Final Victory.

The first started out with a bang for the Mighty Dutch. They showed no pressure as they opened 6 point leads 6-0 and 8-2. Rich Kennedy dumped in 6 points while John Savage and Dean Decker helped with 4 each to put the Dutch ahead by 2, 16-14. The majority of the second period was controlled by the Dutch but with 1:35 left in the half Servite went ahead for the first time 31-30. Savage paced the Dutch tossing for 8 points with Steve Beach coming off the bench to pop for 4 points. The Dutch went to the locker room down 2, 36-34. The third period began with Servite controlling the tip again (they got all 4 jumps). Manchester fell behind 4 but closed the gap only to go under 6. Dutch did get fired up to end the period tied 54 all. Kennedy and Scott Gormley brought the Dutch back scoring 6 points apiece. In the final period the lead changed 8 times then Servite jumped to a 5 point lead at 1:49. Savage hit a bucket and Servite came down and were fouled but they missed enabling Savage to chalk up 2 more to bring the Dutch within 1. Next Servite went into a partial stall finally seeing a good percentage shot with 30 odd seconds left, but Beach came from nowhere to jam the ball back to Kennedy. Kennedy and Bruce Cray worked the ball in to Savage who shot a 10 footer as all watched it go thru the hoop to put the Dutch up 1 with 5 seconds remaining. The Manchester fans were in bedlam. Servite called time out then passed a long one only to call time again with 4 seconds (this enabled them to pass in at side court). The rest is history as Fuller took the inbound pass, pivoted, and let go with his 25 footer. It arched toward the basket and found nothing but net. Servite had stopped Manchester's trek to Lansing by one point, 69-68.

Savage led all scorers tossing for 24 as he swept the boards 11 times. Kennedy followed popping for 16. Gormley and Decker pumped for 8 each while Cray and Beach posted 6 apiece. Turnovers were deadlocked at 19. Servite proceeded to play Muskegon Saturday last. With the score tied Fuller shot again with only seconds left. His shot failed to go in but Muskegon was charged with goal-tending so Servite was awarded the winning points. Servite now goes up against Bay City for the State Championship.

In a decisive vote Tuesday, March 26 citizens in the Manchester School District rejected additional classrooms and a new athletic field. 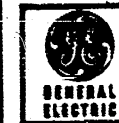

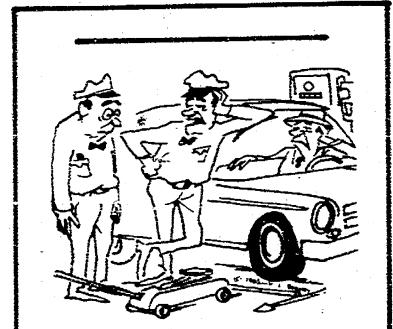

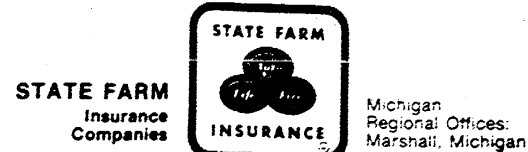

ASK THE DENTIST

By Alfred E. Seyler, D.D.S. and the Michigan Dental Association

Q. My dentist told me that unless I had the cavities in my child's baby teeth filled, the second teeth would decay too. He is six years old. Is it true that decay will go to the second teeth from the baby teeth?

A. I suspect there is some lack of complete understanding between you and your dentist, but I trust I can clear it up for you. In the strictest sense, decay does not go from the baby teeth to the second teeth. For example—if a baby molar has a large cavity, the second tooth which is growing in the jaw under the baby tooth, will not be decayed just because of the cavity in the baby tooth.

However, if the baby tooth above the growing permanent tooth becomes abraded on account of deep decay, the permanent tooth may be affected. In such a case, the second tooth does not actually decay, but when it comes into the mouth there is likely to be a spot or area which is brown or dark yellow. Such a spot may be soft, and will decay more readily than well formed enamel.

Another instance where decay in baby teeth and some new permanent teeth. Investigators have found that the bacteria which cause decay in teeth are very numerous in such a situation, and of course, the second teeth are therefore more likely to decay than if all cavities are treated by the dentist. You will note I said "treated by the dentist," not necessarily filled with metal restorative material. Such "treatment" can be a form of temporary filling material, which the dentist may use to fill a cavity until he can get around to placing a permanent filling. Not only do such treatment fillings stop tooth-aches, but they also help the pulp or nerve of the tooth to heal itself and they cut down on the number of tooth decay producing bacteria in the mouth.

That farmers should be involved in such an idealistic confrontation is not surprising. If these educators and their advisors are successful in their efforts to make economic literacy a part of everyone's lifestyle, agriculture will remain the "unchained giant" of our nation—a phenomenal, productive, efficient industry which can benefit all mankind and promote world peace.

An understanding of our economic system, which has been the envy of the world, would mean an end to citizens' cries for government controls that squelch productivity, create shortages and damage farmers' hard-earned markets. It would halt inflation caused by excessive government spending and demands for costly social programs.

It would mean that capitalism, profits, incentives, would no longer be "bad" words in our vocabulary.

It's the college's philosophy that economics should be an integral part of all educational curricula and mandatory in every school system's program.

They have proven, through pilot programs, that kindergartners are receptive to the teaching of economics. Through games, "comic" books, and producer-middleman-consumer exercises, youngsters readily learn the basic lessons of economics which they will use in all activities of their lives.

To gather sufficient united effort to turn their dreams into reality, the college and its advisory council face a big challenge. Economics has long been classed as dreared and dull, rather than the exciting, pertinent subject it really is.

They'll have no problem getting support from farmers, who know they have everything to gain from the economic literacy of the American public.

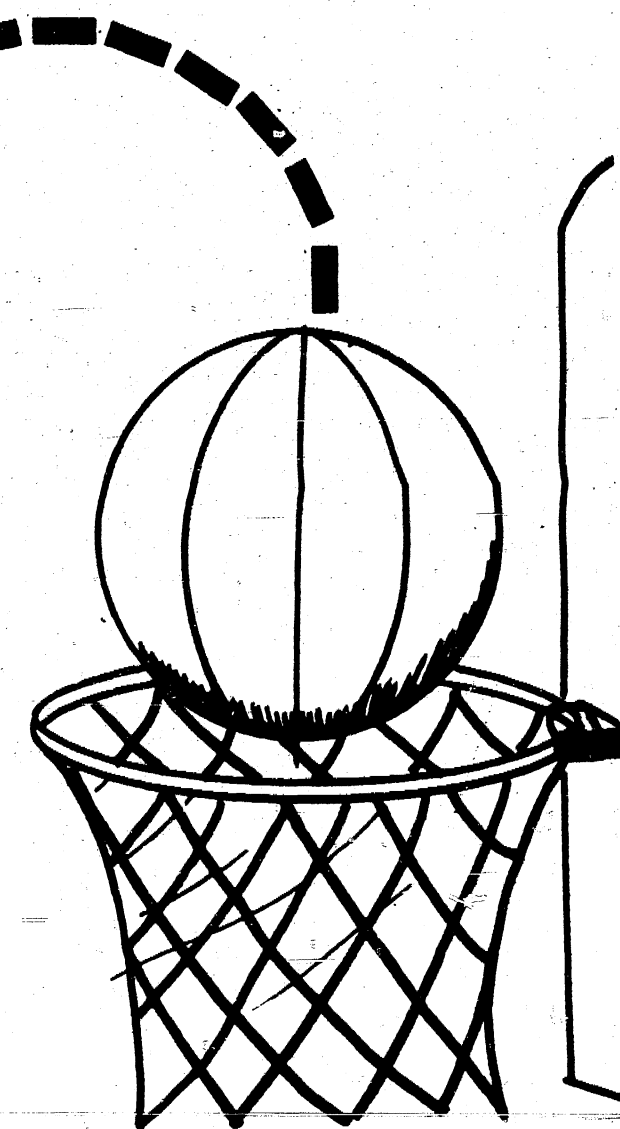
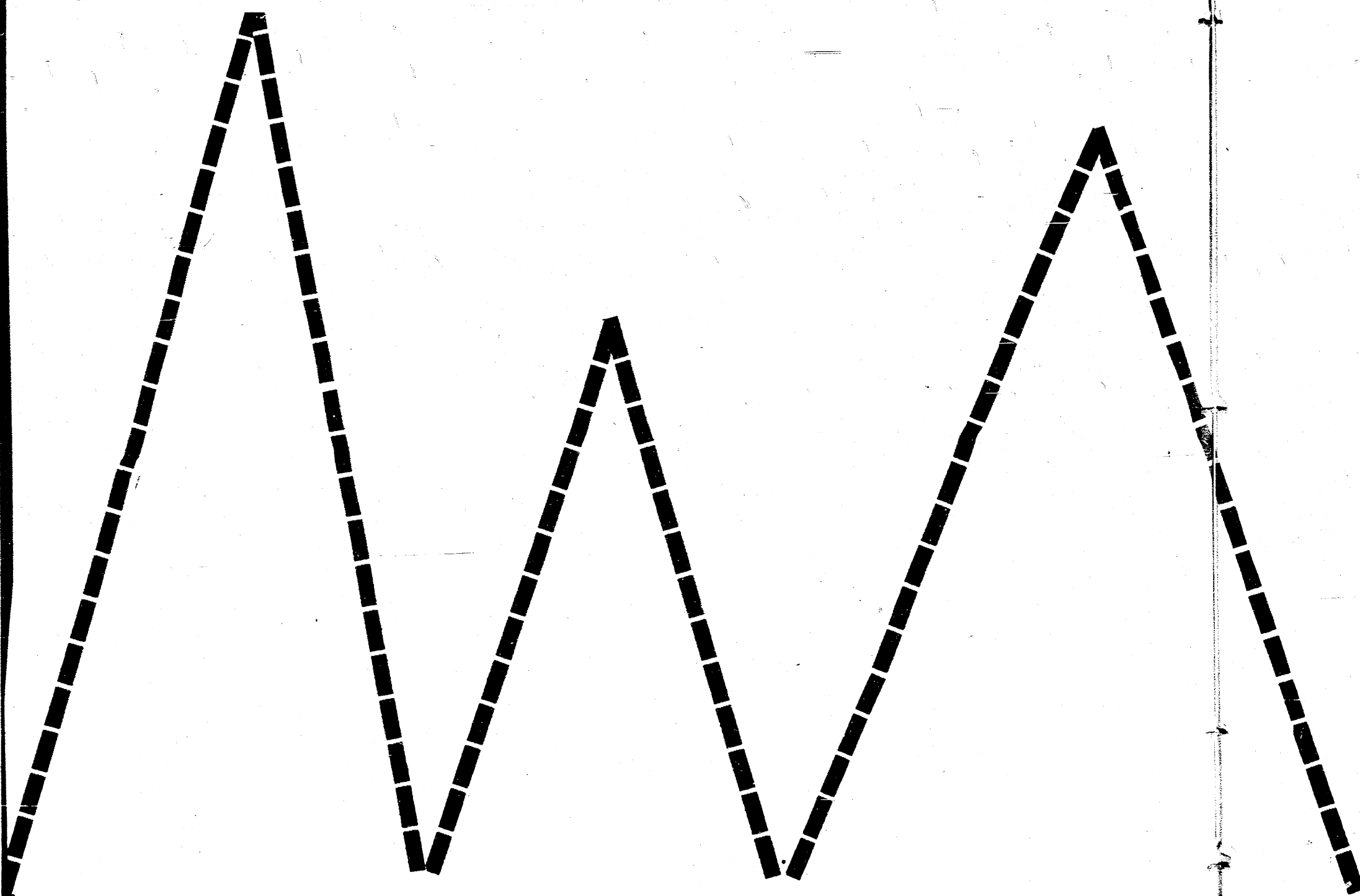

Michigan Bell reported today it has embarked on a record construction program this year that calls for the expenditure of nearly \$420 million for the expansion and improvement of communications facilities throughout the state.

David K. Easlick, company president, said that Michigan Bell has committed itself to the record outlay even though "neither the immediate economic outlook nor the company's poor earnings would ordinarily encourage an investment of this magnitude."

Easlick said the construction program is based on forecasts that, despite the present instability in the economy, there will be continuing long-term growth in telephone customers and calling, requiring major expansion of communications facilities.

"We must look ahead and plan for the future," Easlick said. "It is less costly to anticipate future growth and to build now than it would be to engage in a 'crash' construction program at a later date," he said. "And, in the long run, a 'catch-up' construction program would cost us and our customers more money and wouldn't satisfactorily meet our service obligations to them."

Stressing the importance of the company's program to the economy, Easlick said it would directly support some 20,000 jobs—half of them in Michigan—in the telephone company and in such

Easlick pointed out that providing communications services requires a lead time of months and even years in some instances in the planning, engineering and manufacturing of the increasingly complex equipment needed to meet customer demands.

"And, we have to keep ahead of population shifts and local growth too," he said. "It costs money to meet customer expectations and to keep a step ahead of growth," he emphasized, "and our 1974 construction budget is a reflection of this." Easlick said the company has spent over \$2.2 billion during the past decade for new construction in Michigan nearly \$1.5 billion of it in the past five years.

Easlick noted that the 1974 statewide construction budget is up 19.3 percent over 1973 expenditures of \$352 million. This is slightly more than the 15.4% increase in 1973 over the previous year and is, in part, due to the continuing escalating effects of inflation, he said. Michigan Bell provides service to over 2.7 million customers in all or part of 76 of the state's 83 counties.

The company expects to add about 185,000 telephones this year, which will bring its total telephones to over 5.3 million. The company anticipates handling over 9.6 billion local and long distance calls this year compared with 8.9 billion in 1973.

The tax law provides penalties for taxpayers who fail to file a tax return or pay their taxes on time. If you file a return late, a penalty of 5 per cent per month of the tax due will be added to your taxes-up to a total of 25 per cent of the tax due.

The law requires you to pay a penalty of half of 1 per cent per month if you file your return on time but fail to pay your taxes on time. This penalty for late payment is also limited to 25 per cent of the tax due. In any one month during which a taxpayer has failed both to file and to pay, the total penalty cannot exceed 5 per cent. Neither penalty will be imposed if you can show there was a good reason for your failure to file or pay on time. Regardless of your reason, however, you will be charged 6 per cent annual interest on taxes not paid by the due date and there is no limit to the amount of interest that can accrue.

Every exemption you claim for yourself or your dependents is worth a \$750 deduction from your income this year. What exemptions are allowed? Every taxpayer is allowed to claim one for himself. A married taxpayer also may be entitled to claim an exemption for his or her spouse on his or her separate return. Some taxpayers may qualify for additional exemptions for themselves and their spouses because of age or blind-

You may claim these exemptions whether you itemize deductions or take the standard deduction. If you use the tax tables, the number of your exemptions will determine which table to use that has your exemptions already figured in.

In his position with the United Church Board, Dr. Marcus directs the denomination's extensive medical, educational, urban, agricultural, social and evangelistic programs in Angola, Rhodesia, South Africa, Zambia, Tanzania, Malawi, Ghana and Togo.

Before his appointment as Africa secretary in 1962, Dr. Marcus served for five years as co-secretary for Racial and Cultural Relations of the denomination's Council for Christian Social Action. In 1970 Dr. Marcus was appointed by the U.S. Department of State to serve as a member of its Advisory Board on Africa, a civilian board made up of Americans most knowledgeable about Africa to advise the Department.

Born in Swiftown, Mississippi, on February 14, 1917, Dr. Marcus was named

outstanding alumnus of the year in 1962 by Alcorn Agricultural and Mechanical College, Lorman, Mississippi, from which he was graduated in 1940. He received a bachelor of divinity degree from Lincoln University Theological Seminary, Lincoln University, Pennsylvania, in 1943. He has also done graduate work at Western Theological Seminary, Pitts-

burg, Pennsylvania. Dr. Marcus has served as a leader at the annual Race Relations Institute at Fisk University, Nashville, Tennessee, and as dean of the annual racial and cultural institute at McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago. He is also the author of a widely used booklet, "The Bible and Race."

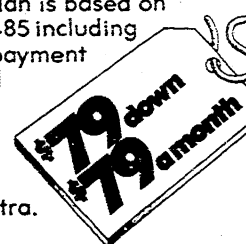

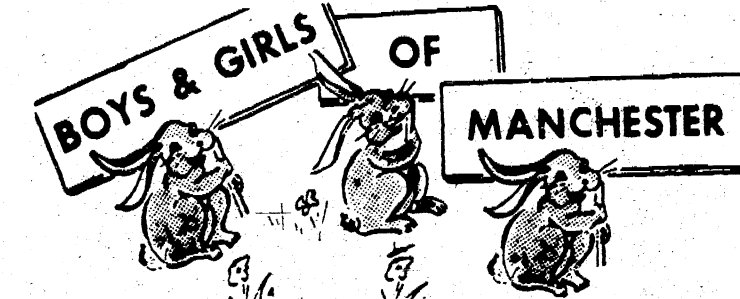
