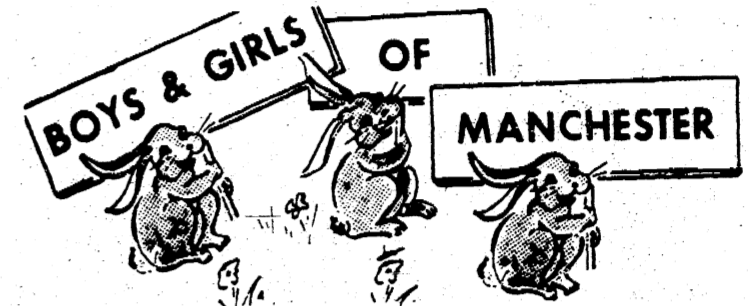

BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING

The regular meeting of the Board of Education was held in the High School Library on March 11, 1974 with all members present. Also present were Superintendent Swartz and Principals Kocessid, Tapping Tassie and McGuire, Mrs. Vicki Fryhoff, members of the Athletic Boosters Club and representatives of the North Sharon Bible Church.

President Klager called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m.

Building trades bills were presented for payment. Lou Vogel moved, supported by Don Walter, that the bills for the house be accepted as presented. Motion carried.

The athletic boosters were present to talk about the bond issue for the new athletic field. Their concern was whether the bond issue for the athletic field would get as much publicity as the addition to the Klager School. They were concerned as to how the field would be publicized and what they could do to help. They gave their full support to both the classroom additions and the completion of the new athletic field.

The representatives of the North Sharon Bible Church presented their views and concerns about the problem of smoking in the public schools.

The salaries of the driver training instructors were discussed. Mr. Swartz reminded the board that their salaries are lower than other areas, and, therefore, he recommended that they be raised to \$6,000 per hour. Lou Vogel moved, supported by Gene Bentschneider, that we raise the salary to \$6,000 per hour. The motion was withdrawn and tabled until further information is available.

Mr. Swartz reported on future Vocational and Technical Education plans. Talks are underway with Saline and Milan. The board felt that this is the right direction to go and gave their support.

The comparison of gallons and cost of fuel oil and gasoline for the school district was presented. The fuel oil gallons have dropped but the total cost has increased. Gasoline usage has increased slightly but the cost has risen greatly.

The report on the buses was given and a special meeting of the bus committee will be called to go over the information with Wm. McCall.

The board went into executive session

and considered nine teachers for tenure status. The nine teachers are as follows: Joan Bogard, Astrida Ewing, Rebecca Mann, Carolyn Patterson, Joan Rinehart, Charmaine Schwab, Carol Walter, JoAnn Williams, Bonnie Spess. Thirteen teachers were recommended for a second year probationary status. The thirteen teachers are as follows: Barry Hesse, Jane Boyce, Mary Ann Detling, Diane Friese, Virginia Gains, Wayne Jackson, Diane Ann, Janice Little, James McCullough, Jeanne McMullen, Robert Novotz, Carol Savage, Jean Spike.

The board then went back into general session. Don Walter moved, supported by Lou Vogel, that we grant tenure to the nine teachers eligible for tenure status. Motion carried. Gene Bentschneider moved, supported by Don Walter, that we grant second year probationary status to the thirteen teachers eligible for second year probationary status. Motion carried.

Mr. Klager then appointed two committees. The committee to look into additional land for the Pleasant Lake School is Rene Feldkamp, Lou Vogel, and Andy Luckhardt. The committee to look into the land to connect the high school property and the Klager School is Jim Walkow, Gene Bentschneider, and Don Walter.

The board then went on record to congratulate the basketball team on their wonderful success and requested a special letter be written to them. Meeting adjourned.

All members were present except Jim Walkow. Superintendent Swartz and Principals Ted Tapping and Don Tassie and Douglas Price were also in attendance.

Discussion was held on the recent bonding election and the board discussed alternatives that would appear feasible as far as class size and space is concerned.

The financial report and monthly bills will be taken up at the work session of the board.

Driver training salaries were again reviewed and information was furnished board members relative to salaries being

paid in other school districts. After reviewing this information Lou Vogel moved, supported by Gene Bentschneider, that the driver training salaries be increased to \$6,000 per hour. This was unanimously approved.

Due to an easing on the energy crisis Superintendent Swartz recommended that the board reinstate some of the field trips that were eliminated earlier.

It was also reported that the allotment would be 90% of the 1972 base. Mr. Swartz stated that perhaps it would be necessary to make application for additional gallons through the State Department in Lansing.

A resolution honoring the Varsity Basketball team and Coach was read. Gene Bentschneider moved, supported by Lou Vogel, that this resolution be adopted and it was passed unanimously. Resolution follows:

WHEREAS: The team members played exceptionally well as a team and by doing so brought credit to the Manchester School District and the community, and

WHEREAS: Each player did give his utmost in all practice sessions and

all games, and

WHEREAS: Coach Brian Schick performed most capably as a coach and a representative of the school district,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Appropriate recognition and appreciation be given to Coach Brian Schick and Varsity Team Members—Bruce Cray, Scott Gormley, Rich Kennedy, John Savage, Jeff Wallace, Steve Beach, Dean Decker, Scott Evisizer, Mark Feldkamp, Chris Gregerson, Kurt Kensler, Paul Tassie and team manager, Dan Popley.

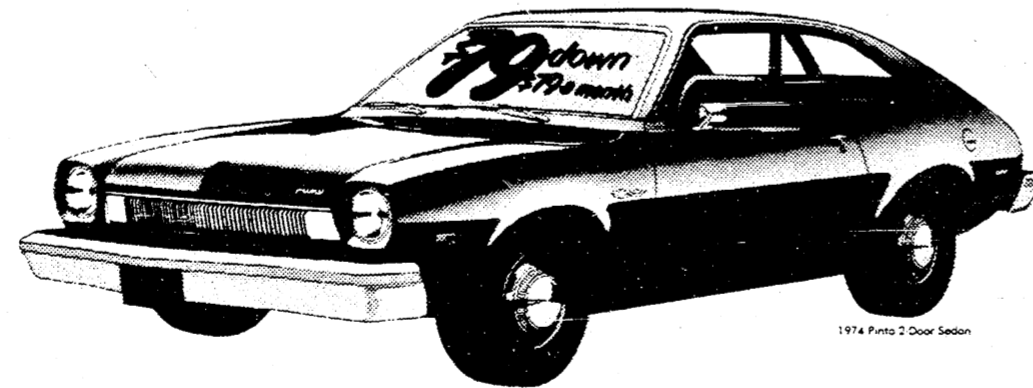

TO THE GAS CUSTOMERS OF CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY

NOTICE OF HEARING GAS ALLOCATION PROCEDURE

Case No. U-3990

On January 15, 1974, Consumers Power Company filed with the Michigan Public Service Commission a Supplement to Application in Case No. U-3990, which requested that the Commission amend paragraph "C" of its Order dated November 26, 1971 in Case No. U-3990. Consumers Power Company states in its Supplement to Application that there exists in the State of Michigan, and elsewhere throughout the United States, a severe gas supply shortage, which shortage, which shortage had made it necessary that suppliers of natural gas, including Applicant's pipeline suppliers, substantially curtail the deliveries of natural gas to their customers. Consumers Power Company also states, in its Supplement to Application, that, in response to this shortage of natural gas, the Commission granted Applicant authority to implement a gas allocation procedure. One of the stated purposes of the currently-effective gas allocation procedure was to alleviate the hardship then being experienced by certain commercial and industrial customers. This hardship existed because prior to the effective date of such gas allocation procedure, gas usage of commercial and industrial customers was restricted to "base year allocations." Thus, weather-related increases in gas consumption and increases in gas consumption arising from increased usage of existing manufacturing or processing equipment was precluded. Accordingly, Applicant proposed, in its authority to create the presently-effective gas allocation procedure, to ameliorate this situation by making sufficient gas available, independent of the proposed gas allocation procedure, to permit commercial and industrial customers then being served (other than those being supplied gas from steam generating equipment, electric generating equipment, or kilns rated at more than 50,000 cubic feet of gas per hour) to "fully utilize their existing equipment" presently utilizing gas as a primary fuel. In response to Applicant's proposal, the Commission authorized Applicant, in paragraph "C" of its Order dated November 26, 1971, in Case No. U-3990, to:

"...make available to its present customers (other than those now being supplied gas from steam generating equipment, electric generating equipment, and kilns rated at more than 50,000 cubic feet of gas per hour) sufficient gas to fully utilize existing equipment which is presently utilizing gas as a primary fuel..."

In recent months, Applicant has been confronted with the claim on several occasions that under the quoted language from paragraph "C" of the November 26, 1971 Order, existing customers may utilize existing equipment to heat new buildings or building additions. The Applicant, uniformly, has denied this claim as being inconsistent with the intent of the gas allocation procedure in general and the intent of paragraph "C" of the November 26, 1971 Order in particular. Accordingly, Applicant proposes that the Commission amend its Order dated November 26, 1971, in Case No. U-3990, so as to make clear that the use by Applicant's existing customers of existing equipment to heat new buildings or building additions is precluded, unless such use is restricted to an annual allocation of gas consistent with the customer's previous gas usage.

As set forth in the proposed paragraph "C," Consumers Power Company proposes that ordering paragraph "C" read as follows:

"C. Consumers Power Company is hereby authorized, independent of the gas allocation procedure herein approved, to make available to its present customers sufficient gas to fully utilize (1) existing manufacturing and commercial or industrial processing equipment which is presently

using natural gas as a primary fuel, except that Consumers Power Company shall restrict customers who are now being supplied gas for steam generating equipment, electric generating equipment, and kilns rated at more than 50,000 cubic feet of gas per hour, to the annual Mcf capacity reservation contained in their present gas service contracts or, if there is no annual capacity reservation in their contracts, to the base year allocation or the commitment made by Consumers Power Company in accordance with the gas sales restrictions authorized by this Commission in Case No. U-3778, and (2) existing space heating equipment, provided there is no expansion or addition in the area to be heated. If an existing customer makes additions to the area being served by existing space heating equipment through additions to the existing building or new buildings, such customer shall be limited to an annual allocation of gas consistent with the customer's previous gas usage."

The Supplement to Application in Case No. U-3990, together with the Commission's initial order therein, is available for public inspection at the offices of the Michigan Public Service Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, and at each local office of Consumers Power Company.

The Commission has scheduled hearings on the Supplement to Application, and it has ordered that Notice be given that:

A. A public hearing will be held at 9:30 AM on April 19, 1974 in the offices of the Commission in the Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, for purposes of determining whether, or in what form, ordering paragraph "C" of the Commission's Order in Case No. U-3990 should be amended.

B. Any parties seeking to intervene in these proceedings, in accordance with Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, shall file with the Commission at least five (5) days prior to April 19, 1974, an original and six (6) conformed copies of the Petition to Intervene, together with Proof of Service, upon Consumers Power Company.

C. THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ORDERING PARAGRAPH "C" OF THE COMMISSION'S ORDER IN CASE NO. U-3990 DESCRIBED IN THIS NOTICE IS IN THE FORM REQUESTED BY CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY. THE MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION MAY EITHER AUTHORIZE ITS ADOPTION IN THE FORM REQUESTED, DENY ITS ADOPTION, OR MAY ORDER THE ADOPTION OF A NEW ORDERING PARAGRAPH "C" IN A FORM DIFFERENT FROM THAT DESCRIBED HEREIN.

Jurisdiction of the Commission in this Order is pursuant to Act 300, Public Acts of 1909, as amended (MCLA 462.2); Act 419, Public Acts of 1919, as amended (MCLA 460.51); Act 3, Public Acts of 1939, as amended (MCLA 460.1); Act 9, Public Acts of 1929, as amended (MCLA 483.101); Act 306, Public Acts of 1969, as amended (MCLA 24.201); and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1954 Administrative Code, Supplement No. 54 R 460.11.

reliable suppliers of agricultural commodities on a competitive basis with the producers of other nations. It's a healthy situation when farmers can take more profit from the marketplace and less from the Federal treasury.

America's breadbasket spillover also gives us bargaining power for products which can be produced cheaper in other countries. Imported automobiles, suits made from imported fabrics, Japanese-made recorders and television sets, shoes made in Spain and Italy—all are paid for with American agricultural products.

Because this spillover of agricultural production helps establish our nation as a dependable source of supply for food and other products, when our leaders sit down at the council tables of the world, they truly hold the high cards in international negotiations.

For this, we should all be grateful.
